



HOW THE DEMOCRATIC PARTY DIF

he mob has won, in Michigan. Raw, brute power. Ruthless, vicious mob violence you thought could happen only in Russia. You thought it couldn't happen here. But it has happened here - in Michigan. And in Michigan, the Democratic Party died!

It's not our story. It's Senator Barry Goldwater's story. And his remarks, made in Detroit January 20, 1958, were based on the revelations of an amazing document, an official study of the University of Chicago, written by a research assistant of the CIO-PAC. And this was given to Senator Goldwater by three members of the United Auto Workers - deeply concerned that the lust for political power shown by the leaders would thwart the union's legitimate economic purposes.

Here are Senator Goldwater's own words: "This document, written by a CIO expert named Calkins, tells the story of the growth of the CIO union power inside the Democratic party of Michigan and how the seizure of the party machinery was first decided upon and how it was car-

"It began one evening in Detroit, early in 1947, when the President of the State CIO Council met secretly with some discontented Democrats. According to the Calkins study, the decision was made there, at that meeting, to seize control of the Democratic party of Michigan.

"In 1948, the CIO-PAC moved in on the grassroots level of the Democratic party. According to the PAC expert, the move was made with the personal approval of Walter Reuther. "The year 1948 was enormously successful for the CIO

politicians in Michigan. They elected a Governor. But, they did not let him get the foolish idea that he might be in control

"In the spring convention of the Democrats in 1949, the New York Times reporter says it was Gus Scholle, director of the state CIO, rather than the Governor, who was the real head of the State Democratic Convention.

Goon Squads Take Over

"In 1950, I understand the traditional Democrats made a last vain attempt to take back their party from the CIO politicians of Michigan. The Calkins investigation shows how this last attempt was smashed by equipping each of the Wayne County District conventions with small squads of men ready to use force to prevent the regular Democrats from regaining power. The leader of the armed squad which took over the Democratic Convention in the 15th district told Calkins he was equipped with 6 men, 25 clubs and 2 pistols.

"As the terrorists completed their final outrages on the dying remnants of the old party, Gerald Fitzgerald, Democrat National committeeman said, and I quote his comment to the newspapers: 'I have just watched Socialism take over the Democratic party by Communist processes.'

"Mrs. Nellie Reilly, former Democrat National Convention delegate warned, and I again quote: 'Socialists are in complete charge of the Democratic party machinery.'

"The Democratic National committeeman subsequently refused to attend the State Convention of his own party, saying he refused to attend a convention, the delegates of which had been picked, and I quote his statement to the newspapers: With storm troopers guarding the doors and the Chairman presiding with a baseball bat.'

"There is a final item needed to complete the full picture of the extent of control of the Michigan Democratic Party by the CIO politicians.

"Who finances the party? "By 1950, the treasuries of the CIO unions were supply. ing about two-thirds of all the campaign costs of the statewide Democrat politicians, including Governor Williams, accord-

jing to the Calkins-University of Chicago investigation. "By 1950, the CIO politicians had completed their con-quest of the Democratic party of Michigan.

Delegates Thrown Out Bodily!

"The goon squads took over, and the gavel, that traditional symbol of orderly parliamentary procedure, was discarded for the sawed-off baseball bat.

"In all but one district - the 16th - there was near rioting as the strong arm squads took over.

Delegates representing the old line Democratic elements were beaten and thrown bodily out of the halls by the shocktroop goon squads!"

To this, Gerald Fitzgerald, Democratic national commitan, adds this solemn epilogue:

"After this, the theme song of the Nation, instead of GOD BLESS AMERICA should be GOD SAVE AMERICA." These are facts, Mr. and Mrs. America. These are facts, Mr. and Mrs. long-time Voter in the Democratic Party!

And - who would know more about these facts than a real stalwart of the Democratic Party, Donald R. Richberg, one of the leaders of the New Deal, a distinguished lawyer whose professional life has been almost entirely devoted to fighting for labor legislation. In his book, "Labor Union Monopoly (Regency, \$3.50) Mr. Richberg issues this warn-

The recent rapid progress of such a program in the United States should warn us that the prospect of a Socialist labor government is a very real and threatening menace to the maintenance of our Constitutional form of government and our Constitutional liberties.

"These evils will not be remedied until an overwhelming majority of free citizens realize that LABOR'S ECONOMIC MONOPOLY AND POLITICAL POWER ARE PREPARING THE WAY FOR COMMUNISM FAR MORE EFFECTIVELY THAN THE COMMUNISTS THEMSELVES."

Where is the Democratic party of old? It is gone. Infiltrated by left-wingers of every shade and color except for the southern wing it has been made over with startling speed into nothing but a Socialist-Labor party.

One Sinister Figure

One man is the dominating figure in these socialist-labor groups. Already, through their use, he has made himself the most powerful single individual in the Democratic Party. That man is Walter P. Reuther.

Walter Reuther is the power in the national Democratic Party today - and for many reasons. Reasons that are powerful persuaders to many politicians - among them the fact that he has at his command millions of dollars for political use. And no man in the American labor movement knows the

methods of Russian Communism better than Walter P. Reuther. Walter Reuther and his brother Victor actually spent 18 months in Moscow in 1933 and 1934, studying Communist techniques of propaganda and agitation. And from Moscow,

in a letter glowing with praise for the communist system, they are quoted in this significant phrase:

One of their first activities was to help consolidate the Communist and Socialist youth movements into the Communist-front "American Student Union" - offering American young people trips to Russia, free. And the Reuther brothers were sponsored in this operation by none other than Celeste Strack, of the Central Com. mittee of the Communist Party.

At a public meeting in Flint, Michigan, on March 18. 1936, Walter Reuther gave a detailed account of the Moscow episode, describing the Soviet Union with glowing enthusiasm, In this meeting a question was asked about religion in Russia. And this was Reuther's answer:

"We do not believe in God."

There is much more to the Reuther story - including his role as leader of the destructive sit-down strikes in which Communists plainly played a leading role - with open defiance of the law, brazen contempt of court orders, rioting, wholesale destruction of property, and bloody violence.

There is more to the Reuther story — much more. Do you need more? Roscoe Drummond in the New York Herald Tribune summed it up in a column back in 1956, when he said, "Walter Reuther does not have to be President of the United States to be one of its most powerful citizens."

Which Way, America?
