The Sin of Tolerance

Tolerance has been defined as "recognizing and respecting other's beliefs or practices without necessarily agreeing or sympathizing."

Americans have always been considered a tolerant people. Religious liberty, for instance, is guaranteed by our Constitution. We have scores of different sects and creeds, churches and religious groups all getting along in more or less peace and amity. We have sharp and at times violent differences of opinion; yet we respect the other fellow's right to differ with us, no matter how irrational his arguments may sound.

We argue pointedly about politics, we differ with each other about countless aspects of our daily life, yet insofar as these differences go between Americans, the sharp edges of discord have always been blunted against a solid background; the feeling of universal loyalty to one nation, one flag and one God.

Of late years there has been a change. The country is uneasy. You hear the oft-repeated statement "I don't like the look of things." People are beginning to look beneath all the tinsel and fanfare of clever propaganda and catch glimpses of the shoddy base on which the so-called liberals rest their bid for power. We have followed too many false leaders, men who are strangers to the old words of "honor and faith and sure intent."

The tolerance that was once a virtue has now become a sin. We have become tolerant.

We have become tolerant about treason; we have become tolerant about embezzlement in high places; we have become tolerant about immorality; we have become tolerant about crime, delinquency and illegitimacy; we have become tolerant about government waste, about the loss of our freedoms; we have become tolerant about godlessness, about unbelief. We have been sapped to conviction, drained of our beliefs and bereft of our faith.

Whatever the disillusion, no man should cease to hunt for what he wants or to hope for great things. Great things exist. It is the men who destroy them or make them seem hopeless.

WHAT DO YOU THINK?

The people of Wheeler County have stood by long enough and watched the office of county attorney turn into a \$4,800.50 a year sideline for out-of-town practicing attorneys. Let's put a stop to that foolishness right now.

Two very competent men have filed for the office of county attorney, perhaps one or maybe both men may resign before the filing fee deadline arrives. In any event the people of Wheeler County cannot and must not stand by and let the office of county attorney go to "any man" that plans to run the office in the long-distance manner in which it is being run now.

Don't misunderstand me. I don't feel that the county attorney must live in Wheeler. . . . But I definitely feel that for \$4,800.50 plus, a year he should spend at least 4 or 5 days each week in the county office. I doubt that the office has been occupied more than 4 or 5 days during any given month during 1959.

The law states that the duties of a county attorney are to: Take care of the legal aspects of the County and JP Court and advise the Commissioners Court in all legal matters.

Some have indicated that the county attorney's obligation to the county can be complied with in a few hours each week. But what about his obligation to the PEOPLE.

WHEELER COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

Flood Prevention working on the upper Washita is progressing on or near the schedule that was set last year. The eight dams in the Wheeler District are scheduled for construction in 1960. Some of them will be ready for invitations to bid on the contracts in a few weeks.

It is probable that some of them will be completed in time to store some water during the item in the completion of the structures will be vegetating the dam and emergency spillway. A large part of this work will be carried over into 1961.

When all eight structures are completed and filled to the level of the drawdown spillways, they will add about 268 acres of water to the District. The additional flood storage pools will protect the flood plain of Gageby Creek. This flood plain has some of the most productive soil in the Wheeler District. In addition to the flood protection, some areas will probably be irrigated from the standstill water in future years. The landowners will need permits from the State Board of Water Engineers to irrigate. Other uses of the water will be limited only by existing State laws.

H. O. Willborn Files For Position On State Board Of Education

Election of the State Board of Education is being sought by Herbert O. Willborn of Amarillo, long time leader in regional and state educational affairs.

Willborn was appointed on January 1, 1959, to fill the vacancy created by the death of A. R. (Dick) Bivins, who was elected to the post in 1956 to represent the 18th Congressional District on this board.

By state law, appointed members may serve only until the next general election. Willborn's term, however, will be for only two years, since Bivins' term covered the years of 1956-62.

Willborn served on the Amarillo School Board from 1949 until he resigned to take the state board position. He also served on the Amarillo College Board of Regents for the same period.

Long before his service at the state level, however, Willborn had principally through his research and planning that Senate Bill No. 116, which allows school districts to have a more fluid financial program, while controlling the total of taxation for construction purposes, was passed. This bill provided a much wider market for school bonds, by providing a secure base related to valuations of the district.

Willborn has also served on a special committee appointed by the governor and with membership from the Texas State Teachers Association to study pay schedules for all teachers in Texas. As the result of this committee report, a pay raise of \$405

Is Your House Tight and Ready?

Roof Should Get Top Priority In Checkup

Give first attention to your roof when you make an inspection tour this fall to get your house ready for winter.

Here's how to check a roof to make sure it's ready for the long, rugged months ahead:

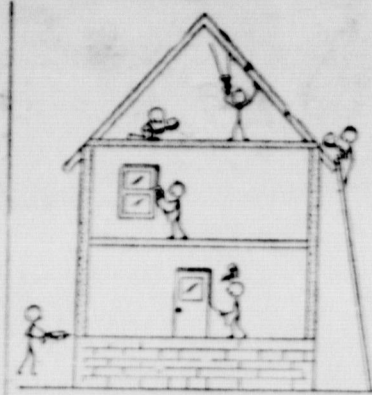
1. Take a flashlight into the attic soon after a rain and look for damp spots on rafters and decking. These often indicate that water is seeping through the roofing material.

2. Make the attic as dark as possible and look for pinpoints of light in the undersurface of the roof. The light leaks can mean water leaks.

3. Look at the roof from the outside. It should be smooth and flat without signs of wear. If it has a worn, shabby appearance, it probably isn't giving the service it should, and certainly detracts from the looks of your house.

If your inspection reveals any of these faults, your next step is to call in a reliable roofing contractor for a professional check.

If he finds the roof in bad condition, he'll probably recommend an entire new roof of asphalt shingles. Why not make repairs? Simply because an at-

tempt to repair an old roof rarely works out satisfactorily. A roof wears out uniformly over the years. Consequently, the spots not repaired are weak and are bound to show flaws soon. Another reason is that walking on an old roof to make repairs often causes new leaks to appear.

In addition, a new roof of asphalt shingles not only will give you and your family years of trouble-free security, but will do a lot to improve the appearance of the house, especially if you choose wisely from the many colors available.

Fall Inspection Can Save Fuel, Boost Comfort

Many home owners fail to realize that the house, like the family car, needs to be "winterized" to get it ready for cold weather.

If you want to be sure of more winter comfort and economical operation in your home, here are some of the most important areas to check:

Insulation. For efficiency, insulation should surround the house in a thick, continuous blanket, with no holes or gaps. If you aren't aware of the importance of good insulation, consider the fact that a thickness of four inches of mineral wool in the ceiling and at least three inches in walls can save as much as 40 percent annually on heating bills.

Doors and windows. These must fit tightly to keep heat from escaping. Old windows and doors that are loose, swollen, or warped should be replaced. Many styles of windows and doors of ponderosa pine are available from building material dealers, including units complete with frame that go into place at a minimum of labor cost.

Storm sash. To be efficient, storm sash and storm doors must fit tightly to create a dead air space. Modern combination sash and doors are available in ponderosa pine. These have readily exchangeable glass and screen inserts.

Caulking. A careful tour of the house with a caulking gun will save many heating dollars. One villain that often goes unnoticed is the joint between foundation and sidewalls. It should be filled with caulking compound. Other points to watch out for are around window and door frames.

Weatherstripping. Be on the lookout for doors and windows that have no weatherstripping, or whose old weatherstripping has become useless through wear, packing down, or loss of spring.

Mineral Wool Ideal For Do-It-Yourselfer

Three types of mineral wool insulation are available to the home owner for do-it-yourself insulation.

They are mineral wool blankets, long rolls of insulation ideal for insulating attic floors and crawl spaces; batts, which are similar to blankets but in shorter lengths, and pouring wool. The latter comes in lightweight bags and is poured into the space to be insulated.

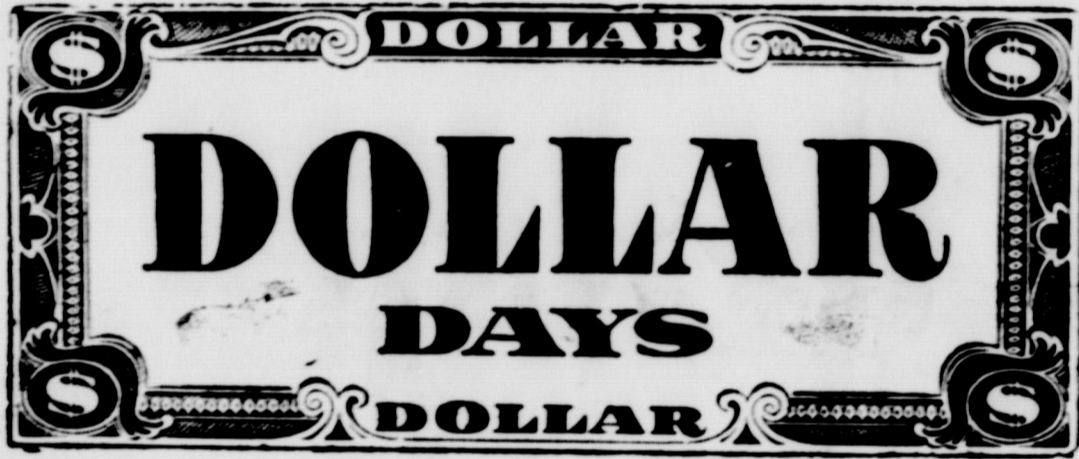
