Wheeler County To Get Another Bridge

Clyde Drake, resident highway engineer, Wellington, Texas, announced Wednesday that Gilvin-Terrill, Inc., of Amarillo had submitted the low bid and was awarded the contract to construct the new bridge across the Red River between Wheeler and Shamrock on highway 83. The low bid was \$573,603.00 and construction will begin sometime in November. The contractor has 200 working days to complete the project, which consists of 3 miles of new paving and a 125 1/2 ft. prestressed concrete beam bridge. Drake estimated that from 25 to 30 employees would be on the job at all times.

LOCAL COLTS RIDE OVER LEFORS TEAM

The hustling, aggressive Wheeler Colts ran roughshod over the visiting Letors Jr. High Bandits last Thursday night, 38-6. The game was played before a good crowd at Nicholson Field and they supported the future Mustangs enthusiastically with their cheers.

The Colts received the opening kickoff and in six plays had the first touchdown of the game with Dunk Porter, 150 lb. Colt full-back, going over from 25 yards out. Porter ran for the extra point and Colts were in the lead 8-0. A charging defense kept the Bandits from making any serious threats with the ball after receiving possession on their 20. Porter, whose number was called often during the game set sail once more for the Lefors goal with an 80 yard run. Good blocking by the rest of the Colt team was evident on this touchdown run as it was throughout the contest. The extra point try was good and the Colts led the Bandits at the end of the first period 14-0. The second quarter saw no scores, run up on the board but Lefors had a touchdown called back for an infraction of the rules. The Colts came out the second half anxious to add more to their total and made two more touchdowns in the third quarter. The first tally of the quarter came on a 16 yard scamper right up the middle by the promising young Colt quarterback, Richard Wallace. Aided by good blocks thrown by the center of the Colt line, Wallace raced into the secondary and outran the Bandit defenders. Porter carried over for the two pointer and the lead mounted to 22-0. Colts. Porter made his third touchdown of the evening with a 25 yard run to paydirt to climax the third period scoring for the Colts. Don Burks ran the extra point and the Colts went into the final eight minutes of play with a 30-0 lead. Possibly the most exciting play of the game came in the fourth quarter as Lefors was gamely trying to get back in the game with a passing attack. Nichols, Bandit quarterback, was attempting to pass from deep in Colt territory when, in desperation, to keep from being thrown for a big loss by the on rushing Colts, he threw the ball right into the waiting arms of Lewis Miller, Colt lineman. Miller simply headed north under a full head of steam and crossed the goal line without a hand being laid upon him. Porter ran the middle for two points and the Colts lead went to 38-0.

Lefors was not to be denied as Nichols continued to fill the air with passes and finally hit Roberts with a 16 yarder for the score. The Colts swarmed the extra point attempt and the final score was 38-6.

Every boy who suited out got into the fray for the Colts and all of them showed the desire and grit that is characteristic of a good football player. Fine play was abundant on the Colts side and all the fans are looking forward to the Colts next encounter which will be against the Shamrock Jr. High team on Oct. 13th at 7 P.M. on Nicholson Field.

Re-Surfacing Assured; Paving To Come Later

The city council met Monday night for a special meeting with representatives of the Chamber of Commerce and voted unanimously to go "all-out" to secure additional paving for the city of Wheeler.

A survey compiled by Dr. H. E. Nicholson and his committee composed of Bill Owen, Judge George Heffley and Clyde Johnson, indicated that Wheeler was desperately in need of 20 new blocks of paving, including curbing and gutter and unless resurfacing was done on 34 blocks of the present paving it will be ruined within another year.

Unofficially the City Council voted to begin the resurfacing of the 34 blocks immediately and contractors have already been contacted to start submitting bids. The resurfacing should take place within the next few weeks.

The new paving, which is impossible to run during the winter months, has been scheduled for next spring.

To help the city council with their survey and to speed up the work on the paving, Dr. Nicholson requested everyone interested in new paving, new curb and gutter or resurfacing of their present streets, to contact him immediately. Final Judgement Entered in Gas Rate Controversy
At Austin, in a trial held Sept. 12-14th, in Judge Jack Roberts 126th District Court, Wheeler Gas Company vs Railroad Commission of Texas, judgement was entered in favor of the Gas Company granting a permanent injunction, allowing the Company to charge the rates that have been effective since December, 1957. This Court action makes permanent a temporary injunction that was granted in favor of the Company in December 10th, 1957.

Judge And Soil Man Have Wreck
No charges were filed by Highway patrolmen Bill Lusk following an accident last Thursday which involved a state employee and a district judge.

The accident occurred 3 miles west of Mobeetie on highway 150. Neither of the men were seriously injured and the total damage to both vehicles was estimated at \$600.00.

The mishap occurred as Eli Baker, soil conservation employee, driving a '59 Ford pickup attempted to make a left hand turn off of highway 152. Lewis Goodrich, district judge, was following behind Baker and was attempting to pass Baker. Goodrich's 1960 Pontiac crashed into the side of the Baker pickup.

Both men received numerous cuts and bruises. However neither were seriously injured.

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

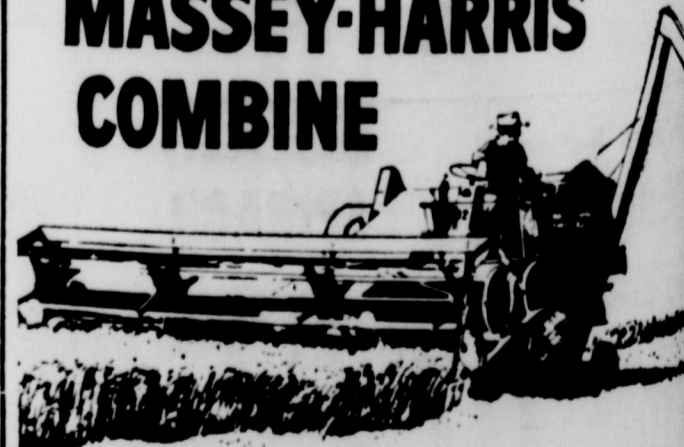

SHAMROCK IRISH STOP WHEELER 36-6

Led by Jerry Jernigan's three touchdowns, the Class AA Shamrock Irish defeated an improved Wheeler Mustang football team last Friday night 36-6. Following a rain, which fell all afternoon preceding the game, the game was played on a very muddy gridiron before the year's largest crowd. Water was standing in several spots on the field as the teams lined up for the opening kickoff. The Mustangs received and being unable to penetrate the Irish defense, were forced to punt. The Irish required only five plays from scrimmage to rack up their first points of the night.

A five yard penalty against Wheeler moved the ball to the Mustang 19 where Jernigan found a big hole over the Mustang right tackle and went for the touchdown. Campbell ran the extra point and the visiting Irish had a quick 8-0 lead. The Mustangs were unable to gain with the kickoff and gave the ball back to the Irish with a punt. Shamrock, for the only time in the game, was forced to punt to Wheeler on this series of downs and they punted to the Mustang 35 where Jolly returned to the 38 and fumbled, the Irish recovering. The fast Irish marched goalward again with Jernigan moving the pylon over the double end line on a 7 yard run. McBev's ran over for the two points and the Irish led the Mustangs 16-0 as the first quarter ended.

Fumbles plagued both clubs the entire second quarter and a recovered fumble helped the Mustangs stop the Irish on their third but the Irish were handed the ball deep in Mustang territory shortly afterward and they went on to score. The Irish started a punt late in the second quarter. Driving to the Wheeler 9, the Mustangs rose up and took over on downs at that point. Here the ball started playing tricks on both teams and it changed hands three times. The Mustangs fumbled inside the 10 but on the next play, the Irish fumbled and the Mustangs recovered on the 9. Moving to the 14, the slick ball again was fumbled by Wheeler and Shamrock took over. Scribner made the last four to paydirt over his left tackle and also ran the extra point. The Mustangs returned the kickoff to their 45 and the ball ended; the Irish went into intermission with a 24-0 lead.

The fans were hardly settled back in their seats for the second half when the Irish tackled on another 6 points. Wheeler kicked off and the Irish returned to their 43 and in two plays made the 57 yards to the end zone. Campbell ran for nine to the Mustang 48 and with second and one coming, Jernigan broke into the clear and sped 48 yards for his third touchdown of the night. 11:05 remained in the quarter as the try for extra point failed and the Irish held a 30-0 lead. Only one other threat was made in the third period as the Irish drove from their 49 to the Mustang 12 but lost the ball on downs. Even though down 30 points, the Mustangs were giving it all they had and the defense looked much improved over the past week. The Irish took over in the Shamrock 40 shortly before the third period ended and early in the fourth quarter, 10:13 remaining, a 60 yard drive was climaxed with Scribner going over from 3 yards out. The Irish attempted to pass for the two pointer and it was no good and the score now read 36-0 in favor of Shamrock. The Irish discontinued to substitute liberally and late in the game, the Mustangs got a drive going that began on the Shamrock 46 following a pass interception. The Mustangs moved to the Irish 11 and time was called. The Irish moved their first unit back into the game but the Mustangs were up to the task. After faking the Irish defense to his right, G. C. Baker, Mustang quarterback circled his left end and for the six pointer with 2:17 remaining. The try for extra point failed and the final score was 36-6, Irish. The Mustangs as a team played much better ball than against Erick the week before. Several of the boys

stood out in the Mustang defense with Jolly playing an out-standing game from his halfback position. Watson, Baker, Troyce Hunter and Bradshaw were other boys in the thick of the defense. Hill did an excellent job punting with the conditions as they were and the old bugaboo of poor snapbacks seemed to have been cured. All the Mustang ball carriers ran hard and hopes were raised that David Tremble will be back in top shape once more as he got into the ball game for brief periods. If the Mustangs continue to improve and the desire mounts, district play should find them playing much better ball.

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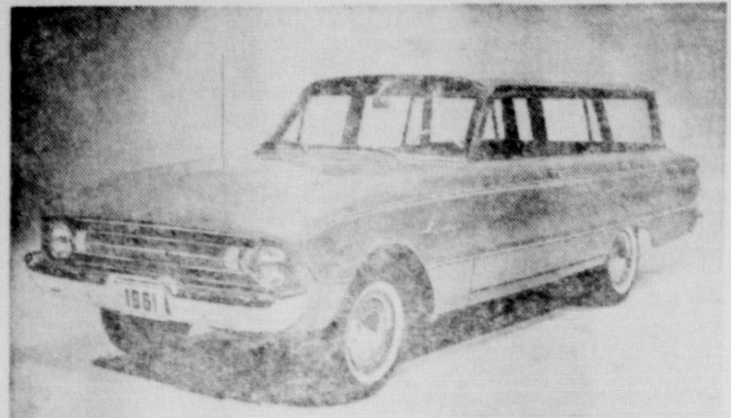

FOOTBALL — 1957

Wheeler's Mustangs built up a 26-7 third-quarter lead in just two minutes of the fourth period & got the score of their lives only to hold on for a 33-21 victory over the Happy Cowboys in the Class B regional championship game played here Thursday in Buffalo Stadium. The Cowboys of District 2-B came to life in the early seconds of the fourth quarter to score and then come back in a minute and one-half to jump to within five points of the District 2-B champions. But Wheeler failed to score and the Mustangs rolled back nonchalantly for seven points shortly after the last Happy touchdown. The Mustangs jumped out front 7-0 in the first quarter and held a 19-7 halftime lead.

Both teams went into the regional contest with by-district ties under their belts. Wheeler last week tied Groom 7-7 and won on penetration to advance. Happy tied Whiteface 20-20 and Whiteface won on penetration but was later disqualified when it was discovered that an ineligible player was on the team.

Thursday's Thanksgiving Day contest on the campus of West Texas State was played before a small crowd of around 1,500. The Mustangs, coached by J. D. Atwell and George Daughtry, will have to be content with the regional title. Class B schools do not advance into state championship playoffs.

Fullback Jim Porter, 180-pound junior and a real workhorse, scored three of Wheeler's touchdowns on short plunges. Porter was one of the top ground gainers of the game. Joe Jaco, 150 pound senior half-back, added one Wheeler Touchdown and Gary Satterfield, a 155-pound sophomore halfback, made the other. Harold Reid kicked three of five extra points.

Porter put the Mustangs out front in the first quarter with a touchdown plunge of two yards with 51 seconds left in the quarter. Reid's conversion was good. A desperation pass from quarterback Harold Crossland to end Larry Hunter with a third and 16 situation set up the touchdown. Jaco took a Happy punt to the Cowboys 46. The pass went for 34 yards. Porter then made three carries which set the ball on the five and Jaco carried to the two.

With four minutes gone in the second quarter, Jaco went five yards around right end for another counter and the conversion attempt was wide to the right. Wheeler got possession of the ball when Bill McCormick, 215 pound junior tackle, recovered a Happy fumble. Porter made a 25-yard run for the latest gain of the series. Halfback Vincent Venhaus scored

Happy's first touchdown midway of the second quarter on a four-yard run. Quarterback Gary Roogie ran over the extra point. Wheeler came back minutes later when Crossland intercepted a Happy pass on his own 29 and carried to the Happy 49. A Crossland to Jaco pass went to the seven and two plays later Porter went over from the seven.

Satterfield went over from one foot out for Wheeler's fourth Touchdown and his extra point was good.

Porter went over from the one for the final Mustang touchdown and Reid's conversion was good. Another Crossland to Jaco pass for 34 yards set up the play.

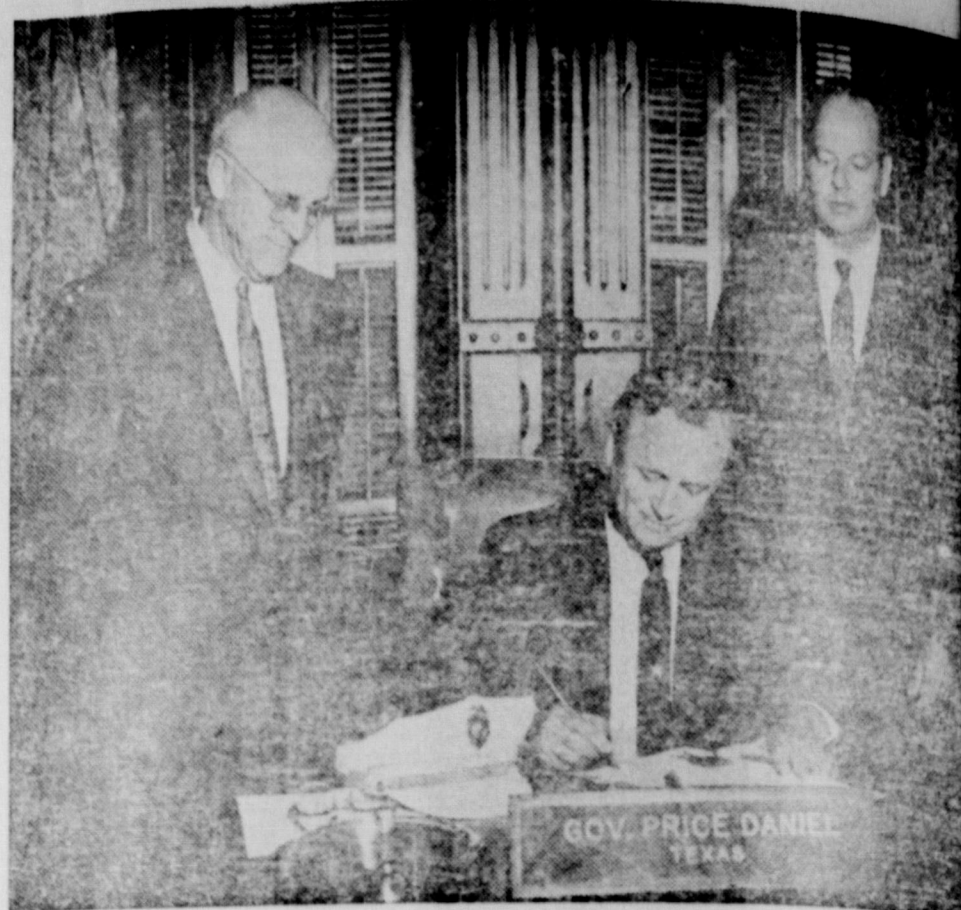

AUSTIN, Tex.—Texas needs a tougher law to regulate the sale of pistols, Arty Gun Will Wilson, law to regulate the sale of pistols Arty Gun Will Wilson, so that irresponsible persons can't buy them, Wilson told Texas prosecuting

attorney at an Austin meeting that gunners in Texas were up to 11 per cent last year. "One was to prevent these killings," he said, "is to keep pistols out of the hands of irresponsible persons."

Wilson recently held a constitutional amendment to the old law requiring licensing of pistol dealers because of the way it was written, but said that he believed there should be such a law.

A lot of money spent on catching and punishing law breakers might have saved the attorney general sag estate, if not more were spent on prevention of crime.

Texas District and County Attorney Association presented Wilson a life membership plaque during their meeting here in recognition of his leadership in law enforcement. Earlier this year Wilson was named top state attorney general in the nation by the National Attorney General's Association.

HIWAY PATROL OPENINGS—Applications to fill 120 openings in the State Highway Patrol will be taken by the Department of Public Safety through Oct. 1.

Applicants must be high school graduates or the equivalent and must pass a full written examination to be given in 16 different Texas towns. After acceptance, the prospective patrolmen will receive 16 weeks training at the Law Enforcement Academy in Austin.

Application forms may be obtained from any DPS field office or by writing to DPS Headquarters, P. O. Box 4087, Austin.

DRIVER ED PLAN TOLD—Driver education in Texas public schools might be financed on a cooperative state-local plan similar to that used for the pre-school program for non-English speaking children.

This program was discussed in a recent speech by Brad H. Smith, director of the Governor's Highway Safety Commission. Driver education tied in with the public school system is one of the goals numerous safety groups have pushed toward for some time.

Smith noted that a local school system may secure state funds for teaching non-English speaking preschoolers if it puts up some local funds also.

"Since these plans seemed to work," Smith said, "we are looking at their success for possible application to the driver education to recommend a cooperative local-state effort."

OIL FLOW CUT—Texas Railroad Commission set the October oil allowable at 2,670,567 barrels a day on an eight day producing pattern.

It will be the sixth straight month production has been limited to eight days. Since the production will be spread over 31 days in October compared to 30 in September, the daily allowable drops by 47,644 barrels a day.

Despite the continued low allowable, Texas independent oilmen were taking a brighter view at the Commission hearing. For months they have spoken gloomily, even desparately, of a glut in Texas Crude. At this hearing, buyers spoke of a shortage of Texas Crude crude, and a spokesman for independent said, "We are not as worried as we have been."

POLIO DOWN, HEPATITIS UP—Good news in the polio field, but a growing problem in infectious hepatitis is reported by the State Health Department.

For the first half of the year, polio cases were down to 27, compared to 101 for the same period last year. But 1,191 cases of infectious hepatitis were reported, compared to a five year average of 566.

Control of hepatitis is complicated by the fact that (1) the virus has never been isolated, (2) exactly how it spreads from person to person is not known and (3) no specific treatment is available.

Isolation of the patient and extremely careful sanitation measures for those who come in contact with whom are usually recommended.

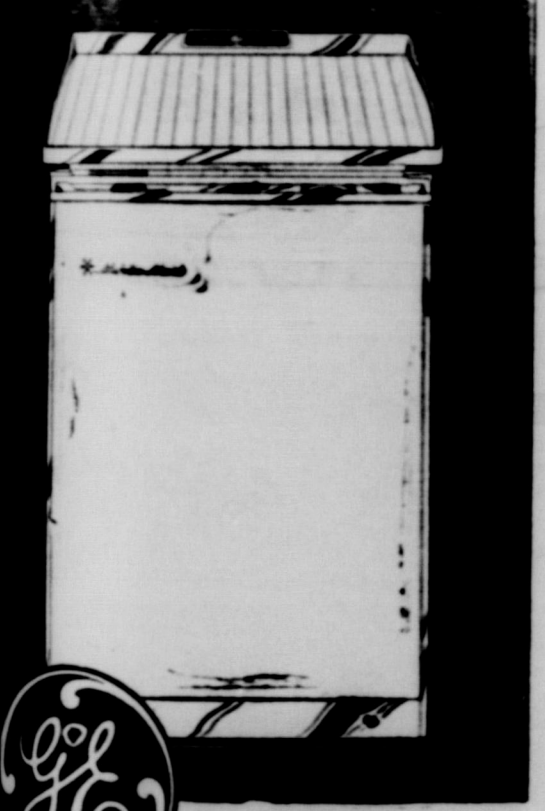

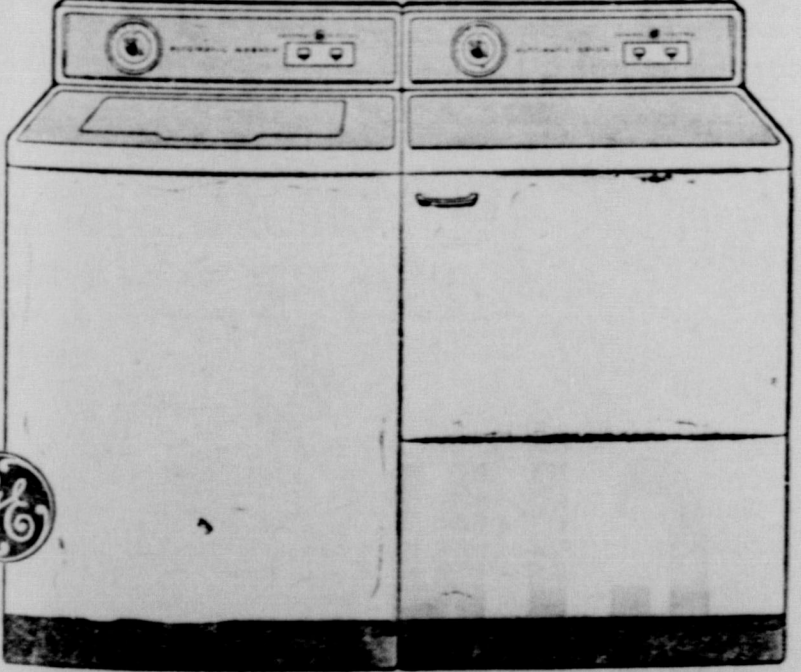

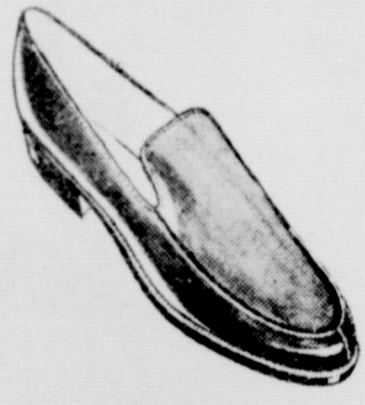
