

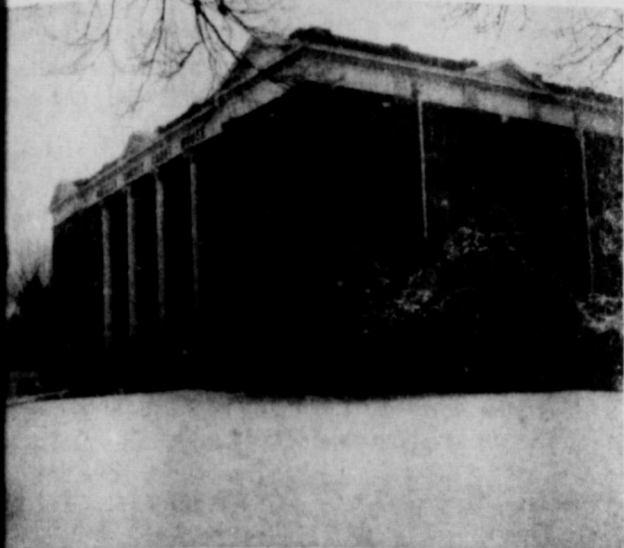

SAM PAKAN ADDRESS CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

Wheeler Chamber of Commerce met Tuesday evening with Sam Pakan of Shamrock as guest speaker. The topic of the evening was developing Highway 83 into an In-state highway.

Pakan, owner of the Shamrock Auto Supply in Shamrock and Pakan Parts in Wheeler is second vice-president of Highway 83 Association. Another name for the Highway 83 Association of the towns located along the 2,152 miles of road from Churchill, Canada to Brownsville is Great Plains, U.S. to Canada Highway 83 Association. The association was organized to unite towns along the highway and to help each one of them.

In his talk, Pakan pointed out the problems of a small town in keeping the young people from leaving after high school. Lack of industry and the need for jobs is the reason for their leaving. He feels every community has something it could develop to keep its young people.

Highway 83 has a great tourist potential with the highway serving 15% of the U.S. land area. Canada is fast becoming the playground of the summer and is helping all they can to bring about the interstate highway.

The association is now working toward getting each of the governors of the states concerned, to designate Highway 83 as an interstate highway. The governors of North and South Dakota signed the petition, along with their highway departments.

Kansas was also listed as being well organized in their efforts with Texas being the least organized of all the states involved.

Pakan continued, "Truck traffic is important, but we need tourist worse. We also need freight service on the highway." He pointed out that to receive freight or ship freight, it is necessary to go either to Amarillo or Oklahoma City.

It is estimated that the development around the junction of an interstate highway and 152 would be worth \$5 million within 5 years.

Motels and cafes are the biggest drawing card of tourists. The towns along highway 83 need to organize individually to stop the tourists and keep part of the tourist dollars in their own town.

Vise expressing his thanks to Louis Stas for his work on the float for the St. Patrick's Day Parade at Shamrock, Albert Chapman for the use of his car in the parade and Band Director Venis Wren for the fine showing the newly re-organized Wheeler band made at the St. Pat's Parade.

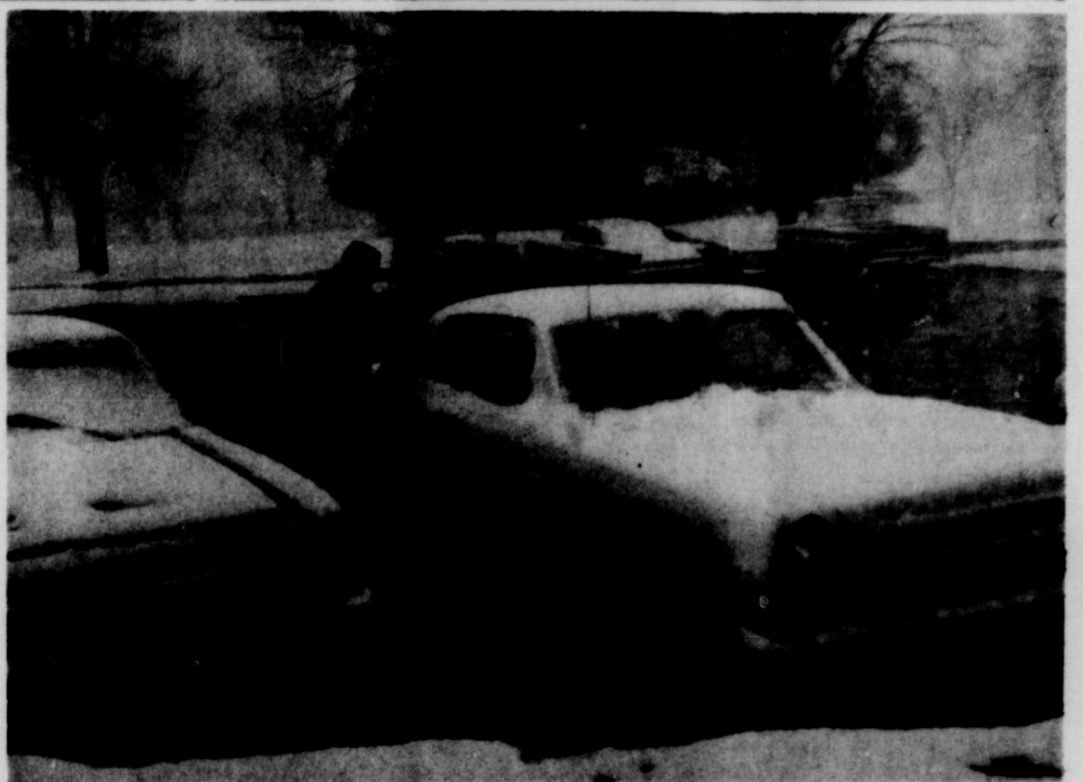

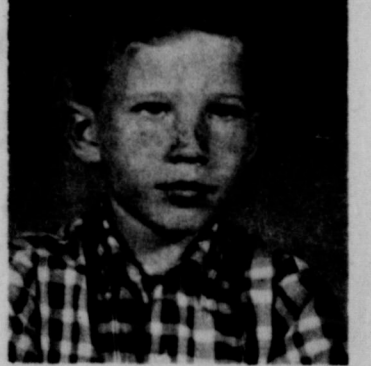

HIGHWAY 83 PROGRESS REPORT

It is time to get a new bulletin letter off to all of the Highway 83 boosters and members. Quite a bit has happened since the last convention at Pierre, S.D.

Work toward the completion of the organizing of State Highway 83 organizations is being completed slowly but surely. South Dakota, Nebraska and Kansas are organized with Texas working towards completion of the same. I have not heard from anyone in the North Dakota Country as to their plans but have hopes for something farth coming.

The Kansas 83 delegation made the trip to Topeka in December and obtained endorsement from Kansas State Highway Commission and later from Governor Docking. Nebraska 83 group did not get as good of results from their trip to Lincoln, Neb., but do not believe they were completely stopped in their attempt at obtaining an endorsement at a future time.

Time is an important element in the promotion of the I-27 program by this national-international highway group as there is the possibility that some discussion on ac-

tion by the U.S. Congress in Washington D.C. may be forthcoming sooner than expected.

As for the highway 83 business, things must continue to be pushed for, such as constant improvement and rebuilding or present highway, removing all bottlenecks and congested areas, improvement of roadside parks and tourist attractions.

Our traveling 83 ambassador, Ira Laidig, of Oberlin, Kan., as just returned from a trip to Brownsville, Texas on behalf of the organization with stops at all towns and cities along the way. He reports more interest this year than last trip he made that way. He believes that there still remains much to be desired in some areas as the interest being shown along the highway.

INTERESTING FACTS

 Did you know that sandwiches can be frozen? A frozen sandwich thaws slowly in a lunch bag so it spoils less quickly than a freshly made one. Fillings which freeze well are meat, chicken, fish, cooked egg yolks, peanut butter and baked beans.
 Did you know that water is the enemy of wood, plain cork and linoleum floors? Use water sparingly and wipe up immediately when cleaning.
 Did you know a hosiery company has developed a new technique designed to eliminate heel wrinkling and twisting in economy-priced stockings. The technique is called "Heel Cuddler." The process puts more fabric in the heel areas and uses twice as many stitches. The extra fabric is constructed to fit the contour of every type of foot.
 Did you know that Texas' population is increasing by 19,000 monthly. In 1964 the population was 10,397,000. Projections for 1985 list almost 15 million Texans.
 Did you know that venereal disease (VD) is the most urgent communicable disease problem. Infectious syphilis among teenagers between ages 15-19 years almost triples between 1957 and 1963. An average of one or more youngsters out of every 10 in this group is exposed to infectious syphilis in some metropolitan areas in Texas. Estimates place the annual national incidence of VD among the teen group somewhere between 200,000 and 300,000 - a minimum of 600 per day. With VD epidemic in some teenage groups, parents and educators must combine their efforts to give adequate and accurate information about VD to every young person.

Mr. James Cason from the Texas State Dept. of Public Welfare did an excellent presentation of "Parent and Child Relations." Much was learned at the session.
 Did you know that peanut butter can make a nutritious snack for the children and teenagers too. Try this easy recipe.
Uncooked Peanut Butter Fudge
 1 cup peanut butter
 1 cup corn syrup
 1/4 cups sifted powdered sugar
 1/4 cups dry milk
 Mix peanut butter and syrup in mixing bowl. Add dry milk and powdered sugar all at once. Mix together, first with a mixing spoon and then with clean hands. Knead until all the dry ingredients are mixed in. Turn out on a board and continue kneading until it is smooth. Form into a roll and slice, or press out by hands or rolling pin onto a block 1/2 inch thick. Cut in squares. (Makes about 2 lbs.)

Easter Seals Chairman

Almost 90% of all funds raised by the Easter Seal Appeal remain in Texas to support the growing needs of the disabled in the state.
 Special emphasis is being given in the 1968 Easter Seal Appeal to the disabled citizen or his family in Wheeler County who may need assistance and not know where to obtain it. Any disabled person can contact Mr. Rogers at 1st National Bank, Wheeler, Texas, who will refer the request for services to the Easter Seal Society. A determination of the extent and type of assistance needed and the most efficient means of obtaining that assistance will be made. Arrangements for needed treatment or service will be made the Easter Seal Society.
 Dr. Milam stated that funds received as a result of the annual Easter Seal Appeal now aid 17,622 disabled Texans but that there are many more not currently being aided. These disabled citizens and especially those in Wheeler County who contact Mr. Rogers can now be guided to the proper sources of assistance. They or their families are urged to contact him or the Texas Easter Seal Society in Dallas, regardless of age, race, cause of disability or financial status.
 Dr. Milam added that the Texas Easter Seal Society annually spends more money on direct services to patients than it raises in the Easter Seal Appeal.

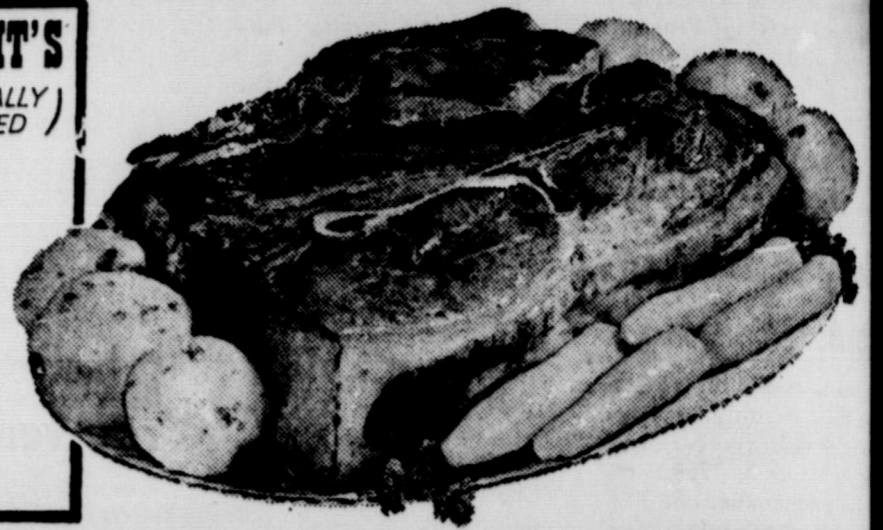

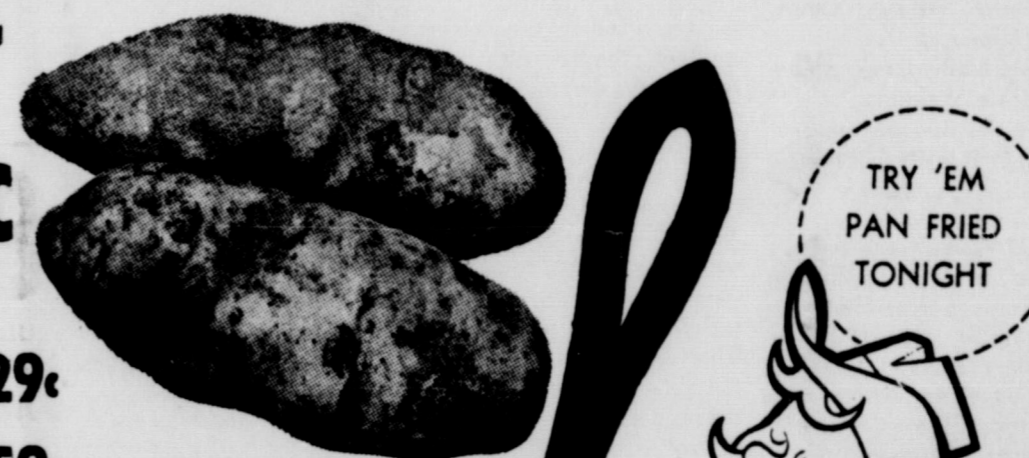
