FORMER MOBEETIE MAN KILLED IN VIETNAM WAR

Funeral services for Sgt.
Keith William Rowell, 25,
of Route 2, Amarillo, former
resident and graduate of
Mobeetie were held in School-

Friday, September 6, 1968.

Sgt. Rowell was killed
August 25, 1968, in enemy
action in Vietnam. He was a
member of the 101st Air
Cavalry. He had been in
Vietnam since October, 1967.
Survivors include his wife,
Ann, Amarillo, Texas; moth-
er, Mrs. Faye Rowell, Clint-
on, Okla.; one brother, Gary
Rowell, Amarillo, Texas; one
sister, Mrs. Judy Vowell; and
grandmother, Mrs. W. A. Row-
ell, Silverton, Texas.

Church of Amarillo, officiat-
ed. Rev. Charles J. Uzzle,

Military Bearers were of
the O. B. Detachment B-2

Phillips, Texas. He was a
member of the First Baptist

RCA&D Project Report Given

There is continuing inter-
est in the organization of a
Resource Conservation and
Development Project for Whee-
ler County. Other counties
now considered along with
Wheeler are - Hemphill, Gray,
Collingsworth, Donley, Hall
and that portion of Briscoe
County below the caprock.
The purpose of RC&D is to
effectively develop and utilize
the natural resources of the
area and locally for a more
stable economy through strong
local leadership and action.

The organization was com-
pleted at a meeting held in the
conference room of the Farm-
ers and Merchants Bank in
Shamrock, Texas last Friday,
Sept. 6, 1968. The name of
the project will be the North
Rolling Plains Resource
Conservation and Develop-
ment Project. The chairman
is Harry Frye of Shamrock.
The vice-chairman is Dan
Henard from Wellington and
Collingsworth county. The
secretary-treasurer is A. L.
"Ace" Gailey from Memphis
and Hall county. Other mem-
bers of the executive comm-
ittee in addition to the prin-
cipal officers are: County
Judge B. F. Conyers from
Hemphill County; James
Cliett, SWCD board from Gray
County; Harold White, Hedley
School Board and Donley
county; O. R. Stark, Jr.,
Quitaque city council and
Briscoe county.
Mr. O. R. Stark was
appointed chairman of the
by-laws committee. Mr. Dan
Henard was appointed chair-
man of the Application Pre-
paration committee.

The primary objective now
is to prepare and submit the
application. A hope was ex-
pressed that the application
could be completed before
December 1, 1968.

Office and the Kelton, Sham-
rock and Wheeler Schools.
Mailout brochures were spon-
sored by the Wheeler County
Farmers Union.

the Extension Service in
1946. In that year, the aver-
age lint yield per acre in
Texas was 134 pounds.
It was 348 pounds in 1961
and an estimated 408 pounds
in 1965.

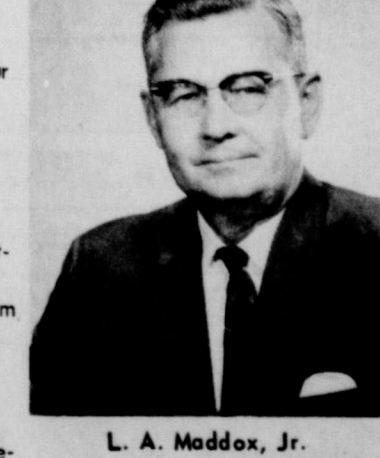

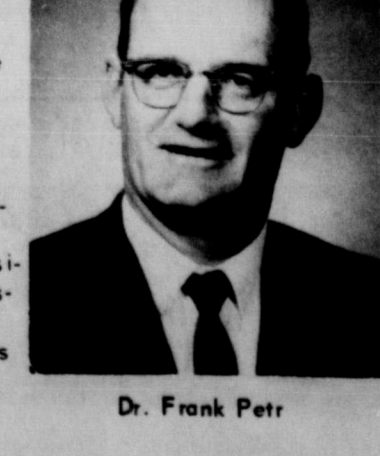

Crops Tour

Dr. Schake, are livestock specialist, works closely with cattle feeders and producers in West Texas and cooperates with county agricultural agents in conducting educational programs and meetings dealing with various phases of the livestock industry. He is charged with providing needed training on livestock matters and works with other extension specialists on short courses and other teaching and training aids. Schake holds BS and MS Degrees in animal husbandry from the University of Missouri and recently received a Ph. D. Degree in animal nutrition from Texas A&M University. A new specialist, he is married and has two children. He was reared on a farm and ranch and did some ranching prior to moving to Texas A&M to continue his graduate studies. He conducted research studies on beef cows at the Rolling Plains Research Station at Spur.

L. A. Maddox, Jr. is animal husbandman with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. He was reared on a ranch near Miami, Texas, in Roberts County and holds a BS and MS degree from Texas A&M University. He managed his own commercial cow and calf operation from 1946 and 1956. While employed by Texas Tech, he started the first performance testing of young bulls at Pan Tech Farms in 1950. Mr. Maddox joined the Texas Agricultural Extension Service staff in 1954 and shortly initiated the first education program on beef cattle performance testing in Texas. In 1956 he was moved to the headquarters staff to develop state-wide programs. Mr. Maddox was one of the founders of the Performance Registry International.

Dr. Petr was placed in the Panhandle as area agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service because of the increasing demands for assistance on the area staff at Lubbock in January of 1968. Dr. Petr is a native of Montana and majored in crop breeding and minored in genetics and plant pathology at Iowa State University where he received his Ph. D. degree. He is a former college instructor in Agronomy and served as research agronomist with the United States Department of Agriculture.

Mr. Hancock initiated the planning of the peach orchard demonstration on the N. L. Sechirst farm in 1966. He is presently serving as Extension Horticulturist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Jerald Crump is a native West Texan serving as Soil Scientist for the Soil Conservation Service. He will conduct the Final Acre Celebration of the completion of the mapping and classification of the final acre of soil on Morris Pillers farm west of Twitty.

Foster Whaley is county agent in neighboring Gray County. He will speak after the barbecue on "Hedging Beef Cattle in Wheeler County Feedlots." He has received recognition from the Chicago Merchants Exchange for his articles on hedging beef cattle. Many individuals seek his counsel before hedging cattle.
