Across The Fence

Sack it to the screwworm. Out of 22 Panhandle Counties, Wheeler County has contributed more dollars than any of the rest toward the screwworm eradication effort. Wheeler County folks have forked over \$6,380.70 to the program since 1962 according to Ed Garnett, Area Farm Management specialist for the Extension Service located in Amarillo. The screwworm has been on the run for several years. This past season showed he was down but not out as more cases were reported this season than any other season since the program began.

Noticed that Texas A&M is starting a new program this spring to prepare students for careers in the rapidly expanding cattle feeding industry. Looks like this would be a real opportunity for some of our local high school seniors who are interested in animal science to get in a field that would guarantee him location close to this area. Who knows, there may be an opportunity right at Wheeler when their new feed lot is opened. This new program will train graduates to manage large commercial feedlots or service this growing industry as feed company representatives consultants or in other roles. Students presently at Texas A&M can begin at the sophomore or junior level with the 1969 semester. To prepare them for mechanized feedlots, students will study nutrition, beef production, marketing accounting and financial management together with engineering courses. A student will spend at least one semester working in commercial feedlots. Dr. O.D. Butler, head of the Animal Science Department will be sending me details on the courses of study later if some of our local high school students wish to come by and talk it over.

"Growing the Bradford Ornamental Pear" is the title of a new USDA Bulletin available at our office for 10c. We saw this tree growing over at Alanreed at Bruce's Nursery. Mr. Paul Bruce

says this tree is well adapted here. Folks who have the tree or who intend to plant it may want to come by the office and pick up the bulletin.

Folks who read the Farm Journal probably noticed the article on Sunflowers this month. We're planning a twenty acre trial through our Northwest Texas Research Demonstration Program this spring. We've got ten acres already committed. We can furnish the seed and help with the spraying. At this point we need ten more acres. If any farmer would like to commit ten acres, let us know. We'd be glad to talk to you.

Farmers in Central Texas gassed about \$50 per acre which compared to 4,000# per acre. Our plots are planned because the plots can be combined with the machines we have. The oil mill at Hollis, Okla. said they'd take all we could grow at 3 1/2¢ per pound.

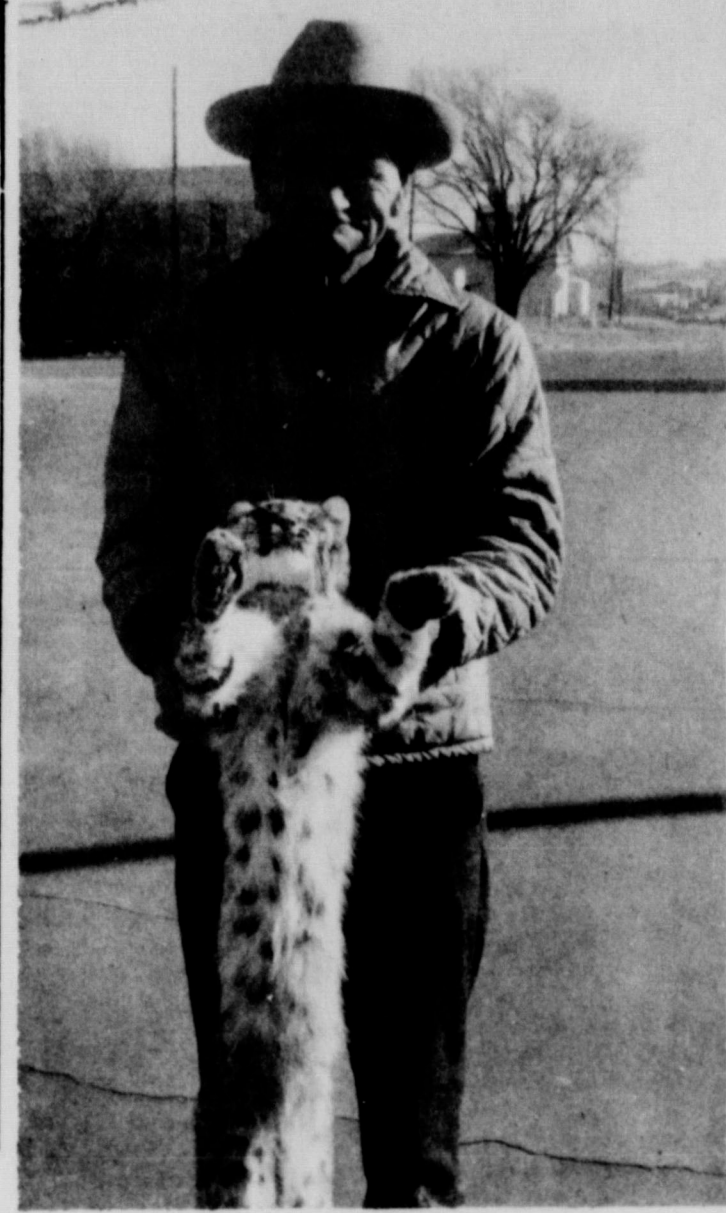

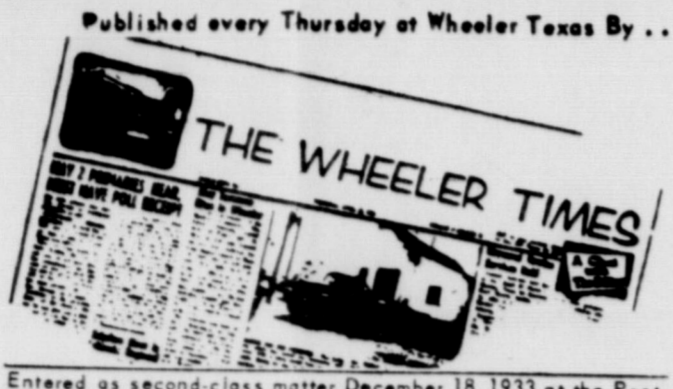

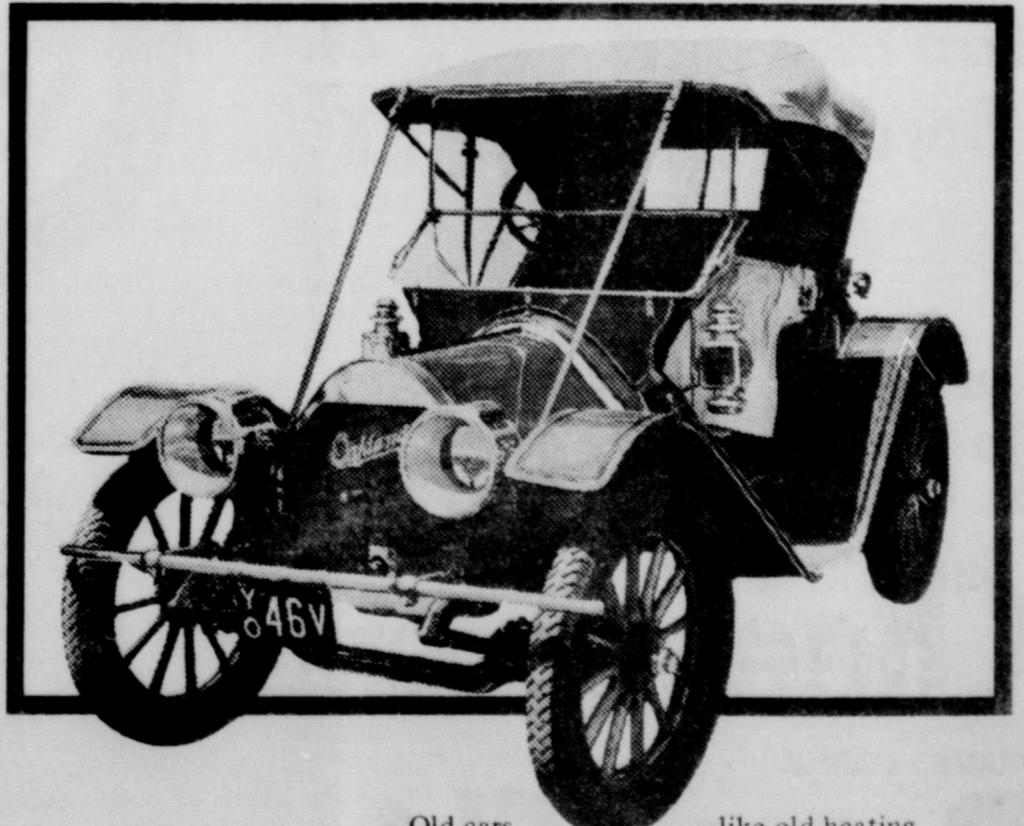

Fire, Unlimited

Burning trash in his back yard, Harold took note of the fact that the grass was dry and the breeze was blowing. So when the fire had died down, he stomped around the edges and scuffed up the embers with his toe.

But, though Harold didn't know it, the fire smoldered on. During the evening it spread to a neighbor's garage and burned it down. And in due course the neighbor filed suit for damages.

"But I really did try to put the fire out," Harold protested at the trial.

Nevertheless the court held him liable, blaming him for not taking greater precautions—such as throw-



ing dirt or water on the embers to make sure they were out.

"Always and everywhere since the beginning of civilization," said one judge, "fire has been regarded as a dangerous as well as a beneficent agency, to be handled with care."

That doesn't mean the person who starts a fire is automatically liable for everything that goes amiss.

Thus a farmer who was tending a brush fire—with every reasonable safeguard—was held not liable when a sudden, ferocious wind spread the flames to his neighbor's land. Pointing out that the farmer had done nothing wrong, the court said he could not fairly be blamed for an "act of God."

But once a person has been negligent with fire, then his legal responsibility may be far-reaching indeed. He may have to pay not only for property damage but also for personal injury or death to persons trapped by the fire's spread.

He may even be liable to someone who, while not in danger at first, got hurt rescuing those who were. Take this case:

Sparks negligently emitted from a passing locomotive set fire to a house in which children were asleep. Their mother, outside the house, rushed in and managed to beat out the flames.

For the burns she suffered, the railroad was later held liable. The court said that, if railroad employees had given proper thought to the spark danger, they could have foreseen not only that a house might be set afire and its occupants jeopardized but also that a rescuer might get hurt too. Said one judge:

"Danger invites rescue. The wrong that imperils life is a wrong to the imperiled victim; it is a wrong also to his rescuer."

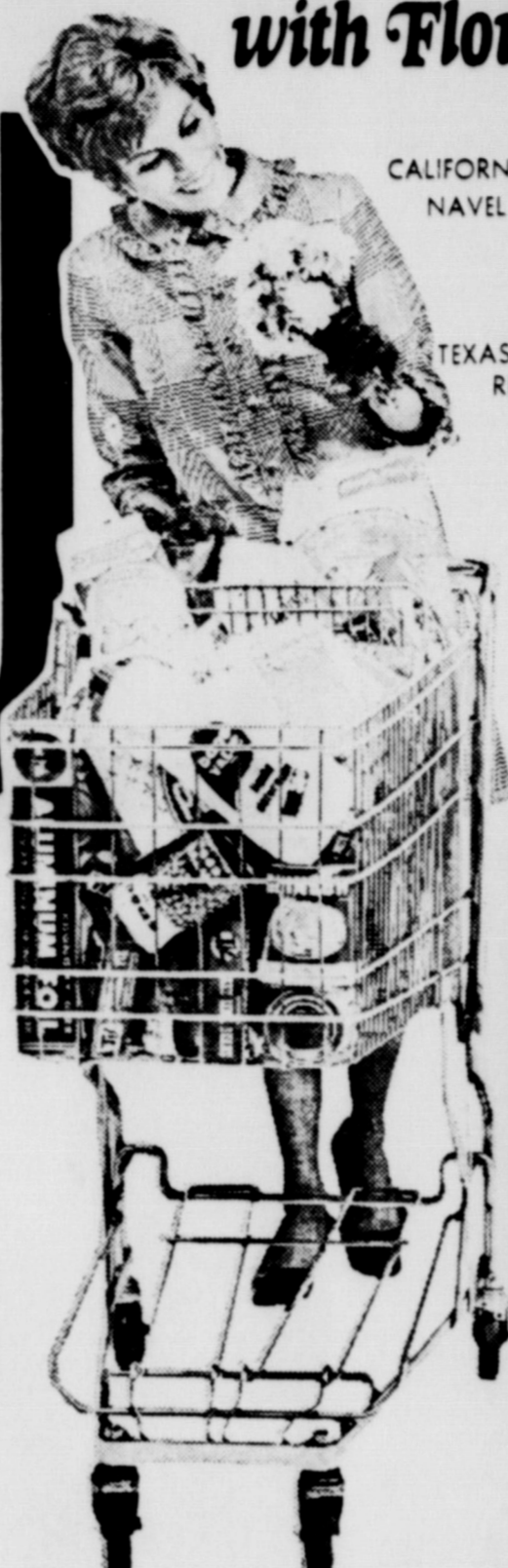
