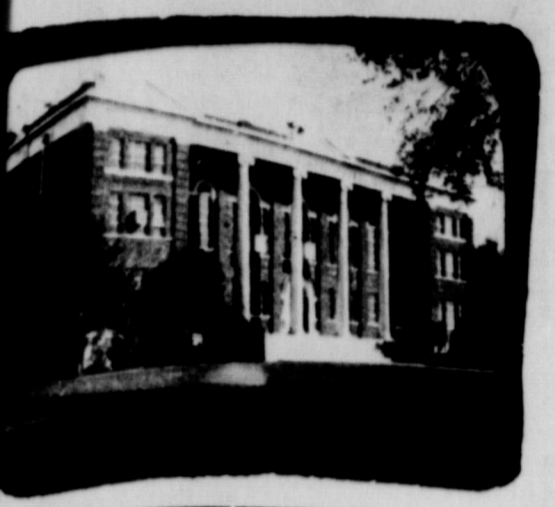

## CITY COUNCIL JUNE 15 STARTING DATE SET ON PAVING PROJECT

The Wheeler City Council met Monday, April 21. Four councilmen, Cecil Pierce, John C. Vise, Bill Owen and Louis C. Stas took the oath of office. Meeting with the council were Homer Davis and John David of Davis and David-Dalhart law firm. They introduced an ordinance for the council's approval. The ordinance adopted the written statement of the city engineer, showing the estimates of the total cost of all improvements, directing the City Secretary to give notice of a public hearing with property owners concerning these costs of which notice is found elsewhere in this issue. Lewis Construction Co., contractors for the paving, have set June 15 for their starting date. This date was announced by Davis and David. Mayor Pete Burton announced the department heads for his term of office. Robert Denson will serve as Mayor Pro-Tem and oversee the Water and Sewer department. Cecil Pierce will serve as head of the Street Department with John C. Vise overseeing the Park and Swimming Pool. Louis Stas will be in charge of the Fire Department and Dump Grounds. Bill Owen

## 3 Re-elected To Bd. Of Directors

Three members of the Board of Directors were re-elected to their posts by stockholders of the Canadian Production Credit Association at the group's 35th annual meeting, held Saturday, April 12, 1969 in the Canadian High School Auditorium. More than 325 members and guests of the agricultural credit organization attended the business meeting and barbeque. Re-elected to the board were Wallace N. Hamker of Booker, C. B. Henderson of Wheeler and L. F. Etheredge of Canadian. Both Hamker and Henderson were re-elected to three year terms and Etheredge was named to a two year term. Etheredge was elected to fill the unexpired term of Marvin L. Longhofer, who passed away earlier this year. Holdover board members are M. Lawrence Ellzey of Perryton, Hugh F. Parsell of Canadian and H.H. Keahey of White Deer. Following the business meeting, the Board of Directors met in executive session and elected the following officers: H.H. Keahey, White Deer, Chairman of the Board, Wallace N. Hamker, Booker, Vice-Chairman, and Larry E. Albin, Canadian, President. Keahey, Parsell and Albin will compose the executive committee.

## Another business meeting highlight was the address made by C. G. Scruggs, Editor of the Progressive Farmer, Dallas.

The Canadian Production Credit Association, owned and operated by its more than 580 stockholder borrowers was organized in 1934. On March 31, 1969 the association had a loan volume of \$13,390,193.00 assets of \$14,074,724.00 and a net worth of \$2,454,732.00. ## TEXAS POLITICS

I'm writing this at the end of the week and it seems like Monday was about two weeks ago. We took up the House Appropriations bill and it wasn't really too bad a bill. However, there were a number of items in there that I didn't like and we tried to make some changes without success. It's smaller than the Senate bill so now a Conference Committee of five members from each house will work out the differences. It will be real interesting to see just what comes out. I remember last session that they came up with about 30 million dollars more money and a bunch of things that were not in either of the bills. We had a rough day Wednesday which included a 5-hour Revenue & Taxation Committee hearing on the proposed chemical tax. We had something like 34 people appear from all types of industry including a number of farmers. I think that this bill won't get any where either. That's the funny thing - not really funny - that very few of the tax bills we have heard so far have much chance of passing as presented. But the fact still remains that we are going to have to figure out some way to come up with a bunch. Maybe next week I can have a little more to say about taxes and the teachers pay raise. Now, let's talk about the amendment to allow Liquor-by-the-Drink on a local option basis. You may remember that I have given you quite a bit of information about this proposal and it has been a real difficult decision with lots of pressure. They needed 100 votes on final reading to pass it. Wednesday they got 95 votes and then with a lot of work they would up with 101 votes Thursday. I votes "NO" both times. Here is how our District voted in the referendum last year: Hansford - For - 319; Against - 750; Ochiltree - For - 364; Against - 849; Lipscomb - For - 179; Against - 489; Roberts - For - 158; Against - 212; Hemphill - For - 313; Against - 512; Gray - For - 2,207; Against - 2,913; Wheeler - 503; Against - 7,096. Total: For: 4,043; Against: 7,096. The amendment will be voted on in November 1970. If it passes, which it probably will do, the Legislature will enact the regulations and then it will be legal only in those counties that voted to have it. So, it will be about two years before it might become effective.

## ARMSTRONG WILL PREACH SUNDAY AT METHODIST

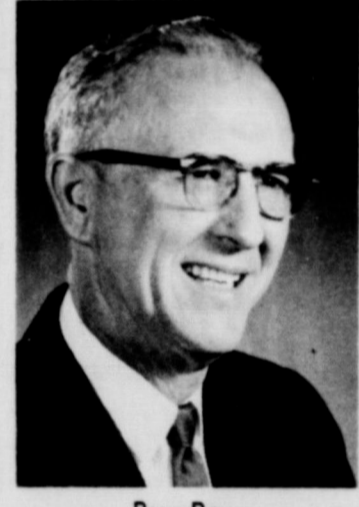

## BAPTIST CHURCH REVIVAL IS SET FOR MAY 4-11

The First Baptist Church will participate in the Crusade of the Americas, and the date for the local revival is May 4-11. After a brief return to winter last week, folks were wondering whether this was really spring or not. Hail thinned out our peach crop. We'll still have enough for a peach pie or two this summer. The fruit that's left should be of real quality.

A lot of home fruit orchardists have been inquiring about fruit rot and worms in peaches. To overcome these drawbacks, you need to start spraying with fungicides and insecticides, following through with a scheduled spray program. A lot of this information is in the fruit and nut tree spray schedule at my office.

Lasso, a newly released herbicide controlled pigweeds in cotton better than any other herbicide in Wellington tests last year. To be sure that you have selected the right herbicide, check the suggestions made in the 1968 Northwest Texas Research Demonstration Handbook available at our office.

We were certainly proud of the showing that Wheeler County 4-H members made at the District 1 4-H contests at Canyon last weekend. Five qualified to attend the State 4-H Roundup. Other good news was that three 4-H members and three adult 4-H leaders were selected from among many participants over the state to attend the National 4-H Center's Citizenship Shortcourse to be held in Washington D. C. June 15-21. A lot of people read about what some troublemakers on college campuses are doing but seldom is national attention focused on what some of our outstanding young people are doing. Wheeler County can well be proud of their young people.

We feel that a lot of the trouble that some young people have in urban areas is that they have never been on a farm and they are not told about agriculture in the media to which they are exposed or in their schools.

This is so much so that most of our young people take the food they eat and the beautiful country they live in for granted. They and many of their elders are ignorant of the fact of life, the fact that agricultural production is the basis for the life that we enjoy.

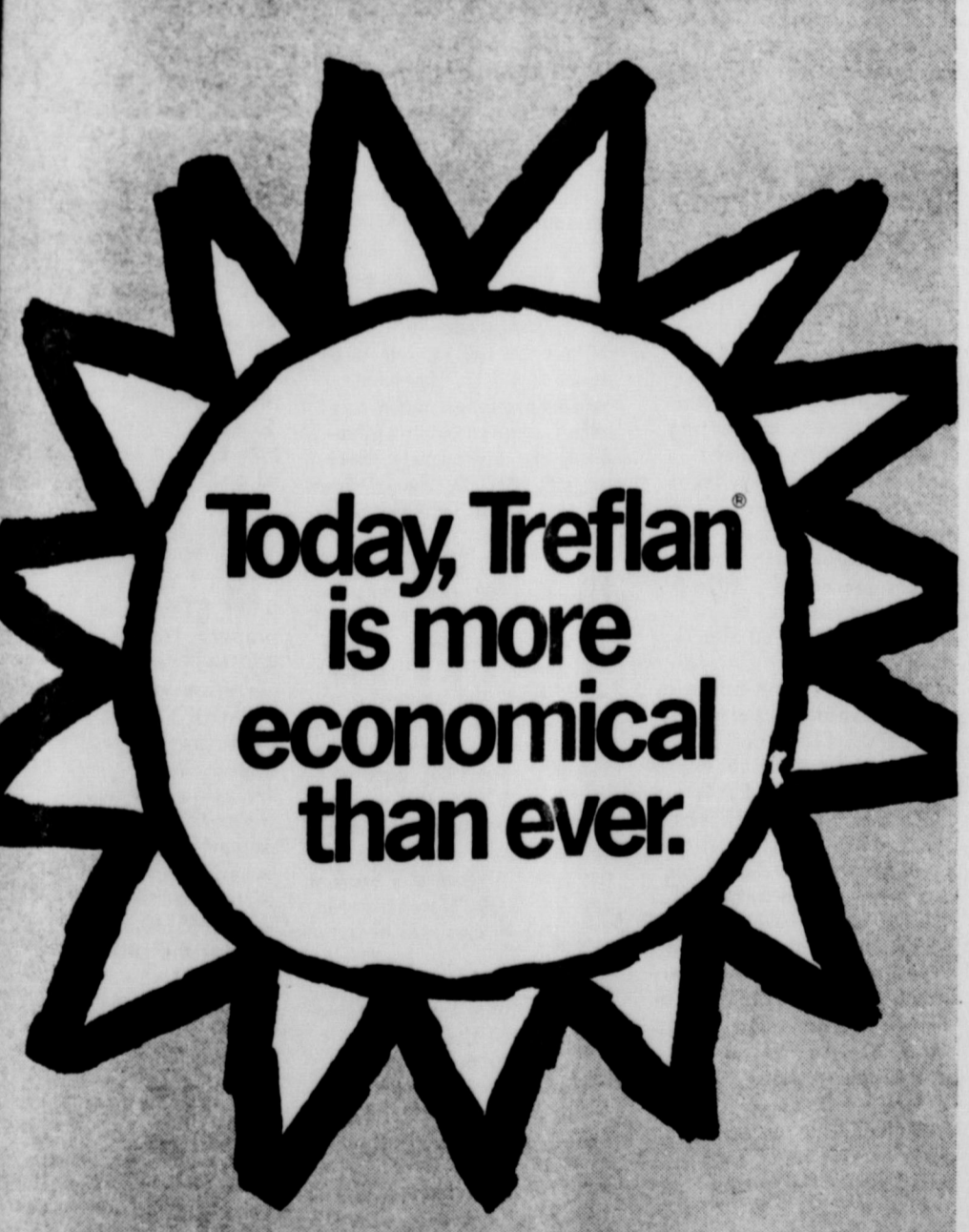

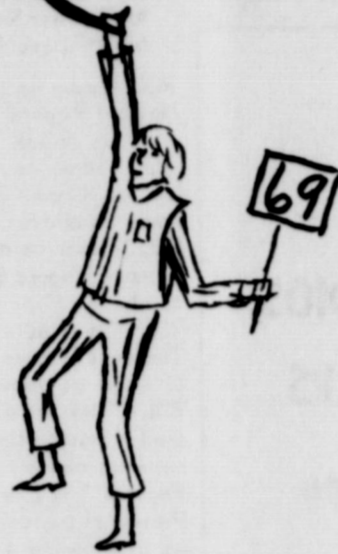

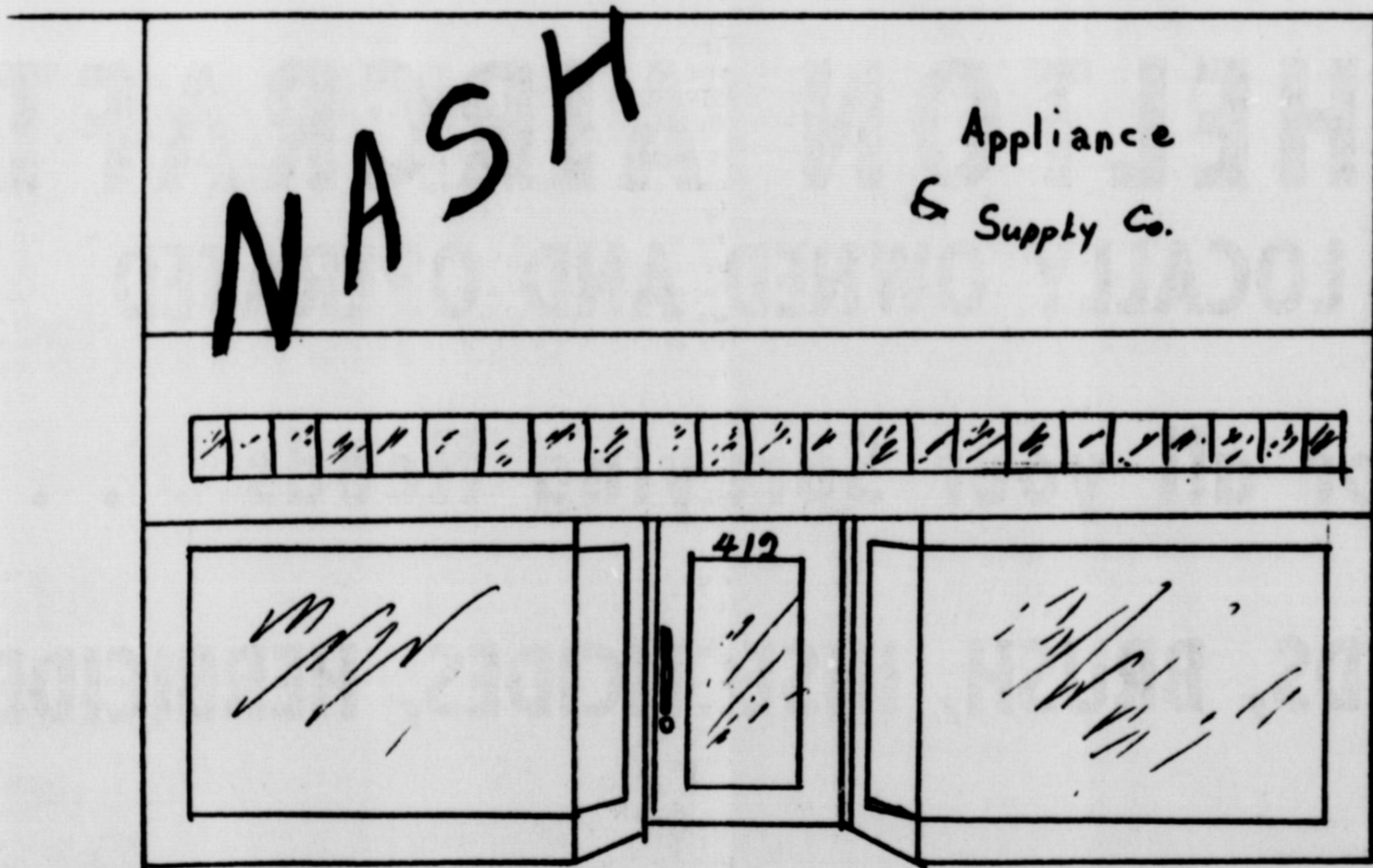
