## Large Group Attends Local Chamber Meet

Attendance was very good at the Monthly Dinner Meeting of the Chamber of Commerce Tuesday Night, March 15. There were about 40 people present and they were treated to some of Nora's good fried chicken as well as some very informative discussion of matter pertaining to the Town of Wheeler and the economic progress of the area.

George Taylor, who always treats his listeners to a good talk, made the principal address on the subject of one of the major crops produced in Wheeler County. This Crop is Wildlife and the harvesting of it. He brought out the fact that about 135,000 dollars is spent in Wheeler County Annually by Hunters and Fisherman. He also gave detailed information on how this resource can be better managed and better economic harvest be reaped from it while at the same time conserving our Game and fish in a better way than it is being done at the present. There were quite a few raised eyebrows evident during George's talk. It seems that we have been searching for a diamond mine all over the world while we had one in our own back yard. Let's see what we can do about it.

During the business session of the meeting, the committee reports indicated that there is quite a bit of activity going on in a business like way in the committees of the Chamber. This writer was very surprised to learn of the some of the projects that are being carried out and well on their way.

The Housing situation is still tight but Thurman Rives reported that bad weather had held us

back in this field and there should be results obtained if the weather ever breaks. Rives reported that there are no houses available in our town where newcomers might locate.

Civic events committee reports that the float was ready for the Shamrock parade on Thursday and should be one of which we can be proud.

T. J. Daughtry reported that his committee was busy in their work trying to help the rural areas acquire telephones. Negotiations have been initiated and some results might be obtained in a reasonably near future.

## Peggy Puryear Speaks At LOCAL KIWANIS MEETING

Peggy Puryear, 13-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Puryear, of Kelton, was the guest speaker at the regular noon meeting of the Wheeler Kiwanis Club.

Peggy's speech was enjoyed so much by the Kiwanis club this writer thought the readers of the Times might enjoy the same.

Her speech was as follows:

Gentlemen—I am happy to have the opportunity to talk to you for these few minutes about 4-H. It has meant a lot to me.

4-H is a sound youth organization built upon developing the individual. We learn to work and play together. We are supervised by trained extension agents and adult leaders. The younger members are also helped by older, experienced junior leaders. We learn group participation, and individual responsibility for our own projects in daily life.

One of the first things we are taught, and must maintain if we are to succeed in our work, is record keeping. You, as business men know the importance of keeping records and we are learning. Our record book shows each project we have—the time and money we have spent, and the benefits we received from them. We can look back to each year and plan how to do better and see what we've been doing wrong. It contains pictures of our projects and activities.

We learn to try. By trying I have learned a little about feeding out a calf and hogs. I wrote an essay to win a Sears Foundation gift that didn't place too well in the show ring—her tail had

been frozen off, and the judge took for the pig with the curly tail. But she raised a good litter of pigs that won first place in the County heavy litter—weight contest in 1958. Last fall at the Wheeler Fair I won the trophy for champion female on a gilt that came from my Dad's stock. He is an adult leader in the Kelton Club where my brother, Tommy and I are members. Tommy had grand champion mal at the Shamrock fair last year. I have learned new skills in cooking and sewing and I'm not nearly so scared today as I was the first time I tried public speaking in 4-H.

Our county camp is something we look forward to each year, and also the monthly recreation parties that bring the county 4-H'ers together.

We have a total of 15 clubs in Wheeler County with an enrollment of 354. 13 of these clubs meet in the schools, 2 of them outside. From these 15 clubs members are elected to serve on the county 4-H Council and I have been and am honored to be a member of the council. We have 48 adult leaders in the county who help in every phase of our work—from stock raising to home management. We are grateful to these leaders for their time and assistance.

## Highway Patrol Investigates 7 Accidents in County

Texas Department of Public Safety investigated 7 rural accidents in Wheeler County during the month of February according to Sergeant E. C. Allen, Jr.

In making this announcement, the Sergeant reported 4 property damage, 3 injury and 0 fatal accidents. These wrecks caused a total property damage of \$2,520.00 with 7 persons injured and 0 killed.

The Highway Patrol Supervisor reminded motorists that Texas law requires registered motor vehicles to have valid inspection stickers displayed by midnight, April 15. "In addition, all trailers registered in Texas which exceed 4,000 pounds gross weight must be inspected," the Sergeant said.

The Motor Vehicle Inspection Program, since the inception in 1951, has reduced the state's traffic accidents by almost 10 percent, the Sergeant explained. Before the Inspection Program was started, mechanical defects in vehicles was a causative factor in 13 percent of the state's accidents. However, only four per cent of the traffic accidents are caused by mechanical defects now.

The Patrol Supervisor stated that only 31 per cent of the vehicles in this county have been inspected and that patrolmen will be stopping all vehicles not displaying a valid sticker after the April 15 deadline. The best way to avoid the long lines expected in the last minute rush is to have your vehicle inspected now.

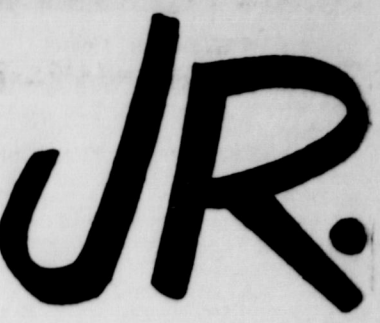

**COUNTY ASC NEWS**

**MINIMUM COTTON SALES** — The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced March 1 that the minimum sales prices for 1959 and prior crops of upland cotton in its inventory will be the higher of (1) the market price, as determined by the Commodity Credit Corporation, or (2) 115 per cent of the Choice (B) loan rate during the 1960-61 marketing year.

For 1960-crop cotton, the minimum sales price will be 110 per cent of the Choice (B) loan rate when sold by local sales agencies and will be the higher of (1) the market price, as determined by CCC, or (2) 110 percent of such Choice (B) rate sold by the New Orleans CSS Commodity Office.

Department officials announced that this determination of minimum sales levels is to place emphasis on farmers' marketing of 1960-crop cotton.

It was also announced that carrying charges will be added in connection with the sales, beginning with 10 points in October and increasing 20 points per month for each month thereafter.

**SAVINGS BONDS** — Series E bonds now mature in 7 years 9 months, get an automatic extension of 10 years. By exchanging them for 10-year income-paying Series H you can defer paying income tax on the E bond interest until you cash the H bond.

**DESTROYING EXCESS WHEAT** — The final date for disposition of excess wheat is May 10. Farmers with seeded or volunteer wheat in excess of their allotment or 15.0 acres must destroy all excess by the above date to avoid marketing quota penalties.

There is an important change concerning the disposition of excess wheat by plowing or disk-ing. Credit can only be given for areas plowed in regular shape with not more than four sides. There must be two sides parallel with each other. These restrictions may be disregarded only if the crop in an entire field or subdivision of a field is destroyed in disposing of the excess acreage.

## HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS FROM YOUR STATE CAPITAL

AUSTIN, Tex. — Texas politicians have been finding it hard to make hay with no sun shining.

A number of statewide candidates are stumping the state, and legislative contenders are getting invitations to speak at rallies and before special groups.

But bad weather and unaccustomed earliness of this year's election schedule have made it harder for most to get campaigns rolling.

Legislative candidates report they are most often quizzed on whether the favor (1) a teacher pay raise and (2) a general sales tax. "Yes" to the first and "no" to the second are generally regarded as safest answers. But many old hands have misgivings, feeling that the two commitments together put them in a hard situation come the next session.

**AMENDMENT LINE-UP**—In the hoopla of a presidential campaign year, amendments to the Texas constitution probably will get only secondary attention, though they are of vital importance to all Texans.

Four are to be voted on by people at the general election Nov. 8. Their order on the ballot, as determined by a drawing conducted by Secretary of State Zolle Steakley, will be:

1. An amendment authorizing the Legislature to create a hospital district in Lamar and Hidalgo counties.

2. An amendment authorizing the veterans Land Board to issue bonds at 3 1/2 percent interest instead of the present 3 percent maximum.

3. An amendment giving members of the Legislature annual salaries of \$4,800 a year and \$12 per day allowances for a 120-day session. Sessions could go no longer than 140 days.

4. An amendment authorizing the Legislature to license and regulate lenders and fix maximum rates of interest.

**SCHOOL COSTS JUMP**—A baby boom of the fifties means soaring school bills in the sixties, as indicated by the State Board of Education's 1960-61 estimate.

Board reported that cost of Texas public school program for next year will be \$365,000,000. This is an increase of some \$15,000,000 over the previous year.

Reason for the rise is more children—requiring more teachers, more books, more desks, etc. Total enrollment for next year is expected to be 2,254,574, an increase of more than a half million since the 1954-55 year.

Counties will have to pay \$73,080,000 or 29 percent of the \$250,000,000 total cost.

**"SLEEPY VILLAGES" GO BIG TIME**—Twenty-one small Texas towns mushroomed into cities during the fifties.

Texas Municipal League reported on towns that had grown 150 percent or more—some as much as 1,617 percent.

Twelve of the 21 big growers are towns near to one of Texas' three largest cities—Dallas, Houston, and Fort Worth. Topping the list with runaway expansion were three Dallas County towns—Irving, up 1,323 percent and Farmers Branch, up 1,211 percent.

Industrialization was the key to the spectacular growth of most of the 21. In a number of cases, the coming of a single large plant started the boom rolling.

**TEACHER FUND GROWS**—Texas' teachers retirement fund has increased more than 35 percent in the past decade, according to State Auditor C. H. Cavness.

Cavness reported that at the end of the last fiscal year the fund stood at \$89,341,283. This is \$140,000,000 more than 10 years ago.

Teachers pay 6 percent of their earnings up to \$4,400 into fund. State matches their payments.

Fund provides for a minimum of \$100 per month retirement pay for teachers and \$75 a month for

other school employees. To make the fund grow, it is invested in municipal, state and federal bonds and certain corporate securities trustees.

**ATOMIC DISPOSAL HIT**—Water pollution by atomic waste material could pose a real threat to public health, fish and wildlife in Texas, said Gov. Price Daniel.

Daniel praised the Sportsmen's Clubs of Texas for their concern over a proposal made at one time to dump concrete containers of low grade radioactive waste materials in the Gulf of Mexico.

State Health Department, said the governor, keeps a continuous check on the state's surface water for atomic pollution from fallout.

**NEED FOR ECONOMY CITED**—Need for the next Legislature to raise between \$150,000,000 and \$200,000,000 in new tax revenue has been predicted by the director of the Texas Research League.

Alvin A. Burger, head of the private organization which studies state government, said state spending will require \$1,000,000,000 a year in the 1961-63 biennium.

Burger urged careful analysis of the highway, education and welfare programs which take 85 percent of the state budget.

As the money saver he recommended taking the cost of maintaining farm-to-market roads out of the farm road funds. At present, this money can be used only for new construction and farm road repair has to be paid out of other highway funds.

He suggested school consolidation as another avenue for economy. County governments, he said, need reorganization to eliminate duplication and problems in the efficient handling of money.

**CAR INSPECTION DUE**—Drive without green Texas-shaped stickers on their car windshields are advised to stop by an inspection station the first pretty day.

Department of Public Safety estimates that only about half of the 4,300,000 vehicles in Texas have had their 1960 inspection Deadline is April 15. Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., DPS director, suggests that the trip be made soon, before the lines get long.
