NEWS FROM— County Agent's Office

Grasshoppers are really causing the damage here in Wheeler County and now is the best time to control these pests. This can be done three different ways as listed below: Dust 20% toxaphene—40% sulfur, or 3-5-4 mixture, or 10% chlordane—40% sulfur at the rate of 15 to 20 pounds of dust per acre. You can also use 2 1/2% aldrin—40% sulfur or 2 1/2% dieldrin—40% sulfur at the rate of 8 to 15 pounds per acre.

You can also use a spray to control the grasshoppers. Use toxaphene or chlordane at the rate of 1 1/2 to 3 pounds per acre. You can also use aldrin or dieldrin at the rate of 1/8 to 1/4 pound per acre as needed.

A bait will also control the hoppers. This method is a little more work and is much slower but it will work. Use 4 pounds of calcium arsenate or sodium fluosilicate per 100 pounds of the following dry materials: cotton seed hulls, wheat bran, or saw dust. Mix the poison with these dry materials and then add enough water until you can squeeze out a few drops when you mash it in your hands. You can add a little banana oil or molasses to sweeten the mixture and make it more palatable for the hoppers. Spread this with a scoop along the fence rows and in the areas where the hoppers are.

Best results have been obtained with the sprays and they will stay a little longer and will be effective for about 8 to 10 days now. Any cotton sprayer or duster will do an excellent job of control by spraying along the fence rows and turnrows of the cotton and feed fields. For more information, check by the county agent's office.

Wheeler County 4-H club judging teams went to the State Judging contests last week at Texas A. & M. Three teams went from Wheeler County and again this year this was the largest number of teams from any county in this district and tied with the largest number from any county in the state.

The livestock judging team placed fourth and Carrol Pitcock was eighth high point individual, Laurence Whiteley was 10th high individual, Jimmy Harris was 12th high point individual and Joe Van Zandt of Mobettie was 30th high point individual. All the members of the livestock judging team except Joe Van Zandt were from Kelton.

The dairy judging team placed 6th in the state contest and Thomas Ray (Tooter) Helton was high man on the Wheeler team and 15th high individual in the entire contest. Gene Haddox was 2nd on team and 16th high individual in the contest while Jerry Hays was 3rd on the team and 20th high individual in the contest and Junior Haddox was alternate on the dairy team. All of these boys were from Briscoe.

The crops judging team placed 7th in state competition and the team members were Troy Dean, Jones, Bob Curlee, and Bruce Hall, all from Allison.

Jamie Clark went to the State Round-up as a 4-H delegate from Wheeler County. The entire group went by school bus and we want to thank the board of trustees from Briscoe for making a bus available for our use. The trip was the most at expense paid for this through the donations of the Wheeler Kiwanis Club, Shamrock Chamber of Commerce, and the Wheeler County Farm Bureau.

The 4-Hers went through Chillicothe, Wichita Falls, Stephenville, Temple, Brownwood, Abilene, Pampa and everyone had a very enjoyable trip. They were accompanied by County Agent Ray D. Siegmund.

3 LADS BREAK JAIL, CAUGHT MONDAY NIGHT

The three teen-age prisoners who escaped from the Wheeler County jail here Saturday night have been caught and returned to jail. Action on a fourth youth who is reported to have met them after their escape is pending.

Deputy Sheriff Lake Black of Shamrock said that all three were caught Monday night. Wayne Turner, 18, was picked up by Sheriff Bus Dorman and Black at his mother's residence, northwest of Twitty about 7:00 p.m.

Billy Lyden Scaif, 17, and Robert Allen Hicks, 18, both of Willis, Texas, were collared by Black about 10:15 p.m. on Highway 66 east of Shamrock. The fourth, Bill Dees, 16, is still free, although there is a chance that he will be charged with aiding the escapees.

The jail-break occurred sometime between 8 and 9 o'clock Saturday night while Mrs. Dorman was gone to church and Sheriff Dorman was out on duty. The Wheeler jail is situated on the second floor of the building where the Dorman family lives. The three had hitched a ride from a passing farmer and gone to Shamrock.

Turner was being held in jail in lieu of payment of bond on a charge of attempted strong-arm robbery. Dees was out on bond on the same charge. The other two, Scaif and Hicks, were being detained on charges of automobile theft and burglary. There has been a series of automobile thefts in the Shamrock area in the past month.

FORMER COUNTY RESIDENT DIES

Mrs. Maude Watts Bradstreet, a former Wheeler County resident and sister of Mrs. Emma Martin of Shamrock, and R. T. Watts of Wheeler, died at 2:45 o'clock Tuesday morning at her home in Plainview.

Mrs. Bradstreet, 51 years old, had been in ill health for a number of years and had been seriously ill the past 12 months.

Funeral services were held in the First Baptist Church in Shamrock at 2:30 o'clock Wednesday afternoon with Rev. James O. Todd, pastor, and Dr. E. S. James, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Vernon, officiating.

Clay Funeral Home was in charge of interment in Shamrock Cemetery.

Mrs. Bradstreet was born July 27, 1900 in Sulphur Springs. She was married to Henry Bradstreet on July 12, 1918, in Wheeler.

The family had resided in Plainview for only six weeks, their home being in Vernon, for the past six years. They moved to Vernon from Dalhart.

Surviving are the widower, Henry Bradstreet, Plainview; two daughters, Mrs. Lucille Rowell and Mrs. Joyce Hillingsworth, both of Plainview; one son, Sgt. Winfred Wayne Bradstreet, Gap Town, Penn.; her father, J. T. Watts, Amherst.

Two sisters, Mrs. Emma Martin, Shamrock; Mrs. Ruth Rowell, Littlefield; two brothers, R. T. Watts, Wheeler; and C. W. Watts, Tulla; five grandchildren: Jackie, Dana and Judy Rowell, all of Plainview; James H. Hollingsworth, also of Plainview; and Susie Bradstreet, Cactus.

Mrs. Bradstreet united with the Baptist Church in girlhood. Her membership was in the Vernon Baptist Church.

Her husband, Henry Bradstreet, is a nephew of Marvin and J. C. Bradstreet of Wheeler.

Oil? Maybe!

It is the understanding of the Times that the Gulf Oil Corporation has staked two exploratory locations west and northwest of Wheeler within the last week and have started dirt work on one location preparatory to moving in a drilling rig.

One of the staked locations is on the M. D. Bullard place which is located 7 miles west of Wheeler as the section lines go. The other is reported to be on the Mary E. Redding Estate property in Section 21, Block A-5 and is 5 miles west of Wheeler as the section lines go.

The Bullard place is the south half section of Section 23, Block A-5, H&GN RRY Co. Survey.

So far as the Times can learn both locations are for core or formation tests. In other words, the oil company concerned is just looking around to see what is under the sandy land of Wheeler County.

Bulldozer work has been started on the Bullard location and at noon today (Thursday) the slush pit appeared to be about half dug. The drilling company has cut a road due west from the county road to the location. So far as the Times can learn no work has been started on the Redding location as yet.

According to reports, the Big Chief Drilling Co. of Duncan, Okla. is moving in a rig from New Mexico to do the drilling at the Bullard location. Reports are that there is no set contract depth but it is presumed that it will be a deep test.

In connection with the oil scare which these locations have caused in this vicinity, D. G. Sims reported this week that he sold half royalty on his place which is located just south of the Bullard half section at a base price of \$137.50 per acre. Sims' place is in the Northwest Quarter of Section 18, Block A-5, H&GN RRY Co. Survey.

Editorial

HORSE-SENSE FROM RIDGEWAY

General Matthew Ridgeway, now Allied Commander in Europe, gave Senators who are members of the Senate Armed Forces Committee a clear picture of the dilemma in Korea, when he passed through Washington, on his way to his new European post.

To those politicians and retired military men who have been screaming for a new

offensive in Korea, General Ridgeway's words are a much-needed antidote. When asked by a member of the Senate committee whether he had a plan to end the war, Ridgeway did not fall into the political trap and assert that if he were entirely free to run the show, he could end the conflict. Instead, he pointed out that there was no simple solution to the Korean fighting and that the solution rested in the political sphere and not in the military field.

General Ridgeway also pointed out that to rout the Communists in Korea and run them to the Chinese border would not necessarily end the war. This is the one monumental point which so many Americans have blindly refused to understand in the last twelve months. Even if the United Nations amassed superior military power and struck a powerful blow at Koreans and Chinese in North Korea and forced them back to the Chinese border—which is a much longer front than the present one—the war would not be over.

Even if the United Nations command could wipe out all the Communist troops in North Korea today, the war would not necessarily end with that stroke. The Communists have not committed the majority of their available troops by any means and are perfectly capable of bringing huge forces into the conflict when and if the United Nations reach the Chinese border and attempt to invade China.

The United States and the United Nations have restored the democracy of South Korea and driven the Communists out of this free country. That was the purpose of the U. S. effort from the beginning. Today the battle line is about the shortest it could possibly be in North Korea and there are certainly two good sides to the argument for a huge U. S. effort to capture North Korea—which has been under Communist domination since 1945—or to invade China. It is refreshing to see that Ridgeway admits that there is no simple solution to a tough problem in Korea.

USING GOLD TO FIGHT CANCER

In the Naval Hospital at Bethesda, Md., a new weapon is being used against cancer. Tiny crystals of radioactive gold giving off rays similar to X-rays, are being injected into cancer patients who are suffering from dangerous complications of certain deep-seated cancers of the lung and abdominal organs.

Gold is particularly well suited for this job in that it is a heavy metal and stays put until it does its job. For all practical purposes, the radiating power of gold lasts for only ten days, while some other material, which would give out radiation for thousands of years, would not be suitable.

Reports from naval doctors indicate that there is growing evidence that this new treatment helps to relieve pain, reduces the need for periodic tapping of the fluid, and in some cases appears to cause reduction of the cancer itself.

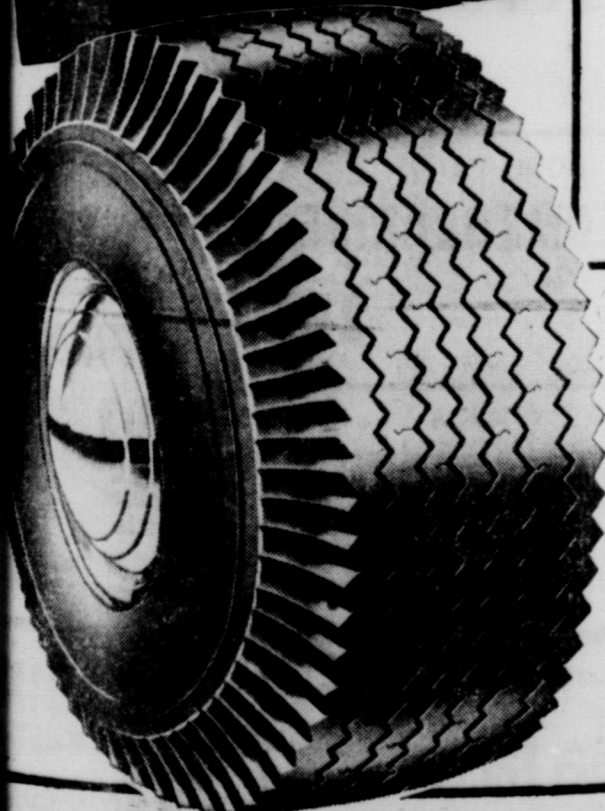

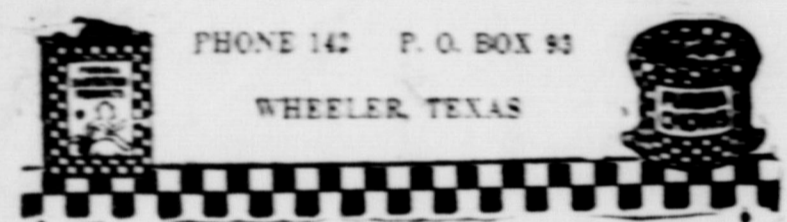
