a fine 46 yard kick and a rash of penalties against Wheeler, including a clipping fine and a personal foul penalty.
A pass interception by Manning at the Wildcat 47 set up the Mustangs fourth TD and seven plays were needed. Rives started it off with by getting 5 and then Britt added 21 at right guard Tommy Cole carried on four of the next five plays and hit off left tackle for the final six yards. A pass was too tall when the Mustangs tried for two.
A lot of football was sand-wiched in the final 1:44 and a hard rain began to fall as the game drew to a close.
Wheeler had the ball at the Canadian with 1:44 to go but were forced to punt. A 41 yard boot by Britt was fumbled at the Wildcat 9 and the Mustangs pounced on it with 50 seconds remaining. Rives pounced out a 6 yard gain at right tackle and the Mustangs called time. Britt then got the touchdown when he plunged the final three yards off his right side.
With but 28 seconds remaining, the Mustangs fumbled on the attempt for a two pointer and the game ended as the rains came with the Mustangs kickoff.
Rives had 208 yards for the night, followed by Britt with 93, Cole 68 and Simmons 11 yards.

ACROSS THE FENCE

Close to four inches of rain fell in parts of the county. Hail damage to cotton was extensive in some areas. Flooding water and erosion were by-products. Wheat will be helped considerably, especially in the Mobeetie vicinity.
1969 Wheat Program:
There's only a couple of changes in the 1969 wheat program, but they're significant ones. The national allotment was cut 13% from 1968 and diversion payments are incorporated into the 1969 program. Loan rate is still \$1.25 per bushel. To become eligible for program benefits, you must divert an acreage equal to 15% of your 1969 allotment to soil conserving purposes. This is equivalent to the decrease in allotment.
In other words, if your 1969 wheat allotment is 100 acres, you could divert 15 acres, and plant the entire 100 acres to wheat. If your farm allotments were 60 acres, you could divert for pay 50% of 60 acres or a maximum of 30 acres. But if your allotment were 20 acres, you could divert the entire 20 acres.
Marketing certificates on 43% of the projected production of the farm allotment will be paid. Wheat certificate value based on the August parity value would be \$1.38 per bushel. One interesting aspect of the program is that by planting only 43% of your allotment, you are eligible for maximum certificates, as well as price support. This opens up the opportunity of planting the minimum amount of wheat, and seeding the remainder of the wheat allotment in a nonallotment crop.
Soybeans are the most obvious choice as well as sunflowers. For your own farm situation, you should budget your alternatives. Based on what we can see, a program consisting of 43% wheat and 57% soybeans looks like about the same income as other wheat alternatives. Where yields of soybeans are at least average. Planting all of the allotment to wheat appears preferable to diverting either 50% of a smaller portion of the allotment to a soil conserving use. Any way you go, it looks like you'll get a little better than \$1.30 a bushel wheat.

SILVERTON FIRST CONFERENCE FOE

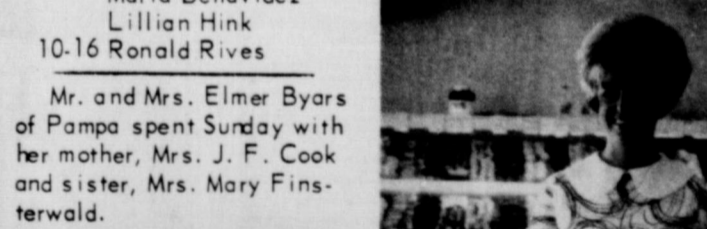
Fresh from their 32-0 victory over Canadian, the Wheeler Mustangs get the 1968 district race underway this Friday night when they journey to the South Plains and take on the strong Silverton Owls in a 7:30 encounter.
Both clubs bring identical records into the contest with Owls lone defeat coming last week at the hands of Kress.
The Owls have been the surprise of the district to date and will pit their potent offense, led by quarterback Lannie Arnold, a 170 lb senior whom the Owls are boosting for all-state, and their senior running back, Cletus Grady, against the Mustangs who have been stingy with yardage.
