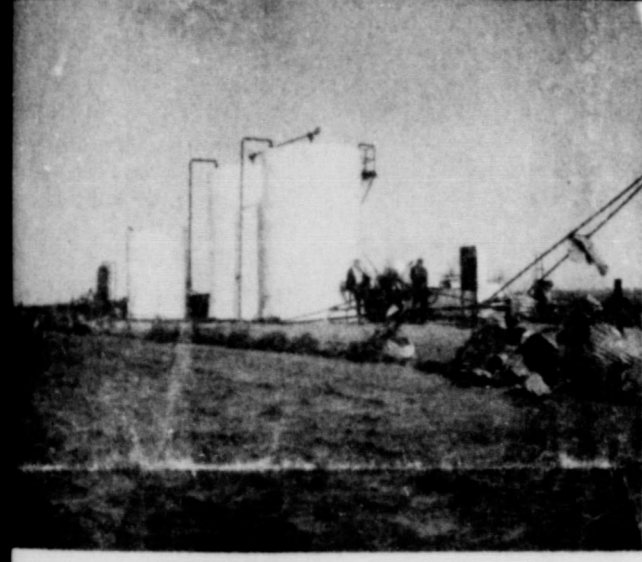
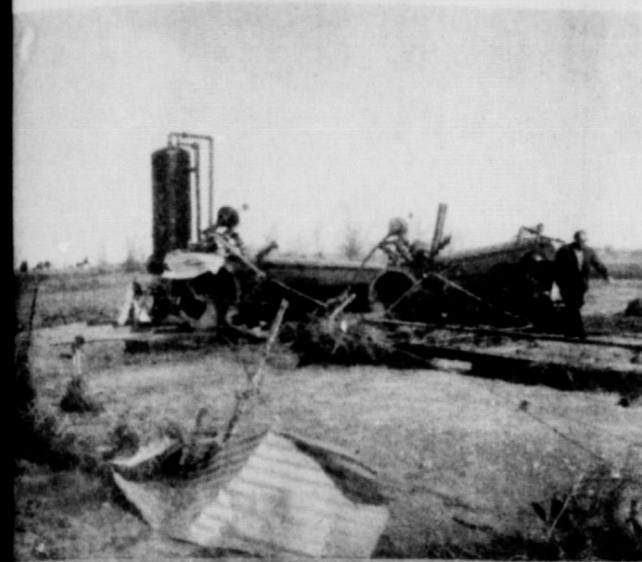

REVIVAL SET

A revival will begin Sunday, April 7th at the Allison Baptist Church with Rev. Leonard Abercrombie of Calvary Baptist Church of Altus, Okla. evangelist.

Mobeetie Cemetery was struck at 7:15 p.m. Tuesday evening, April 2, with a tornado. Several houses, sheds, highlines and telephone lines in the area were heavily damaged by the storm.

A Sinclair Oil Company Tank Battery was destroyed. The tank battery is located 1/4 mile east of the cemetery. Bill Rains of New Mobeetie happened to be at the tank battery at the time the twister struck. He was in a tank truck. The windshield on the truck was broken and he was drenched in crude oil from an overturned "Heater Treater." Rains stated that a spark could have easily ignited the entire area.

One tank from the Sinclair battery was rolled 300 yards southeast of its original location. Natural Gas lost two tanks southwest of the Sinclair location.

When asked if there was a funnel, Rains stated there definitely was, as when the storm struck, the wind was from all directions.

The tombstones in the cemetery fell in different directions which would indicate a funnel. The windmill at the cemetery was wrecked along with a small shed. The roof of the shed was carried southwest from the foundation. Fifty tombstones were counted to be tipped over at the cemetery.

The C.W. Striblings, northwest of Mobeetie, reported all the storm windows broken on the west side of their house. The windows were broken by chunks of ice rather than hail stones. Two inches of rain reportedly fell in a matter of 20 minutes at the Striblings.

An estimated 75 persons gathered at the high school auditorium Friday evening to hear Larry Milner of Southwestern Public Service's Industrial Development Committee. The meeting was called by Wheeler County Service, Inc. and \$2300 in shares were sold during the meeting.

Wheeler County Service, Inc. is a new corporation formed for the purpose of making preparations for industry in north Wheeler County. The corporation is a result of an Industrial Committee set up by the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce.

Wheeler County Service, Inc. is in the process of selling stocks in the corporation in order to raise money needed before Wheeler can expect to enter the campaign for attracting industry.

Milner listed five things necessary for a community to attract industry: (1) Community Betterment. The appearance of a community has a lot to do with industry's selection of a town. Companies are on the lookout for a "good community." Within a 200 mile radius there will be eight towns equally suited for the same industry. Any project, such as street paving, which will better this community will better our chances.

(2) Research and Analysis. Research is necessary to determine what a community has that will support a community and what type of industry would be best suited to the raw materials at hand. A community must have facts and figures to prove industry or a manufacturer can make a profit.

(3) Industrial Financing. A community has to furnish building for the industry or manufacturers. Industry does not want its money tied up in a building. The money can be put to a better use, making more profit for the company.

The building is usually furnished on a lease-purchase basis.

(4) Industrial Sites. There must be industrial sites available. It is necessary that the Industrial committee select a site suitable for industry and get an option before industry makes a decision. The price of land will double if a decision was made to locate in a community.

(5) Prospects. Where can an industry be found. As has been said before, look in your area for a business that could be expanded. Check in the community for the man with an idea, would this idea work, and could it be developed into a business.

Most important, a community should be ready to accept a business or industry of any size. Do not pass up the opportunity of a small business or industry and wait for the big catch. One industry will attract others.

Listed above are five important steps toward the attraction of industry. Even when these steps are completed, it will not mean we will have an industry. We will be ready for one.

This is going to take money. We can not set here and wait for a miracle; we have to help make it happen. The need for money is the purpose of selling the shares in Wheeler County Service, Inc. This money will be spent toward accomplishing the five steps.

The shares are being sold at \$100 each with a goal of 100 shares or \$10,000. The board of directors of the corporation ask that you buy these shares not expecting a return on your investment. Do this as an investment in the future of North Wheeler County. You will be a stockholder in that future.

The money from the shares will be invested immediately and will begin drawing interest.

The money will be wisely spent only when it is necessary.

AMERICAN RED CROSS BLOOD PROGRAM ACTIVITIES DURING 1966-67

The 55 Red Cross regional blood programs operate through 1,700 Red Cross chapters in which 111,700,000 people reside.

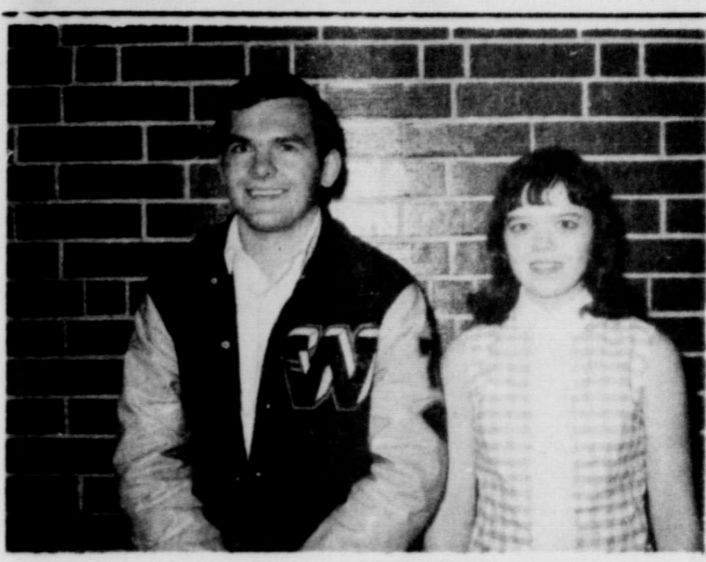
A total of 2,979,100 units of blood was donated through Red Cross.

46,400 units of blood were collected by Red Cross during the fiscal year from the National Guard, college students and other groups for the Defense Blood Project which terminated on Nov. 1, 1966.

Blood donations through Red Cross by source of donors are as follows: 1,738,400 from the general community and community groups; 762,500 at industrial plants or businesses; 224,600 at military installations; 171,000 at colleges and universities; 66,200 at penal institutions; 16,400 from other sources;

Of the total donations of blood collected through Red Cross, 87% were collected by the mobile units operating through the 1,700 participating chapters. The remaining 13% of the total donations were made in the center chapters.

A special "Reserved Performance" policy will be inaugurated for this important limited "HAWAII" roadshow engagement.

The "Reserved Performance" policy will enable the movie-goer to purchase tickets in advance, which will guarantee a seat to every ticket holder for the performance of his or her choice.

Tickets will be on sale at the Rogue Theatre Box Office and can be purchased up until the time of the evening matinee performance.

Performance time for evening performance: 8:00 p.m. and Wednesday matinee - 2:00 p.m.

The importance of this test run of "HAWAII" can be underscored in the following ways:

1. For the first time in film history, a small city will be playing a major roadshow attraction at the same time as the large population centers.

2. The "HAWAII" test will determine whether there are enough people in Wheeler to see a top roadshow attraction and thus whether bringing other such films to town in the future is feasible.

Red Cross

Blood was collected by Red Cross at an average rate of 3 donations per minute.

Red Cross collected blood in 43 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands.

249,300 persons donated blood through Red Cross each month. Of this number, 26% were first-time donors.

A total of 773,000 first-time donors contributed blood through Red Cross.

Red Cross distributed a total of 2,287,500 units of whole blood to hospitals and blood banks.

The Red Cross distributed whole blood or one or more whole blood products in 49 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands.

Whole blood was provided to 43,000 hospitals located in 48 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands.

The 133 Red Cross bloodmobiles conducted 27,600 blood collecting programs.

A total of 328,400 volunteers served in the Red Cross Blood Program.

8,500 registered nurses trained during 1966-67 to serve as volunteers in some phase of the Red Cross Blood Program.

A total of 6,800 student nurses were trained for volunteer participation in Red Cross blood programs during 1966-67.

Volunteers serving in all phases of the Red Cross Blood Program outnumbered career staff 138 to 1.

waxing. If it is not, the wax will collect and cause "dirty spots" on the floor. A self-polishing wax must be used on asphalt and rubber tile floors or the tile will deteriorate. The wax may also be used on vinyl and linoleum floors. A self-polishing wax has been made to use on wood floors, but do make sure that it is recommended for wooden floors.

The daily care of floors is quick and easy if you keep the floors waxed to prevent dirt from sticking. Go over the floors once a day with a vacuum cleaner or dry dust mop--neverone treated with oil--because soil softens wax and makes it smeary. If something spills, remove with a damp mop. Too much cleaning can cause extra needless work. If dirt will not be removed with a damp mop, then it is time for a new application of wax. Do this before the grit begins to damage the flooring.

To remove dark spots, dog spots, grease, lipstick, crayon or heel marks from the floor, rub lightly with a steel wool and a liquid polishing wax. Do not use this method on asphalt or rubber tile. Here's to better floors year round!!!

After adulthood (about age 25) is reached, the basal metabolic rate decreases per unit weight. If food intake stays the same over a long period of adult life, a small surplus of ten calories daily equals one pound of increased body weight.

ACROSS THE FENCE

By Max W. Hatter, CAA

The greenbug's taking his share of the wheat crop. We counted greenbugs on John O'Gorman's place at Twitty last week. Counting greenbugs is pretty tedious work because they're so small. We came up with about 200 greenbugs per linear foot. According to Norris Daniels, Entomologist at the Bushland Experiment Station, that's about the number of greenbugs per linear foot that would justify treatment.

However, he points up the fact that in early April, the wheat plants could tolerate many more greenbugs per linear foot. In fact, it would be 300-800, he said in April before control measures could be justified. We suggest regular checks in wheat fields to determine the number of bugs present.

The most alarming thing we discovered was the absence of any natural enemies of the greenbug to combat them. The need for applying insecticides will depend in a large part on the number of greenbugs present, size and vigor of the plants, temperature, time of the year, moisture conditions, state of growth and presence or absence of parasites and predators. At this writing, we don't have many natural enemies in the fields we checked. But we are approaching the stage where the size of the wheat, we understand, will let it tolerate more greenbugs than we have now. It just could be that a couple of dollars spent on insecticides might be more beneficial yield-wise than a fertilizer application. Fellows like Grady Dodd, Coy Revious and others who depend heavily on wheat have sprayed and are spraying now. The cost, we understand, is around two dollars per acre. Parathion is a good chemical to use even though some aerial applicators prefer Dyston.

Folks who want the latest information on control measures may wish to pick up the Texas Guide for Controlling Insects and Mites on Grain and Forage Crops (MP-399).

Agricultural Clinic: We know that inclement weather has kept a lot of farmers out of their fields when they most wanted to be in them. We hope everyone'll get most of their work out of the way soon and mark Monday, April 15 on their calendar. The agricultural committee of the Shamrock Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring a free barbecue on that date to those Wheeler County farmers and ranchers attending this year's Wheeler County Agricultural Clinic. The program'll begin at 2:30 p.m. at the Shamrock High School Auditorium. Topics to be discussed include: Chemical Weed Control in Cotton, Maize and Alfalfa; Growing and Finishing Feeder Pigs in the Panhandle; Irrigation Systems and Watering of Crops in the Panhandle; Maize Varieties Showing Resistance to Dwarf Maize Mosaic Viruses; Control of Insects in Field Crops and Agribusiness Services Available to Texas Farmers and Ranchers. Make Plans to Attend. Mark your calendar now! - April 15.

Range Cattle Systems Compared: A recent comparison of two range cattle systems on the Texas Rolling Plains shows that a cow-yearling venture can be more flexible and profitable 8 out of 10 years than a cow-calf system. The comparison was made on a 425 animal-unit ranch which produced its own replacements. The average net ranch income for the 1955-64 period was \$12,315 for the cow-yearling system and \$10,665 for the cow-calf system. Calvin C. Boykin, Agricultural Economist with the U.S. Department of Agriculture at Texas A & M University, reported that adjusting cattle inventories to changes in the range forage supply was the major problem in maintaining output and income. Synthesized ranch budgets were used by the specialist in making the analysis.

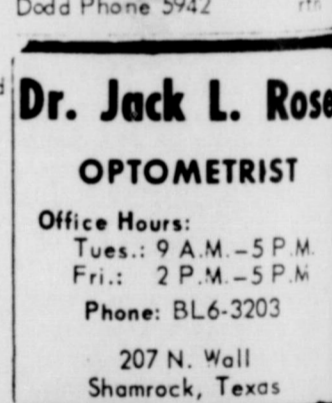

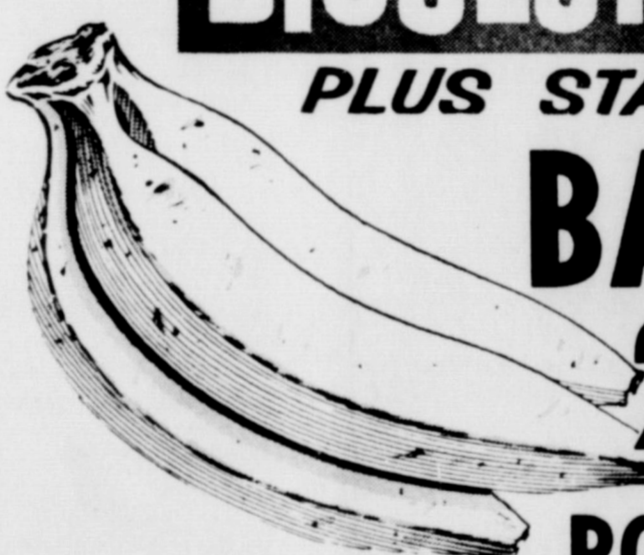

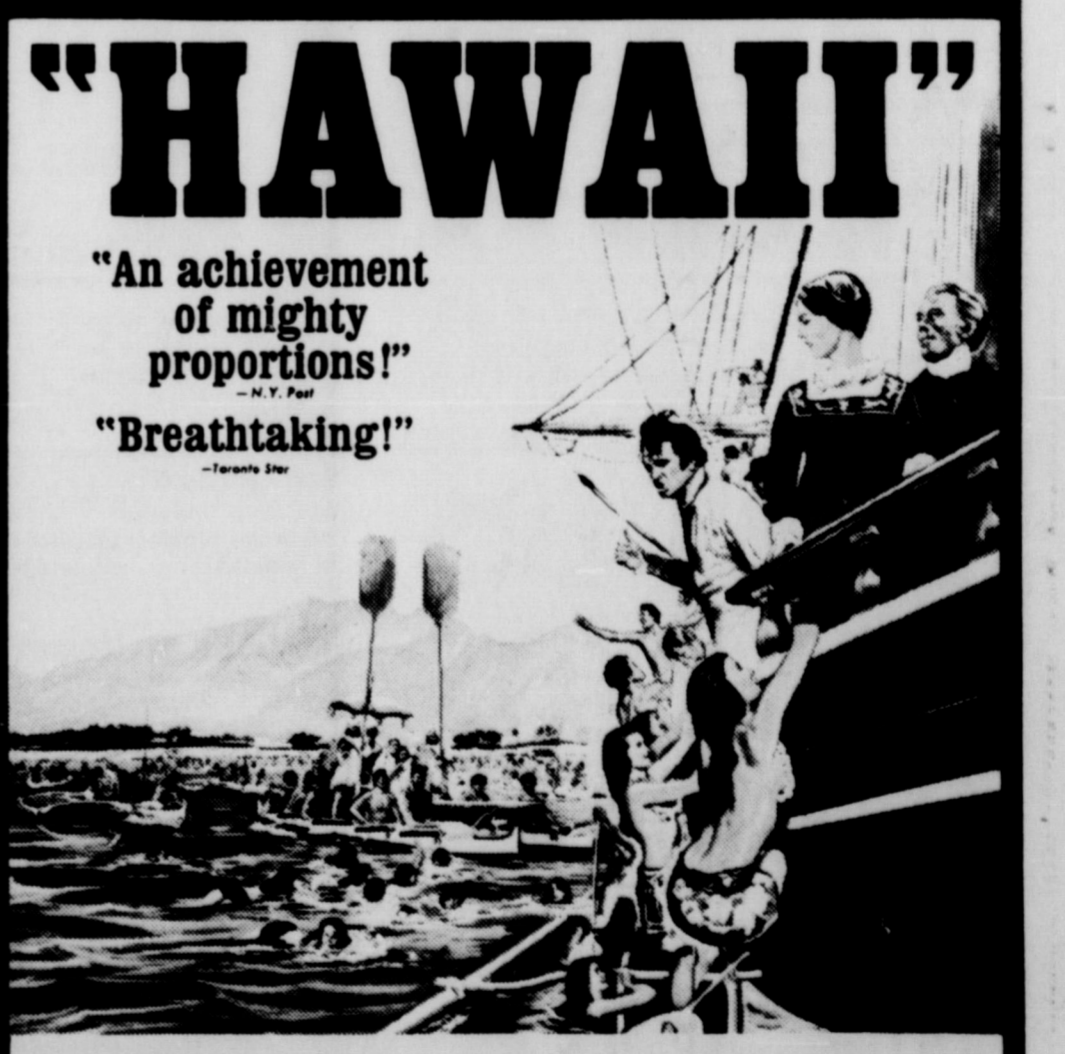
