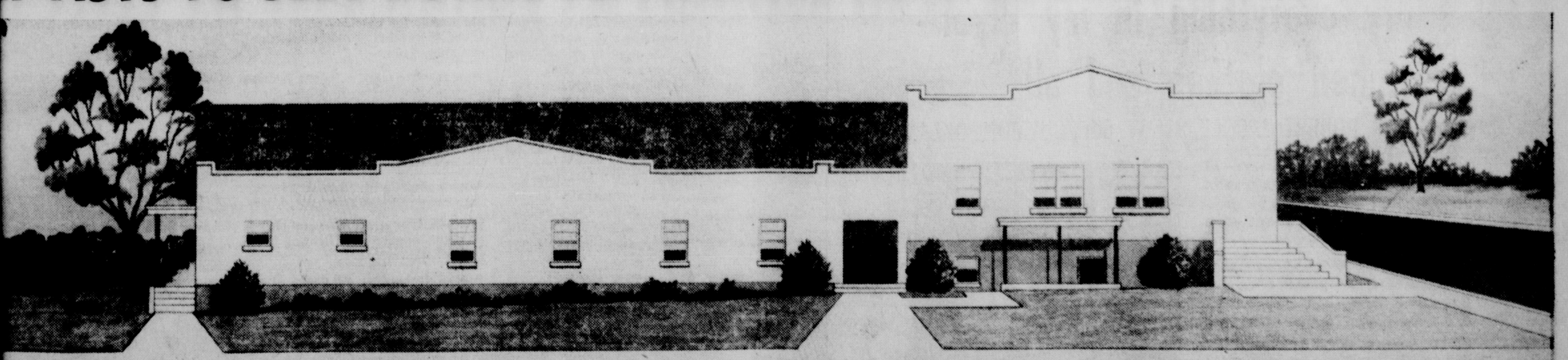
## City Purchases Pickup For Use While Repairing Streets

**2,195 Poll Tax Receipts Issued**

Thurman Rives, tax assessor, collector, announced Tuesday that 2,195 poll tax receipts were issued in Wheeler County before the passing of the January 31 deadline.

This means that the county's potential balloting strength will be stronger by 743 votes than last year when 1,452 persons paid their poll tax.

Five hundred of the poll tax receipts were issued at the office of W. A. Sims in the City Hall building in Shamrock.

Rives reminded owners of motor vehicles that 1960 license plates are now on sale at his office Wheeler and at the office of the tag agent, Lyman Benson, at Benson Hardware in Shamrock.

It is a state law that owners have with them their certificate of title and last year's registration receipt when buying their new tags.

**WHEELER COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS**

Grass seeding time is here and for once, the farmers and ranchers will be seeding on moisture rather than on hopes for moisture. This moisture will reduce the advantages of earlier seedings particularly if the weather stays cool for seed to sprout.

Choosing a grass to plant is often a problem. Native grasses that grow naturally on the type of soil involved are the best pick. They start slowly but are adapted to the climate and can take the droughts. Natives will also reseed themselves and the stand will continue to improve with good treatment.

The introduced grasses often lose out in the bad drought years. They also have a harder time trying to compete with weeds. Some of them do fill a special place in a grazing program. Weeping lovegrass makes very good growth on depleted soils and will build up the organic matter and fertility faster than some natives. It is also very good for winter use. It fits a grazing program better when used from frost until the native grass starts in the spring. Its grazing value is very closely connected with the fertility of the soil on which it grows. Fertilizing weeping lovegrass on poor soils will give it more food value and increase the palatability.

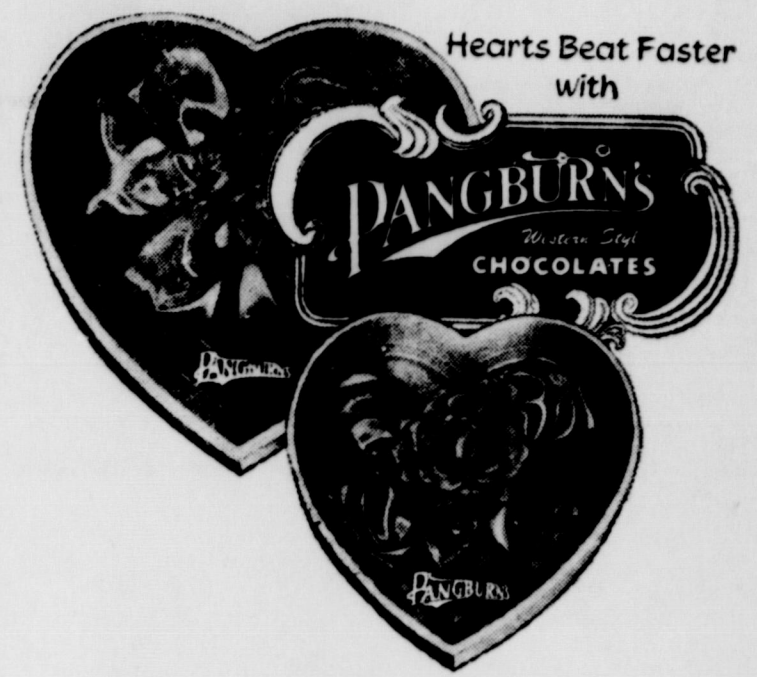

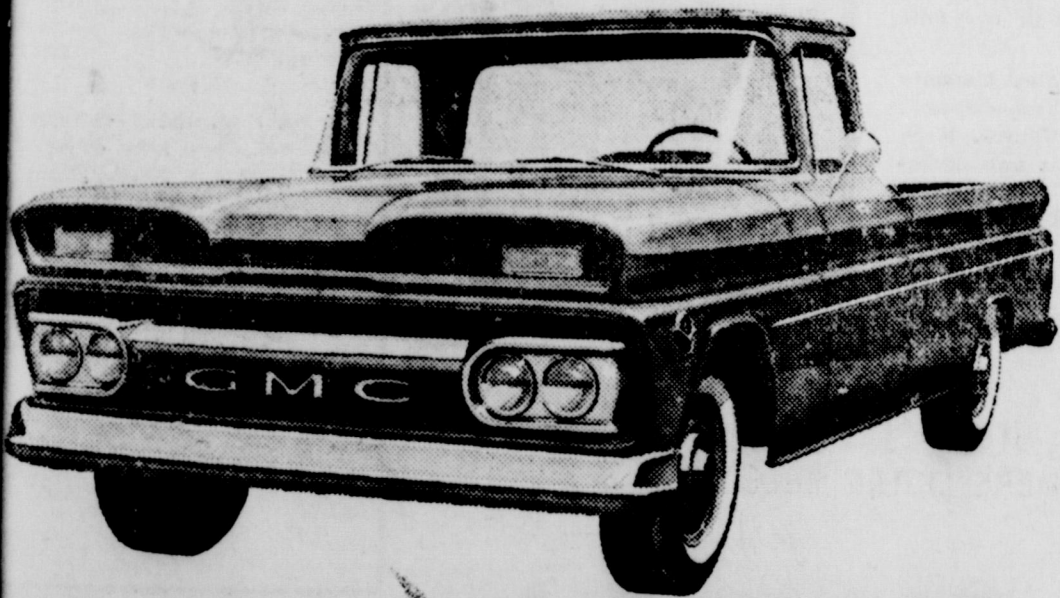

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## FRIENDS SAY FORMBY WILL RUN IN 1962

Friends of Marshall Formby says he will run for Governor in 1962.

Formby, Plainview attorney and former chairman of the Texas Highway commission, had been a prospective candidate for Governor in 1960. Recently he announced that he would not run this year because he did not want to engage in the bitter, name-calling campaign it would take to win the race this year against the present Governor who is seeking his third term.

However, Formby has said that his decision not to run this year does not shut the door on the possibility of a race two years hence.

"It's something like the West

Texas farmer who gets hailed out or the dry weather ruins his crop," Formby said. He always says, "There will be another year."

"I hope that most of our state's financial problems will be solved during the next two years," the Plainview attorney said. "Certain-ly spent its entire time trying to solve our financial mess, there will be little time to do anything else for the state.

"If I run in 1962, I shall have a tax program that will bring in sufficient revenue to finance our state, a tax program that will in-crease as the state grows so we will not have a tax fight every

two years.

Formby stated that he regretted he and his friends did not deem it advisable to make the race in 1960. He said he and Daniel had many friends in common, and that many had received favors from the present Governor and naturally would owe him their loyalty.

"And I don't like to put my friends on the spot. Besides a bitter campaign this year would have brought further division among the members of our Texas Democratic party. I believe we need more unity and harmony."

"Every time I've run for office I've had a hard-fought campaign. I expect 'hard' campaigns and don't ever expect any other kind. But to oust the present Governor from his office would have required the type of campaign that is not good for the individual or for the state."

Formby supporters point out that few men with his qualifications ever offer themselves for the Governorship of Texas. They emphasized that he had been a Texas county judge, a state senator, spent four years with the army engineers in World War II, is a highly successful business man, has been a farmer and as a member of the Texas Highway Commission for six years helped spend more than a billion dollars in highway construction.

Formby's views about the building of more Farm to Market Roads in Texas are widely known. He contends that the state must build several thousand and more miles of FM roads for the benefit of rural Texans and for school bus and mail routes.

He is spending his time now in the practice of law at Plainview and in looking after his business interests. He visits over the state a lot, making talks. During his six years on the Highway Commission he visited every county in the state, with the exception of three counties. Since he is only 48 years of age, his friends point out he has ample time to prepare himself for the race for the state's top job.

## SET OR MOVE SHRUBS NOW

By Elizabeth Litsch

Home Demonstration Agent

This is a good time to organize shrubs into screen or foundation plantings around the home. Any shrubs that dot the lawn and complicate mowing may be reset at this time.

Consider potential size of the tree or shrub, when choosing a location for setting or resetting. Large growing plants are not suited for planting around the walls or foundation of the average home. They do make excellent screen plantings to give privacy to work or recreation area of the landscape. Some large plants that require little water

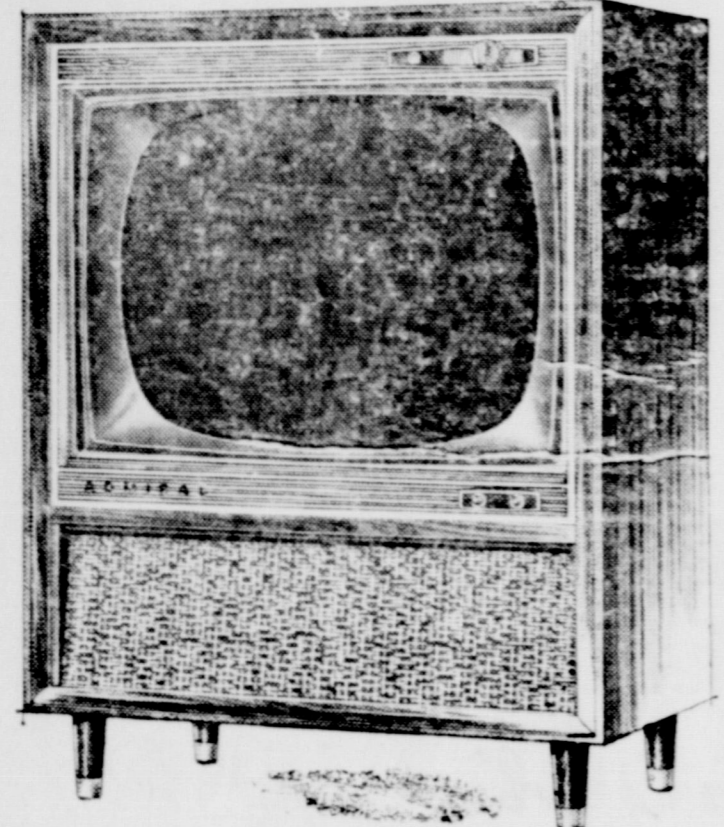
are the althea, ligustrum, zonia cypress, cherry laurel, myrtle, evergreen sumac, etc. Nearly all shrubs can be used in screen planting, but should be placed around the house in proportion to the size of the house. For a ranch type house, which is now, true shrubs that will not grow over 4 feet, are best suited. There are many true shrubs that are and drought, resistant. These are rosemary, lavender, dwarf junipers, spirea, dwarf canthia, nandina, althea, agarita and others.
