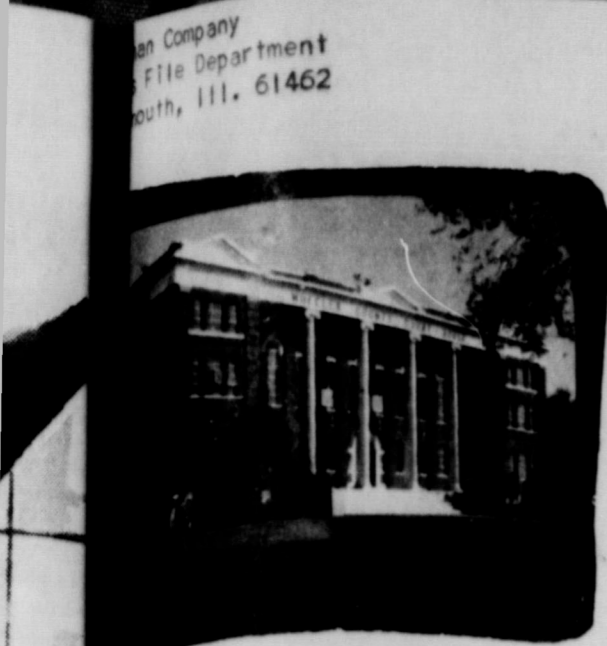

Mayor, Councilmen Elected

A total of 150 ballots were cast in the City Election Saturday, April 5. The voters elected a mayor and three councilmen.

O. B. "Pete" Burton was elected to serve the unexpired term of Don Earney, who resigned due to business obligations elsewhere. Burton is the owner of Pete Burton Ford.

Four candidates sought election to the three positions on the council. Incumbents Cecil Pierce and John C. Vise were elected with 132 and 102 votes respectively. Bill Owen received 107 votes for a place on the council. The fourth candidate, Louis C. Stas, received 79 votes.

The resignation of Pete Burton as councilman to accept the office of Mayor, left one vacancy on the council. The council voted to appoint Louis Stas to fill this position.

Kelton Baptist Will Hold Revival April 1-May 4

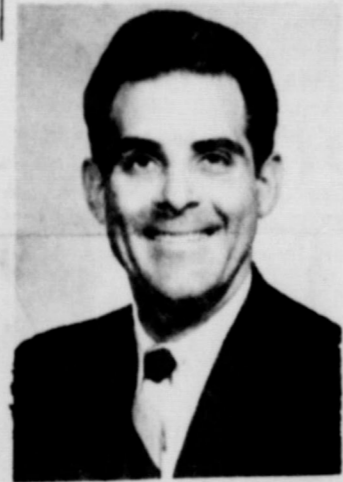
The Kelton Baptist Church will hold a revival from April 27 through May 4, 1969.

TEXAS POLITICS

Rep. Malouf Abraham last week was the shortest of the session to take the Legislature met in a brief ceremony for former President Dwight D. Eisenhower.
