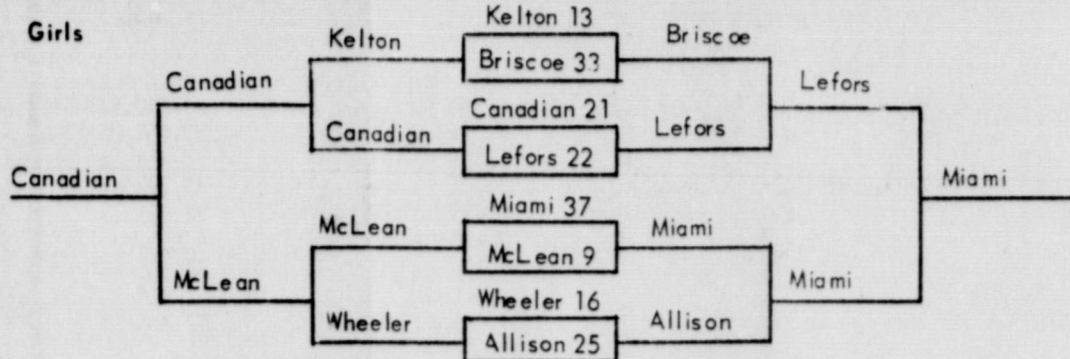

MOTHERS TO MARCH TODAY JAN. 30

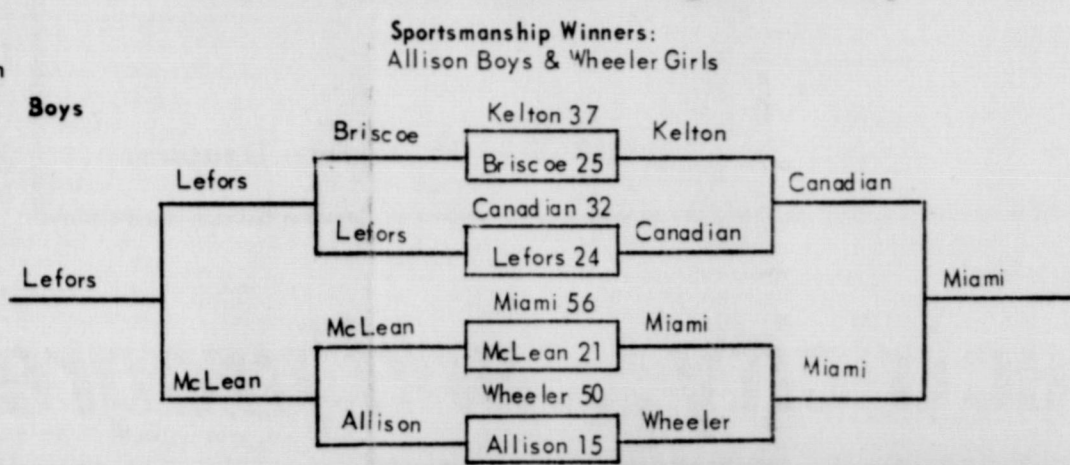

Historical Markers To Be Dedicated Saturday

The historic Farmers and Merchants State Bank of Brock, the Millie Parter House, Old Greer County, the Pagan School and the Black Barn on Stiles Ranch in Wheeler County have been named as recorded Texas Historical Landmarks, significant to the history of this community and state, and worthy of preservation, today announced Charles Woodburn Amarillo, president of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee.

This marker and its location will appear in the next edition of the "Guide to Official Texas Historical Markers," in tourist guides and on maps to stimulate tourist interest in this area, to provide interest on historical tours and to acquaint the people of Wheeler County with their own unique historical past.

The first two degrees of achievement, the junior homemaker degree and the chapter homemaker degree are planned so that members as they work toward the degrees will have a chance to grow step by step in ways that are important to them and to the organization.

We have the second week of the session under our belts. This week we had the big inaugural celebrations, parades, dances and speeches. The town was really full of people, especially from the Lubbock area. We also had a big delegation of Farm Bureau people from over the State. They had us all to a banquet where Governor Smith made his first speech. Ochiltree and Hansford Counties were both well represented. It looks like it is going to be next week before we get our committee assignments. This is a little later than last time but with new people in all three top offices it takes a little longer. Seems like everyone is giving everyone else the benefit of a doubt. Of course, this can't go on forever as we have too many real tough problems that aren't going to get solved without making some people unhappy.

Governor Smith's speech to our joint session this week was well received. It actually covered a lot more territory than a lot of us expected. I think that he will probably surprise a lot of people in the job he will do as our Gov-

ernor. He doesn't have the glamor etc. but he sure has the know-how and has assembled a top-notch staff of people. This will probably be the last West Texas Governor for many moons. By the time Preston leaves, we will have redistricted after the 1970 census.

Opposition to the consolidation provision of the Governor's Education Committee continues to bring an avalanche of mail. Actually there isn't any use of writing me because I am against it. Maybe if you know or trade with some people in Dallas, Houston, San Antonio and some of those big cities you might ought to be writing them. I don't think they have as many as 50 votes out of the 150 at this time. We want to be sure and not go to sleep at the switch when the time comes. We are going to have to face up to the fact that things will get tougher before they get better. We will need to face up to the fact that our problems are not going to disappear. We either need to solve them ourselves or someone else will do it for us. I hope you have gotten some moisture by now.

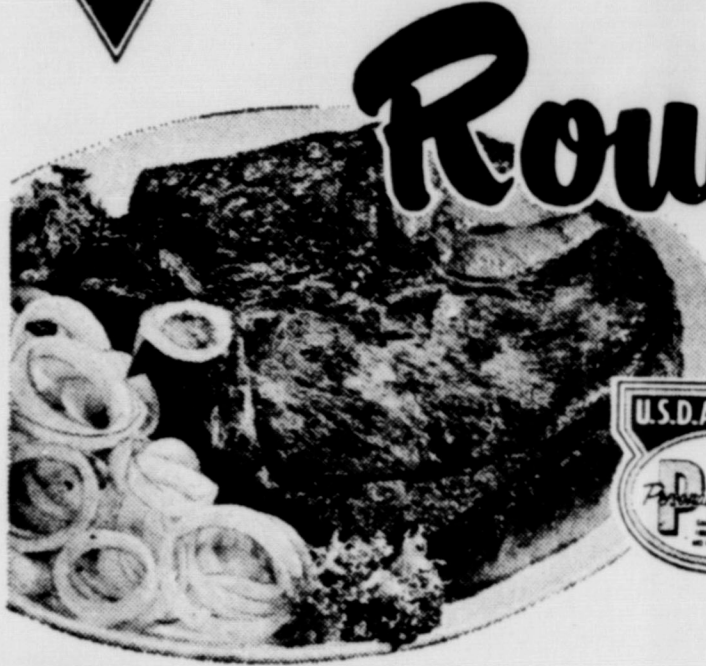

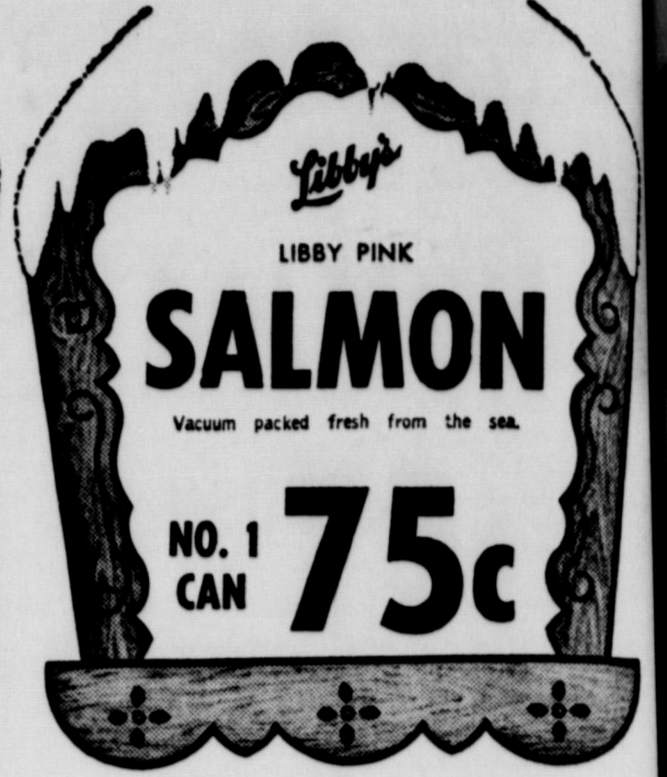
