## Local Post Office To Give Faster Service To Patrons

Better and faster mail service will be the result of recent changes in dispatching time and mail routing according to an announcement made by Virgil Jamison, Local Postmaster, this week. Beginning Friday, April 22, 1960 the last dispatch of the day will be at 5:00 P.M. This will allow more mail to be given one day service in and out of Wheeler.

Following the change to take effect on Friday all mail is deposited at the Post Office up to 5:00 P.M. will be dispatched on that day. The past dispatch time has been 4:00 P.M. so this will result in important mail having one more hour to be worked out by people in Wheeler before it will be too late to mail it.

This change is in line with the Department policy of improving Mail service to all points by setting up system improvements to move the mail faster. The Motto of the Dept. has been: "Move to-day's mail today, in a business like way" and this new Moto system is designed to do just that. All mail within a 250 mile circle of Wheeler will arrive for delivery next morning at its destination, and most mail will reach much further than that by the next morning.

The Post Office Dept. hopes that within the reasonably near future any letter mailed in the U.S. A. will be delivered the next day anywhere in the country. The plan being put into effect now is one step in the overall planning being set up to accomplish this proposed goal.

Judge Geo. Hefley was in charge of the special program and the following is a copy of the speech he made before presenting Dr. Nicholson with a plaque and Mrs. Nicholson with a corsage.

Judge Hefley had this to say about Dr. Nicholson, "Dr. Nicholson, you were born on February 7, 1889 in Valley Head, Ala. You attended Public Schools there and was reared in Valley Head. You enrolled at the University of Alabama School of Medicine at Mobile and continued your studies there until 1909 when you transferred to Southwestern University School of Medicine at Dallas. You attended Southwestern for your senior year, and was graduated there on April 28, 1910. At that time Southwestern was a branch of SMU. Since then, Baylor University College of Medicine took over that school and you have a diploma from both Southwestern and Baylor.

Upon graduation, you interned at the Texas and Pacific Railroad Hospital in Marshall, Tex. Upon completion of your internship, you practiced for a short time at Retugo, Tex., and at Lancaster, Tex. Then you took a contract practice on a large plantation near Hughes, Ark. While there you made your calls on horseback and carried the medicine in the saddle bags. ## What Is The Answer?

A little over a year ago several dozen men met, sampled public opinion, formulated plans, and set out to raise \$50,000 to build a Television Translator System for Wheeler County, because they thought the people wanted such a system.

Now 15 months and \$47,000 later, this same small group of men is about to form the opinion that they were wrong.

The system, which cost \$47,000, not counting legal, advertising and insurance expense, is offering three major networks to area TV viewers. Granted the reception is not excellent everywhere, but did you really expect it to be perfect?

Both good and bad reports about reception came into this office from all over the county. Nevertheless, more than 800 families in the county are using the UHF system. And believe it or not, over 200 of these families have not paid their \$60.00 "tie on" fee. You're right, it's not compulsory, but what about morals. Or is that something we have all forgotten.

And that's not all, of the 600 families that have paid their \$60.00 fee only a handful of them are paying their monthly rental, which is only \$1.00

At present the system has enough money to continue operation for one more month. Unless they received enough money in the next few days to meet operating expenses and pay off the \$3,000 balance which is still owed on the equipment... who knows what will happen. If you are one of the families mentioned above, send in a check today, if you don't have the money, the Farm Bureau has a financial plan where by you can pay the \$60.00 off at \$5.00 per month.

## Agent Tells How To 'Get Rid' Of Skunks

Several calls have come into the County Agent's Office on how to get rid of skunks that are under houses. A leaflet put out by the Wildlife Specialist, Extension Service, says to use a one by six board about eight feet long and a large size garbage can with the board running from the ground to the top of the garbage can. Then bait the garbage can with sardines and table scraps (meat) to draw the skunks. Try to keep all dogs and cats penned. Early next morning after baiting the traps approach the can very quietly, with garbage can lid in hand. Look into the can cautiously and if the skunk is present, carefully place lid on can. Do not expose your face to the animal, Agent Swain said.

Secure the lid with a rope or wire and haul to an isolated area. Remove lid, turn can over with a board and dispose of the skunk with a gun.

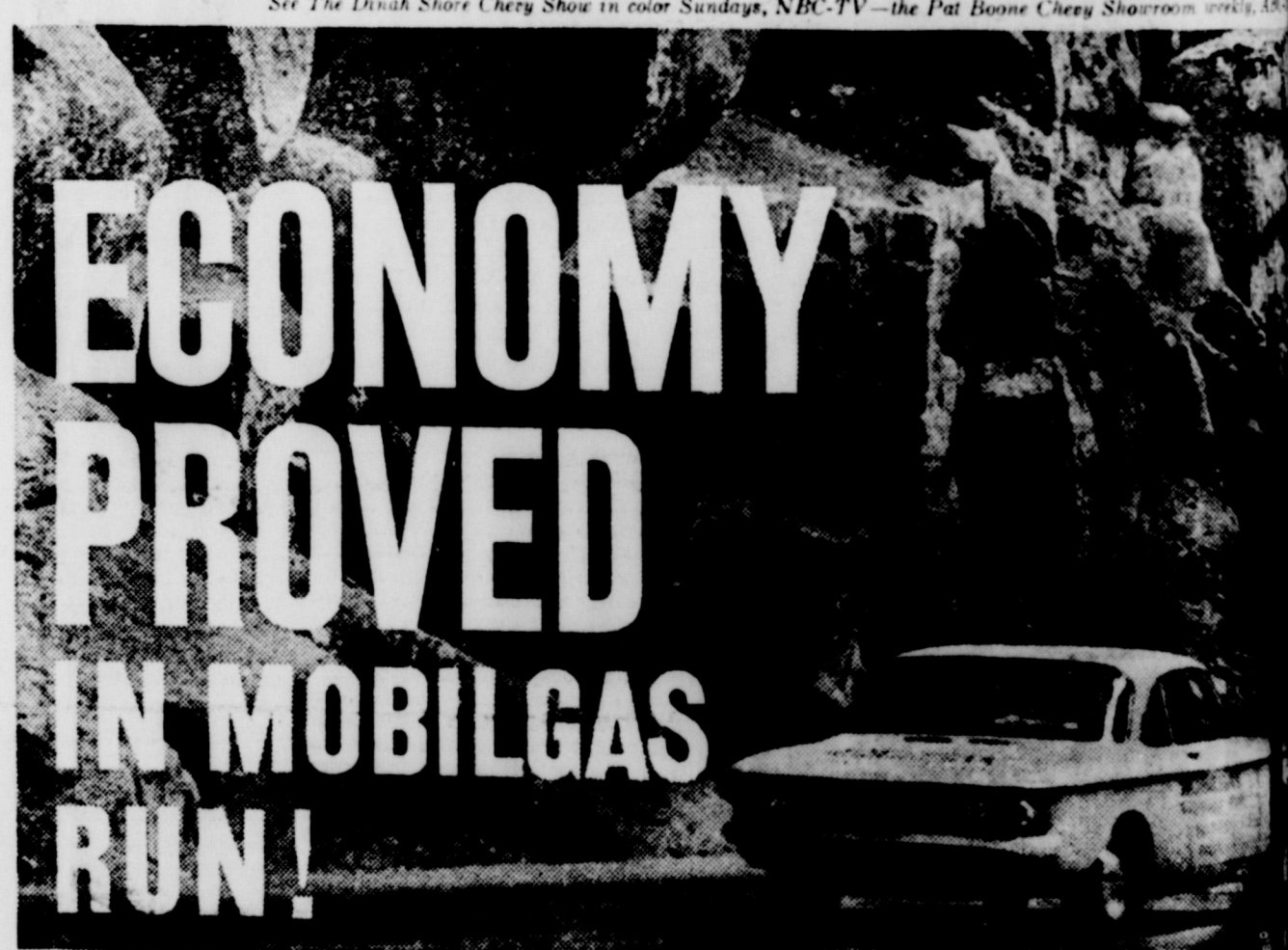

**WHEELER COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS**

Deferred grazing is one of the best conservation treatments that can be given to rangeland. It does not mean losing the use of a pasture for a year. The forage can be harvested after the deferment period is up.

Deferring during the growing season makes the good grass plants stronger and allow them to make seed. After the seeds are ripe and beginning to fall, the grass may be grazed with little damage. Two pastures can be altered and still carry as many cattle as if both are grazed year-long. Deferring does more when moisture is good. It often pays more to defer rather than overseed some old fields or badly depleted rangeland. Some areas that were planned for reseeding in 1960 were rested in 1959. The grass came back so well that seeding will not be needed. The saving in seed cost alone will pay good rent on the land for the rest period.

The Soil Conservation District and the Soil Conservation Service

will help plan systems of grazing that will include rest periods for pastures. The ACP will assist ranchers where cross-fences are needed to better manage grazing.

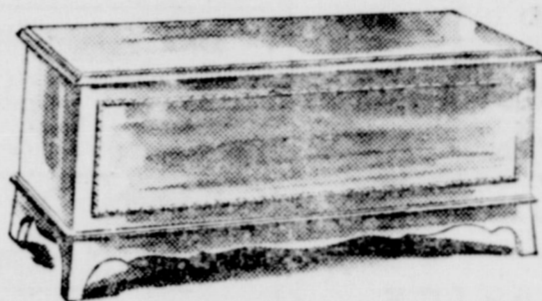

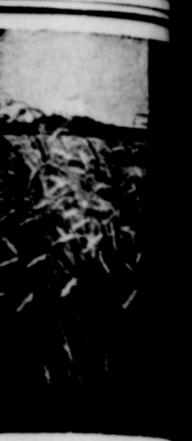

## HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS FROM YOUR STATE CAPITAL

AUSTIN, Tex. — A 30-member committee appointed by Gov. Price Daniel will meet May 16, to begin work on a tall task.

Assignment of the State Finance Advisory Committee will be to suggest every possible economy in state government and recommend a tax program to put the state on a sound financial basis.

For the immediate future the tax program is to wipe out the general revenue fund deficit, which the governor estimates will be \$30,000,000 at the end of this fiscal year, and provide \$35,000,000 for teacher pay raises.

Committee is to be made up of leading citizens in both public and private life. Six already have been named. They are Secretary of State Zollie Steadley who will be chairman; Jess Irwin, the governor's budget director; Jon Ford, administrative assistant to the governor; Dr. John R. Stockton, director of the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research; John B. McKee of Dallas, Ford Motor Co. executive; and Hugo Lowenstern, Amarillo real estate man.

Gov. Daniel said he would ask the committee to search for revenue sources other than general sales tax or state income tax.

He hopes, said the governor, that the committee will work out some recommendations soon so that a special session can be called this year to pass teacher pay raises. Under Texas' requirement for pay-as-you-go financing, the Legislature would have to pass taxes to wipe out the deficit before it could vote funds for the school improvement program.

TEACHER RAISE ENDORSED — Nearly three-fourths of the candidates for Legislature this year have told the Texas State Teachers Association they favor pay raise for teachers.

Some qualified their statements to indicate that getting the pay raise might be an easier-said-than-done proposition.

Of 431 candidates for the Senate and House, 336 answered TSTA's questionnaire, and 293 said they approved the Hale-Aikin school program.

Asked if they would vote the necessary taxes for it, 252 promised support outright. Others added conditions on the kinds of taxes they would approve.

LOAN PLAN DISAPPROVED — Third Court of Civil Appeals has held the certificate plan used by some loan companies is unconstitutional.

Loan companies involved in the test case are expected to appeal to the State Supreme Court.

Under the certificate plan, the borrower of \$100 would agree to repay his loan through monthly payments on an investment certificate for \$110. This, according

to the Attorney General's Department, forces the borrower to pay more than the permitted 10 per cent interest because the interest does not drop as he pays off the principal.

Loan companies, which won the first round in district court, contend that the same procedure is used by banks, saving and loan associations and other lending institutions.

Attorney General's Department replied that there is no specific provision prohibiting other institutions from computing interest in this manner.

SCHOOL BUYING CRITICIZED — Clothing purchases at the Texas Blind, Deaf and Orphan School for Colored and Austin were far in excess of use during the past 18 months, State Auditor C. H. Cavness reported.

Cavness said his audit turned up excess clothing purchases totaling \$3,824. In all, he said 3,042 articles of clothing were bought, but only 75 articles were issued to the children.

He said he had received no reasonable explanation for the discrepancy. Cavness suggested that the Texas Youth Council, which oversees state schools for needy and handicapped children, make an inventory and transfer surplus items to other schools.

CITIZEN INTEREST URGED — Texas Law Enforcement Foundation has called on individual citizens to feel responsible for the way the law is observed in their communities.

Citing no specific instances, the TLEF executive committee said that "a breakdown in citizen responsibility must precede any breakdown in law enforcement."

Three new members have been elected to the TLEF executive committee. They are Neill Masterson Jr. of Houston, W. B. Jones of San Angelo and Radeliffe Killam of Laredo. Dolph Bise Jr. of Uvalde is now secretary of the committee.

Plans are under way to expand the foundation's board to include representatives from every part of the state and to set up a program to assist families of law enforcement officers killed on duty.

DON'T WORRY ABOUT IT — State Supreme Court has again refused to get involved in a dispute as to whether a Dallas district judge can hold a railway president in contempt of court because trains blocked a Dallas street.

However, the high court repeated, with emphasis, its belief that the district court order is void and "no trial judge will attempt to enforce" it.

Dallas Dist. Judge Jack Thornton sentenced M-K-T President W. N. Deramus to 240 days in jail and levied a \$4,000 fine because Katy trains blocked a street for more than five minutes at a time against the judge's order. Since then, an underpass was begun.

Deramus, a St. Louis, Mo., resident, has sought to avoid coming to Texas to appear in Thornton's court despite the Supreme Court's reassurances. Thornton has declared he would put the railway executive in jail.

SHORT SNORTS — Texas permanent school fund totals \$413,231,236, according to a report to the

State Board of Education. Fund is built up by revenue from mineral lease bonuses, rentals and oil and gas royalties on public lands set aside for schools. Only the income for investment of the fund can be spent.

A record number of Texans have qualified themselves to vote this year. State Comptroller Boh Calvert estimates that total axes plus exemptions will total 2,559,000. This compares to 2,110,000 in 1956.

Prices received for Texas farm and ranch products increased two per cent last month, said the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, but were nine per cent below a year ago.
