SOIL STEWARDSHIP WEEK MAY 19-26, 1968

The week of May 19-26 has been designated Soil Stewardship Week. Dusan Pakan, chairman of the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District said "this is a week set aside each year nationally to call attention to everyone's moral responsibility as a

steward of the soil and other natural resources provided by God." The association of Texas Soil and Water Conservation Districts and the State Soil and Water Conservation Board are sponsoring the observance in cooperation with the National Association of Soil and Water Con-

servation Districts. The theme of this year's observance is "A Time for Initiative." The theme was developed with the idea that never before have there been so many reasons for so many people to become involved in resource affairs. "Clearly this is a time initiative - for action, innovation and for

ideas," said Pakan. This is the 14th year that soil and water conservation districts have sponsored the week.

50 ATTEND MEETING AT WELLINGTON

Approximately 50 people from Wheeler and surrounding counties attended an important meeting in Wellington May 17, 1968. This meeting was to explain the purpose and function of Resource Conservation and Development Projects.

The meeting was opened by John Robert Henard of Wellington. Mr. Henard welcomed the group and introduced Mr. Harry Frye of Shamrock. Mr. Frye explained the purpose of the meeting and stated several serious problems of this area that need an organized effort to overcome. Some of these problems Mr. Frye mentioned are: to develop water resources; to develop wildlife and recreational resources; to develop rural water supplies systems; to develop crop and livestock markets and to develop tourist attractions. Mr. Frye then introduced Mr. Hal Storey. Mr. Storey is the Project Coordinator for the Southeast Texas Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) project.

Mr. Storey gave a brief account of the legislation enabling the formation of RC&D projects and told of the formation, extent and functioning of the Southeast Texas RC&D project. Mr. Storey stated, "The primary purpose of RC&D is to give technical and financial help to local groups to obtain better economic opportunities in rural areas through speeding up the conservation and development of that areas natural renewable resources." An RC&D project usually includes several counties. (Those counties in this area that are considering the development of this type of project are Wheeler, Collingsworth, Donley, Hall and Gray and possible Morley.) To qualify for participation the area must have serious problems of lack of development of their natural renewable resources. They must also have strong local interest in the use of this type organization. Mr. Storey said, "The key to the formation and successful operation of an RC&D is to have strong local leadership. The federal government does not formulate or dictate the plan. This

Get that cotton in the ground. This seemed to be the watch word as some farmers set out to put this year's crop in the ground. E.B. Stevens, Morris Pillers and Vaughn Lister said they had their cotton crop in the ground this time last year. Cool weather and rains have delayed our plantings, but we've got the moisture. Was real interested in seeing how Vaughn's new Treflan bander worked. If we can get weed control for \$1.25 per acre, we can probably grow a lot cheaper cotton.

We got our cotton variety plot planted at Briscoe last week. Put in some of that De Cerro variety that W.H. Riley got 42c a pound for last year and some other long staple varieties that we believe folk'll really be interested in.

Maize planting time is just around the corner. This would be a real good time to go in and spot spray those troublesome Johnsongrass areas with MSMA (Ansan) and kill it down where you can handle it before planting.

ACROSS THE FENCE

Eradication of Johnson grass and other weeds is essential for efficient crop production. Johnson grass not only competes for water, nutrients and sunlight, but may serve as a source or habitat for insects and diseases. Johnson grass is the primary overwintering host for maize dwarf mosaic virus, a new disease of grain sorghum in this area of the state, therefore, eradication of the weed may become increasingly important in sorghum production areas.

"Besides being unsightly, Johnson grass along ditches and fence rows should be controlled to reduce the source of seed that may later contaminate cultivated fields," says the agronomist. Small patches of Johnson grass may be eradicated in non-cultivated areas with such soil sterilant herbicides as sodium chlorate or bromacil. Sodium chlorate at three to five pounds per

square rod (16 2/3 feet) can be used along ditches and fence rows. Bromacil should be applied at 15 to 20 pounds of active ingredient per acre.

Rainfall is required to move these herbicides into the soil. Treated soil will remain sterile for two or three years. Shorter periods (several months) of sterilization can be obtained with a mixture such as sodium TCA and Dalapon.

In cultivated areas where soil sterilization is to be avoided, use dalapon at the rate of 10 to 20 pounds per acre on 6 to 10 inch Johnson grass. Small areas may be treated by spraying foliage until wet with one or two pounds of dalapon in ten gallons of water. Usually two or three sprayings at two to three week intervals is necessary for eradication.

"Economic Johnson grass control on large cultivated areas can best be obtained by tillage and DSMA or MSMA with a one-half percent surfactant. This should

be applied to vigorously growing plants at three to five pounds per acre. Herbicidal oils may also be effective under these conditions.

June 1-20 is the planting date for soybeans if you want to try some this year. They make good hog feed and net profits where water is available is comparable to dryland maize returns.

Enter Field Day: John Shipley tells us they'll have their Experiment Station Field Day at 1 p.m. on May 28. Looks like an interesting program. Folks attending will see plots on weed control, irrigation of wheat, maize and soybeans and wheat variety plots. Those interested in attending, let us know. We plan to make it.

Wheat: We've been a little disappointed in growth of dryland wheat. Some of our wheat varieties seem a little susceptible to rust. Others took a little frost damage resulting in blasted heads. Of course, our greenbugs didn't do us a lot of good. However, our irrigated wheat looks like it's going to turn out real well.

Dealer Announces New "Open Door Policy"

A new open door policy for customers of Lee Hardware & Furniture has been announced by Loyd T. Lee, Owner of the retail outlet located at 418 Main St.

"The open door policy," Mr. Lee said, "is a new refrigerator-freezer with reversible doors which may be changed to open from whichever side the customer desires."

The new household appliance, called the Reversa-Door refrigerator, was previewed by Mr. Lee at a spring sales meeting held in Lubbock.

He said the new model offers a solution to the "wrong door swing" problem experienced by thousands of America's transient families and even by the more stationary families who want to remodel their kitchens.

Mr. Lee pointed out that 20 per cent of the total U.S. population moves each year and that one age group almost doubles the national average.

"Almost 40 percent of those families whose head of household is in the 25 to 35 category are on the move each year," Mr. Lee said.

"More and more of these mobile families are learning that the refrigerator that con-

veniently opened from the right in their suburban New York home really ought to open from the left in their new Los Angeles kitchen," Mr. Lee said.

With the new Reversa-Door refrigerator, all it takes is a Phillips screwdriver, a 5/16" open end wrench and about 25 minutes to change left hinged doors to right hinged doors--or vice versa. The hinges and decorative trim are simply reversed.

Mr. Lee said the new refrigerator-freezer model also features automatic ice making and storage, frostless freezing and adjustable refrigerator shelves.

Lake Marvin To Reopen

Lake Marvin, located 14 miles northeast of Canadian, Texas will be opened for fishing and camping June 1st. The lake was closed in September of 1966 and chemically treated, drained, cleaned out and then restocked with bass and channell catfish.

According to lake officials, the chemical biologist stated that fishing should be excellent with fish weighing approximately 1 1/2 to 2 lbs.

The concession building at the lake will be operated by Mr. and Mrs. Roger McFarren and will feature a good selection of bait, fishing equipment and camping supplies as well as soft drinks and candy.

There will be eight cabins overlooking the lake which may be rented by the night or by the week. There will be cabins completely furnished with stove, refrigerator, beds and linens while others will have only beds.

All cabins have showers, private baths and hot and cold running water. Personal boats with small trolling or gasoline motors will be permitted on the lake. A fee of 50c per person or \$1.50 per carload and .75 for personal boats will be charged.

A contest will be held the opening weekend and a tackle box will be given to the person catching the heaviest fish during the first and second of June. Fishermen must register their catch at the concession building between the hours of 7 a.m.

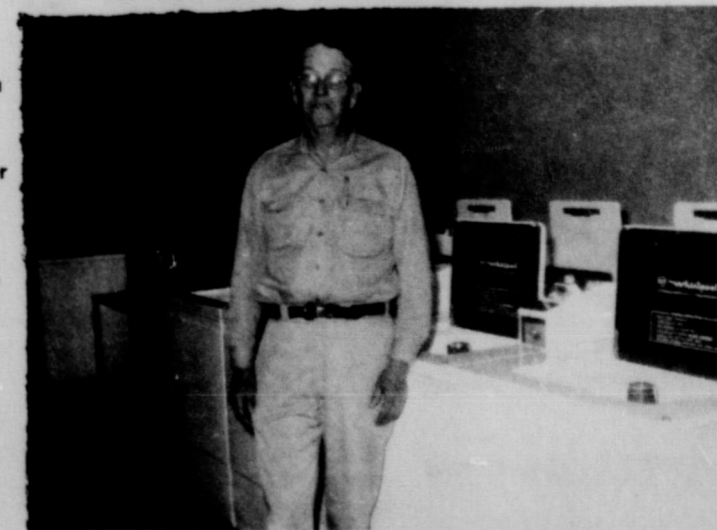
