His life history as recorded for posterity in the book "Hide Town" by Mrs. Sallie B. Harris reads as follows; "R. H. Forrester (Rheaboam Hezekiah) was born in Hill County, Texas near Whitney August 31, 1890. Moved to Hills borough at an early age. He prepared to teach school while very young in Southwest Texas State Teachers College. He also attended North Texas State Teachers College. Mr. Forcareer at the age of sixteen.
