CAR TAGS GO ON SALE FEBRUARY 1

New license plates for 1960 will go on sale in Wheeler county February 1, County Tax Collector and Assessor Thurman Rives announced today. The plates will be reverse of 1959, and will have white letters and numerals on a black background.

Rives stated that four and one-half million motor vehicle registrations were bought by Texans in 1959. "Don't be at the end of that long line. Get your vehicle registered early," Rives urged. "The registration deadline is April 1, but we hope car and truck owners will put on the new plates as soon as possible."

"Bring your certificate of title and your last year's registration receipt. Penalty for improper registration of a vehicle can be as much as \$200. Don't risk an illegal registration. Remember, too, that a portion of all registration fees stays in your home county to benefit your local community."

Catalogs Ready For Harper Hereford Sale

Catalogs have been mailed by the secretary of the Harper County Hereford Breeders Association, Incorporated, for its sale to be held Wednesday, February 10. This 19th annual sale, to be held by this association, will offer 52 purebred animals — 47 bulls and 5 females.

A sifting committee carefully selected the consignments and all animals measure up fully to the strict requirements of the association, both in individuality and in pedigree.

This Hereford association was one of the first to be organized in the Southwest for the purpose of holding consignment sales. This year, as has been the practice for years, the auction will be held in the purebred livestock heated pavilion at Buffalo Okla. The building, financed by Harper County citizens, was erected for the purpose of holding sales and 4-H club shows. Standing on the county fairgrounds, adjoining the airport at the west edge of Buffalo, it is also convenient to two national highways — US-64 and US-183 — and the Santa Fe railway.

1960 Census District Office Opened In Amarillo, Texas

Establishment of a district office for the 1960 Census of Population and Housing at 616-1/2 North Polk Street, Amarillo, was announced today by Director James W. Stroud of the Census Bureau's regional office at Dallas, Texas. Mr. Clyde Cook will be supervisor of the district office.

He will direct a force of 24 crew leaders and 346 census takers in the following counties: Armstrong, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Childress, Collingsworth, Cotton, DeWitt, Deaf Smith, Donley, Gray, Hall, Hansford, Hemphill, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Packer, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman, Swisher, and Wheeler.

Taking the 1960 Census nationally will require the services of 160,000 enumerators, 10,000 crew leaders, and 400 district supervisors, and 400 district supervisors. The district supervisors, working under the general direction of the permanent regional field directors, are responsible for all phases of the census in their districts. Duties of the district supervisor include the recruiting and training of a small office staff, reviewing the direct supervision of the field canvass which begins on April 1.

Prior to the start of the census, all households will receive in the mail an Advance Census Report Form, a new census-taking device which is designed to speed up the field canvass and provide more accurate statistics. Distribution of this form, which contains the basic population and housing questions, gives the family a chance to assemble information about each member in advance of the census taker's visit.

4-H Council Plans County Contests

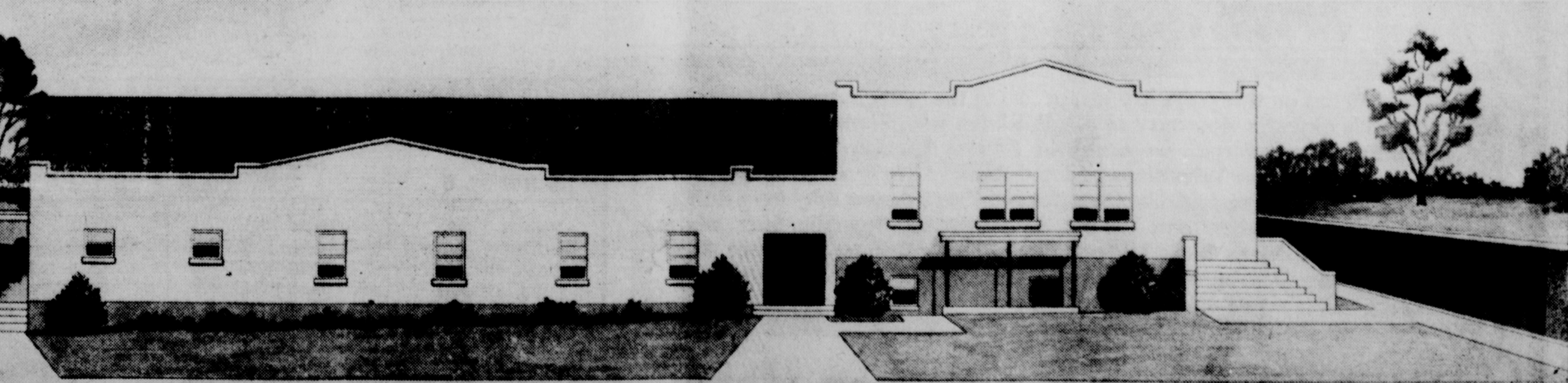
The Wheeler 4-H council met for a called meeting on January 21 at the court house. Chairman Kenneth McCasland presided over the meeting.

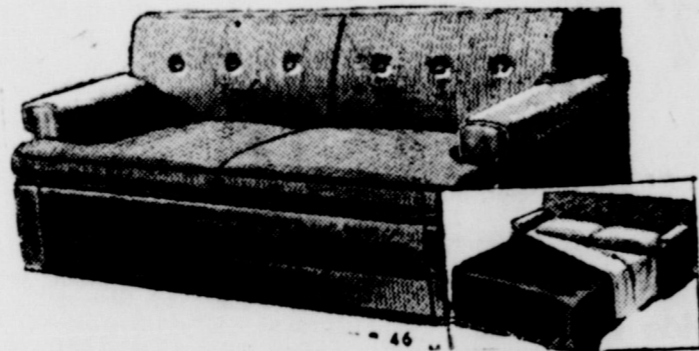

NEW ARTHRITIS PROGRAM:

National Foundation now offers assistance to juvenile and adolescent arthritides through age 18. This is the most hopeful group with which to work to prevent disability. From this group, too, much can be learned of benefit arthritis patients of all ages. Of the 16,000 children likely to seek some treatment each year, some 5,000 to 6,000 may need treatment as extensive as that required by paralytic polio. The program involves both research and treatment ... Research to find cause, cure and prevention; Treatment to prevent deformity and minimize crippling when started early.

ANOTHER NEW PROGRAM — BIRTH DEFECTS:

National Foundation now offers aid to patients through 18 with birth defects involving the central nervous system, among which are:

- Spina Bifida, a defect involving absence of bone in the vertebrae, through which spinal membranes protrude;

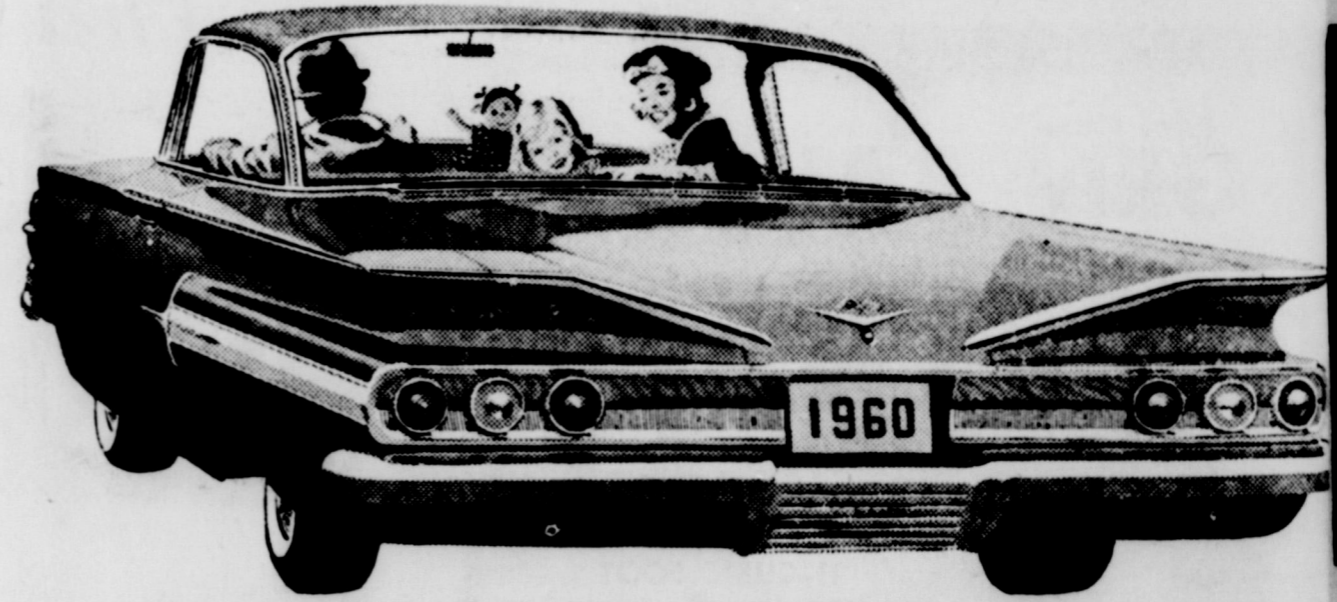
