

ACROSS THE FENCE

Water was knee high and rising last week as cotton farmers were prevented from getting into fields to plant. The hail damaged the wheat a little but we don't feel it's anything to be concerned about. About all that's left to do now concerning wheat is to grease the combine and find someone who will pay you what wheat's really worth.

Hog prices are going up. Forecasters say they'll hit

\$23 in July. By the way, the Bureau of the Census, says we don't have but a third of the number of farmers in Wheeler County growing hogs now that grew them five years ago. Leonard Kyle, Extension Agricultural Economist at Michigan State University, says he thinks, "Many people have gone out of the hog business because they have gone to off-farm employment or changed their program. He said they wanted to utilize their free time, particularly in the winter, without livestock chores. I know this is true in Michigan, he adds, because many people want to be free on

the weekend to live like their city cousins." Anyway, whatever the reasons, a lot of folks here have quit the business and we feel they're going to miss out on an income possibility because of it.

For those folks who'll have to replant cotton because of hail or rain and who banded herbicides in the soil, don't forget to plant your other crops in the middles.

Conditions for screwworms were never as good. Thirty-five cases have been reported in Texas this year compared to six last year. Continue to check your herds

carefully, treat wounds, collect and send in all worm samples.

Joe Dukes of Allison, we understand, lost 20 calves to rustlers the other day. A number of others have lost some too. Folks might want to keep a close watch on their livestock.

Predator Insects Show Promise: Bollworms and tobacco budworms in cotton may be more resistant to available insecticides these days, but they are no match for one of nature's equalizers—the larva of the green lacewing, a natural predator. Two USDA entomologists at Texas A&M University have

obtained a 96 percent reduction of bollworms and budworms by releasing great numbers of the Chrysopa larvae into a cotton field. The larvae, also known as aphid lions, showed a respectable tolerance to insecticides. The entomologists, Dr. R.L. Ridgway and S.L. Jones, said the practice was still in the experimental stage and is not meant to replace but to reduce the use of insecticides.

We'll probably use more insecticides on our cotton crops this year. Cotton farmers may wish to secure the 1968 guide for Controlling Cotton Insects on the Rolling

Plains, available at our office in Wheeler.

Weed control in Maize—consider using oil-water emulsion sprays for applying atrazine to grain sorghum this season. On small weeds one to two pounds of atrazine in one to two gallons of a non-toxic oil should give good weed control. The oil should contain an adequate amount of emulsifier for 20 to 40 gallons of total carrier per acre. If weeds are large and the sorghum is more than six inches tall, higher rates of water, oil and atrazine should be used.

For aerial spraying, use

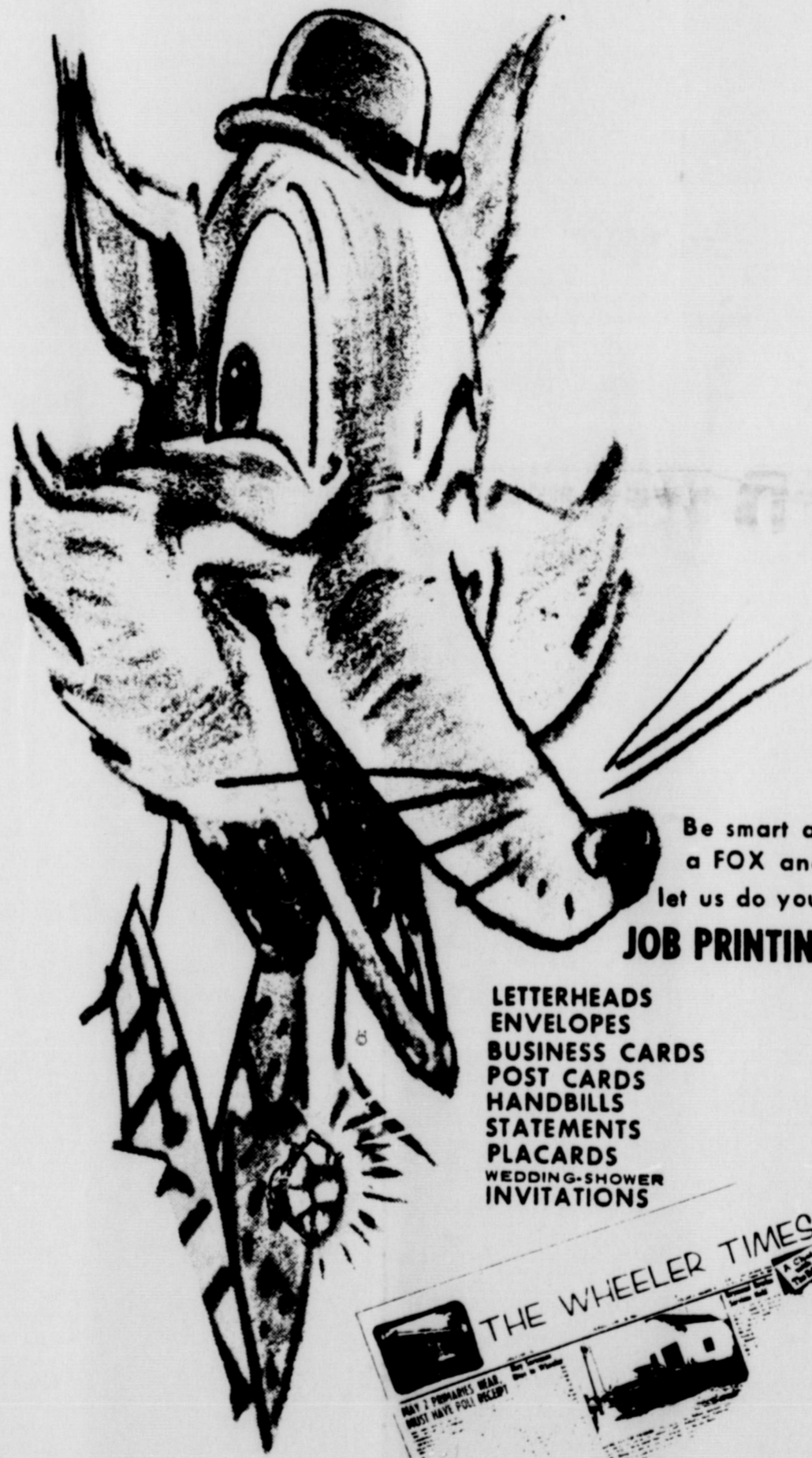
5 to 10 percent non-toxic oil with sufficient emulsifier and one to two pounds of atrazine per acre. If the spray drop size is in the range of 200 to 400 microns, application can be made with as little as two gallons of carrier per acre.

In 1964, field tests first indicated that oil emulsions improved the effectiveness of atrazine. Four inch pigweed growing in 6 inch sorghum was controlled better with atrazine applied in an oil-water emulsion than with water and surfactant. A year later, good control of six inch pigweed was obtained with atrazine at one pound

per acre applied in an oil-water emulsion.

Results in 1966 again proved the effectiveness of oil-water emulsions, this time by aerial application. One pound of atrazine per acre with an oil-water emulsion of only two and one-half gallons of total carrier per acre eliminated six inch pigweed growing in a field.

In one replication of a study, atrazine at two pounds per acre in five gallons of oil-water emulsion carrier was the only treatment that gave some control of broad-leaf grass, the research points out.

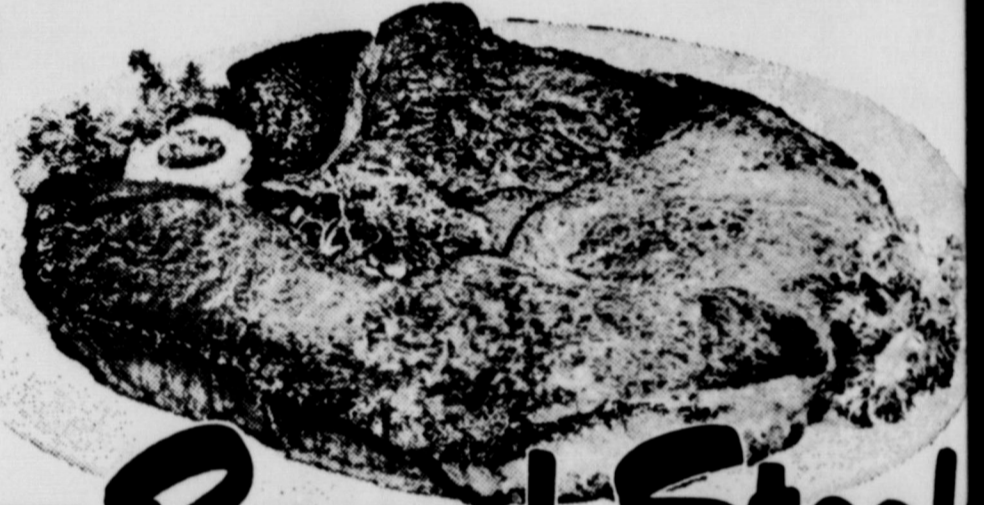

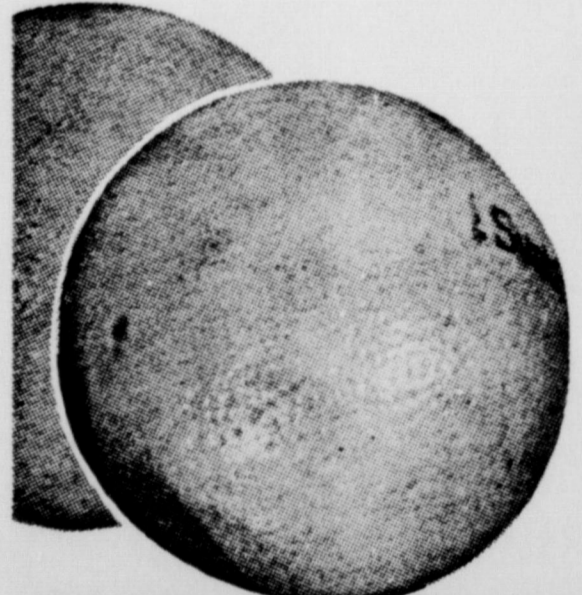
