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MUSTANGS SHUT OUT CLAUDE

ACCIDENT KILLS TWO MEN NORTH OF WHEELER FRI.

A traffic accident 9 miles north of Wheeler Friday cost lives of two men. Killed in the head on crash were Thurman Lee Hall, 23, of Hamlin and Rev. Walter A. Hodge, Sr. of Hamlin. Both victims were pronounced dead at the scene by the Justice of the Peace Dick Bates.

According to Texas Department of Public Safety patrolman, Don Copeland of Shamrock, Hall was traveling north on the highway when his car collided with a bus truck driven by Hodge. The patrolman stated the highway was wet, but not particularly slick. Visibility was good, the officer said. Rescue workers took more than an hour to remove the vehicles from the tangled steel wreckage.

Hall was born in Cordell, Okla., and had resided in Allison since early childhood. He served two tours of combat duty with the U.S. Army in South Vietnam after graduation from high school. He was discharged in February.

Since then he had worked ranches in the Allison area. Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Alene Hall of Allison and four brothers, Charles and Sherman, both of Pampa, Roy of Shamrock and Jerry who is with the U.S. Army in Germany.

The Rev. Mr. Hodge was pastor of the United Pentecostal Church in Hamlin for 10 months. Survivors are his wife, Edna Hodge of Hamlin; son, Walter A. Hodge Jr. of Colorado Springs, Colo.; three brothers, Elmer of Hamlin, Calif., M.V. of Hobbs, N.M., and Edgar of Long Beach, Calif.; two sisters, Ola Tyner of Long Beach, Calif., and Mrs. Belle Miller of Yuba City, Calif., and two grandchildren.

Mrs. Edna Hodge is a resident of Allison.

A determined team of Wheeler Mustangs fought the elements and Claude last Friday night on the high

plains and played near errorless ball in getting their first district win with a convincing 24-0 blanking of the Claude Mustangs.

Playing on a sloppy field and in fog so thick that you could hardly see across the gridiron, the visiting Mustangs put 16 points on the scoreboard in the first quarter and used a great goal line stand in the second quarter to break any hopes Claude had for victory.

Wheeler kept Claude deep in their territory on their first two possessions and forced kicks and the second set the Mustangs up on their 40 yard line.

Using Jimmy Cole, Dale Stevens and Kent Ware, who was filling in on offense for the injured Rodney Weatherly, the Mustangs drove to the Claude 23 for a first down.

Dale Stevens got all of the 23 in one big chunk as he found a good hole at left tackle and sped goalward. Heading for the flag, Stevens outraced his pursuers to yard dirt and tacked up the six pointer with three minutes remaining in the first quarter. Cole was not to be denied on the two point try and the Mustangs added two more.

Lin Cope returned the kickoff to the Claude 36 where he was jarred loose from the pigskin and Dale Helton recovered for Wheeler at that point.

Ware got 5 at right guard to get the drive going and then Cole picked up a first down at the 24 as he rambled 7 yards off right tackle. Ware and Cole each got 6 more to set up another first down at the 12 as the Mustangs pounded out the yardage inside the Claude ends.

It just took two plays to get the touchdown from the 12 as Stevens hit off left tackle down to the six and then Cole got the call at the same place and rammed it over.

With only five seconds remaining in the quarter, Stevens skirted left end for the 16 point bulge that the Mustangs were never in real danger of losing.

Even though Claude made a couple of threats in the second period, you never get the impression that the Mustangs were to be denied the win after suffering three setbacks.

Claude took the kickoff after the Mustangs second touchdown and used a 32 yard pass from Greg Forbes to Joe Minkley to put them at the Wheeler 22. Four plays got a first down at the 4 but a Mustang was guilty of a personal foul on the tackle and Claude had a first and goal situation at the Wheeler 2.

Billy Merrell tried it off right guard but Ronnie Hill stopped him at the line of scrimmage to set the pattern for the great stand.

Claude used Gary Shields next on a sweep at left end but Gary Fischer downed him for a loss of 3 back to the 5. The Mustangs were a little anxious on the next play and were guilty of offside which gave Claude the ball at the 2 again with third down facing them.

A pass was incomplete before Forbes headed into what appeared to be a hole at right tackle. Noel Glazner and Cole slowed him up and then Weatherly put the hammer to Forbes on the 1 and the jubilant Mustangs took over.

They could only get to the 10, however, and had to kick and Stevens booted 28 yards against the breeze and Claude had good field position at the 38.

Four plays later, Glazner recovered a Forbes fumble at the Mustang 19 to kill the last threat Claude made in the game. Wheeler kept the pressure on Claude throughout the third period but got no points for their efforts.

A fumbled punt attempt gave the Mustangs a chance at the Claude 39 but they gave up the ball on downs at the 34.

Cole intercepted a Forbes aerial at the midfield stripe and returned it to the Claude 43 but Wheeler was forced to punt from there and Stevens banged a 40 yarder to the Claude 17 as the third period ended.

Claude drew a five yard fine for offside before Pat Hill and Glazner dropped Forbes for a 11 yard loss back to the 1 and it looked like the Mustangs might get a safety but Forbes got out of the end zone just ahead of the whistle.

Wheeler then drew five for offside to give Claude a little breathing room but this was short lived.

Forbes attempted a pass out in the flat and Jerry Beaty neatly stepped in front of the intended receiver and snagged the ball and quickly dashed the 11 yards into the end zone.

Fischer went straight up the middle standing up for the final Mustang points as the clock dimly showed 9:57 to play.

Wheeler made one more deep penetration but came up short as time was running out in the game.

The Mustangs drove from their 48 following a punt down to the Claude 8 where they

had first and goal but four plays got only 4 yards and Claude took over and 30 seconds later the visiting Mustangs had their fifth win of the year.

PROPOSED RECREATION FACILITY PLANS OFFERED FOR CONSIDERATION

For the past several months members of the Wheeler School Board and City Commission have been working together to develop outdoor and community recreational facilities for use by the school, community and the area surrounding Wheeler.

The program, as envisioned, by the members of these two groups, would involve development of the twenty acre tract of land immediately north of the existing school buildings into a park-playground complex containing picnic areas, playgrounds, tennis courts, baseball fields, practice fields, track, football field, athletic field house, community building, bus storage facilities, and parking areas.

The site is to be fully landscaped and furnished with park-playground equipment, picnic equipment and lighting systems for nighttime use of the facilities. Parking areas are to be located at strategic points in the project for easy access to the various facilities.

The community building will provide for meeting rooms, club room with kitchen facilities and furnishings. The athletic field house will contain dressing and shower facilities for the track and field programs of the community and school. The bus storage building will be used to garage the school buses and as exhibition building for community and county-wide trade and fair activities.

In conjunction with the planning process, the discovery was made that a participating grant program, under the direction of the

Parks and Wildlife Department of the State of Texas, might be available for partial funding of certain costs involved in the development of outdoor park and recreational facilities such as those planned for Wheeler. It is anticipated that formal application for these funds would be made to the Park and Wildlife Department in behalf of this project by the City of Wheeler as applicant.

If the grant was approved there would be a remaining capital expenditure required of approximately \$250,000 which would have to come from local resources. To

COLTS CLOSE SEASON WITH VICTORY OVER CLARENDON

The Wheeler Colts closed out their '71 campaign last Thursday with a narrow 14-12 win over Clarendon and by virtue of the win, finished second to Memphis in the final standings of the District 2-A Jr. High competition.

By the same two point margin the Colts were knocked out of the championship by Memphis three weeks ago and they finished the season with a 5-1 record which gave Coach Richard Gaines' crew the best season they have had in several years.

After a scoreless first quarter, Clarendon got on the board first with 7:37 to play in the second quarter as Kenneth Odom climaxed a 76 yard drive with a scoring jaunt from 3 yards out. The try for the two pointer failed and this proved to be the margin of the game.

Charging back against the fired up hosts from Clarendon, the Colts moved to the Clarendon 6 where they lost the ball on downs but were quick to get it right back as Odom fumbled at the 10 and Mike Bradstreet recovered for Wheeler.

An offside penalty set the Colts back to the 15 but this only halted the Colts' momentum as Mark Bateman passed to Tommy Vines on the Clarendon 2 for a first down. Danny Helton got a yard at left guard and then Bateman kept on a quarterback sneak for the final yard and six points. Steve Lamb skinned left end for the big two points to give the Colts a two point margin with 2:02 to play in the first half.

Failing to score after gaining the pigskin at the Clarendon 34, the Colts relinquished the ball at the 31 but promptly forced a punting situation midway in the third quarter.

Odom got a bad snap on fourth down at the Clarendon 35 and when he picked the loose ball up at the 16, Vines was there and banged him to the ground to give the Colts a big break.

Three running plays got a first down at the 6 but these last 6 yards proved hard to get. Jim Verden got four of them on first down and Lamb added another before Bateman was stopped for no gain at the 1.

The Colts called time with fourth down facing them and the strategy conference at the sideline paid off as

Lamb found a little daylight at left guard to get the TD. Verden was smothered on the run for the two points as the Colts upped their lead to 14-6.

Clarendon took the following kickoff and a big fourth down pass of 25 yards from David Lewis to Jack Bell gave Clarendon a first down at the Colt 21 three plays deep in the final quarter.

Lewis passed on first down and the Colts were guilty of pass interference in the end zone which set up a first and goal at the Colt 2 yard line. Odom got the six points from that point at left tackle to cut the margin. The Colts had to 2 with 6:33 still to play in the game.

The Colts dug in and raked the ball carrier up at the line to scrimmage to preserve their slender lead.

Clarendon got one more chance late in the game when they took over with a punt at their 36 with 1:56 to play. After two running plays gained 7, Lewis passed 21 yards to Eddie Eads at the Colt 36. Lewis lost a couple and called time out with 29 seconds to play.

Two passes were incomplete and then Tony Hefley iced the victory for the Colts by intercepting a pass at the Wheeler 45 and time ran out as Bateman just fell on the ball on the snap.



TWO KILLED: Two men lost their lives Friday evening 9 miles North of Wheeler. Killed were Thurman Lee Hall and Walter A. Hodge. The head-on crash occurred on a flat, straight stretch of road. The road was wet, but not particularly slick at the time of the accident. The impact of the collision left Mr. Hodge's glasses hanging on the light switch knob and false teeth on the dash board. Doors of both vehicles had to be pulled open by the wrecker before the bodies could be removed. Wright Funeral Home was called to the scene of the accident.

The picture on the right shows a pair of overalls suspended between the wall and the roof.

EXPLOSION RIPS RURAL HOME; 1 MAN INJURED

Mose Thompson was injured in an explosion at his home 2 miles West of Wheeler Monday evening about 10:15. He is now in the Shamrock Hospital where his condition is reported.

Thompson was in the process of moving into the frame house on FM 2473. When he attempted

to light a stove before going to bed an explosion resulted.

The explosion moved the front and back walls of the house four feet out from their foundation, all the doors and windows were blown from the house and the roof was apparently lifted off the house. A pair of overalls hang by their suspenders from the ceiling; the suspenders are caught between the wall and the ceiling.

Following the explosion, Thompson, 46, drove to the residence of his employer, Daryl Snelgroves, and was taken to Parkview Hospital. He was treated for first, second and third degree burns on the arms, hands and face. He was transferred to Shamrock Hospital Tuesday evening.

The fire alarm was turned in and the Wheeler Fire Department reported to the scene of the explosion. No fire resulted from the explosion.

The house had been empty for some time before Thompson began moving in.

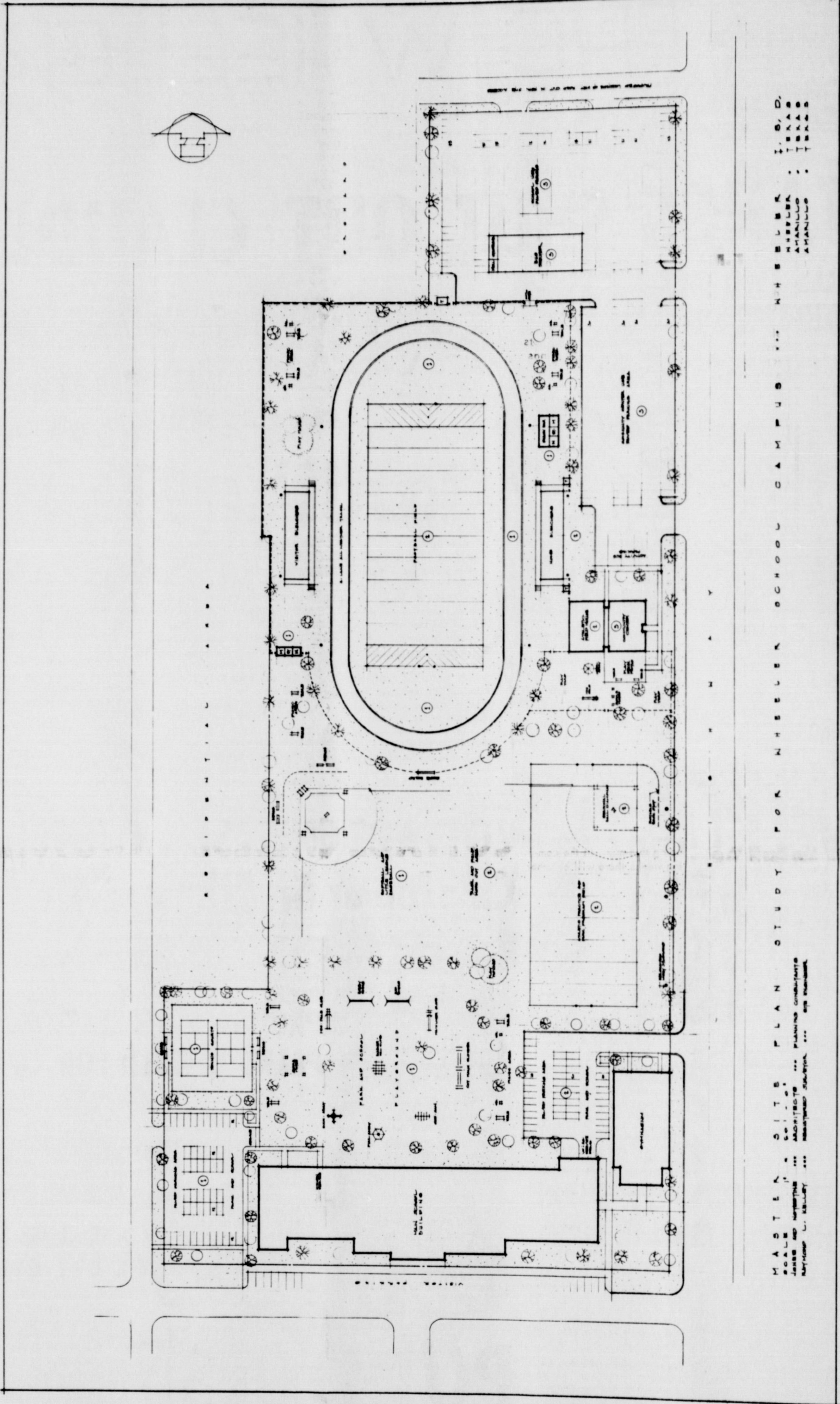

Mr. Hall was killed Friday in a two-car collision 9 Miles N. of Wheeler.

He was born Jan. 6, 1948 at Cordell, Okla. Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Allison. He had lived in Allison all of his life, attending school there and was a graduate of Allison High School. He was a veteran of the U.S. Army, serving two tours of duty in Viet Nam. He had been discharged from the Army on Feb. 19, 1968.

Fine Print
"The large print gives the small print (which has often had a deal of truth in it. Many a clause has been tucked in typographical obscurity."



But in recent years, the (sometimes even the color) print in insurance policies has been widely regulated.

For example, a common requirement in the field of insurance is that the contract must be printed at least as large as the benefits. Take this case: A man disabled by rheumatism tried to collect on an insurance policy that promised, in lettering to pay benefits for months. But down in the print, the policy cut the payment to only one month for diseases — including rheumatism.

Was the man bound by one-month limitation? A court decided that he was not. Because of the substandard size of print, said the court, that the policy simply had no effect.

Even if the print is large enough, it will ordinarily carry as much weight as large that is typewritten or hand-printed into the policy.

Another case involved an insurance policy in which words "Double Indemnity Fatal Accidents" had been set by typewriter. Later, double indemnity held to be payable, even though there was conflicting language in the printed portion of the policy. The court said that words specially inserted were more likely to be correct than words in a standard form.

Of course, anything that defines an insurance policy also carries a greater responsibility upon the policyholder. The courts, the less grounds have for arguing that you do not understand what kind of protection you were getting.

Accordingly, it makes sense to examine a policy before you buy it, rather than waiting until you have suffered a loss. Not even large print, even a special notation, can do you anything unless you read it.

Prussic acid may be the problem after the freeze. Hybrid sorghum-sudan pastures, fast growing and excellent forage for livestock, can also be deadly during the fall grazing season.

The plant's own enzymes break down plant material and this results in prussic acid poisoning for animals which eat the forage. The actual agent causing death is hydrogen cyanide.

Prussic acid poisoning generally occurs at two times. It is especially prevalent after a frost that has damaged plants. Also, poisoning occurs when plants perk up and begin fast growth after a very droughty period.

Hay that is improperly cured can also present prussic acid poisoning problems for a short time.

Hydrogen cyanide is very volatile and therefore stays in the plants for only a short time. But while it is present, animals must be kept off the pasture for a few days.

In several cases, cows exhibiting symptoms when the veterinarian is called may be dead before he can arrive. He will probably be able to save only those which are still breathing.

Farmers and ranchers should be on the lookout for nitrate poisoning that may occur during the late fall on winter pastures when there is a lot of cloudy weather.

Under these conditions, the plants, instead of growing and changing nitrates into protein, just accumulate the nitrates. Animals must also be taken off these pastures until the plants have had a chance to grow and convert the nitrates into protein.

They tell us that the blood of animals that have died from nitrate poisoning will be chocolate brown while those dying from prussic acid poisoning will be cherry red.

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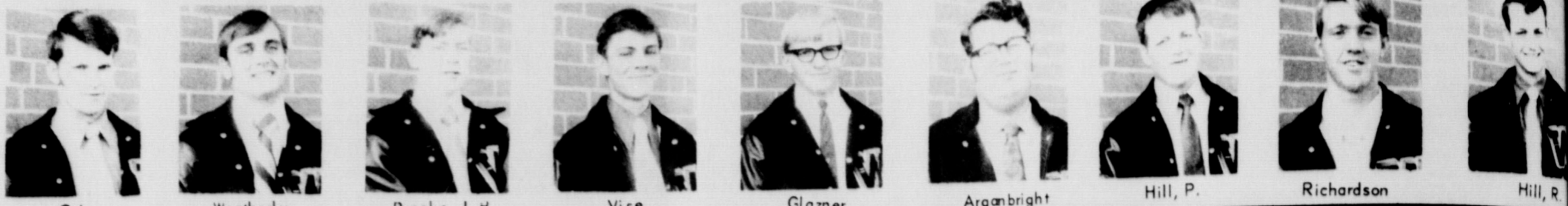

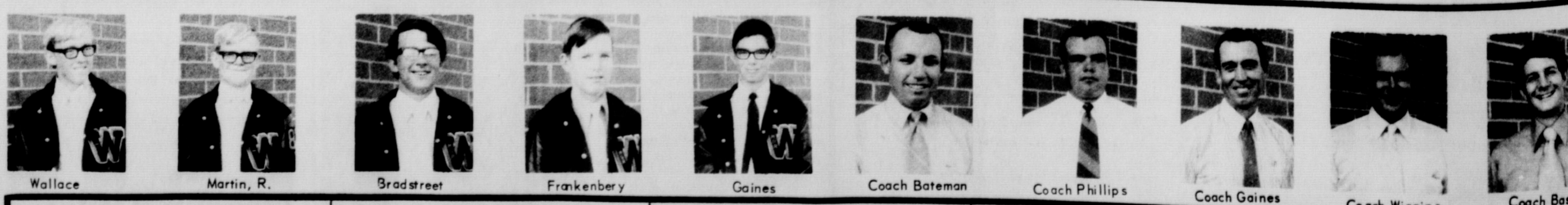

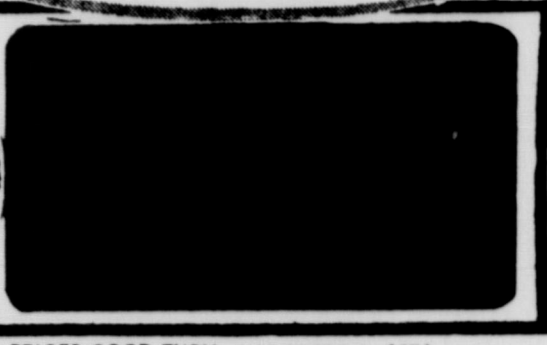
