Years Of Success Story Of Forresters

EDITOR'S NOTE: As you already know, Mr. and Mrs. Forrester have sold their insurance and abstract company to Hiram Whitener and Thurman Rives. This writer thought it might be interesting to recall a few of the highlights in the lives of Mr. and Mrs. Forrester.

The Forresters were married in 1920, they had met a few years earlier when Miss Mitchener, as she was known then, brought her speech class to Wheeler and presented a play for the Wheeler students entitled "Call of the Wilds". However, Forrester contends that he knew her several years before the play.

History reveals that Mr. Forrester was superintendent of schools for 3 or 4 terms in Wheeler, followed by a superintendent position in the Mobeetie school. His tenure as superintendent of the Wheeler school was interrupted for a short time during world war I. He enlisted in the service from Wheeler in 1917 and was soon made a sergeant first class and was about to become an officer when the war ended.

While superintendent of the Wheeler schools Mr. Forrester was responsible for the first Annual and he helped organize the first home-ec department in Wheeler. In 1923 Forrester decided to run for county and district clerk, and he won. After two terms as clerk he was elected county judge. He served one term.

In 1926, while employed as a deputy county clerk in Wheeler, Mrs. Doris Forrester purchased a small established insurance agency, which was being operated in connection with an abstract business. There were two other agencies in the town at that time, both of which were connected with banks. At the beginning of the depression Mrs. Forrester bought them and thus her agency became the largest agency in the northern part of the county.

The building which has housed the Forrester Insurance Agency for many years was constructed in 1927 for a filling station and in 1930 the building was remodeled to house the insurance, abstract office. Later in 1948 the dwelling which Mr. and Mrs. Forrester now live was constructed.

In addition to Mr. Forrester's tenure as county judge, and county and district clerk, he served as mayor of Wheeler for 16 years. And was secretary manager of the National Farm Loan Association in Wheeler from 1938 until his retirement in 1957.

To many of the people of Wheeler it may come as a surprise to learn that Mr. Forrester has four degrees. They include: "Doctor of Divinity," "Doctor of Law," "Doctor of Philosophy" and "Doctor of Literature". He is a 32 degree member of the Masonic Lodge.

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FINAL RITES ARE HELD FOR LULA IRONS

Tribute to the memory of Mrs. Lula Lee Irons was paid in final rites Tuesday at 3:00 o'clock in the First Baptist Church of Wheeler. Rev. Strauss Atkinson, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Canyon, read the services.

Mrs. Irons, a resident of Amarillo for the last 17 years and a former long time resident of Wheeler, died Monday morning at 2:40 in Northwest Texas Hospital of complications following surgery two weeks earlier. Service were held in Amarillo at 11 o'clock at the Blackburn-Shaw Funeral Chapel with Dr. W. Winfred Moore, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Amarillo, officiating.

Lula Lee Bibby was born December 15, 1877 in Eden, Ala., the daughter of Martha Jane Mullins Bibby and James Hardy Bibby. She moved to Texas with her family when seven years old. On January 8, 1902 she was married to Robert Irons at Cumby, Tex. In March 1913 the Irons family moved to Wheeler and settled on their farm two miles west of town. In 1921 they moved to Canyon so that their oldest daughter could attend college, and they continued to live there at various times until all four daughters had completed their college education. The family again took up residence in Wheeler.

Mrs. Irons died in Amarillo June 9, 1956.

VOTERS PICK INCUMBENTS

Wheeler voters went to the polls Tuesday and picked incumbents James Verden, Dorsie Hutchinson and W. D. Mitchell to serve another term as city councilmen.

Mayor Thomas Daughtry will also serve another term as mayor.

The unofficial returns as released by election judge A. B. Crump are as follows: Thomas Daughtry - 58 Dorsie Hutchinson - 51, W. D. Mitchell - 59 James Verden - 56, and Frank Caswell - 24.

And Bill Owen received two write-in votes for mayor.

The official returns will be tabulated and released at the next regular meeting of the city council.

The total number of votes cast according to Crump, was 65.

Rep. Grainger McIlhany Is Honored By Texas Animal Health Council

Approximately 200 persons, including farmers, stockmen, state senators and representatives, attended a dinner honoring State Rep. Grainger McIlhany for "outstanding achievement in legislation in the field of agriculture."

Among the achievements that McIlhany was honored for included nine bills in the animal health council program which were designed to comply with the federal requirements so that Texas

Livestock can be shipped to all parts of the United States without tests and quarantine. The principal bills in this program are the brucellosis control bill and the livestock auction inspection bill.

The dinner was held Monday night in the Starlight Room of the Coronado Inn.

Harold Nelson, chairman of the state dairy association, in making a presentation of a new watch to McIlhany, said "It is with the

deepest appreciation for the fine work you have done for agriculture in your district, that we, the 31 organizations sponsoring this affair, present you with this token of our esteem."

Charlie Scruggs, associate editor of the Progressive Farmer magazine, was the principal speaker. Scruggs addressed the group on food production. He said "We are lucky to be able to live in America and in this wonderful State of

ours, where food is no problem. In the United States, food is the finest bargain in the world today. We can expect no shortage of food in the future."

He told the audience of electronic data processing machines that actually plan farms. He said the machines, after being "fed" data on the land in question reveal the number of cattle, sheep, hogs or other animals that can be raised successfully, which crops to plant, and how to rotate those crops to the best advantage.

He said "This is a real and sacred heritage we should protect at all costs."

He pointed out that several years ago Texas had the reputation of being a "dumping ground" for diseased and inferior animals. He said "through the efforts of 31 farm organizations, and with the full cooperation of legislators like Grainger McIlhany, a work program was set up that has resulted in the emergence of Texas as an outstanding livestock producing state."

Hemphill Deputy Recovering From Gunshot Wounds

Hemphill Deputy Sheriff Walter Adams was listed as "improved" but still on the "hospital list" by attendants at the Hemphill County Hospital.

Deputy Adams underwent surgery early Saturday, March 19 and was kept under oxygen for sometime after his arrival at the hospital with a collapsed lung.

He was shot in the upper right chest by a former patient of the Wichita Falls State Mental Hospital. The shooting occurred about 10 a.m. Wednesday March 16 in the Sheriff's office.

The gunman, Wesley Thompson, 45, a Hemphill County farmer, entered the office on the pretense of purchasing a set of auto license tags. When Adams approached the window where Thompson was standing, the gunman raised a .22 caliber single shot rifle and fired.

Thompson who had made threats against Sheriff Rathje and members of his own family was taken to Dallas Wednesday afternoon and admitted to a mental hospital there.

Thompson lives about 15 miles south of Canadian.

Deputy Adams is a brother of Carol Adams of Wheeler.

FORMOSA (FHTNC)—Marine Acting Sgt. James W. Coward, son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter R. Coward of Mobeetie, Tex., took part in a huge amphibious landing exercise, March 22, on Formosa's southern coast with units of the Okinawa-based Third Marine Division.

The exercise, termed "Operation Blue Star" called for the Third Marine Division to assemble in the area on March 20 along with units of the Hawaii-based First Marine Brigade and U. S. Republic of China Navy, marine and air force elements.

Purpose of the operation, which comprised over 18,000 Marines and 70 Navy ships, was to promote closer working relations between U. S. and Republic of China forces in practicing the conventional and vertical assault type amphibious landings.
