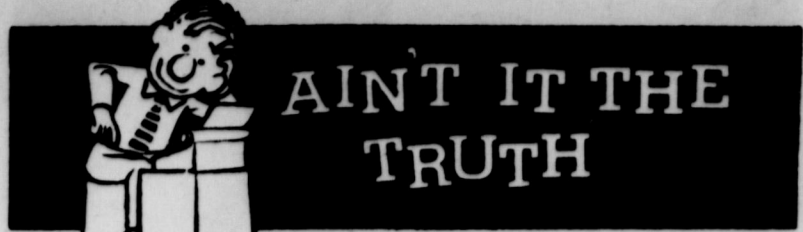

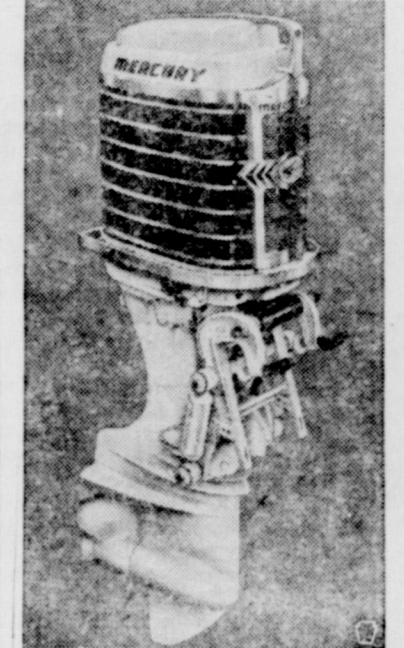

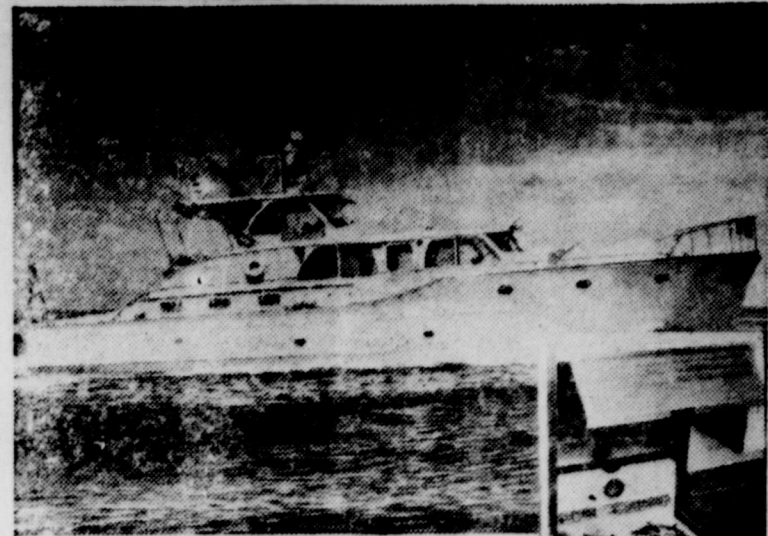

Stainless Steel Goes To Sea



Among the innovations designed to make

is the application of a metal already familiar
in marine hardware, stainless steel, to the new galley accessory
shown over the range at right, a self-contained range hood that
banishes smoke, grease and cooking odors from the air.

The accessory is made of
stainless steel for the same rea-
son so many fittings — from
bow rails to flagpole lights —
now come in the durable metal.
It never tarnishes; it requires
only infrequent rinse downs and
wiping to maintain shipshape
luster; and it remains virtually
impervious to the salt air that
wreaks havoc with so many
other metals.

The ductless hood, which is
currently installed in the Fan-
T-Sea, III, a seagoing cruiser,
attaches in place with only four
screws — no ducts, pipes, or
outside louvers are utilized.
Dual filters and a built-in fan
cleanse and recirculate the air
in the confines of the galley
even more quickly than the
once-every-10-minutes cycle in
an average-size home kitchen.

Air is first filtered by a spe-
cial mesh to remove grease. The
balance of the contaminants are
eliminated by an activated char-
coal filter which captures min-
ute foreign particles by adsorp-
tion in a labyrinth of pores.

The hood, made by The Duct-
less Hood Co., Inc., 601 Plan-
dome Road, Manhasset, New
York, is constructed of stain-
less steel for resistance against
denting and scratching as well
as for ease of cleaning. Maint-
aining the filters is easy, too.
The grease filter simply snaps
out for washing. The char-
coal filter can be reactivated
when necessary by baking
it in an oven.

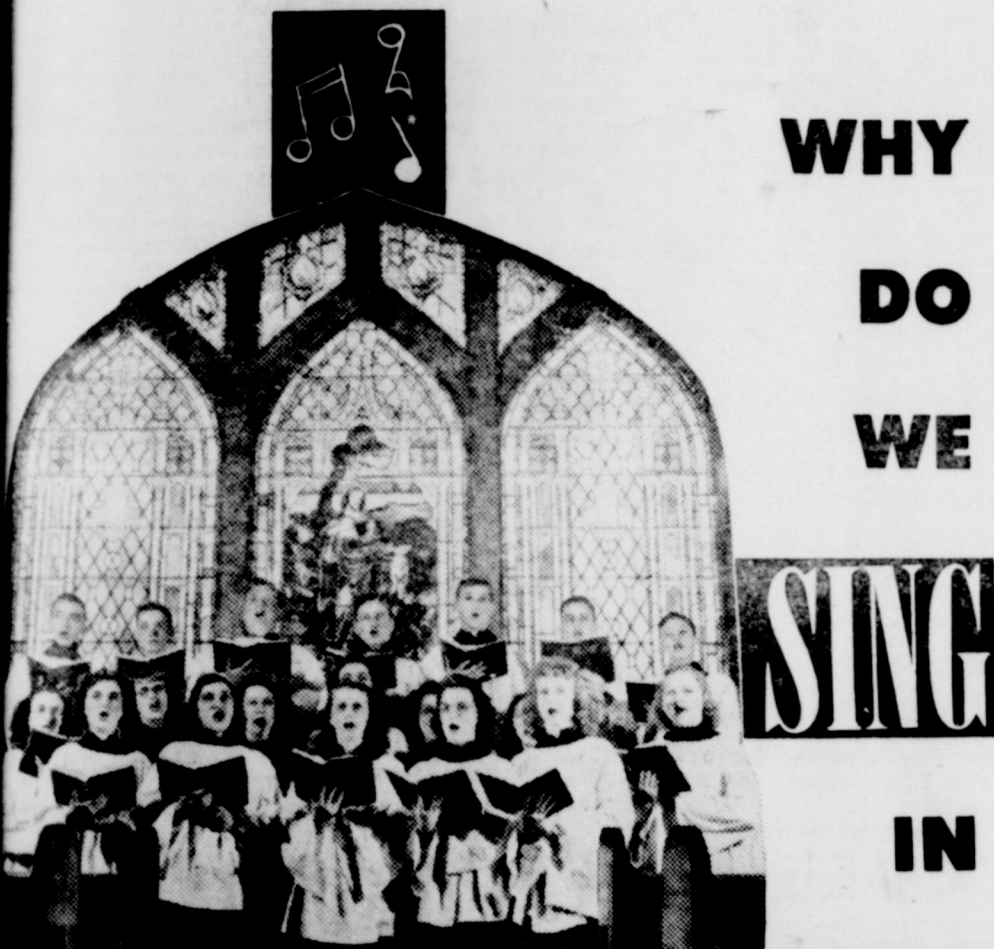

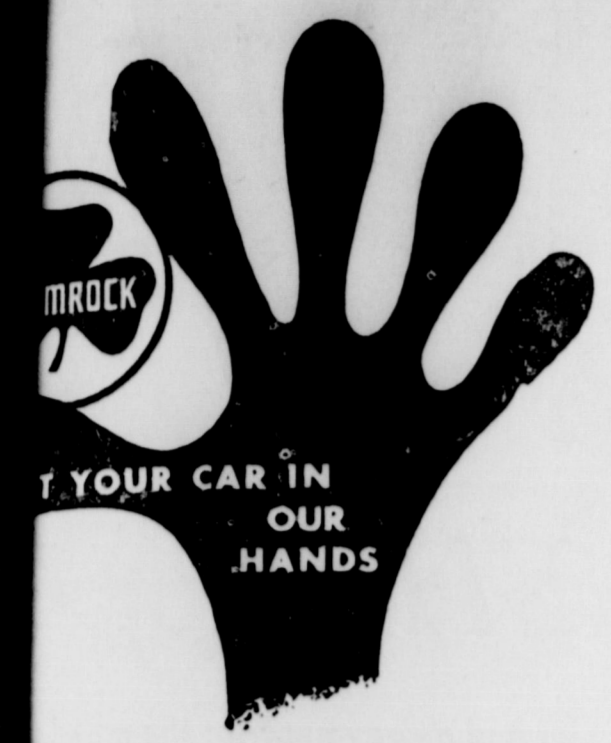

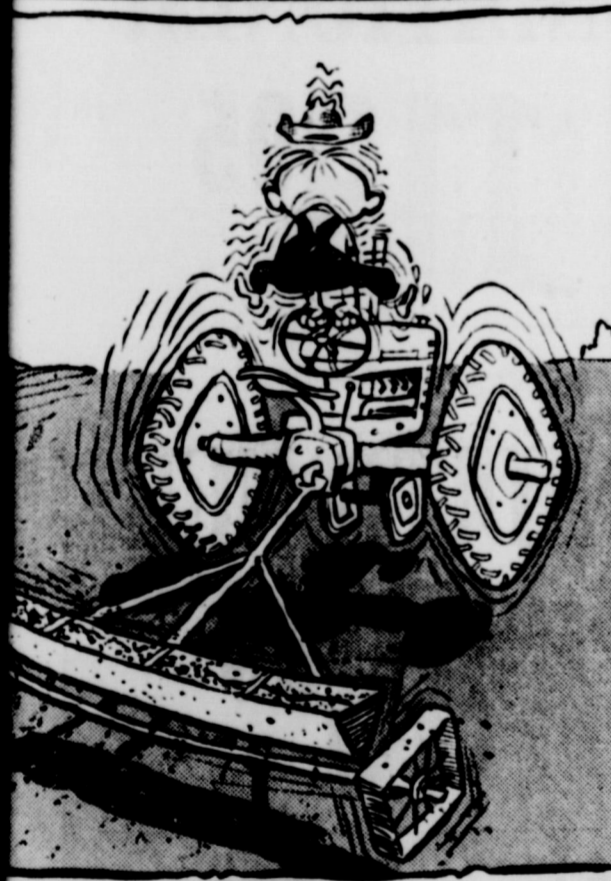

HIGH LIGHTS AND SIDE LIGHTS FROM YOUR STATE CAPITOL

AUSTIN, Tex. — Texas Highway Department soon will come out with a brochure aimed at attracting out-of-state tourists to Texas.

Publication of the booklet with State Highway funds has been delayed by Attorney General Will Wilson. State Comptroller questioned the legality of using road-tax revenue for non-highway purposes, and the Attorney General's opinion as to legality was requested.

pretty close to the road. It contains a map of the Texas highway system tells about traffic laws and highway markers and makes a strong appeal for safe driving.

Its publication was declared legal on grounds that to refuse authorization would, in effect, declare unconstitutional the amendment approved by the people to allow advertising of Texas with state funds.

Expense of the brochure said Wilson's opinion, "will be refunded to the highway program many times due to the great increase in automobile travel and the resultant increase in gasoline taxes."

Tourists spending in Texas dropped by \$100,000,000 last year. This has been attributed by many to the fact that other states have advertised vigorously while Texas has not.

TRAFFIC COURTS URGED — More and more attention in Texas is being given to plans for setting up courts of record to try traffic cases only.

Lawyers and law enforcement officials have been concerned for years.

Public interest was suddenly changed this year when the State Board of Insurance adopted a traffic law which would have required drivers who had paid fines for traffic offenses to appear in court if they went to court over a ticket.

A State Bar Association committee has suggested a two-tiered system for rural and one for metropolitan areas.

Under this plan, county seats with 50,000 or more population would set up a city traffic court of record. Less populous areas could set up a county-wide traffic court. City judges would be appointed, county judges elected.

In each case, the new courts would be restricted to traffic cases and usual cooperation and justice of the peace courts would continue to function.

University of Texas Law School Dean Page Keeton has suggested that county traffic courts be set up so that appeals could be directed from them to the Court of Criminal Appeals.

SECOND GAS TAX UPHELD — State Supreme Court has ruled the state has a right to collect a tax on gas when it is taken from the ground a second time.

Francis Gas Company had been taking gas from the ground in Jackson County, running it through a cooling plant and then re-injecting it into the ground.

It paid a tax for the first extraction, but protested state demand that it pay again when it took the gas out again. Supreme court held the company had to pay the 7 percent of fair market value production tax for the second extraction.

WHAT'S A BOMB? — Anyone who buys a jar of gasoline for his lawn mower could be accused of violating the state's anti-bomb law, a Dallas labor lawyer argued before the Court of Criminal Appeals.

His Client was convicted of having assembled materials for a "Molotov cocktail"—a homemade bomb consisting of a jar of gasoline with a rag stuffed in the top for a wick.

In the case at issue, the bomb was exploded in the driveway of a non-striking employe during a Dallas labor dispute.

Dallas assistant district attorney disagreed with the charge that the law is unconstitutional. He said the statute makes it clear that possession of gasoline for use as a fuel is legal, but for use in bomb-making it is illegal. He said the law had been upheld seven times by the court of Criminal Appeals and twice by the U. S. Supreme Court.

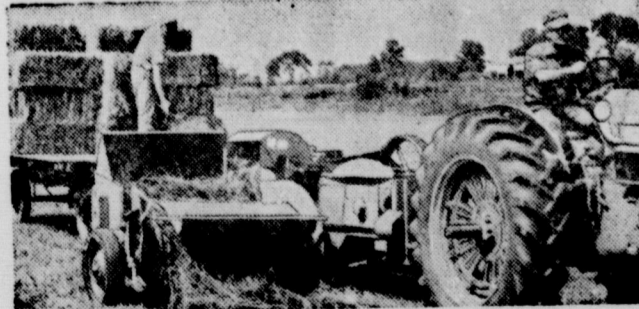
