

an economic factor in Wheeler County. The number of irrigation systems in the County has grown in the last few years to approximately one hundred systems. These systems would have the capacity to irrigate an estimated eight thousand acres. This is a great factor in the welfare of the area.

When an irrigation system is installed, it is very important to have a system that is deisgned correctly. Most of the irrigation systems

in Wheeler County are sprinkler systems. In order to utilize our irrigation water to best advantage, there are several things to consider in the design of a system.

The first thing of course, to know, is how much water Mrs. Doris Newsom last week, is available. The next thing to consider would be the Stinnett, are the proud parents type of soil to be irrigated. As some soils take water faster than others, you can readily see that this would be important, for you would not want a system that would deliver water to a given area faster than it would take it. This would cause wasteful runoff that would result in an unnecessary cost of both water that is scarce, and


> Other factors to consider in the correct design of a system is the size of pump, main line size and lateral size, the nozzle size and pressure that the system should maintain.

If you are considering installing an irrigation system keep in mind that this is one of the functions of the personell of the Soil Conservation Service. They have trained engineers and technicians that would be glad to assist you in planning a system for your particular need, so do not hesitate to ask for their help.


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
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


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
