MUSTANGS HEDGE CLAUDE 21-16 FRIDAY

The Wheeler Mustangs closed out the 1969 win over the Claude Mustangs before a cold gathering of fans at Nicholson Field.

The fans that didn't show up for this final game, and there were a lot that chose to be elsewhere, missed one of the best games of the year as the two old rivals mixed it up like the championship was on the line.

This win gave the Mustangs a 7-3 record and second place in district play after losing out in their efforts for a second straight district crown.

Claude led at the half 8-7 and then went ahead again midway of the final period before the Mustangs fought back and got the go ahead touchdown with six

minutes to play. The final play of a scoreless first quarter saw Claude having to boot the ball to the Mustangs and the visitors had Wheeler in a hole at their 4 yard line. Striking out from that point, the Mustangs fought their way 96 yards to paydirt.

Wheeler got all of the yardage on this TD drive on the ground and used half of the quarter before Dave Britt ripped off his left guard and got into the end zone from 11 yards out. Keith Wood kicked the extra point and Wheeler had their shaky 7-0 lead.

Jerry Ashworth, 185 lb. junior halfback, was the big thorn in the Mustang's side as Claude took the kickoff following Wheeler's touchdown and drove for their half-

time lead. The 80 yard drive came to a fruitful end for Claude as Richard Berg banged over from one yard out with but two seconds remaining on the clock. Ashworth bounced off a couple of tacklers to get in for the two points and Claude had a slim 1 point margin at halftime.

Wheeler had a promising drive snuffed out at the Claude 19 in the third quarter when a 15 yard dash to paydirt by Steve Simmons was wiped out by a clipping penalty.

The local Mustangs got back in the lead late in the third period as they drove 51 yards in 10 plays with Dave Britt getting 43 of the yards as the Mustangs probed a soft spot in the Claude defensive middle.

Roy Don Chick got the final yard at left tackle and then stuck his nose in on

the right side for the two pointers.

Claude came right back with the kickoff and with the aid of a personal foul penalty against Wheeler, set up shop at the Wheeler 47.

Terry Knox got 18 big yards to the Wheeler 29 and then Claude proceeded to get the yardage in small chunks for a first and goal at the Wheeler 8 yard line.

Three plays later, Ashworth cracked in from a yard out and Claude trailed by one. Ashworth fumbled as he hit the line for the two point try and the ball bounded for the back of the end zone with Mustangs from both sides in hot pursuit. Mike Forbes beat Britt to the ball and draped around it for two points and Wheeler was now down by one point and 7:45 remained in the game.

Roy Don Chick made short work of the Claude lead, four plays after the kickoff as he found running room at right tackle and then cutback over the middle to break loose from the Claude safety and dashed 46 yards to the end zone for what proved to be the winning margin.

Wheeler's five point lead began to get smaller and smaller after the kickoff as Claude pounded to the Wheeler 31 for a first down and the clock was also favoring the visitors.

From the 31, Knox attempted a reverse and the ball fell free and Steve Simmons recovered for the Mustangs at the 37 with just over three minutes remaining.

Wheeler wasn't about to give the ball up at this point and calmly drove the pigskin to the Claude 16 as the final gun sounded and rang down the curtain on the Mustangs successful season.

Kelton Teams Defeat Wheeler

The Kelton girls beat Wheeler Thursday at Kelton. The final score was 57-7.

The first quarter Kelton was 20 and Wheeler 1; the second quarter, Kelton was 34 and Wheeler 5; the third quarter, Kelton was 50 with Wheeler 5 and the fourth quarter showed Kelton with 57 and Wheeler 7.

Malinda Krug lead Kelton with 30 points, Jane Matthews was second with 10 and Jan Matthews made 8 points. Patty Jagers lead Wheeler with 4 points. The guards played a fine defensive ball game putting pressure on the Wheeler forwards throughout the game.

The Kelton forwards also showed good hustle and team work in executing their plays, stated Coach McFarren.

The Kelton boys beat Wheeler Thursday at Kelton. The final score was Kelton 32 and Wheeler 13.

The first quarter Kelton was 6, and Wheeler was 7; the second quarter Kelton was 12 and Wheeler 10; the third quarter, Kelton was 27 and Wheeler 12 and the fourth quarter showed Kelton with 32 and Wheeler 13.

J. C. Brooks lead Kelton with 14 points and Wayne Wheeler was second with six. T. Martinez and J. Brown lead Wheeler with four points each. The boys through hustle and determination were able to outlast the bigger, stronger team of Wheeler, stated Coach McFarren.

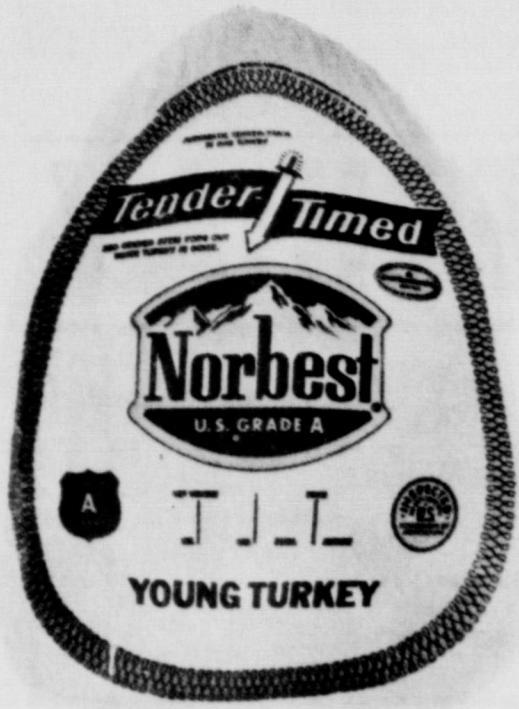

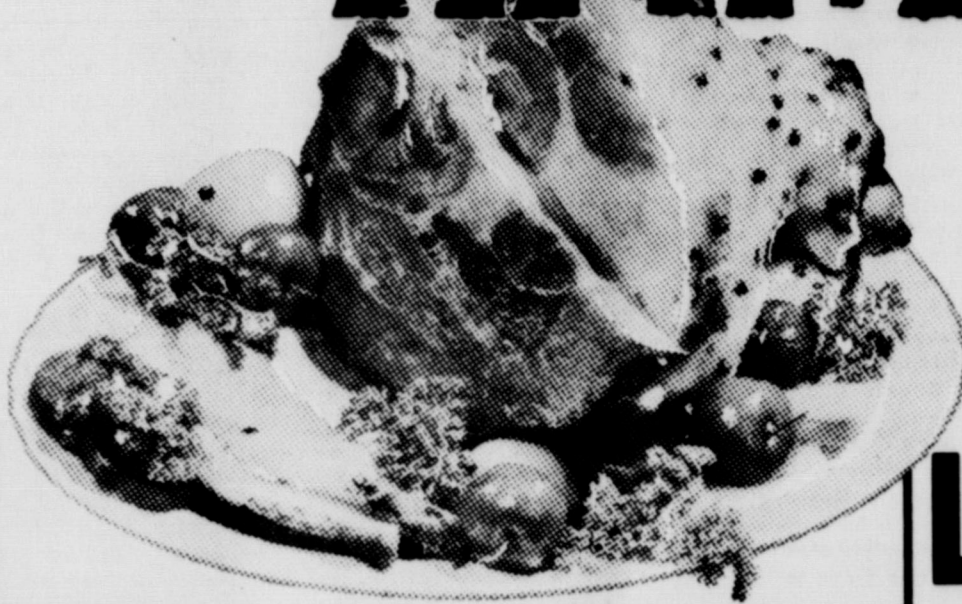

Sometime before April 1, the Wheeler County Bee will be held and the Champion will go to Amarillo April 25, 1970 for the annual regional Bee elimination to choose a regional winner. The regional winner will win an all-expense paid trip to Washington, D. C., the first week in June.
Last year Kay Ridgway daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. J. Ridgway was the Wheeler County Champion and placed 8th in the regional Bee. The Champion was an 8th grader in the Mobeetie School.
The 1970 Golden Spread Bee will be co-sponsored by WTSU and the Amarillo Globe-News. Mr. L. J. Edmondson, WTSU Director of Public Services, will be Bee Director for the Golden Spread.
Again there will be a secondary contest - unique only in the Golden Spread Bee - open to contestants from the 6th and lower grades. These Juniors will be guests of the Amarillo Globe-News at the Regional Bee on April 25, but will not spell unless they represent the senior division, also.
Ronda Weiss was the County Junior Champion for 1969 and her parents were Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Weiss. She was a 6th grader in the Shamrock School.
The first place winner in the Regional Bee will go to Washington as the district Champion. In the school contest, each winner receives a Paper-Mate pen, inscribed "School Champion." "I Entered" and "School Champion" ribbons will be awarded each participant in both junior and senior divisions.
This will be the 43rd year for the National Spelling Bee, sponsored by newspapers throughout the 50 states and the 22nd Bee, sponsored by the Amarillo Globe-News.
