Funeral Services Were Held Sunday For R.H. Forrester

Funeral services were held for Judge Roy Henry (Pete) Forrester, an outstanding citizen of Wheeler for many years, Sunday, Dec. 15, 1968 in the First Baptist Church of Wheeler. Officiating were Rev. Kieth McCormick assisted by Rev. P.D. Fullingim of Lubbock, Rev. M.B. Smith of Pampa and Mr. C.B. Witt of Amarillo.

His life history as recorded for posterity in the book "Hide Town" by Mrs. Sallie B. Harris reads as follows; "R. H. Forrester (Rhebaam Hezekiah) was born in Hill County, Texas near Whitney August 31, 1890. Moved to Hillsborough at an early age. He prepared to teach school while very young in Southwest Texas State Teachers College. He also attended North Texas State Teachers College. Mr. Forrester began his teaching career at the age of sixteen.

His family moved to San Angelo, Texas where R. H. attended a business college earning a diploma in business.

While Mr. Forrester was superintendent of Wheeler Schools in 1917 he volunteered for World War I Service going to train before officers camps were organized. He managed to go through rigid training, and was gradually promoted until Armistice was signed.

After the war was over Forrester came back to Wheeler and again began teaching.

Through the years he was district clerk, county clerk and county judge and for many years he was elected mayor of Wheeler, not ever having run for the office, but was re-elected each year.

He began studying law and was admitted to the bar during his judgeship. Mr. Forrester later became deeply

interested in the Book of Law written by Moses so decided to enroll in Webster University, Atlanta, Georgia, Post Graduate school and November 10, 1941 received his D.D. Degree. Following this he began work immediately on his Ph. D that was completed in 1944.

After the retirement from the Federal Land Bank, Mr. Forrester was associated with his wife, Doris Mitchener Forrester, in the insurance business that they had been operating for many years in Wheeler. Mr. Forrester was married to Doris Mitchener in 1920 at Wheeler where they have spent their entire married life.

Mr. Forrester's parents were Tom H. Forrester and Marcella Matthews Forrester. He had been a Mason for 49 years and was a past master of the Wheeler Lodge.

Serving as pall bearers were Ray Miller, R.G. Russ, Joe Darden, R.J. Holt, Jr., Ed Witt, Joe Rogers and honorary pallbearers were Thurman Adkins, Guy Hardin, D.O. Beene, Grainger McIlhenny, J.C. Moore, Jr., and C.A. Holdeman.

Survivors include his wife, Doris of Wheeler and one niece, Mrs. J.D. Todd, Corpus Christi.

Interment was in Wheeler Cemetery, Wheeler, Texas under the direction of Wright-Denson Funeral Home.

CITY COUNCIL MEETS MONDAY

The Wheeler City Council met Monday, December 16. The councilmen toured the garage-maintenance shop and heard recommendations on changes in the paving program.

Meeting with the council were Gaddy Vise, Max Wiley and Jim Montgomery. Gaddy Vise asked for an additional block of paving from Texas St. to Sixth St. on S. Osage,

which would put the paving in front of his property. Wiley and Montgomery asked the council to consider the removal of planned paving on two blocks of Kiowa St. from Texas St. to Seventh St. The city secretary began Tuesday checking with the property owners who would be affected by these proposed changes.

Thurmon Rives, tax assessor-collector met with the council. Rives reported the collection of \$1,500 in delinquent taxes. The Council will continue their efforts to collect the back taxes.

A motion was made and seconded by the council to present a map of the paving program to Southwestern Public Service. Southwestern Public Service will be asked to draw a lighting plan for the installation of additional street lights.

The council agreed to write a check to pay for the garage-maintenance shop. The structure was completed at a cost of \$10,000. The city trucks and street equipment will be stored in the garage with a maintenance shop across the end for the city employees to make minor repairs.

The city office will be closed Dec. 25-26 for Christmas and Jan. 1 for New Years.

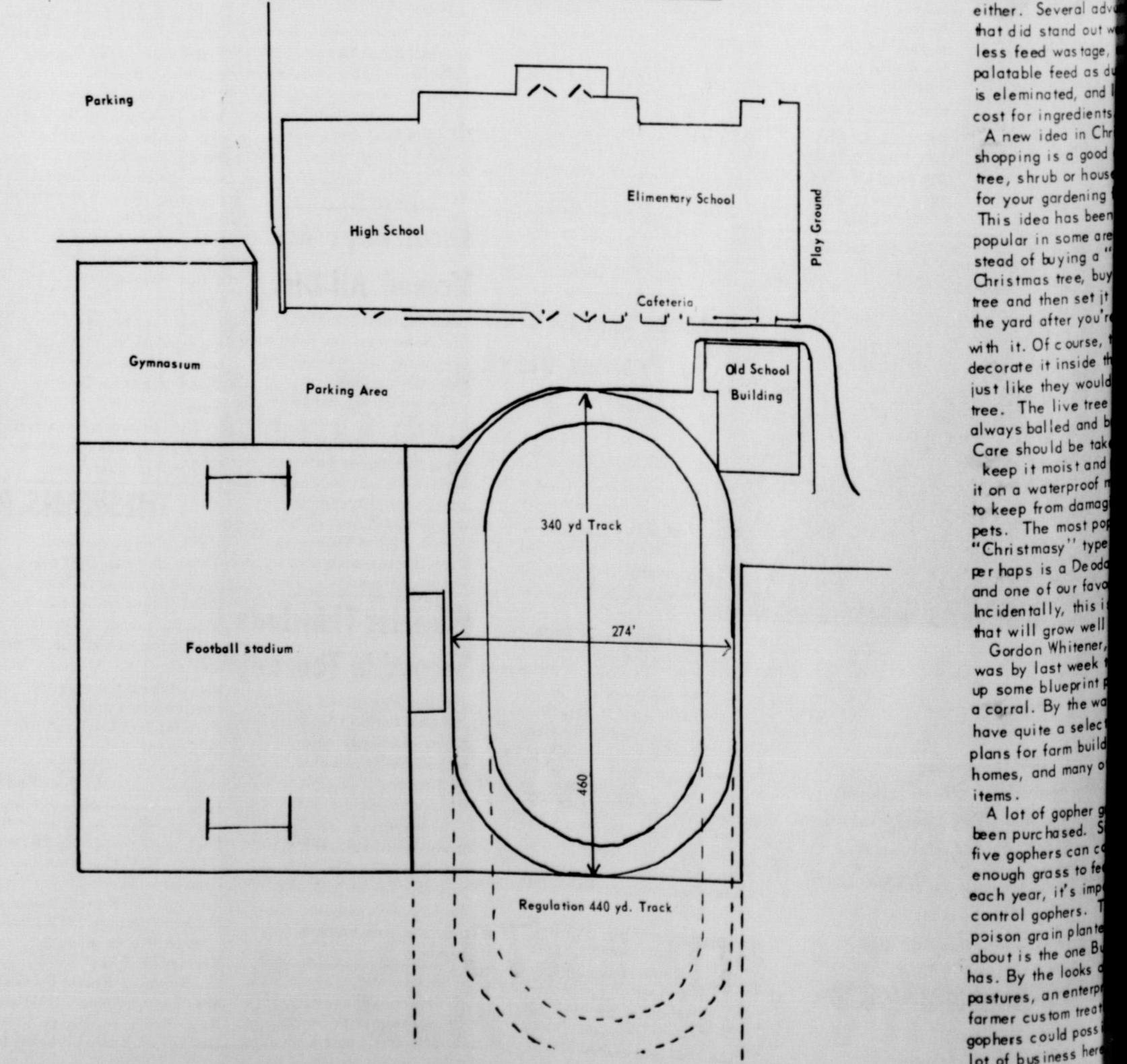

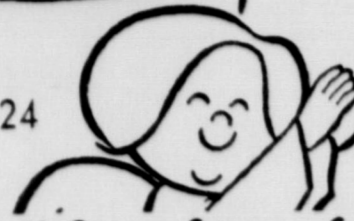
