## BLOOD MOBILE ARRIVES THURS., AUG. 8

### YOUR BLOOD IS BADLY NEEDED!



The Wichita Regional Blood Center will make its annual blood drawing in Wheeler, Texas August 8th from 9 A. M. until 2:15 in the Wheeler School Cafeteria. We need 120 pints of blood donated from north Wheeler County. There have been 109 units of blood used at the Parkview Hospital from the Wichita Regional Blood center in the last six months plus some drawn locally for emergency use.

This regional blood center serves over 2 million people, 123 hospitals in Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas and Missouri and veterans in hospitals and military hospitals in this area.

Do your share. Plan to give the gift only you can give. That unit of blood may help a patient already in need of blood to regain their health or indeed at times to prevent death.

This past two weeks have drawn from all the known O- blood donors at the local hospital. Seventeen people have walked into the hos-

pital and given a pint of their blood for 2 patients. More blood of other types has been drawn locally for other patients.

If you have not been contacted and you have not gone to the hospital in the last six weeks to give blood, please think seriously about the shortage of blood locally and nationwide that makes it necessary to call local donors for their blood. Do your share and give your pint.

If you are between the ages of 18 and 60 you may give blood. Between the ages of 18 and 21, donors must have their parents permission unless you are in the military service.

The blood center is short all types of blood and it is urgently requested that people who have considered giving blood but have never dared be located and typed and give their pint at this time.

Please read these instructions carefully as to who may give. Of course the doctor in attendance will make the final decision as to whether you should or should not give.

- A. REGARDING IMMUNIZATION:**
1. Rabies: one year after last shot
  2. Small-Pox: Two weeks for "No Take"; for "Take" after scab comes off
  3. Yellow Fever: Two weeks after last shot
  4. Typhoid: 24 hrs. after last shot
  5. Typhus: 24 hrs. after last shot
  6. Rock Mountain Spotted Fever: 24 hrs. after last shot

7. Influenza: 24 hrs. after last shot
  8. Tetanus: 24 hrs. after last shot
  9. Cholera: 24 hrs. after last shot
  10. Diphtheria: 24 hrs. after last shot
  11. Poliomyelitis - Salk Vaccine: 24 hrs. after last shot
  12. Sabin Vaccine: (oral) no waiting period
- B. Vitamin, hormone, liver, antibodies and related products and other injections donor must be evaluated by the physician on an individual basis.

1. Cortisone: 1 month after last dose.

**C. EXPOSURE TO CONTAGIOUS OR INFECTIOUS DISEASES:**

If donor has been exposed to infectious or contagious diseases in or out of the home, he should not be scheduled for three weeks.

If there is more than one child in the family, he should not be scheduled for three weeks after the last patient has recovered.

D. 1. Persons with a history of hepatitis are not permitted to donate blood for any purpose. This has been in effect for over 5 months.

2. Persons who have ever had malaria are permanently deferred. This is a recent and drastic change in policy.

3. Women need be deferred for only six months following termination of pregnancy. It was formerly 12 months. This is new.

4. Cancer, except for minor skin lesions, is reason for deferral. This is not a new policy.

**DIET**  
**PROPER DIET:** It is important that you eat to maintain your strength, but avoid fatty food for four hours PRIOR to donation.

**Suggested Breakfast:** Fruit, fruit juices with generous amounts of sugar. Cream of Wheat or oatmeal with sugar and trim milk, toast with jam, jelly or honey. (no butter)

**Suggested Lunch:** Clear soups without fats, sandwiches (no butter or mayonnaise) roast beef, tongue, chicken, lettuce, tomato, onion or cucumber (catsup), eggs, if eaten, boiled or poached.

Vegetables: prepared without fat. Bread: toast or crackers, no butter.

Salad, Vegetable, fruit or dry cottage cheese (no mayonnaise or oil dressing) Use lemon juice, vinegar, salt or sugar

Dessert: jello or fruit. **ADVISABLE TO FORCE LIQUIDS:** Any carbonated drink, coffee, tea (without cream) water

**FOODS EXCLUDED:** Fried foods, cream, butter, mayonnaise, oil dressings, peanut butter, gravy, ham, bacon, pastries, nuts and chocolate.

Following are revisions of "Instructions to Blood Donors"

1. Proper Diet: While it is not desirable for donors to ingest heavy, fatty meals, they should not go with a full stomach at the regular meal time prior to donation. Light refreshment such as fruit juices, bread crackers, dry toast, raw vegetables, jam, jelly or honey, skimmed milk, black coffee or tea is desirable during a 4 hour period prior to donation.

Please do "NOT" eat fats (such as cream, butter, fatty meats or fried food) for at least four hours before your appointment.

2. Fire-fighters: Volunteer or regular fire-fighters should not donate blood within 36 hours of a possible call-for-duty. In smaller communities where much dependence is placed on the volunteer fire-fighter, it would be advisable to divide these volunteers into two groups, each group to donate alternately.

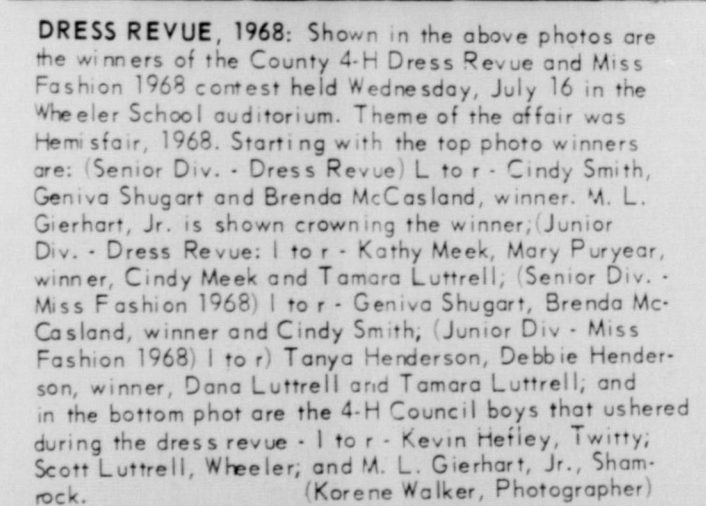

## SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

### Plants Could Cause Death

"The summertime beauty of our state's lush vegetation in yards, fields, pastures and woodlands, also holds dangers that the public should heed," H. N. Smith, State Conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service in Temple warned this week. Smith said that throughout the U. S. and Canada more than 700 species of plants are known to cause death, illness or extreme discomfort to people.

"Chewing, swallowing or otherwise contacting the toxic parts of certain plants, trees and shrubs, takes a heavy toll," Smith said. "Each year health services report that about 12,000 children are poisoned or injured by these sources."

Parents should be concerned, the SCS official stated, because many of the plants are quite common in flower and vegetable gardens and in ornamental landscaping, as well as in wild places. Bulbs, roots, seeds, leaves, beans, stems or berries may contain poison, depending on the species of plant.

The beautiful oleander bush, for example, grown all over the country, contains a deadly heart stimulant similar to the drug digitalis. The toxin is so strong that a single leaf can kill a child. People have died merely from eating stems speared on oleander twigs and roasted over a fire.

The popular Christmas flower poinsettia is full of an acid, burning juice, so lethal that a child who consumed one leaf might die. Mistletoe berries can also be deadly.

Peach tree leaves contain hydrocyanic acid, one of the most dangerous poisons known. Potato and tomatop plants, close kin to the deadly nightshade, have foliage that contains alkaloid poisons which can cause severe digestive upset and nervous disorder if eaten.

Jimson weed, sometimes called thorn apple and stickweed, grows almost everywhere and causes more poisoning than any other plant. It grows from 2 to 5 feet tall, has large leaves and white funnel-shaped flowers resembling morning glories. All parts are poisonous, especially seeds and leaves.

Duffenbachia or dumb cane is a beautiful house plant grown in millions of homes, but merely biting its stalk can cause swelling of the mouth and tongue that can be deadly. It is called dumb cane because of its power to strike its victims speechless. The stalk contains needle like crystals of calcium oxalate that become imbedded in the tissue of the mouth and tongue causing severe swelling and pain.

Castor bean seeds are especially dangerous because they are so deadly and so readily available. They are sold in garden stores for about 25 cents a packet and are popular because they produce large, lush plants in one season. Yet each seed contains enough ricin, a powerful blood poison, to kill a child.

Mescalbean or mountain laurel, is also dangerous. It has a poison bean with a hard coat. If it is swallowed whole there may be no ill effects, but if chewed or crushed it can be lethal.

Other common plants in Texas that have poisonous parts include elephant ear, harkspur, azaleas, lantana canna, yew, oaks, water hemlock, poison hemlock, poisoning, poison oak and poison sumac.

"More detailed information on these and other plants can be secured from health and plant authorities," Smith said. "However, we have requested SCS offices in our state's 184 soil and water conservation districts to cooperate fully with the National Safety Council in keeping the public alerted to plants that cause these problems."

### Sediment Causes Water Pollution

Temple, Texas - "Sediment causes more pollution than any other substance," H. N. Smith, State Conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service, reminded this week in announcing a new SCS booklet on the subject.

The publication, entitled "Sediment - It's Filling Harbors, Lakes and Roadside Ditches," is now available free from SCS offices. Smith said sediment ruins lakes, kills fish, and costs millions in taxes for dredging and filtering. It also carries other pollutants such as chemicals with it. Most phosphates and pesticides, for example, are carried on sediment. Erosion control measures are effective in reducing pollution from these sources.

The SCS official said the new publication points out that more than half a billion cubic yards of eroded land is dredged each year from streams, navigation channels, estuaries and harbors at a cost of 40¢ a cubic yard. Cost of keeping it out of these places through proper conservation practices would be only a fraction of that.

"Also, our sediment studies on reservoirs show that sediment is damaging practically every lake in Texas," stated Smith. "In fact, several cities have had to build new lakes because the old ones filled with mud. And this is not just a Texas problem - it's also a national problem."

Sediment also destroys spawning beds for game fish, ruins their eggs, and reduces their food supply. In many small streams across the state, sediment has filled the deep pools that were once a refuge for fish during dry weather.

Smith said that the sad thing about sediment is that it hurts the land where it comes from and it hurts the water where it goes. And it's all caused by soil erosion. He pointed out, however, that it's not just a farm problem. Last year, 1.5 million acres of land were stripped bare for housing developments, new roads and other construction. Sometimes it's years before anything is built on this land - and, in the meantime, it erodes.

Smith thinks the only answer to the sediment problem is a constant vigil on the part of every user of land - farmers, rancher, housing developers, cities, and others. A sound program of soil and water conservation can reduce sediment damage by as much as 90 percent - nothing else will, he said.

### Frank Phillips College Is Growing

Frank Phillips College in Borger has reached its twentieth birthday. For the past years this junior college has been growing in leaps and bounds.

Seven beautiful buildings are built on a campus that has now expanded to sixty acres. These buildings are modern, air-conditioned and well kept. The oldest is only twelve years old.

The administration building was built in 1955-56. The Fine Arts building with its auditorium and student center was finished in 1961.

The gymnasium was constructed in 1956 and enlarged in 1961. The college maintenance building was constructed in 1962.

The new James W. Dillard Library was finished in April 1967. This fine library is the show place of the Panhandle. With its carpeted floors, walnut furniture and 20,000 volumes, it holds a place of eminence among colleges and universities of the region.

Last year two beautiful, completely air-conditioned dormitories were constructed on the campus. Maxine Gains Hall has capacity for eighty



college women, and W. G. Stephens Hall will house one hundred and twenty college men.

The dormitories with adequate parking area are well situated on the western slope of the campus and are readily accessible to the other buildings and the student center where the college cafeteria is located. Reservations are now being taken for rooms in the dorms.

**Freezing Prepared Foods**

By Brenda W. Hofmann, CHDA  
During hot summer months, it is easier to open the freezer for baked goodies or casseroles than to spend hours in the kitchen. Freezing is the only method to preserve many of these baked or cooked goods. Cook most breads, cakes and pies before freezing. Cool them and wrap in moisture-vapor proof

material. Use standard recipes for breads and cakes. For quick breads use double-action baking powder. Biscuits and muffins are better frozen uncooked. Bran muffins, fruit and nut breads are better if baked before freezing.

You may freeze bread and rolls baked or unbaked. Use a recipe with a fairly large amount of fat and sugar. Baked products may be stored as long as 9-12 months. If you want to freeze dough, allow it to rise until double in bulk. Doughs shaped before freezing may be inferior, even when stored only two weeks.

Prebaked cakes containing fat may dry out slightly after two months, and after four months, flavor changes may be expected. Use pure extracts as imitations may produce off-flavors. Angel food, yellow sponge, chiffon and fruit cakes baked before freezing will keep up to a year. Uncooked confectioner's sugar frostings freeze best. Boiled and other soft frostings containing egg whites and cream fillings are not suitable for freezing.

Fruit, vegetable and chiffon pies freeze successfully. Fruit pies may be frozen either before or after baking. Crust is more tender and flaky and flavor fresher when the pies are frozen before baking. It is best to not freeze lattice top pies. Don't cup steam vents in top crusts of frozen unbaked pies until they have been removed from the freezer.

When using your freezer, these pointers will help make combination dishes better.

1. Do not overcook foods that are to be frozen. Foods that are to be heated before serving are best if only partially cooked; meat should be tender but still firm, vegetables slightly underdone.
2. Use as little fat as possible in gravies and sauces. Fats have a tendency to separate, but if used in smaller proportions, they will recombine when heated.
3. Fried foods are apt to become rancid after one to two months of storage.
4. Use seasonings sparingly as some of them change during storage. Pepper gets stronger. Cloves may become stronger during storage and discolor frozen fillings.
5. Garlic becomes stronger during storage and onions gradually lose flavor. Green Peppers, sage and pimientos increase in strength.
6. It is important to cool cooked foods promptly to prevent continued cooking. Submerge the cooking pan in ice water to hasten cooling. Foods lose flavor rapidly when held at high temperatures. And warm foods invite bacteria growth.
7. After cooling, package in moisture-vapor-resistant material immediately. Pack all types of cooked foods as solidly as possible to avoid air spaces in the containers.
8. Enhance the flavor of meats, poultry, seafoods, precooked foods and vegetables with monosodium glutamate (MSG).
9. Casserole dishes containing macaroni, spaghetti, noodles or rice may be frozen. To serve, bake in 350 degree F. oven for 40-60 minutes.
10. You can move the baking dish directly from the freezer to the oven with little danger of breakage.
11. You can freeze almost any type of creamed dish except those containing hard-cooked egg whites. Avoid overcooking and cool rapidly in a pan of ice water. Don't store longer than two or four months.
12. Package prepared foods in amounts suitable for serving. You may safely freeze frozen foods that have been thawed if they still contain ice crystals. Thawed foods spoil faster than fresh foods.
13. Thawing and refreezing may lower the eating

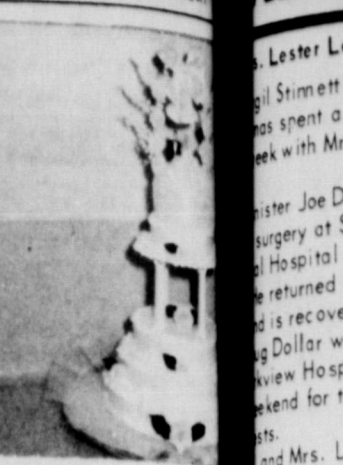

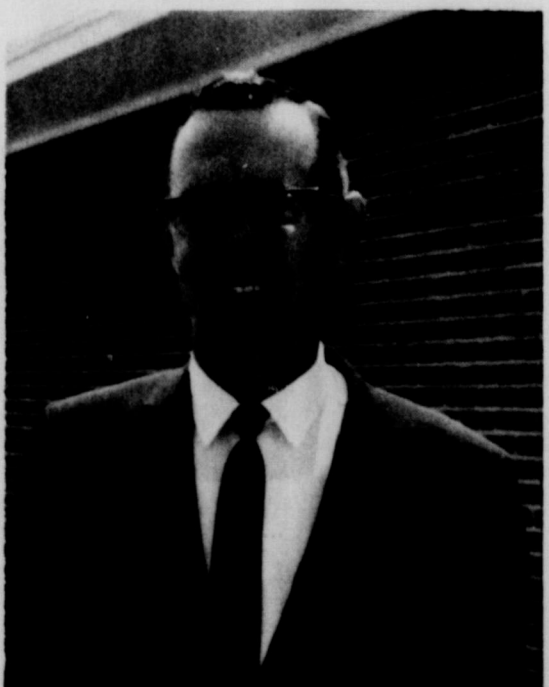

## Eight Accidents

### In Co. In June

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated eight accidents on rural highways in Wheeler County during the month of June according to Sergeant J. L. Dalrymple, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed, five persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$5,465.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first six months of 1968 shows a total of 31 accidents resulting in no persons killed, 12 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$25,415.

"During the first six months of 1968 in Texas there were 1472 traffic deaths or four less as compared to the 1476 traffic deaths for the same period of 1967," the Sergeant stated. However, if past trends continue the last six months will probably raise the 1968 total to one percent over the 1967 total of 3,367 deaths.

The Sergeant also stated that a training school for 120 new patrolmen with the Texas Department of Public Safety will start July 30.

To qualify for employment in the uniformed services of the DPS, a man must be between the ages of 20 and 35, not less than 5 feet eight inches tall, have a high school education or its equivalent, be in sound physical condition and be a citizen of the United States.

All interested young men who can meet these qualifications are urged to contact the nearest DPS patrolman or DPS office for complete details concerning the position of a patrolman, training and benefits.

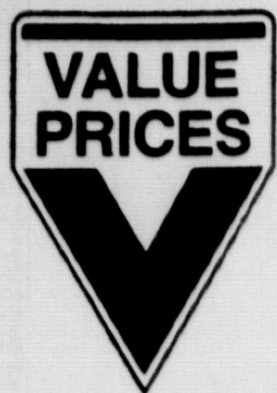

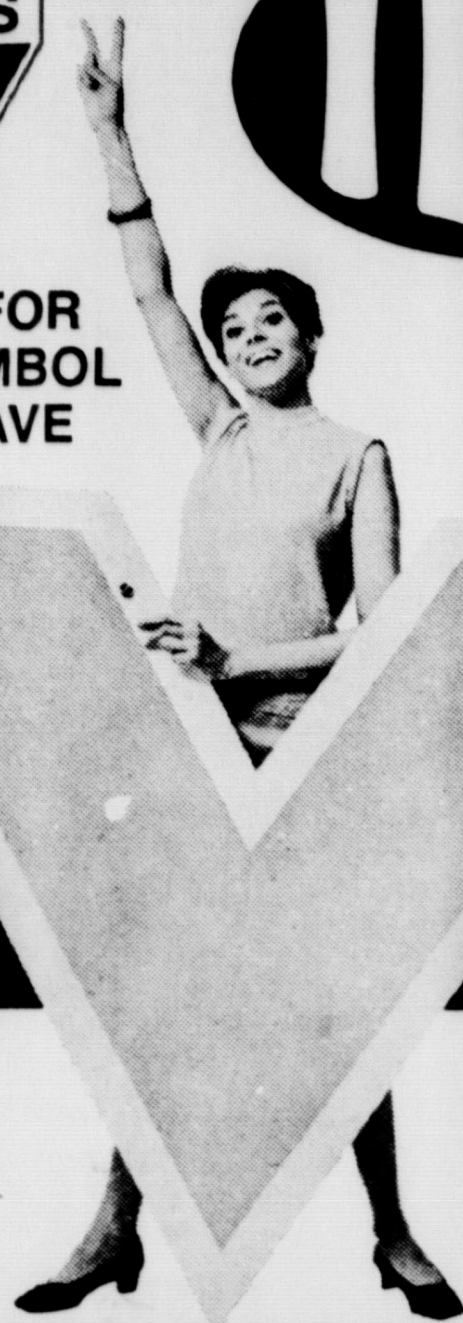
