## Local Reader Blasts Kennedy Record

Kennedy has promised a 5% increase in national growth. I assume this will be brought about by the 16 to 18 billion increase in government spending that he has promised. The 1960 allotments will be announced about the first of December and a referendum will be held about December 15 to decide whether or not marketing quotas continue.

An abundance of pullers are in Wheeler and with a few days of shine most of the cotton will be ready for the gin.

1. Please walk on the sidelines only. Do not, under any circumstances, walk across the hardwood floor. To do so will ruin the finish. Smoke only in the new concession addition.

3. Players only are to be admitted to the dressing rooms.

4. The stage is to be used only for plays and programs. Do not go behind the curtain or sit or stand at the front of the stage.

5. Courtesy begins with us and is reflected by our children. In other words, a simple, general rule would be for each of us to come in the gym, find a good seat and leave it only to go to the concession area and return.

The new sound system is very delicate and very sensitive. Let's all take good care of it.

Our attendance is up slightly from a year ago. We hope that it continues to show a slow, but steady growth.

As parents and patrons, everyone needs to study the needs of the public schools both immediate and the future. When we consider that rural counties such as ours have lost as much as 50% of their population during the last two decades, it is easy to see that a decreasing school enrollment causes more taxes to be needed to finance the education of those remaining. These taxes can come only from three sources: Local, State and National. Most of our

citizens feel, we think, that our local and state governments are the proper ones to finance our public schools. If we are to avoid Federal Control which comes through Federal financing, the citizens of our State need to get behind the efforts now being made to cause the Legislature to pass bills increasing the money now available for education in Texas. Some researchers already see a need for an additional 100 million dollars for the next biennium. Whatever type taxes the Legislature passes to raise the money will have to be paid by you and me. In general, the people will have the type of schools for which they are willing to pay.

Our state is ranked at 32nd in order of the amount of money spent for its public schools. Do we want it to remain so? It seems to me most of our citizens prefer to spend more so that their children's future may be better provided for.

Remember American Education Week November 6-12. Visit your school and become acquainted with your children's teachers. Help them to give better educational opportunities for everyone.

# HOW THE DEMOCRATIC PARTY DIED

"In 1948, the CIO-PAC moved in on the grassroots level of the Democratic party. According to the PAC expert, the move was made with the personal approval of Walter Reuther.

"The year 1948 was enormously successful for the CIO politicians in Michigan. They elected a Governor. But, they did not let him get the foolish idea that he might be in control of the party.

"In the spring convention of the Democrats in 1949, the New York Times reporter says it was Gus Scholle, director of the state CIO, rather than the Governor, who was the real head of the State Democratic Convention.

### Goon Squads Take Over

"In 1950, I understand the traditional Democrats made a last vain attempt to take back their party from the CIO politicians of Michigan. The Calkins investigation shows how this last attempt was smashed by equipping each of the Wayne County District conventions with small squads of men ready to use force to prevent the regular Democrats from regaining power. The leader of the armed squad which took over the Democratic Convention in the 15th district told Calkins he was equipped with 6 men, 26 clubs and 2 pistols.

"As the terrorists completed their final outrages on the dying remnants of the old party, Gerald Fitzgerald, Democrat National committeeman said, and I quote his comment to the newspapers: 'I have just watched Socialism take over the Democratic party by Communist processes.'

"Who finances the party?"

"By 1950, the treasuries of the CIO unions were supplying about two-thirds of all the campaign costs of the statewide Democrat politicians, including Governor Williams, according to the Calkins-University of Chicago investigation.

"By 1950, the CIO politicians had completed their conquest of the Democratic party of Michigan.

Where is the Democratic party of old? It is gone. Infiltrated by left-wingers of every shade and color except for the southern wing it has been made over with startling speed into nothing but a Socialist-Labor party.

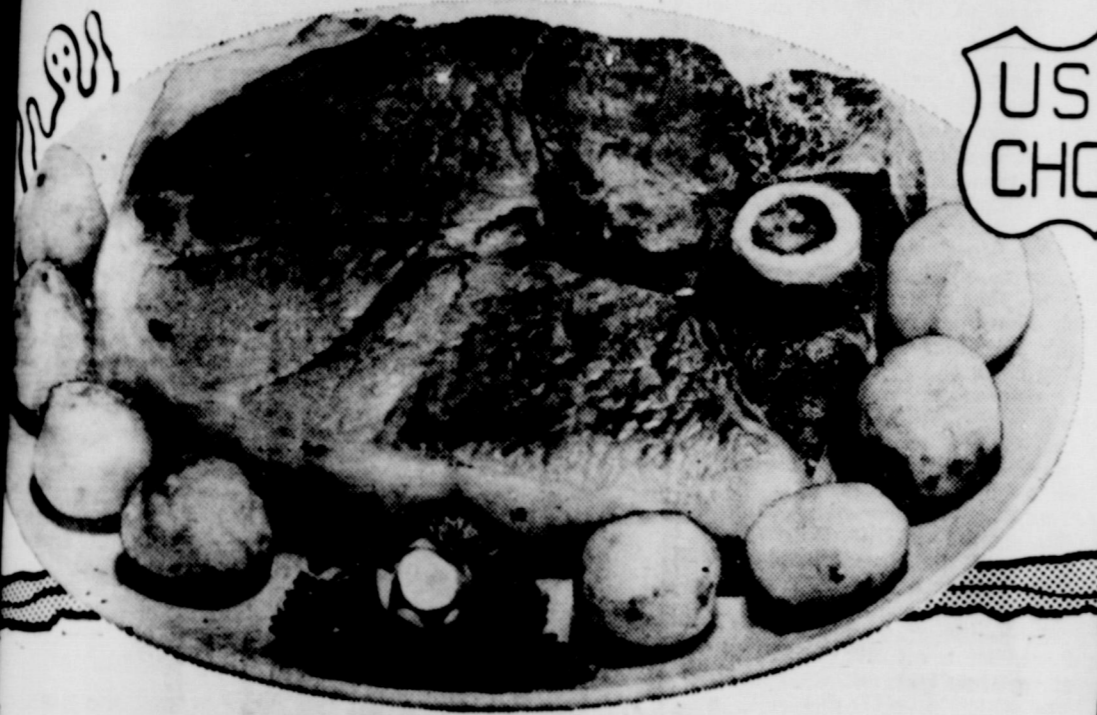

place where I should be, in Switzerland, Germany, Holland, Ireland, or America, or in any other Kingdom or territory I shall come to, and do my utmost to extirpate the heretical Protestants of Masonic doctrines and to destroy all their pretended powers, legal or otherwise.

I do further promise and declare that I will have no opinion or will of my own or any mental reservation whatsoever, even as a corpse or cadaver (perinde ac cadaver), but will unhesitatingly obey each and every command that I may receive from my superiors in the militia of the Pope and of Jesus Christ.

That I will go to any part of the world whithersoever I may be sent to the frozen regions North, jungles of India, to the centers of civilization of Europe, or to the wild haunts of the barbarous savages of America without murmuring or repining, and will be submissive in all things whatsoever is communicated to me.

I do further promise and declare that I will when opportunity presents, make and wage relentless war, secretly and openly, against all heretics, Protestants and Masons, as I am directed to do, to extirpate them from the face of the whole earth; and that I will spare neither age, sex, or condition, and that I will hang, burn, waste, boil, flay, strangle and bury alive these infamous heretics; rip up the stomachs and wombs of their women, and crush their infants' heads against the walls in order to annihilate their execrable race. That when the same cannot be done openly I will secretly use the poisonous cup, the strangulation cord, the steel of the poniard, or the leaden bullet, regardless of the honor, rank, dignity, or authority of the persons, whatever may be their condition in life, either public or private, as I at my time may be directed so to do by any agents of the Pope or superior of the Brotherhood of the Holy Father of the Society of Jesus.

In confirmation of which I hereby dedicate my life, soul, and all corporal powers, and with the dagger which I now receive I will subscribe my name written in my blood in testimony thereof; and should I prove false or weaken in my determination, may my brethren and fellow soldiers of the militia of the Pope cut off my hands and feet and my throat from ear to ear, my belly open and sulphur burned therein with all the punishment that can be inflicted upon me on earth and my soul shall be tortured by demons in the eternal hell forever.

- Since World War II, there have been three increases in the Federal gasoline tax alone. This brought the Federal tax to 4 cents a gallon, in addition to the State tax of 5 cents a gallon!
- In the last ten years gasoline taxes have skyrocketed 51%—yet the price of gasoline itself has risen only 5.5% during the same period!
- Each year the average motor vehicle owner in this state pays \$78 for gasoline taxes alone. That's just a few dollars less than the average week's pay for most people!

**HIGHWAYS AND GASOLINE TAXES**

Your gasoline retailer, naturally, favors construction of the roads that the motoring public needs. He believes in fair and reasonable taxation for this purpose but feels that taxes on gasoline have now reached unreasonably high levels. He also believes that all special taxes on the motorist should be used only for highway purposes. Yet last year out of every automobile tax dollar collected by the Federal Government from highway users, more than 40 cents went for non-highway purposes. If these automotive tax revenues were dedicated for highway purposes, there would be no need for the latest increase in the federal gasoline tax.
