## PROTECTION?

Out in Minnesota last week something took place that makes a person wonder what is happening in this nation of ours to those inalienable human rights and freedoms our Constitution is supposed to protect.

The incident we refer to happened at the strike-bound Wilson & Co. meat packing plant at Albert Lea. For many weeks company and union officials have been unable to agree on terms of a new contract with the result that union workers have been out on strike and the company finally resorted to the use of non-union labor to keep its plant in operation.

With the advent of non-union labor into the plant, union strikers tried to stop the non-union employes from entering company property. Mass picketing was resorted to with the ultimate result that Minnesota governor, Orville Freeman, finally had to call out a unit of the National Guard to restore law and order around the company property.

The first thing the National Guard did was to post heavily-armed guards at the gates of the plant with orders to keep the plant closed to strikers and non-strikers alike. This action, quite naturally, greatly pleased the striking union as it fitted in perfectly with the union's threat to keep the plant closed until company officials surrendered to the union's contract demands.

But company officials took quite a different view of the National Guard's action. They protested that the National Guard had no authority to close the plant as its primary job was to provide protection for workers who wanted to enter the plant, perform their work and earn their pay. Company officials also pointed out quite strongly that the company had thousands of pounds of perishable products in various stages of processing, and that these products would quickly spoil unless workers were permitted in the plant to finish processing them. Company officials further said that if the plant wasn't permitted to continue operations an injunction would be sought in federal court to force the National Guard to rescind its plant closing order.

After mulling over the situation for a couple of days, the National Guard commander revealed yesterday that the striking union had agreed to a plan whereby for a seven-day period the company would be permitted to bring in 300 non-union men each day to complete the processing of the perishable products. Presumably, after this seven-day period is up the National Guard will again refuse to permit any workers to enter the plant.

This is a strange way to protect the rights of those who want to work, and we wonder what kind of an administration is running the State of Minnesota when a National Guard unit has to seek the approval of a union boss before it will permit non-union workers to enter a strike-bound plant.

Certainly, the National Guard, if it was permitted to do so, could protect non-union workers from violence without denying them the right to work. And certainly, we haven't yet reached the point in this nation when the mere threat of violence by a striking union is sufficient to force a state administration to shut down the operation of a private enterprise.

If things have reached this point in Minnesota then it again emphasizes the urgent need for national legislation to put some of these powerful labor unions in their proper place.

We know of nothing in the Constitution or in any state law that gives any labor union the right to use force or violence to keep a non-union man from working. But here in Minnesota we have a situation where the police force of a state instead of protecting the right of non-union men to perform their jobs, is using guns and bayonets to help a union keep non-union workers away from their jobs.

This is a fantastic situation and under the circumstances it is no wonder that company officials are going to seek a court injunction to protect their right to operate a business without having to knuckle under to a labor union's demands.

Supposedly, this is still a free country, but when things like this happen one is entitled to wonder just what is happening to the freedoms we used to prize so highly.

## HERBERT KNOLL IS A CANDIDATE FOR SHERIFF

Herbert Knoll, a resident of Wheeler and Colingsworth Counties since his boyhood this week announced his candidacy for the office of Sheriff of Wheeler County, subject to the action of voters in the Democratic Primary, May 7.

Mr. Knoll, who is 49 years old is a member of a prominent, pioneer area family. He moved to northern Collingsworth County in 1918 with his parents, the late Frank Knoll, Sr., and Mrs. Knoll. He attended Shamrock Schools and has been engaged as a farmer-stockman all of his life.

This is the first time he has asked for a public office.

"I submit my candidacy for the office of Sheriff of Wheeler County with the feeling that I am fully qualified to execute the duties of the important office in an efficient manner. It is my pledge that, if elected, I will strive continuously to enforce the law in a fair and impartial way, devoting full time to the duties of the office." Mr. Knoll said.

## Pampa Child Killed In Wreck At Skellytown

17-month old Pampa girl is dead and one man remained hospitalized Saturday in North Plains Hospital in Borger as the result of a car-train crash Friday night at Skellytown.

Investigating highway patrolmen, Arthur Waight and Paul Fisher, said Adelia Pettit died in North Plains Hospital at 9:15 Friday from injuries received in the crash and J. E. Cantrell, a passenger in the Pettit car, was listed in good condition. Cantrell's wife,

Carroll L. Pettit, 2210 Hamilton, the driver of the car, and his wife, Virginia, and another daughter Alisa, 4, were not seriously hurt.

Bill Jenkins, 1805 N. Wells, who was driving behind Pettit and witnessed the accident, said there were no warning lights or a flagman at the crossing and Pettit did not see the train until too late to stop. Apparently, after seeing it, according to Jenkins, he tried to beat the train across the

tracks. The Pettit car was struck at the rear wheel on the right side.

The train, including a switch engine and 20 tank cars, stopped 169 yards from the point of impact, highway patrolmen said. The train was traveling about 10 miles per hour when the collision occurred.

Funeral services were held Sunday, January 10 at 3:00 P. M. in the First Baptist Church of Wheeler with the Rev. M. B. Smith of Pampa assisted by Rev. Frank Ross officiating.

Adelia Rose Pettit was born in Wheeler, Texas July 16, 1958 and was 1 year 5 months and 22 days of age.

Sorrow of friends and sympathy to the family was clearly demonstrated by the large crowd and floral offerings at the funeral services.

Survivors include the parents, Mr. and Mrs. Carroll Pettit of Pampa; one sister, Alisa Carol Pettit of the home; Paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Shelby Pettit of Wheeler; Maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Carl Laflin of Wheeler; and Mr. and Mrs. G. H. Marrs of Wichita Falls, Texas.

Serving as pall bearers were: Adrian Risner, Harold Callan, Ray Griffin and Mike Wilson.

Interment was in the Wheeler Cemetery under the direction of the Kirk Funeral home.

## Area High Schools Are Urged To Enter Math Contest

CANYON, Jan. 13 (Special) — Entries by area high schools in the National High School Mathematics contest have been urged by Dr. H. L. Cook, professor of mathematics at West Texas State College. The contest is scheduled March 10, but the deadline for school registration is Feb. 1.

The contest is sponsored by the Texas Association of the Mathematical Section of America, and Dr. Cook is regional chairman for the association.

No limit on the number of contestants from each school is made, Dr. Cook said. The contest will be given in the various schools on March 10. Deadline for registration is Feb. 1, and contest entries should be sent to Dr. H. J. Ettliger, Department of Mathematics, University of Texas, in Austin.

## WHEELER COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

The Wheeler Board of Supervisors and the Soil Conservation Service personnel assisting the district have just announced some changes in terrace specifications, beginning with 1960, terraces on row crop land will be spaced six inches farther apart. There is six inches vertically. On land that has a slope of two feet per hundred feet, the terraces will be 25 feet apart. On land that is as flat as one foot per hundred feet, the terraces will be fifty feet farther apart.

On land that will be in small grain or drilled so things as such as 75 percent of the time, the vertical interval will be one foot greater. This will double the increase in terrace spacing mentioned above. Experience over the past years has shown that these spacings will work in this area. It will remove some of the objections to terracing and still save the land. These new specifications apply to terraces built with costsharing help from the ACP.

If you have delayed terracing because of too close spacing, see some of the Soil Conservation Service personnel in the district and see how the new spacings look.

## SWEETWATER PHILOSOPHER FEARS 30 - MINUTES WARNING AGAINST MISSILE ATTACK WON'T BE ENOUGH

Editor's note: The Sweetwater Creek Philosopher on his grass farm on Sweetwater discusses time this week, or at least it seems that's what he's doing.

Dear editor:

I'll tell you, I appreciate those scientists' efforts, and I guess these thirty minutes warning is better than none, but it seems to me that even if we had a half hour's warning, even if everybody hit the floor at the same time and teen-agers cut their bathroom time down to 60 seconds, there still might not be too much we could do about it, outside of wringing our hands and dodging.

What this country needs right now is a warning system that gives us three or four years to prepare for a nuclear attack.

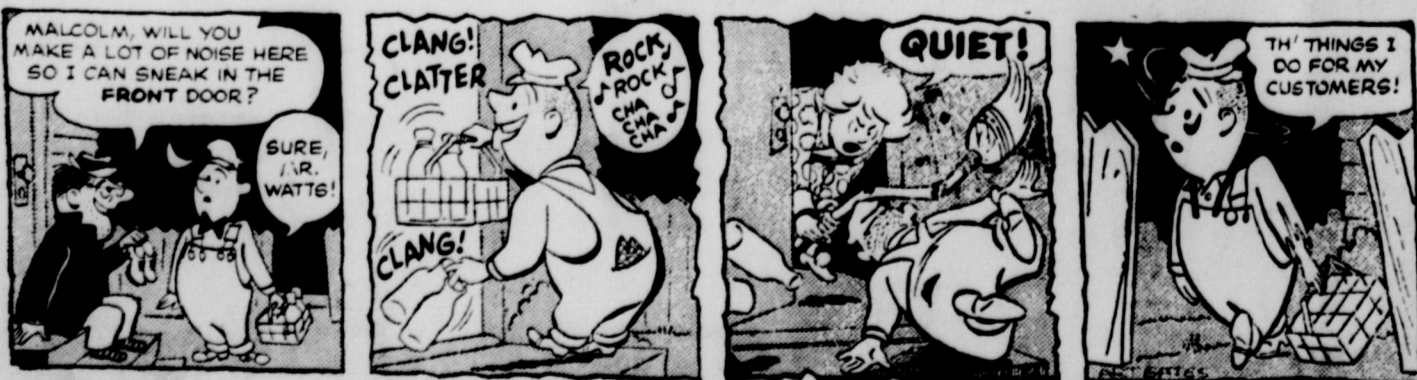

## Seedlings Available For Windbreak

Established windbreaks are an excellent means of preventing wind erosion of valuable topsoil as well as providing protection for farmsteads, especially in West Texas. The Texas Forest Service this year will again make available tree seedlings for planting windbreaks says Bryan Swaim, County Agent.

Deadline on orders for the seedlings is March 1, according to Swaim. Red cedar, Arizona Cypress, Austrian pine, ponderosa pine, cottonwood, mulberry, sycamore and osage orange bois d'arc seedlings are available and will be shipped for planting shortly after March 1. The price is nominal and order forms in the office can supply the exact figure.

The seedlings will be packaged bare-rooted in moss and moisture-proof paper rather than being individually wrapped in burlap. Swaim pointed out that the seedlings may be used only for windbreaks—not for shade or ornamental purposes.

Application blanks may be secured from County agents, Court-house, Wheeler, Texas. In addition, the forms are available upon request from the Director, Texas Forest Service, College Station.

Swaim said this is a sound soil conservation practice and is used on many farms in Wheeler County and trees are now available now on cost basis for windbreaks. These windbreaks make very desirable wildlife habitat which is of economical importance to Wheeler County.

## HIGHLIGHTS OF 1959 SCS YEAR LISTED

The Supervisors of the Wheeler Soil Conservation District have just released their annual report for 1959. Highlights of last year's work are:

The board selected Norbert Schlegel of Lela as the outstanding conservation Farmer of the year. The Shamrock Club presented him a plaque in appreciation. The District was host to the Texas Section of the American Society of Range Management in June. They were shown some excellent range work in the ranching area northeast of Wheeler. Easements were secured on the eight floodwater detention structure planned for Gagely Creek in the district. The Board expressed thanks to the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce and individuals who helped on this task.

The Board assisted George Gandy in making a trip to Sul Ross College in August. He represented the district in an educational work shop aimed at getting more conservation information into our schools. George has worked diligently at this job for a long time.

The Extension Service represented by Bryan Swaim assisted the district with their educational program. Included was training to 191 boys in grass identification, coaching a grass team that placed second in the District contest and sixth in the State contest. A wildlife demonstration was carried on and seven ponds stocked with fish through assistance of the County Agent. He also assisted with the formation of a new game preserve association.

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee assisted the District to carry out its program by furnishing cost-shares for applying practices on 326 farms. The total furnished amounted to about \$70,335. Items on which cost-sharing was furnished included grass seeding, brush control, water wells, dams, terraces, diversion terraces, deep plowing, chiseling and control of bindweed. Members of the County Committee and their employees also served as advisors to the board an occasion.

The Soil Conservation Service assisted 34 farmers to prepare new conservation plans during the year. They gave technical assistance to district cooperators to apply the following amounts of new conservation work: Conservation Crop Rotation - 1932 Acres Contour farming - acres. Cover cropping - 792 acres. Crop residue utilization - 1423 acres. Rotation hay and pasture - 730 acres. Stubble mulching - 443 acres. Brush control 16,096 acres. Deferred grazing 12,697 acres. Seeding pasture and range - 3313 acres, proper use of grassland - 17,110 acres. Diversion terraces - 4 miles, Terraces - 14 miles and Ponds - 1. This was all newly applied work on district cooperators and does not include work already on the land nor does it include all work paid for by ACP.

The Great Plains Conservation Program ended the year with 17 cooperating farmers and ranchers. \$6,945 in cost-sharing under this program was paid to these men during the year.

The district added a drag-line to their equipment during the year. It will be used primarily to dig stock water ponds in sub-irrigated rangeland. Overall progress during the year was outstanding on range conservation. Cropland work made progress but is not nearly so evident to the casual observer. The Board extends thanks to all the many individuals, civic groups, government Agencies and others who have made a community enterprise of saving the basis of agricultural production of the Wheeler Soil Conservation District.

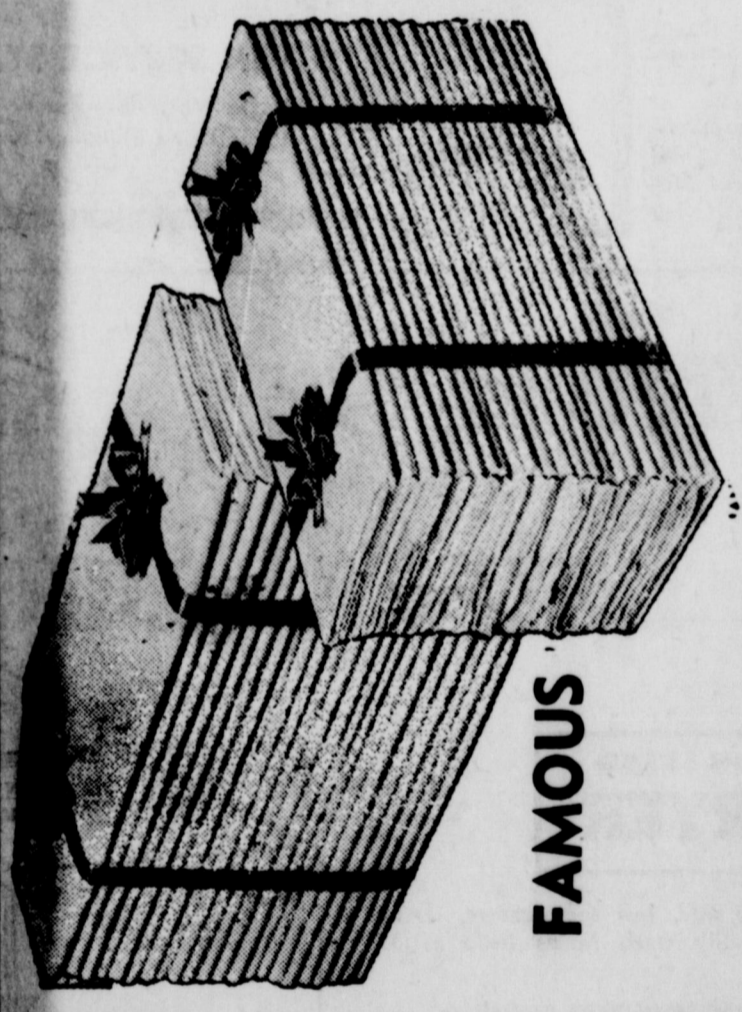

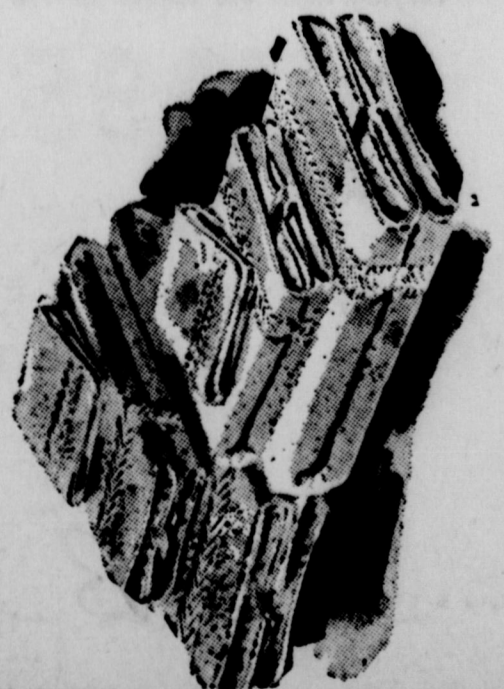

**Farm Bureau To Add Channel To Translator**

Glynn Bell, chairman of the Wheeler County Farm Bureau Translator System, announced Tuesday that the plans for the addition of a third channel to the Translator System are complete.

Actual construction is pending FCC's approval of the permit.

The new channel to be added is seven (7). And Bell indicated that the channel should be ready for use within the next month. However, an unexpected delay in issuance of the permit could delay construction Bell said.

Some new ideas and developments will be used on channel seven. For instance, a new type antenna will be installed, factory representatives say the new antenna should increase output by 20 to 25 percent. In addition to the new type antenna the tower will be raised another 25 feet. And in the event the new antenna and increased height helps reception. Antennas 4 and 10 will be replaced and they will be raised to the top of the tower.

Bob Sinks, Adler Corporation representative, will be in charge of construction on the new channel. Sinks has also been given a

contract to maintain the Wheeler County system. Sinks will also construct and maintain the Miami, Childress and Spearman projects.

Estimated cost for channel 7 has been set at \$12,000. After the two Amarillo TV stations pay their pledge the Farm Bureau will need an additional 3,000. This money must come from donations throughout the county Bell said.

Donations should be sent to: J. T. Johnson, Mobeetie; Glynn Bell, Shamrock or Geo. Richardson Wheeler. The \$12.00 per month maintenance fee can also be sent to either of these men. Bell indicated that a large number of persons have failed to send in their maintenance fee. This money is needed if the station is to continue operation Bell said.

In addition to the \$250.00 per month maintenance fee which is paid to Sinks the Farm Bureau has insurance which costs \$472.00 per year and electricity which runs about \$34.00 each month. As you can see everyone must pay their \$12.00 maintenance fee if the station continues to operate properly Bell said.

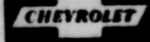
