LOCAL BAPTISTS SELL BONDS IN RECORD TIME

Members of the Baptist Church were jubilant Saturday after learning that the \$75,000 worth of bonds had been sold within 3 1/2 days after the campaign started. Frand Wofford chairman of the Church Building Committee, said he expected construction of the 90' by 67' wing to begin sometime in April or May of this year. The architect is supposed to have the complete plans and specifications ready sometime this week. After the plans arrive, bids will be made and construction will begin as soon as the church accepts a bid. In addition to the new wing, the church plans to remodel the present educational building.

Shamrock-Wheeler Discuss County Fair

A group of interested citizens from Wheeler and some from surrounding rural communities met with a group from Shamrock at the community Building in Shamrock Tuesday Night of this week to discuss the subject of merging the two fairs now being held annually by the two areas. Following the fair season last year there seemed to be quite a bit of sentiment supporting consolidation of the two fairs and the subject was broached at that time to meet and consider a merger with the idea of a Wheeler County Fair to be taken into consideration. On February 2 of this year an initial meeting was held in Shamrock to discuss the situation and it was determined to check with more people in each community and meet again on the 23rd of February and determine whether further discussion of the proposed plan could be fruitful or futile. This investigative work was done as far as time and limitations would permit and the group met again. Soon after the meeting opened, it became apparent there were many obstacles to be overcome before anything of the defined nature could take place. The business people and some of the fair exhibitors at Shamrock had determined that it was best for them to plan on having their fair this year but leave the door open for discussing the subject for future negotiation purposes. The same type discussions had also taken place in Wheeler and there was an appreciable amount of thinking that consolidation was alright but it was desired that the location be at Wheeler. This seemed to lead the discussion or negotiations at a point from which it appeared no way to proceed. The decision was made at the meeting that the entire situation would be turned over to the two fair boards involved and see if they could work out a plan for consideration in the future. The meeting adjourned on a congenial note and the group felt that maximum exploration of the situation had been accomplished as far as possible at the present time. It appears from this writer's viewpoint that if there is ever any possibility of a merger or consolidation the purposes and aims of a fair must be better defined and understood. The decision must be made whether a fair is a business promotion activity or a civic activity by nature. Until this decision is reached it appears that discussion must remain just that and nothing more. At the beginning of this year for the Chamber of Commerce the decision was made to set aside a large portion of the organization's potential for the purpose of building and operational facilities for

Tax Deductions For Dependents

How to claim tax deductions for dependents on Federal tax returns for 1959 was explained here today by Wiley E. Davis of Internal Revenue Service. Mr. Davis reminded area taxpayers that the deductions for a dependent is \$600 and that there are no additional exemptions for age or blindness in the case of dependents. "Cancelled checks and receipts supporting tax deductions should be kept at least three years after filing that 1959 return," the IRS representative advised. The first test to be met for the allowance of a dependent is whether the taxpayer supplied more than one-half of the support of the dependent, unless claimed under the multiple support agreement. Assuming the taxpayer meets the support test, Mr. Davis said that exemptions are allowed for: (1) Your children, including step-children and those legally adopted, who are under 19 years of age or, if over 19, is a student on a full time basis for at least 5 months of the year, even though the child may have income in excess of \$600. (2) Children over 19 whose gross income is less than \$600. (3) Married children who did not file a joint return with husband or wife. (4) Other individuals related to you or your wife or husband. (For list, see instructions with Form 1040). (5) A person unrelated to you who lived in your home and was a member of your household for the entire taxable year. We go back to the old homestead, the old home town. Perhaps we have long anticipated that visit, but now we find that the changes are so disillusioning that we don't care whether we ever return. We meet a friend of years gone by and hardly recognize him. He too has changed. We compare the face reflected from our mirror with old photographs and realize that, without knowing it, we have changed. We try to use a map of yesterday only to discover that it is out of date.

We shudder a little as we wonder if there is anything that remains the same.

Fiber Identification Is An Important Part Of Homemaking

Fiber identification is an impor-
 tant clue to the use and care of
 modern fabrics. The Fiber Identifi-
 cation Act, effective March 3,
 1960, requires that each textile fi-
 ber product, such as clothing,
 must carry a label which gives
 the generic (family) names and
 percentages by weight of the fi-
 bers in the product.
 Each generic name designates a
 kind of fiber that differs in ori-
 gin. The natural fibers—cotton,
 linen, silk, and wool—are familiar
 but some of the man-made fibers
 have unfamiliar generic names.
 Generic names are useful to the
 dresser and homemaker in the
 care of clothing. They are a clue
 to proper washing, drying, and
 pressing temperatures, and to
 spot removal and storage.
 Trade names exist for many
 manmade fibers. If a manufactur-
 er uses a trade name he must pair
 it with a generic name. There are
 many more trade names than gen-
 eric names. If the homemaker be-
 comes familiar with the generic
 names of fibers, this will be her
 key to proper care.
 Reliable manufacturers base
 performance claims and care rec-
 ommendations on yarn construction,
 fabric weave or knit, textile
 finish, and finally on garment
 design and trim; in addition to the
 fiber content.
 Look for performance and care
 information on the labels of fab-
 rics by the yard as well as ready-

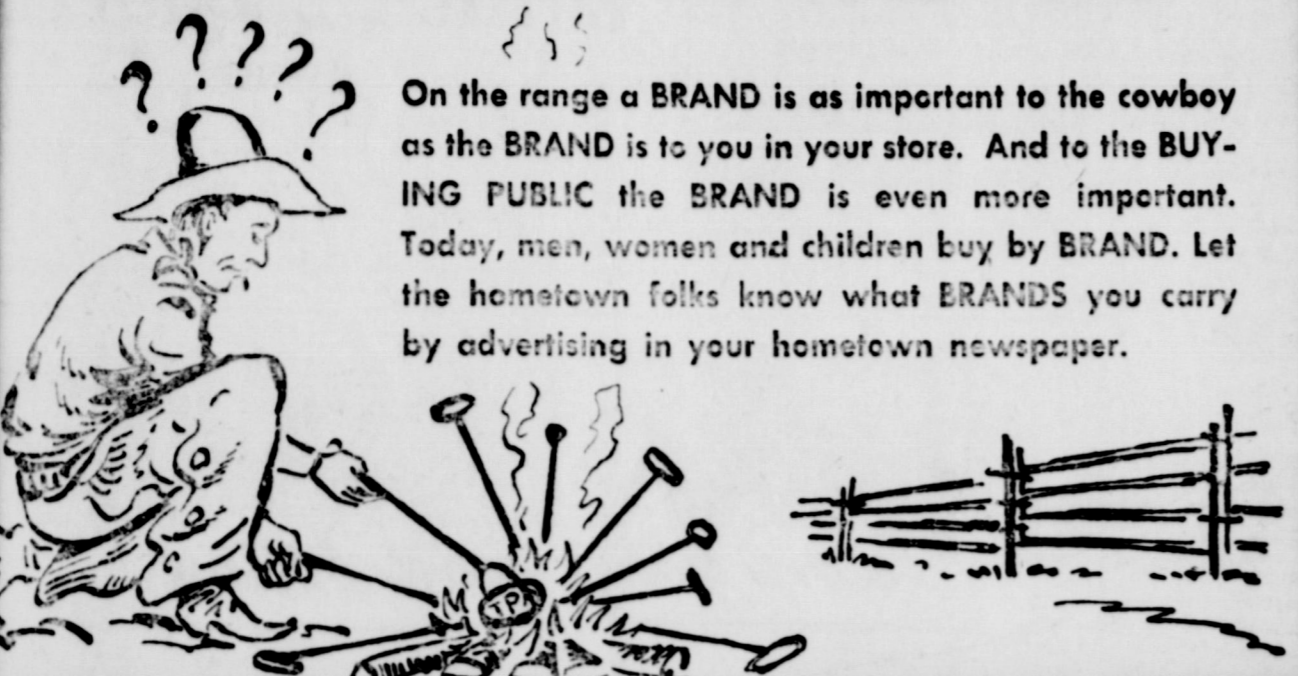

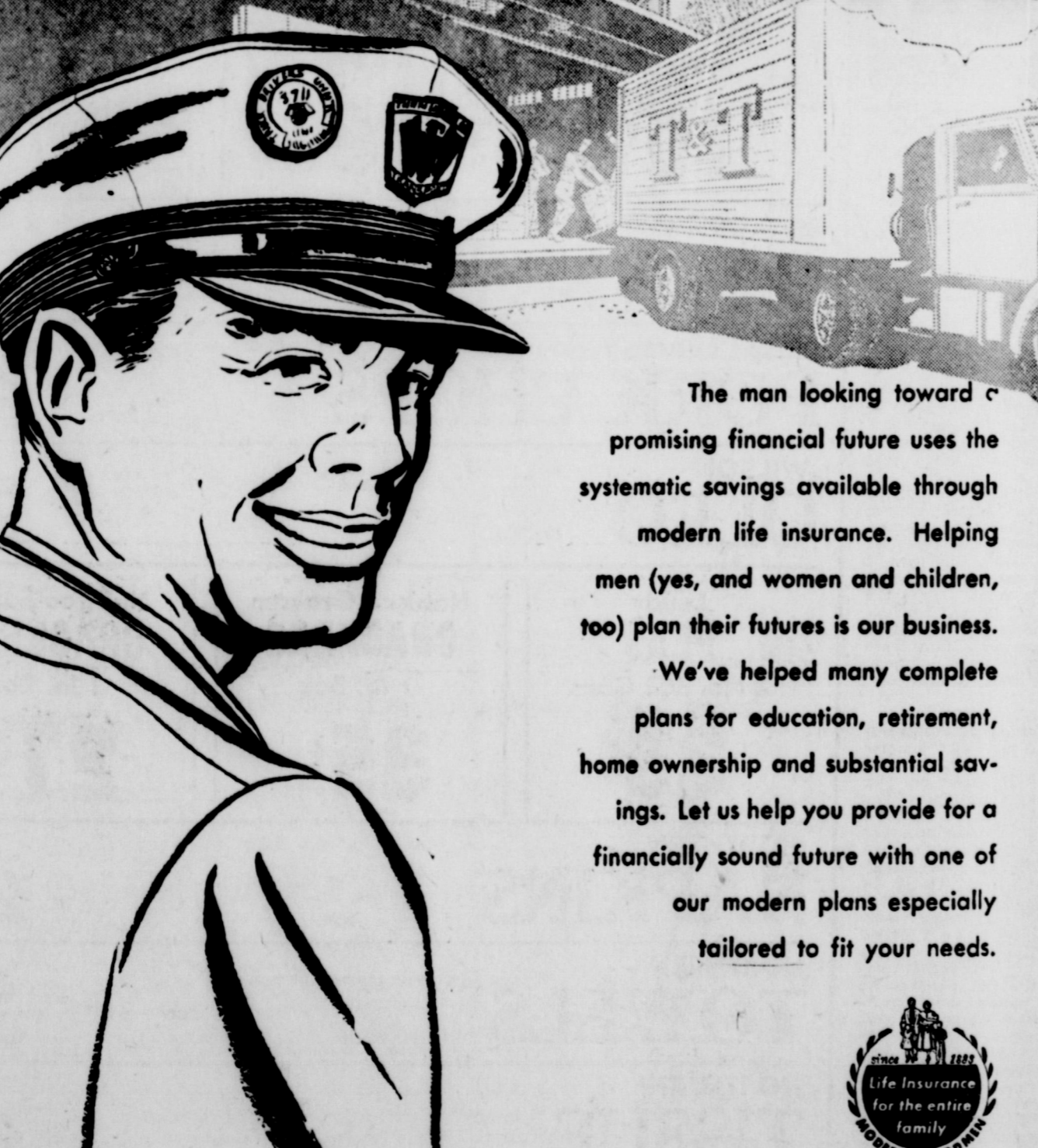

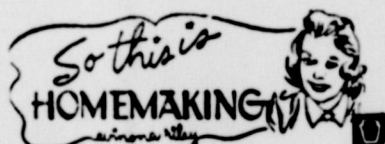

WHEELER COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

Early planted grass does better than late planting most of the time. Many farmers report twice as much grass on early plantings as on late season planting. Research and the experience of the Soil Conservation Service show that the early seedlings have less competition from weeds and a larger percentage of survival.

Farmers who drill grass in a dead litter cover of broadcast sorghums or sudan grass increase their chances of a good stand by three to one. Seeding in weeds or in a growing crop such as small grain is risky. Less than half of such plantings make a start and those that do require about two years longer. Without the dead cover, the seed often gets buried too deep to come up or the seedlings are burned by drifting soil.

Government cost-sharing on grass seeding is available from the ACP or from the Great Plains Program. Soil Conservation Service personnel assisting the Wheeler District will be glad to help farmers select the grasses best adapted to their soil and soil erosion, and the different types of assistance available.

test for the allowance of a dependent is provided the multiple support agreement. If you are one of a group of persons who contributed more than one-half of the support of an individual you may designate one of the group to claim the dependent if:

- (1) Each of the group contributes more than ten percent (but not over one-half) of the support of an individual.
- (2) The amount contributed by the group is more than one-half of the support.
- (3) Each one of the group is otherwise entitled to claim the dependent except for failure to meet the support test.
- (4) Each member of the group (except the one claiming the dependent) files a written declaration that he will not claim the dependent in that year.

For example:

Two brothers and two sisters each contribute 25 percent of the support of their father. Neither of the four meets the support test and cannot claim the exemption except under the multiple support agreement.

They may decide among themselves which one will claim the dependent. Then the other three must sign the written declaration to be filed with the return of the brother or sister claiming the dependent, the IRC representative said.

Red Cross Trains Young And Old To Save Lives

"Good things happen when you serve."

And there could be no better, no greater service than the saving of human life.

Linda Gibson of St. Paul, Minn., is one of the youngest Americans who discovered that feeling in 1959. The 10-year-old school girl saved the life of her 2-year-old sister, Joyce, using a technique of artificial respiration recommended and taught by the Red Cross for nearly three years.

Joyce, ill with a high fever, suddenly went limp and stopped breathing.

"Joyce is the only baby sister I've got. I just HAD to do something," Linda Kay said matter-of-factly. "What she did was to start exhaling her own breath into Joyce's mouth."

"I remembered reading in the newspaper how one kid saved another kid's life by breathing into his mouth," she said. "So I thought it might work with Joyce. To get more air, I ran outside with her in my arms, and breathed into her mouth. Once in a while she would sort of gasp a little and stop breathing. I was half crying but I kept at it."

The Red Cross adopted mouth-to-mouth respiration to restore breathing in infants and small children in mid-1957. Last year, it extended approval to the method to its use on adults, though continuing to endorse two manual techniques. These are the Nielsen back pressure-arm lift method and the Sylvester chest pressure method.

Artificial respiration is one of many skills for emergency care of the injured which the Red Cross has taught since it launched its national program of continuous first aid instruction just 50 years ago.

Since January 1, 1910 the organization has issued 21,000,000

certificates to parents who have completed its first aid courses, 959,000 last year. Courses are now being taught in more than 2,500 Red Cross chapters throughout the country and they are also offered to U. S. servicemen and their dependents at domestic military installations and in the principal overseas theaters.

Its twofold purpose is to reduce accidents by making Americans more aware of their causes and to save lives of accident victims and lessen the effects of injuries resulting when accidents happen.

Now in its 46th year of "Waterproofing" America, Red Cross Water Safety Service last year issued 1,554,300 certificates to persons who completed courses in swimming, lifesaving, and operation of small boats and canoes.
