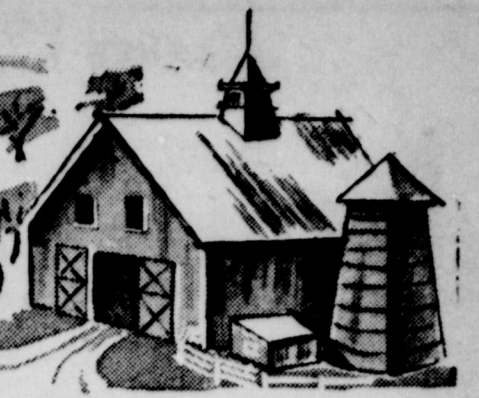

Funeral Services Held For Popular Wheeler Businessman

LEE GUTHRIE IS CLAIMED BY DEATH

Hearts were saddened not only in Wheeler, but over the entire area, as word went out Thursday of the death of Lee Guthrie.

Mr. Guthrie, who had been in ill health for several months, passed away Thursday, October 16, in the Wheeler Hospital, at the age of 57 years, 11 months and 18 days.

Funeral services were conducted Saturday morning, October 18, at 10:30 a.m. in the First Baptist Church of Wheeler of which he had been a devoted member for many years. Rev. M. B. Smith, Pampa, assisted by Rev. Frank J. Ross and Rev. Taft Holloway, officiated.

Hundreds of persons gathered to pay tribute to their friend. Burial was in the Wheeler Cemetery under the direction of Kirk Funeral Home, with Masonic graveside rites.

Serving as pall bearers were John Holcomb, Jake Holcomb, Clarence Robison, Clyde Johnson, Jack Garrison, O. Nations, George Hefley and Amos Page.

Farm Bureau To Kickoff County Wide Financial Drive Saturday

The Wheeler County Farm Bureau met Monday night, and completed final plans for the kickoff of the financial campaign to raise funds to construct a television translator system in Wheeler County.

Community chairmen were given instructions for carrying out the campaign in their respective communities, and each worker was supplied with a list of individuals which he will contact for donations.

More than 100 volunteer workers will converge on the county Saturday morning in their "big push" to raise money for the project.

The project will consist of two 150 ft. towers and rebroadcasting stations.

Construction engineers guarantee grade A television to every

resident of Wheeler County. Here is how the system will work: Two towers will be constructed. Tower no. 1 will be located in the northwest corner of the county. It will pickup the VHF (Very High Frequency) television signals broadcast from Amarillo and rebroadcast it on UHF (Ultra High Frequency). The north end of Wheeler county and parts of Hemphill county will receive the signal from tower no. 1.

Tower no. 2, located a few miles southwest of Wheeler, will pickup the signal from tower no. 1 and rebroadcast it to the south side of the county.

The money raised for the project will be placed in escrow until the project is completed and approved.

The Farm Bureau will ask for a \$60.00 contribution from each Wheeler Countyman, which will be used to construct the translator system.

After construction of the system each contributor will be asked to make a \$1.00 donation each month for service and maintenance of the system.

Sets in this area must be equipped with a corner reflector type antenna and a UHF converter in order to receive the UHF signal. Both the antenna and converter can be purchased through local dealers for \$35.00.

Adult Typing Class To Be Organized

C. E. Porter Of Canadian Dies Following Stroke

C. E. Porter, 58, of Canadian died recently at the Hemphill County Memorial Hospital after suffering a stroke in the Wheeler County jail in Wheeler.

Porter had been arrested in Canadian two days earlier, and was being held in jail under bond on a moral charge.

He had been taken to the Wheeler County jail following arraignment before Justice of Peace H. M. Wood, and was being held under \$5,000 bond pending action of the Grand Jury. District Attorney Bill Waters conducted the investigation in Canadian.

Porter was stricken at Wheeler and was rushed to Hemphill County hospital. He died without regaining consciousness.

My wife just bluntly tells me I'm not using the equipment I've already got to any advantage and mentions a lot of other things which I am too much of a gentleman to repeat, adding

that I'd have chinnery doesn't make any difference if I had twenty thousand dollars worth of equipment.

I'm in favor of this Congressman's eliminating chinnery, but if he thinks eliminating strikes will do it I'm afraid he not taking a practical view of the matter. We're liable to have chinnery on the farms of the world as long as a man had rather prop his feet on the porch than get corn on them following his mule or on other areas driving his tractor, and as far as I'm concerned that's gonna be forever.

from Wayland Junior College in 1922, attended Texas University summer semester and taught school 2 years in Roaring Springs, Texas.

In 1924 he married Laura Wimberly of Abernathy, Texas and together they taught school at Afton, Texas for 2 years. After that he was associated with his father, the late Lem Guthrie, in the Chevrolet business in Matador.

In 1930 he and his father came to Wheeler and purchased the Legion Theatre from Dr. H. E. Nicholson. The theatre building was completely remodeled and "talking" pictures were run for the first time in Wheeler. That same year he opened up a silent movie house in Allison but operated it only a few months.

Later he was a co-owner, with other members of his family, in theatres in Matador, Lefors, and Eden, Texas, and Tipton, Wetumka and Erick, Oklahoma and in 1951 he built the Mustang Drive-In Theatre in Wheeler. In the late fall of 1957 Mr. Guthrie along with his son Corky, started construction of the Wheeler T.V. System and completed the system early in 1958.

In 1934 Mr. Guthrie was employed as teacher and assistant football coach in Wheeler High School. Two years later he was elected principal of grade school, where he served in that position two years.

He was a member of the Baptist church and served his church at different times as Sunday School superintendent and teacher. Also he served capably in directing heating and cooling systems when the new church sanctuary was built.

He became a member of the Masonic Lodge in 1921 at Matador, Texas but moved to Wheeler just before being elected to Worshipful Master of that Lodge. In Wheeler Lodge he was Sr. Deacon, Jr. and Sr. Warden, Worshipful Master, Tyler and Secretary. The latter office he held for 15 years.

Eventual Control Of TB Is Possible In United States

"Eventual control of tuberculosis in the U. S. depends upon whether we can prevent 55,000-100,000 Americans now infected with the TB germ from breaking down into active disease," commented Dr. H. E. Nicholson, president of the Wheeler County Tuberculosis Association.

The current tuberculosis picture in the nation, Dr. Nicholson continued, shows that 69,000 new active cases were reported during the past year and nearly 14,000 deaths—more than from all other infectious diseases combined. There are 150,000 known active cases and 100,000 active cases which have not yet been reported to health authorities; and there are 1,750,000 people living today who have had tuberculosis and need medical supervision to prevent relapses.

"These are among facts presented in the annual report of the National Tuberculosis Association," Dr. Nicholson explained. The report, released today, is in the hands of local tuberculosis association officers throughout the nation.

Dr. Nicholson added that the report showed that tuberculosis was today most often found among persons admitted to general hospitals, those in correctional and mental institutions, inmates of jails, among lower income groups and older people in nursing homes and welfare institutions. The rate is also high among migrant workers, certain racial groups and in densely populated areas.

Dr. Nicholson remarked that financial support for the tuberculosis battle of the voluntary tuberculosis associations was provided last year by more than 13,000,000 Americans through the purchase of Christmas Seals. This mail appeal to people in their homes, traditional for more than 50 years, brought contributions totalling \$25,974,000, of which 94 per cent remained in the county and state for services of tuberculosis associations, and 6 per cent went to the National Tuberculosis Association.

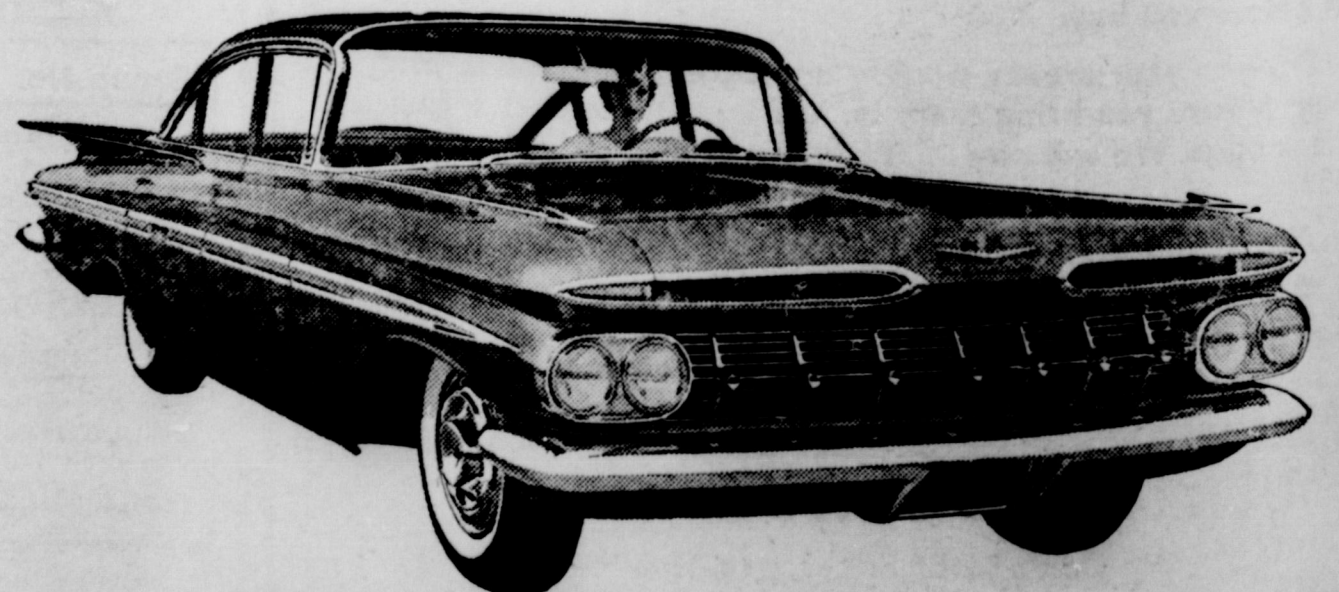
