The Wheeler Nazarene Church will hold a weekend youth crusade, with services starting at 7:00 p.m. each evening.

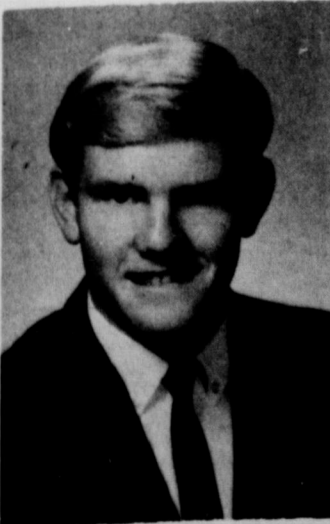
Villard Hunter will be preaching and a young man, Robert Smith from Hurst, Texas will lead the singing. Robert is a senior that has an unusual testimony to tell.

Last Minute Easter Seal

A last minute appeal for support of the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults and its program of services to the handicapped was issued today by Mr. Joe D. Rogers who is the Easter Seal Representative in Wheeler County.

The Easter Seal provided treatment and services for 17,622 physically handicapped children and adults in Texas last year, Mr. Rogers said and this program needs to be expanded. Many people are going without services that would increase the productivity of their lives and make them happier. With increased growth of the Easter Seal Society, more and more of these people will be reached, he added.

The Society is carrying on a continuing program to seek out the disabled who are doing without services and see that they receive the services they need. As Easter Seal Representative, Mr. Rogers is the person to contact for services from the Easter Seal Society.

The Texas Easter Seal Society helps support 21 treatment facilities in Texas where crippled children and adults are treated regardless of their ability to pay. Physical, occupational and speech therapy are offered to help the handicapped overcome their disabilities. A complete referral program to ensure equal rehabilitation services to every person in Texas is included in Easter Seal Society services, he added.

Mr. Rogers asked that anyone in need of services contact him at the First National Bank in Wheeler, Texas, 79096.

He added that the Easter Seal Appeal will close Sunday April 14 and full support should be given the Easter Seal Society by every citizen of Wheeler County.

Track Team Wins 2nd At Dist.

Wheeler took second place honors at the District 2-A Track Meet held at McLean Monday, April 8. The team scored 98 points with the first place team adding up 170 points.

The Wheeler boys entered each of the 12 events. They took four second places. Placing second and earning a place in competition at the Regional Track Meet are Buddy Wood, pole vault,

Bobby Ware, 120 high hurdles; and Donald Rives, broadjump and shot put.

The tracksters will compete at Lubbock April 19-20.

The junior high track team scored 37 points at the McLean meet to take first place. Wheeler had several first and secondplace winners.

The freshman team came in last in the competition at McLean.

Agricultural Clinic Scheduled Monday

Time is growing short until the data for the Annual Wheeler County Agricultural Clinic and Barbecue this coming Monday afternoon, April 15 beginning at 2:30 p.m. in the Shamrock High School Auditorium.

This year's short courses will be comprised of six half hour sessions. Each session will cover one specific area of Agricultural Production in our area.

Speakers for the afternoon's activity are Leon New, Dr. Allen Wiese, Donald Hudman, Dr. Robert Berry, Lyndon Almond and Kenneth Wolf. A barbecue, sponsored by the agricultural committee of the Shamrock Chamber of Commerce, will be served to those attending the clinic at 6:30 p.m. The Wheeler P.C.A. is sponsoring the coffee break.

Leon New, Area Irrigation Specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will speak on "Irrigation Systems and Watering of Crops in The Panhandle Area." New works with County Agents in Extension Districts 1 and 2 in providing leadership for educational programs dealing with all phases of irrigation. New is a native of Hico, Hamilton County and was graduated from Texas A & M University with a B.S. degree in Agricultural Engineering in 1960. Since then he has served as an industrial sales engineer with Central Power and Light Company at San Benito and as a design engineer with a engineering consulting firm in Harlingen.

Dr. Allen Wiese, Weed Agronomist at the Southwestern Great Plains Research Center will speak on "Chemical Weed Control in Cotton and Maize."

"Growing and Finishing Feeder Pigs in the Panhandle" will be the topic of a talk by Donald Hudman, Extension Swine Specialist at Texas A & M University. Hudman gives overall leadership to the off-campus educational programs dealing with the hog business. Dr. Hudman is a native of Moran, Shackelford County, and holds both M.S. and B.S. degrees from Texas A & M University with majors in Animal Nutrition. He received his Ph. D. degree from Iowa State in 1956 and since has served on the teaching and research staff at the University of Nebraska. "Maize Varieties Show Resistance to Dwarf Maize Mosaic" will be the topic discussed by Dr. Robert W. Berry, Area Plant Disease Specialist for the Extension Service. Berry holds Bachelors and a Masters degree from Texas A&M in Plant Pathology. He served as county agent in Hunt and Dickens county before beginning his graduate studies.

Lyndon Almond, Area Entomologist, will talk on "The Control of Insects on Field Crops." Almond works closely with county agents on educational programs dealing with insects attacking crops and livestock with main emphasis on cotton and maize insects. In addition, he is engaged in performing insect surveys and in monitoring the High Plains Diapause Boll Weevil Control Program.

Of special interest to firms providing Agricultural products to farmers in our county will be the discussion led by Kenneth Wolf, Economist - Agribusiness at Texas A&M. Mr. Wolf will talk on "Agribusiness Services"

Predators seem to be on the increase now and the availability of moisture makes control look favorable. Lady Beetles, Nads and Braconid Wasps make up the bulk of the natural enemies of the greenbug. Wheat prospects look good now. The price (\$1.25 per bushel) is the most unfavorable condition. The retail price of a loaf of bread is now 65% higher than it was in 1949. The farmer, we understand, got a little over 3 cents per loaf of bread in 1949 and only 3 1/2 cents in 1967. The retail price was 13 1/2 cents per loaf in 1949 and the price is over 22 cents now. Our 1967 Northwest Texas Research Result Demonstration Program Handbooks are out now. They can be obtained from our office or other locations throughout the county. We encourage you to get a copy now and believe some of the results will be of benefit to you as you begin this year's crop. Copies will be available at the Wheeler County Agricultural Clinic April 15 at 2:30 in the Shamrock High School Auditorium. Fertilizing can give a real boost to dryland wheat due to favorable subsoil moisture situation. Those who have the hard pull-man type soil can also benefit. We wouldn't suggest exceeding 30-40 pounds of nitrogen topdressed though unless the crop's irrigated. A lot of yellowing of wheat could be due to a need for nitrogen as well as damage from greenbugs. About 30 pounds of nitrogen and up to 30 pounds of phosphorus to the acre on grain sorghum land would probably give adequate response. The fertilizer can be applied preplant or as an early sidedress. If in doubt about fertilizing, information on collecting and mailing soil samples can be secured at our office.

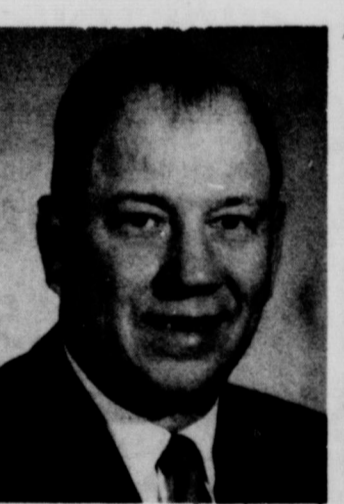
