A fishpond is a delightvul part of a farm or ranch. It adds beauty to theland and provides recreation for farmers, ranchers and their

friends and for paying guests. A surface acre of water makes a good family sized pond. Two or three acres are even better. If a pond is less than about one third of a surface acre in size. fishpond management is hardly worthwhile. The fish most commonly used for farm pond production are several species of sunfish, large-mouthblack bass, white and black Crappie and Channel Catfish. Ponds should be stocked with the kinds, numbers and combinations of fish suited to the particular body of water. The right combination of fish will assist in maintaining the proper balance in fish population. Fish suitable for stocking ponds may be secured through the state and federal fish hatcheries without charge and applica-

Fertilization is very important in fishpond management. If the pond is new, it is wise to begin fertilization before stocking in order to have an abundant food supply when fish are delivered. Inorganic commercial fertilizer recommended for ogricultural use in a particular locality make good fertilizers for the pond. Fertilizers such as 16-20-0, 4-12-4 and 5-10-5 are satisfactory

Organic fertilizers, such as barnyard manure can be used alone or in combinations with inorganic fertilizers at the rate of 500 lbs to one ton per surface acre of water per year. Cottonseed meal or soybean meal may be used under the same conditions at the rate of 400 to 800 lbs per surface acre per year. If a pond is muddy, the use of organic fertilizers usually will help clear the water of suspended soil particles and after the water clears, inorganic fertilizers

may be used The proper method of fertilizing is to estimate the total amount of tertilizer needed for the pond according to the suggestions given, and add about half this amount to the water in the


In fiscal year 1967 over

Postal News

Packages up to 30 pounds for American military personnel served by Army and Fleet Post Offices overseas now can be sent by air transportation at special low rates, Postmaster Virgil Jamison

pointed out today. "Area residents using this new airlift service will get much faster delivery on parcels to military personnel overseas," Postmaster Jamison said. He said the airlift is available on a space available basis upon payment of the domestic parcel post surface rates plus a flat \$1 fee.

Packages weighing up to 30 pounds and not more than 60 inches in combined length and girth qualify for the new special airlift rate, Postmaster Jamison said.

Postal patrons can get the girlift service on packages mailed to all military personnel at APO and FPO addresses and in Alaska. Kawaii and Puerto Rico. Postmaster Jamison noted that the new airlift also applies to parcels mailed back to the states by servicemen from these military post offic-

Parcels on which the \$1 fee is paid get air transportation all the way--from here to the port of embarkation, and there to the overseas base. Postal patrons formerly had to pay air parcel post

Postmaster Jamison said. He said that in many instances the new airlift rates are considerably below comparable air parcel post charges. He cited this example:

*A mother here sending a 15 pound package to her son in Veitnam pays \$3.45 for the new airlift service. The air parcel post rate for the

Postmaster Jamison pointed out however, that it is not always to the mailer's advantage to use the airlift service. On some light packages air parcel post rates may belower than the airlift charges.

Postal patrons should check with the Post Office for the information on the best way to mail parcels to vicemen overseas, Postmaster Jamison emphas-

Thenew airlift service went into effect January 7, 1968. It was authorized under the postal rate bill signed into law by President Johnson.

Booklets are available at thepost office to aid anyone in preparing and mailing parcels to servicemen overseas. Parcels weighing up to five pounds will continue to receive free airlift service without any additional charge as in the past.


