The wheat is slowly ripening and newly planted cotton is coming up. Noticed that Billy Hefley had cotton up out at Twitty when we were in that community last week.

The high humidity has been favorable to a number of ornamental plant diseases. Fire blight is still affecting apples and pears. We have in addition to fire blight received a number of calls about damage to vegetables by aphids and spider mites. Parathion or Systox will control spider mites. We have avail-

able at our office a publication on control of vegetable insects.

Lowell Cure, the County Agent at Childress, tells me that the Childress County 4-H Playday Rodeo will be held this Saturday, June 7 at 10:00 a.m. at the Old Settlers Rodeo Arena in Childress. He has sent us some entry blanks and boys and girls under 19 who wish to enter may pick them up.

Weed Control in Cotton: Lasso, a new pre-emergence herbicide, controlled pigweed as well as or better than presently recommended cotton pre-emergence herbicides. The herbicide does not have to be incorporated, and may prove to be popular with farmers having conventional equipment.

Brand Project: The Kelton Lions Club is in the process of printing a catalogue of Wheeler County Brands. The document should be off the press very soon. Believe this is a worthwhile project. Those wishing copies might want to check with a Lions Club member.

According to researchers one pigweed per foot of row in irrigated maize reduces grain yield approximately 43%. A new publication from the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Bushland called Economics of Weed Control provides some very interesting data to milo producers.

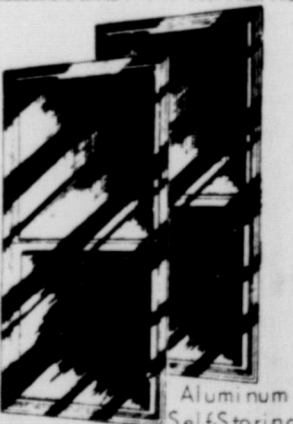

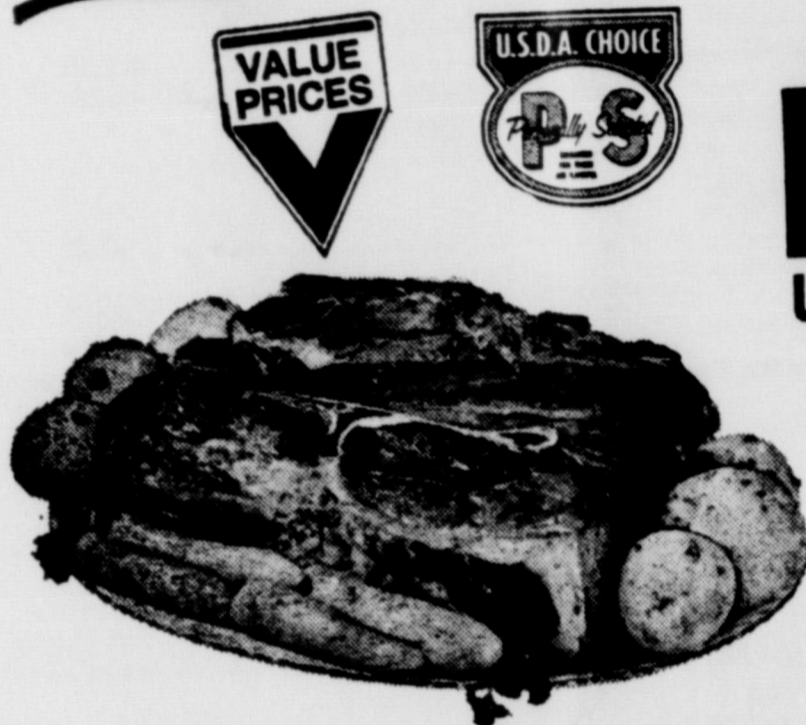
