GOODRICH SEEKS RE-ELECTION TO DISTRICT POST

Lewis M. Goodrich, of Shamrock, who filed for re-election January 1 makes the following statement:

"The condition of the court dockets is the best evidence I have to offer in my race for re-election as your District Judge," said Lewis M. Goodrich of Shamrock this week as he actively opened his campaign in the Thirty-first Judicial District which embraces Gray, Roberts, Hemphill, Lipscomb and Wheeler Counties.

"I realize the average voter is not familiar with the duties and responsibilities of the District Judge's office, and I would like to suggest that the minutes of the respective court clerks offices would supply this information," said Judge Goodrich.

"It is important in passing on the qualifications of a District Judge, for instance to find if he has kept his dockets current, and also what his record is on reversals from the higher courts. I respectfully submit my record in that regard; the dockets are in good condition and the appellate courts have reversed a very small percentage of our cases tried."

"I have devoted my time and very best efforts in performing the duties of District Judge, and feel the experience gained during these years has qualified me to serve you better in the future. PRAY TEST GOING TO 18,000 FEET

Max Pray, Chicago and Oklahoma City operator, has extended contract to 18,000 feet at his No. 1 Mills Ranch, in northwest of section 37, block 4-H of H&GN survey, at 12 miles southeast of Wheeler and near the Oklahoma line in Wheeler county, the Texas Panhandle. Crews have been running logs and surveys at 11,500 feet for several days.

Deal to deepen was made with Phillips Petroleum, who made an additional cash contribution and purchased more acreage in the 2,400 acre lease block. Gulf Oil also is contributing to the venture. The brown dolomite section was encountered at 4,314 feet, and since about 8,000 feet granite wash strings have been penetrated. Falcon-Seaboard Drilling has contract.

Attendance In Wheeler Schools Is On Increase

Attendance in both Wheeler high school and grade school is above that of last year, reports of principals for the fifth period of school show.

The high school shows an enrollment of 113 with an average daily attendance of 111, while there were only 95 enrolled at the same time last year. The grade school has 274 enrolled compared with 266 last year. The average daily attendance for the fifth period is 264.

The average daily attendance for the year, up to the close of the fifth period is 367. Since the total enrollment is now 387, the final average daily attendance will be far above the 349 for the full year of 1956-57.

School officials pointed out that only an average daily attendance of 372 is required to qualify for the addition of another classroom teacher under the state minimum fundation program. If enrollment and attendance had been as high during the first part of the school term as at present, it probably would have been possible to have achieved this goal, it was stated.

Since there is a larger senior class than usual this year, and a smaller number of six-year olds to enter next September, officials do not expect the attendance to be any higher during 1958-59.

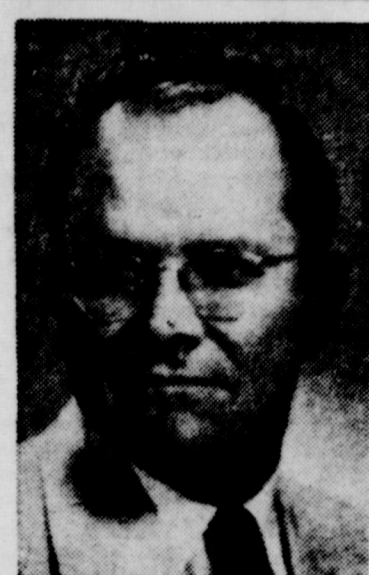

Senate Passes Bill To Help Finance Community Facilities

EDITORS NOTE: Following is a letter received by the Times from Congressman Walter Roger.)

The Community Facilities Bill, under the authorship of Senator Fulbright of Arkansas, passed the Senate last week by a good margin of votes. The vote was 60 to 26. The bill would provide four major accomplishments:

First, it would increase the 100 million dollar Housing and Home Finance Agency's public facility loan program to \$1 billion. This would provide loans for financing local water and sewer systems, hospitals and school buildings.

Second, it would establish a new interest rate formula which, under present conditions, would produce a rate of interest of 3 1/2 percent rather than the current 4 1/8 and 4 5/8 percent.

Third, it would raise the present 40-year maximum payout period on these federal loans to 50 years.

Fourth, it would increase the present federal loan fund, which is available interest free for long range public works planning, by 50 million dollars. The present fund is 48 million dollars, and it is increased to 98 million dollars.

The bill was hotly contested, and the division was very sharp on many of the votes on proposed amendments to the bill that could cripple it. However, when these amendments had been voted down, many of those who had been supporting the amendments came over and voted for the bill on final passage. Many of the cities - especially smaller ones - have been experiencing much difficulty in financing water and sewer systems, hospitals and schools. Many have voted the bonds but were unable to sell them because of the high interest rate that was being demanded and the burden that would be placed on the tax structure of the community. This bill should relieve that situation without costing the taxpayers. It will provide a measurable help toward a constructive approach of absorbing unemployment in many areas of the country.

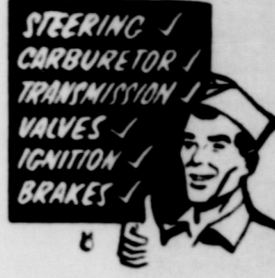

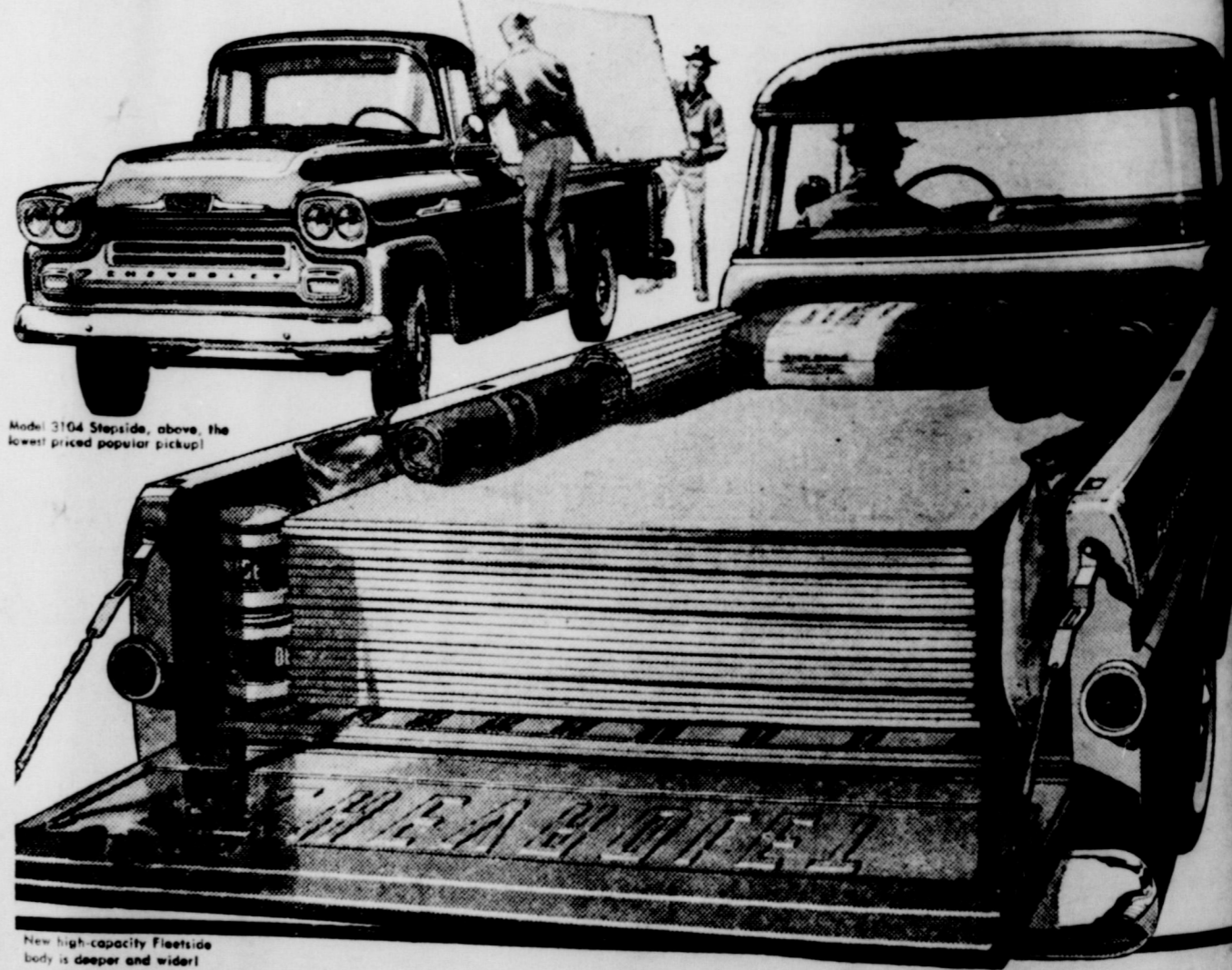

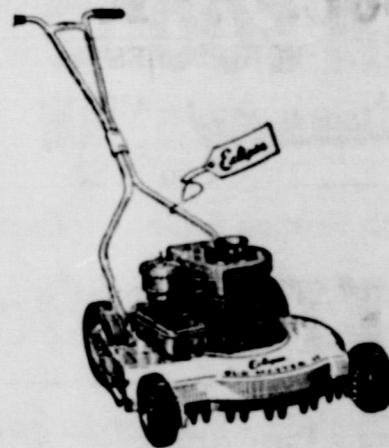

Cross Currents

Now that we approach the closing of school and our thoughts are turned toward vacation we need to think about ACCIDENTS. In Canadian recently Dewayne Wootton, the fourteen year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Chester Wootton accidentally shot himself through the hand while hunting on a Friday afternoon.

Accidents are not restricted to young people. As spring arrives, all of us begin to take up outside activities. We met a young housewife down-state who recently burned up the ceiling of her house and smoked up the furniture. She had some butter melting on the stove when a neighbor came over to borrow a power-driven lawn mower. Betty left the butter warming while she went out to crank up the lawn-mower. The air-conditioner in the wall over the stove sucked up the flames of the burning butter and set the ceiling on fire. Betty got back with the fire department in time to save the house and its contents, but a new roof, new ceiling, and new paint job was needed.

A man came in from work to change clothes for a social appointment. His rifle always stood in the corner of his clothes closet.

In reaching for his clothing, he knocked a clothes hanger from the rack. It hung in the trigger of the rifle and as he bent to pick up the hanger he was shot through the heart and died instantly.

A couple of years ago one of our Miami college students who was working on the highway during vacation was run over by a huge road-building machine and killed.

We read in the newspapers almost weekly where small children are burned to death in a house while Mother is next door drinking coffee with a neighbor.

Nearly every year one or two young men are killed down on the south plain in the handling of pipe which is contacted with electric power lines.

In early spring, or summer we have a rash of accidents, many resulting in injuries, and a few in unnecessary deaths. It just hurts us to read about them. We ought to go over all the rules of safety that we know and teach them to our children.

Home-made rules about guns: Never point a gun at anyone whether empty, or loaded. Carry a gun with the barrel pointing toward the ground. If it is necessary to carry a loaded gun, be sure it is set on safety. Guns kept in town are supposed to be dismantled. After a gun is used, it is supposed to be unloaded, cleaned, and put away out of reach of small children.

Matches and fires available for children to play with are almost as dangerous as guns. Keep matches

out of reach of small children. If little Johnny learns how to work the automatic burner on the stove, teach him to leave it alone or turn the pilot out. And do look out for the kids, you may save their lives.

Violeta Mahood, reporter for the Stanford American, and I recently made a automobile trip down into the Heart of Texas. You will find these signs, CENTER OF TEXAS, around Brownwood. We stopped and had dinner with our friends there, the A. E. Christenberrys.

Chris, the man, has recently had a heart attack. He weighed 250 pounds before the attack. His wife has thought of an ingenious way to keep him on his diet. She simply prepares a tray of prescribed food for him and puts him out on the back porch. In six weeks, Chris has lost thirty pounds, for when he eats the food on his tray, he gets no more! Now that's an idea for you Fatties! The only thing wrong with it is the back porch. That's where the dog and cat are fed. And any of us Roly-Polys know we would not be above eating with the dog! "Move over, Rover, and share your bone!"

At Chris's suggestion we made a tour of the hill country near Bandera. The mesquite trees are green (a sure sign that spring has come). The little valleys are filled with blue-bonnets and trees of redbud border the highways. The mockingbird is already ringing along the bridge paths of the dude ranches. And one sees signs: Good Fishing! We did not see many cattle. The money-take here is the tourist and the customer is from the East, usually New York.

A secondary business is the raising of goats. These animals can be seen grazing languidly on the sides of the steep hills. These hills range in height from about 300 to 800 feet. According to our old geology manual a hill is not a mountain unless it is at least 900 feet high. Hence, this section of Texas is called the hill country because the hills are not quite high enough to be called mountains. It's a mighty pretty country in April!

We had a little trouble keeping the air pressure in our tube-less tires at an even gauge. We could tell when the pressure was out of balance because as we rode along a little tremor seemed to go through the car. The first time this happened, we had the low tires taken off and tested for a tack, or a leak, but could find nothing wrong. Then a tourist told us that the leaks were caused by going around the curves too fast. We slowed down. No more low tires!

Nostalgia: I had my picture made beside an old rock store building that my father built nearly fifty years ago in Nugent, Texas now a ghost town. The walls of native limestone are still intact. And by putting in windows and a roof the building could still be used. Papa hauled the rock and shaped the stone-bricks himself.

Nugent is a dead little town beside the Clear Fork of the Brazos River. We children used to hunt Easter eggs on its banks in the spring and wade in its shallow rapids in the summers. We learned to swim there.

My brother, Fred Blackwell with the Texas Company at Lefors, is very sentimental about this place. He wrecked the old home in Nugent and used the lumber in building his own house. He remembers where he put each piece.

Sadly, I walked about the grounds of the old place. There was still the well, and the cistern, and the huge flat rock we used for a step. But the yard had grown up in mesquites. Only one tree remained from long ago, the Walnut. Under this, we children used to entertain our friends with hot chocolate, biscuit filled with bacon and radishes. Nostalgia is sweet!

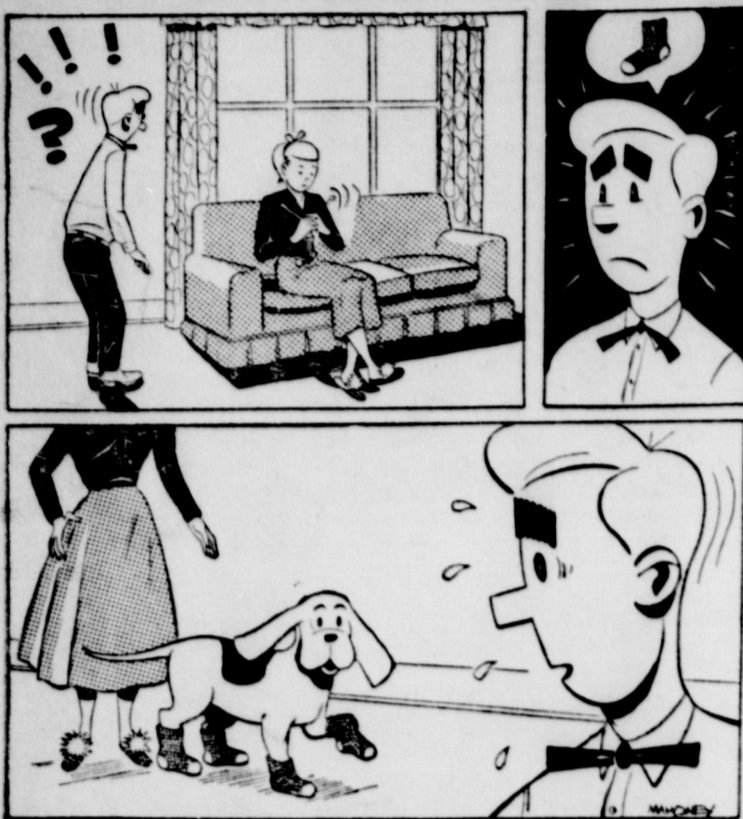

NEWS CONSERVATION WHEELER COUNTY SOIL

The Great Plains Conservation Program is relatively new in the Wheeler District. This program offers a farmer or rancher assistance to plan, schedule and carry out a complete conservation program on his entire operating unit. It provides cost sharing for permanent type practices needed and planned.

This program does not pay any land rentals such as the Conservation Reserve of the Soil Bank. It does not pay for any management practices such as deferred grazing or stubble mulching. It will, in many cases, supplement the Soil Bank and ACP program and give a farmer the opportunity to finish his conservation plan in less time. Under the Great Plains Conservation Program the land owner is assured that money will be available to finish the job regardless of the year in which the work will be done.

Great Plains plans may be completed in three years and cannot run more than ten years under the present law. Agreements expire at the end of the year in which the last cost sharing work is done or at the end of three years, whichever is the longer.

Farmers who are interested should see one of the Soil Conservation Service employees assisting the district.

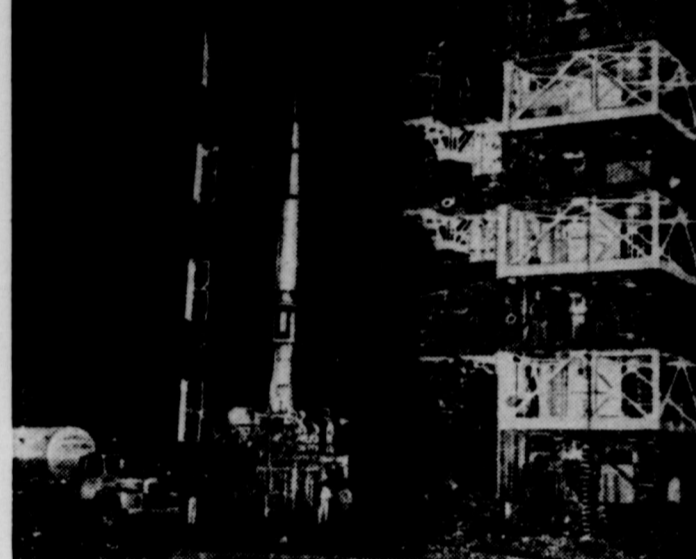

The list of rules is given the parents of erring youngsters who find their way into the Houston police department. The rules follow:

Begin in infancy to give your child everything he wants. He will grow up believing the world owes him a living.

Laugh at him when he picks up "dirty" words. They will make him think he is cute.

Don't give him spiritual training before he is 21, so he can make up his own mind.

Don't teach him the English language.

Praise him in his presence to the neighbors and show how much smarter he is than the neighbor's children.

Never use the word "wrong." It may develop in him a guilt complex. He will be prepared later on to believe when he is punished that society is against him and that he is being persecuted.

Pick up after him and do everything for him, so that he will be experienced in letting someone else carry his responsibilities.

Have no concern for what goes into his mind. Let him read anything.

Quarrel frequently in the presence of your children.

Give him all the spending money he wants. Never let him earn his own.

Take his part against policemen, teachers and neighbors. They are prejudiced against your child.

Let him eat and drink anything he wants whenever he wants it.

When he gets into real trouble, defend yourself and say, "I never could do anything with him."
