Red Cross Chapter To Sponsor Life Saving Course

The Wheeler County Red Cross Chapter will sponsor a life saving course in Wheeler beginning next week according to Mrs. Carroll Adams instructor for the course.

According to Mrs. Adams, boys and girls who have reached the age of twelve and are not older than fifteen years, or who are students in the seventh to tenth school grade inclusive, are eligible to take life saving instruction and qualify for Junior Life Saving certificate, provided they are in sound physical condition and have no physical handicap that would render them unable to perform any of the required skills.

To qualify for Senior certificates, persons are eligible who have passed their sixteenth birthday, or who are students in or above the eleventh grade in school and can meet the same physical qualifications as outlined above.

Both groups, Junior and Senior, must possess enough swimming ability to pass the required eligibility test indicated in the course outlines.

Preliminary requirements for senior applicants include:

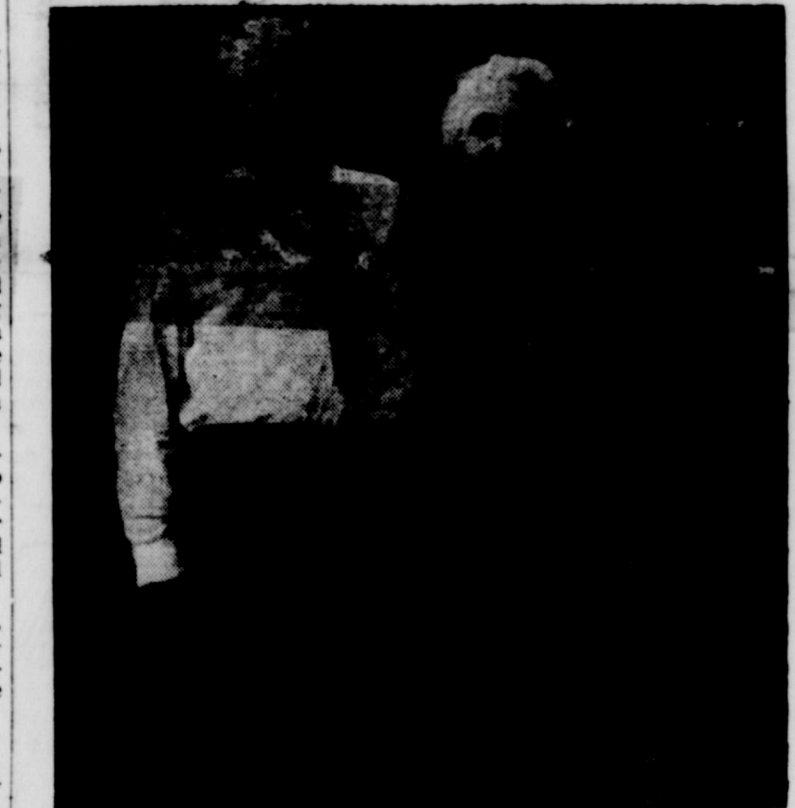
1. Standing front dive, reasonably good form.
2. Swim 440 yards continuously, employing a hand-over-hand stroke (crawl, trudgen-crawl, double trudgen, trudgen); a side stroke using scissor strokes of the legs; swim on the back with inverted scissors or inverted breast stroke kick. These strokes may be alternated as desired but pupils should sustain each stroke when used for at least 20-25 yards.

Pampa Man Held Following Shooting

John Andy Simms, 21-year-old negro is being held in Wheeler County jail under \$10,000 bond following the fatal shooting of his 16-year-old wife.

The 16-year-old woman, Linda Rea, died a few moments after an ambulance rushed her to the Shamrock hospital. She was shot with a .32 caliber pistol.

County officials have not determined the motive for the killing which occurred in front of the Black Cat Inn, a section of colored town in Shamrock.

Simms a laundry worker in Pampa, had sent his young wife to Twitty earlier in the week to chop cotton. He apparently located her in Shamrock sometime Saturday night.

The shooting occurred at 10:00 P.M. Saturday. The couple had been married for about a year. They had no children.

Simms was not captured until 6:00 p.m. Sunday afternoon. He was captured by county officials and state highway patrolmen 1 mile West of Dozier. He was unarmed and afoot when captured.

Local Farmers OK Wheat Price Support

Relatively few of Wheeler County's farmers exercised their right to vote in the Wheat Marketing Quota Referendum held July 21, 1960. Only 37 voted in Wheeler County, with 34 favoring Marketing Quotas and 3 against Marketing Quotas. This 37 who voted represent about 10 percent of those in Wheeler County who were eligible to vote.

Nationally, wheat farmers who voted, favored a continuance of the Marketing Quota program by the largest percent ever recorded in a Referendum of this type. Approximately 95 percent voted to continue Marketing Quotas which assured them of a loan price support of not less than \$1.75 per bushel for all wheat produced within their allotment.

MUSTANGS HAND IRISH 7-4 DEFEAT IN THRILLER — 1937

Going into the game the underdogs, Wheeler Mustangs came out on the long end of a 7-4 score against the Shamrock Irishmen on the local gridiron last Saturday night.

Both teams scored their touchdowns in the second period. Early in the second quarter the Mustangs took the ball on downs on the 50-yard stripe where they heaved an incomplete pass.

Weeks, Mustang fullback, ran behind perfect blocking to the 20-yard line. On the next play he picked up 20 yards around the left end for the touchdown. Weeks passed to Pitcock for the extra point.

Ball Juggles to Irish

Shamrock took the ball from the kickoff and marched down the field for two first downs, which placed the ball in excellent scoring position. Byers threw a long pass which was juggled by a Mustang and Irishman but finally came down into the waiting arms of the Irishman. Brothers then raced the remaining 10 yards across the pay stripe. His try for point was between the uprights but below the crosspiece.

One of the most crucial points in the game was late in the fourth period when the Irish offense bogged down between the 10-yard stripe and the goal line. The Mustang line was fighting hard and the white and green line of the Irish could not gain through the lighter orange and white.

Second Victory Over Irishmen

This was the second win of the Mustangs over the Irish for the past eight seasons. Last year the local squad crossed the opponent's goal line twice and held them to a 14 to 0 score.

Brothers was the standout of the Irish eleven. The whole Mustang squad played better and harder football than they had in any previous game. Weeks looked good in his running and his drives and plunges through the line were largely accountable for the victory. Shipman the blocking back who never carries the ball did some fine blocking. Groves playing his first game in the quarterback position called a very hardy game.

The Mustangs line outcharged the Irish and on the defense they played a whole of a game.

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WHEELER COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

Great Plains Conservation Funds are now available to assist farmers in Wheeler County apply conservation practices on their land. This cost-sharing program is in addition to the regular ACP funds which have been available for a number of years. The Great Plains program is adapted to farms that have a considerable amount of work needing to be done in a few years.

The Great Plains funds are designed to apply a complete job of conservation on a farm unit. The farmer schedules the work over years and money is set aside for all cost-sharing practices to finish the job. By setting aside the funds at the beginning, the farmer is sure that the money will be available to finish the job regardless of the year in which it may be finished. GP contracts may run for any number of years from three to ten. Cost-share rates are based on the average cost of doing the job at the time it is actually done. The rate varies from 80 per cent on grass seeding to 50 per cent on cross fences and dams. There is no payment for management practices such as deferred grazing or stubble mulching.

The Great Plains program is administered by the Soil Conservation Service. Anyone may get the details of the plan by applying to the Soil Conservation Service office in Wheeler.

Childress Votes 411 To 75 Against Combining Offices

Residents of Childress County voted nine to one last Saturday to continue to operate separately the offices of tax assessor-collector and sheriff.

Total vote was 411 for keeping the offices separate, as they are now, and 47 for consolidating them.

Wheeler County residents will have an opportunity to vote on the same issue Saturday, August 6, date of special election called by the commissioners court.

The commissioners called the election after the preliminary census report showed that Wheeler County's population has dropped below 10,000. The law states that the duties of tax assessor and collector and sheriff shall be combined into one office in counties of less than 10,000 population, unless the residents of the county vote to keep them separate.

Hall County residents voted six to one to continue operating the offices separately in that county, and Childress County citizens were even more emphatic in expressing their views, with the nine to one vote against consolidation.

Collingsworth County, which dropped below the 10,000 figure a few years ago, combined the two offices for a while, but later went to the polls and asked that they be operated separately.

All voting boxes will be open in Wheeler County for the special election on August 6, and ballots may be cast between the hours of 8 a.m. and 7 p.m.

Holders of the two offices now are Bus Dorman, sheriff, and Thurman Rives, tax assessor-collector. Both were re-elected this year for four year terms.

Loter Attends Summer Science & Mathematics

Brownwood, Texas — Twenty-four Texas students are participating in the second annual summer science and mathematics training program at Howard Payne College for exceptional high school students.

The institute, which opened Monday, July 18, is being financed with a grant of \$7,500 from the National Science Foundation. The Howard Payne Division of Science and Mathematics has received grants totaling \$165,655 in the last three years from the National Science Foundation, to conduct three summer institutes for high school teachers, two summer training programs for secondary students and an in-service training program to be held during the 1960-61 school year for high school teachers.

Dr. Leonard Daniel, chairman of the HPC Division of Science and Mathematics and head of the Chemistry Department, will serve as director for the five-week student training program opening Monday. Assisting on the instruction staff will be heads of three other Science Division departments: Dr. Fred Loman, physics; Dr. Chris Jordan, biology; and Dale Marness, mathematics.

Charles Brewster, HPC senior from Blanket will serve as head counselor and recreation director for the participating students. Also serving as counselors will be Frances Lamb of Brownwood, who graduated at HPC in May, and Robert Liu, junior from Hong Kong.

Each morning, the participating students will have two hours of classroom in physical science and one hour of work in either biology or modern concepts in mathematics. During the afternoons, they will work on individual research projects in biology, chemistry or physics or participate in a group research problem in mathematics.

Also included in the five-week program will be two-day field trips—one to the Fort Worth-Dallas area and another to the Austin-San Antonio area.

Students who will participate are exceptional science and mathematics students who are between junior and senior years in high school of AA classification or lower.

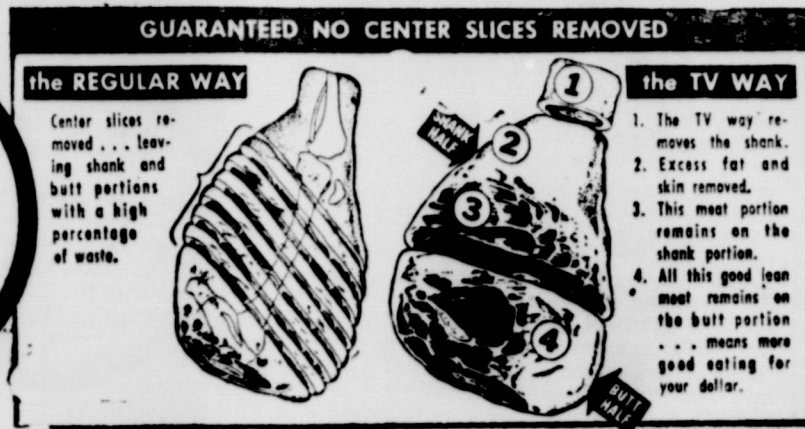

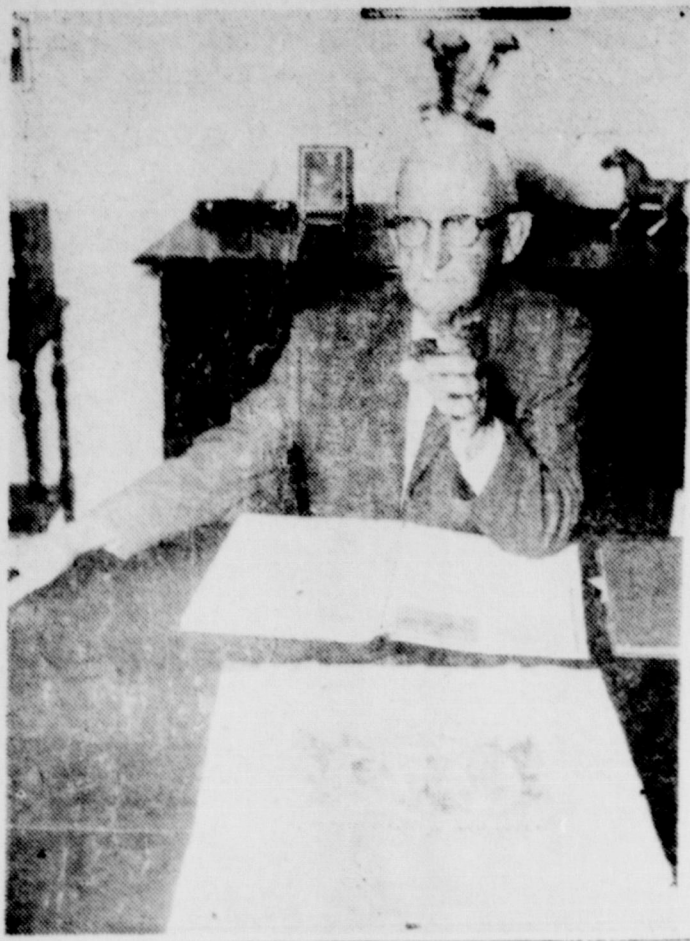

Ramrod of Wheeler Party Affable Guy

WHEELER — Over here in Wheeler folks will tell you that A. B. Crump is a man with an open mind. He doesn't care what you believe . . . just as long as you believe in the Democrats.

So far as anybody in these parts knows, A. B. Crump — a peppery youngster who was too old for World War I — has been a County Democratic Chairman longer than any other man in the great state of Texas. The neat little fellow with a bow tie who has trouble jamming 82 years worth of ideas into neat words and sentences, has ramrodded Wheeler County's Democratic Party affairs for 35 years now.

And come election time, you can count on Wheeler County's vote being one of the first on the board, because A. B. Crump is a man who believes in getting things done.

"When I took over as Democratic chairman," Crump says, "Why it'd be sometime next week before you found out who won. They had a lot of old men in there and it took them all day to write their name."

"First thing I did when I took over was to work around and get some young men in there as election clerks and judges. Made a few people sore, but they lived over it."

Never, never, Crump swears, has he voted Republican. Not even in 1928 Herbert Hoover or 1952 for Eisenhower — the only two times Wheeler County has strayed into the "wrong" side of the tally sheet.

"But one time there was this kind of Republican I knew who ran for a local office on the Democratic ticket, and I voted for him. But I've been sorry ever since."

Although the Wheeler party boss is generally an affable sort of fellow, it doesn't do to carry a chip on your shoulder around him. He believes in letting chips fall where they will. Like for instance the time filing fees were raised from the customary \$1 for area candidates to a percentage of the office's salary.

Most of the other county chairmen kept putting the area candidates on the ballot for the usual \$1 fee. But not Crump. One regional judge candidate balked that first year. It was also the year he didn't get his name on the Wheeler County ballot.

"I told him if he didn't know anymore about law than that I'd sure hate to do business with him."

If there's anything the old Democrat hates worse than a Republican, it's an independent. "I don't even consider them qualified votes."

Talking about independents he recalls back in 1928 when many

Texas suddenly got independent. It was during Al Smith's bid that a well-meaning lady cornered Crump down at the past office one day and showed him her list of the state delegates with drys in one column and wets in another.

"I looked it over and told her I'd just been to the state convention and took a little drink with about half of her drys. Some of them were so drunk they couldn't make the meetings, and that I knew some of her wets never took a drink."

"She said, well, just point them out. That's when I told her just to go home on account of she was already misled and wasn't any use making it worse."

"Now that's your independents for you, I guess, some of those drys were trying to do away with the liquor by drinking it all up before somebody else got to it."

A states right Democrat Crump admits he isn't very happy with a lot of liberal dollars in the party, but he contends the best path is to stay in the party and fight it out there.

He also intends to do some fighting between now and November — for the Democrats who he claims will win Wheeler County and the race.

The Crump home is decorated with political memoirs dating back to William Jennings Bryan's candidacy and on up to autographed portraits of the outstanding Democrats of present time.

"See that picture," Crump said, pointing to a large picture of Truman. "That's about my favorite. I'm just like Harry. I don't give the Republicans hell. I just tell the truth and they think it's hell."

Collecting political souvenirs is but one of many Crump hobbies that include gardening, marmalade, canning, walking cane collecting and others.

"In fact I never have worked. I've just had lots of hobbies."

Some of his other hobbies have included ranching, running an early day general store in Pampa, being vice president of the Wheeler bank, taking care of the mayor's office for six years and doing chamber of commerce work.

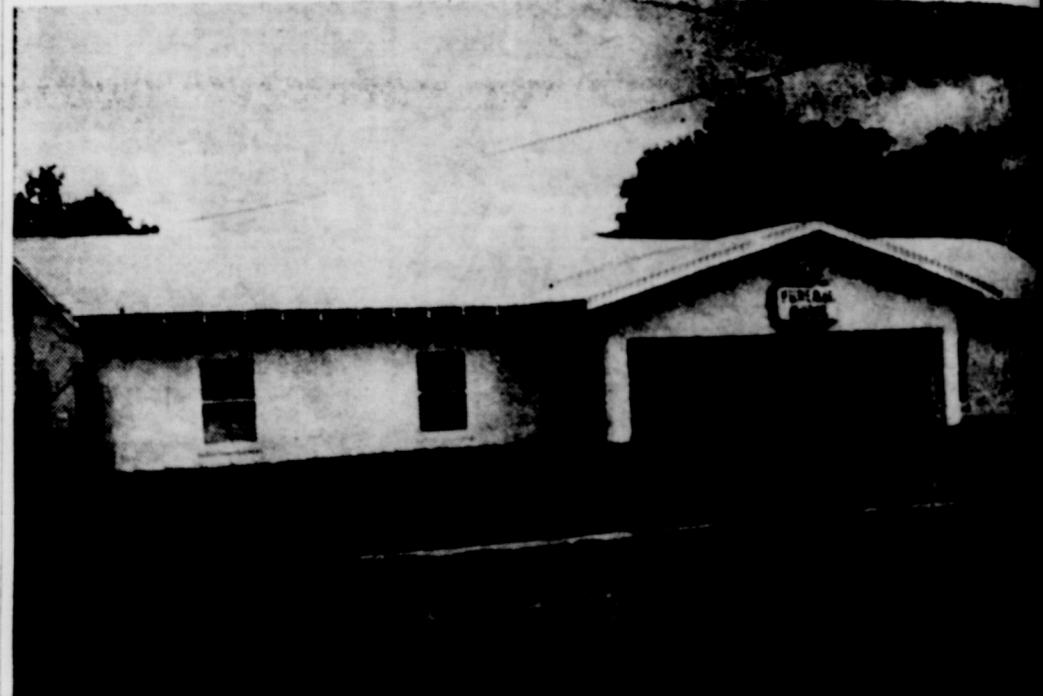
During his years of service to Wheeler County and the Democratic Party, Crump has never collected a salary or been reimbursed for any expenses.

With such a long and avid interest in politics, Crump still claims he has never been tempted to run for anything higher than mayor.

"I wouldn't have an office if you'd give it to me. Always figured I was smarter than the politicians. I made more money trading than what they draw. Besides, I sure don't want anybody telling me where to head in."
