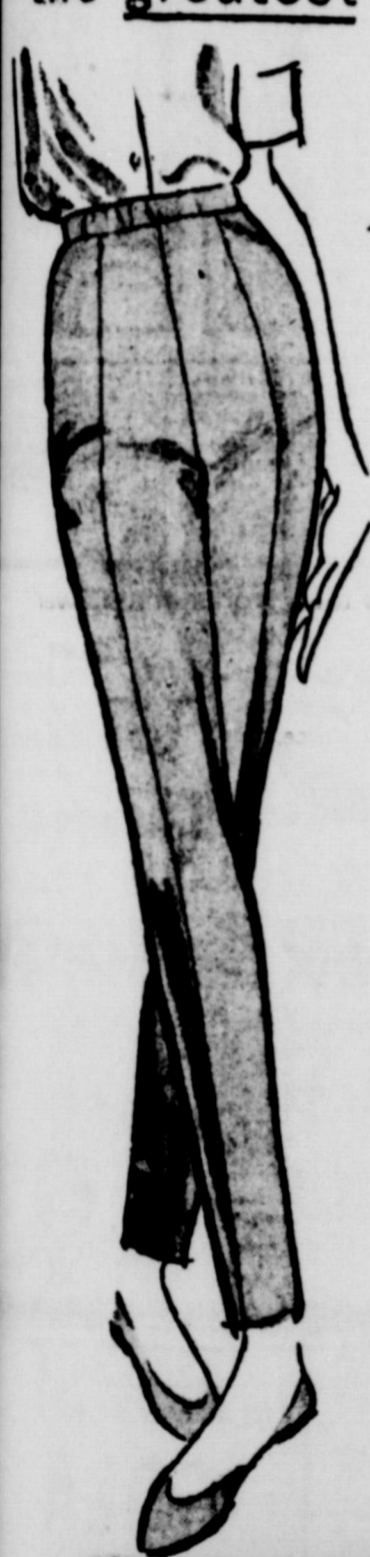

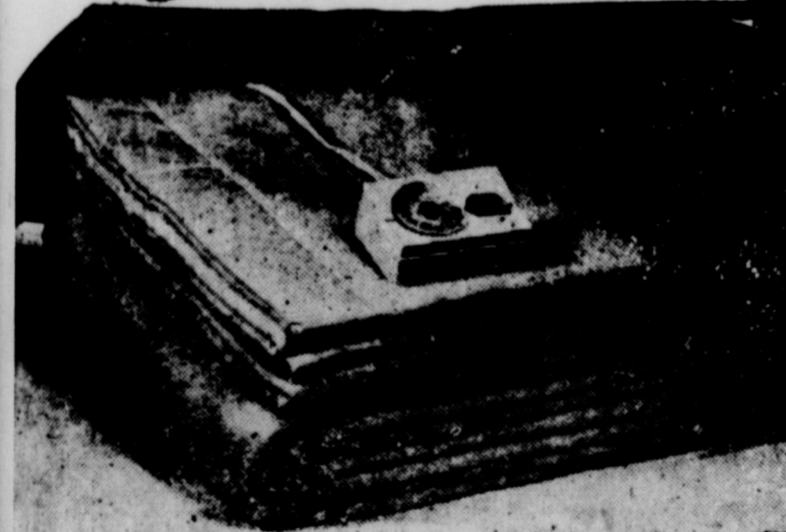

Greenbug populations build up rapidly on wheat pastures with the rather mild weather last week. Earl Williams and I took a greenbug tour up at Mobeetie. We found a lot of damage. Unless cold weather comes soon, the wheat pasture'll not recover too quickly. Some folks who need the grass and considering control measures. Don't be too staid about winter feeding those cows. Of course getting them through the winter at a minimum cost yet in good enough condition to perform well in the spring should be your objective. CLEANING WITH ENZYME

days for these "logs" they may be burned in wood.
After soaking, place the treated material on newspapers to dry and then they are ready for brightening the holiday fireplace fire.
If wood is not easily available, newspapers can be rolled into "logs" which will burn with a rainbow of color. Simply tie the loosely rolled newspapers with heavy twine and soak them in a solution of four pounds of copper sulfate and three pounds of rock salt dissolved in a gallon of water. After allowing several

Hold cotton on a trailer for one day? Three year Texas studies showed trailer storing of cotton for one day increased moisture uniformity so cotton could be ginned with less drying. This results in fewer fibers shorter than 1/2 inch, less variation in fiber length, and less waste in spinning operations. The beauty of a fire in the fireplace during the upcoming Holiday season can be made very more noteworthy with the addition of multi-colored flames. Chemical treatment of the material to be burned can result in green, red, blue or orange or purple flames, instead of the usual yellow flame from wood.

The following chemicals produce these color flames: Copper Chloride - blue; Potassium Chloride - purple, strontium nitrate - red; lithium chloride - carmine and copper sulfate - emerald green. Dry pine cones, small chips or blocks of wood can be soaked in these chemicals

gent. It is just a detergent that contains an enzyme action.

In tests made by consumer Research it was found that a soaking period works best with the enzymes because it takes time for the enzyme to "break down" the stain. Also the use of bleach, ammonia or any strong acid or alkaline solution with the enzyme would stop all enzyme activity. The enzyme becomes inactive in extremely hot water and does best in the temperature between 95 and 130 degrees F.

The enzyme laundry products do not work "miracles" but they do remove some stains that regular detergent does not. It does whiten, and a difference was particularly noticed in sheets, pot holders and dish towels where food stains had collected. It works best on all cotton and nylon fabrics.

The enzyme active laundry products can be bought under the brand names of Tide XK, Axion, Drive, Gain and Biz.

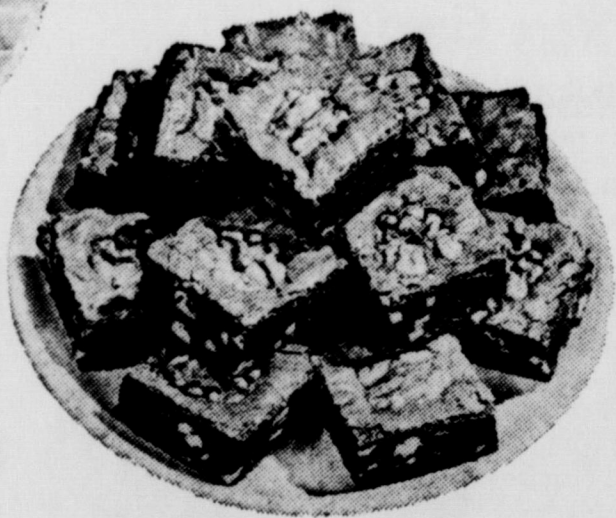
