12 STUDENTS ARE INDUCTED INTO LOCAL NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY

Twelve high school students were inducted into the Wheeler Chapter of the National Honor Society at assembly, Friday, April 26. These students were for graduate membership: Mike Holt, Bobby Ware, Linda Wallace, Lee Hibler, Connie Richardson, and Kelly Abernethy; for active membership: Ronald Rives, Johnny Vise, Louie Simmons and Eddie Matthews; for provisional membership: Janice Ware and Nancy Watts. Steve Hampton and Nancy Wiley were promoted from provisional membership to active membership.

Membership in the National Honor Society has become recognized nationally as the highest honor that can be bestowed upon a high school student. This is true because it represents achievement in the total field of education, not just in some specific field. Membership is evaluated by the faculty, according to national regulations on the basis of four dimensions: character, service, leadership and scholarship.

The first requirement for membership is that the student must have a B average or better. To rate high in leadership, the student must take a constructive lead in classroom and school activities, contribute constructive ideas and show initiative in his studies. Service is rated on the basis of contribution to all and on representation in various types of competition. Character is judged by the responsibility of meeting obligations to the school and to the teachers; by highest standards of attitude toward honest, reliability, fairness and tolerance for others; by willing cooperation with all school regulations; and the highest principles of morality

Case No. 3107: The State of Texas vs Billy Turnbow, Wanda Turnbow and P.C. Hembree, acting together. Bail was set at \$1500.00 each.

Tommy Hyatt, who makes the grasshopper surveys for the USDA Plant Pest Control division in Amarillo, was by last week. He says there's very few hoppers around this spring in our country. This should be good news for cattlemen with short grass.

Visiting with Fred Braxton out at Lela a few days ago. He was broadcasting treflan on his cotton land. Looks like we will have widespread use of this chemical on cotton land this year.

A few year back, we understand that politicians were offering a rabbit for every pot and two cars in every garage. Nowadays there's two or more chemicals to use for every grass or weed. Folks who are considering chemical weed control might want to pick up the new copy of "Suggestions for Weed Control with Chemicals."

Was glad to see that Wheeler County qualified three contestants for the State 4-H Contests last week at Canyon where our District Contests were held. Richard Hefley won second place in the Senior Public Speaking. Richard's coach who will accompany us to College Station is Mrs. Everett Smith of Shamrock. This was routine to Mrs. Smith, who we understand, coached a National Public Speaking Winner a few years back. Of course, we have Helen Puryear going who was a first place Money Management winner last year and Brenda McCasland who went last year too.

We've still got some poison oats left for prairie dog control. W.E. Brashears, who lives in Shamrock reports he's still having good luck using coyote bombs.

Have received several hunting, fishing and outdoor recreational area survey forms. Louis Grayson, local ASCS Office Manager mailed out the forms and plans for local Chamber of Commerce groups to print a brochure showing available hunting, fishing and recreation spots by farmers wishing to be listed in the brochure. Believe these are due pretty soon. If you want your farm included, Louis says to send em' on in as soon as possible.

Elm leaf beetles appear to be out in force this year. Many are coming inside houses. D.D.T. or Sevin does a good job controlling them. The adult form is small brown beetle.

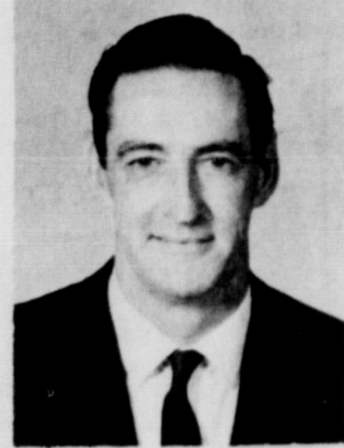
