N. L. (SHORTY) SECHRIST NAMED COMMISSIONER FOR PRECINCT 1

Wheeler County voters turned out 1257 strong Saturday, June 2 and cast their ballots for Preston Smith in the governor's race. James A. Joy carried Wheeler County by 4 votes for the Court of Civil Appeals.

In precinct 1 493 voters cast their ballots in the Commissioners run-off between Shelby Pettit and Shorty Sechrist. Sechrist carried the election with a margin of 89 votes. Sechrist received 291 votes with Pettit having 202.

Smith held a lead of 278 votes in the governor's race. Preston Smith received 741 of Saturday's votes. Don Yarborough received 483 votes.

The contest between Joy and Hazlewood was close with only a four vote difference. Joy received 618 votes and Jack Hazlewood had 614 supporters in the county.

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MEETING IS SET FOR FRIDAY ON INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT

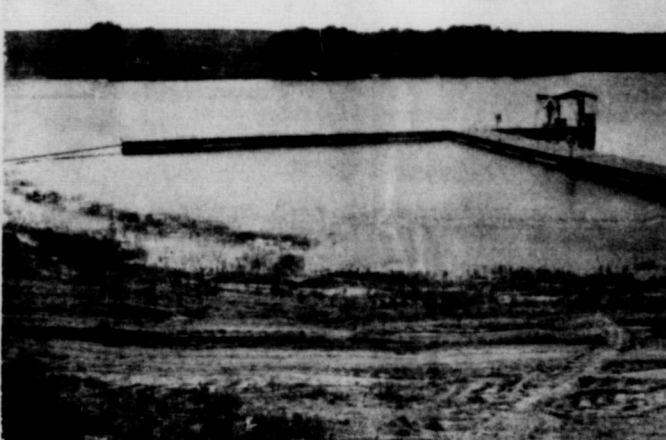
