Harvest Begins; 20 Bushels Is Expected

Harvest of Wheeler County's wheat crop started this week when Bill Hampton cut a pickup load of wheat on his farm located 3 miles East of Wheeler. The wheat tested 60 and had a moisture content of 15 1/2 percent according to Cecil Richardson at the Richerson Grain Company.

Richardson estimated the average yield of Wheeler County wheat at 20 bushels per acre.

The present market price of wheat locally is \$1.78 per bushel. Harrison Hall cut 15,000 lbs. Wednesday which tested 62 and had a moisture content of 14.82. F. H. Davidson cut 14,000 lbs. which tested 61 with a moisture content of 13.41.

Richardson said the harvest should get into full swing within the next few days.

Eight Rural Traffic Accidents Investigated

Eight rural traffic accidents were investigated by the highway Patrol service of the Texas Department of Public Safety in Wheeler County during the month of May, according to Sergeant E. G. Albers.

In making this announcement, the sergeant reported 2 property damage, 6 injuries, and no fatal accidents. These wrecks caused a total property damage of \$4,580.00 with 9 persons injured and none killed. This brings the total for the year in this county to none killed, 19 injured, and property damage of \$9,985.00.

"During the first five months of this year, traffic deaths decreased 11 per cent over the same period of 1959; however, the most dangerous part of the year accident wise is still ahead of us," the sergeant said.

"In Texas, about 40% of all traffic deaths are usually recorded during the first six months of the year; about 60% in the latter half. With the Fourth of July holiday we start the busiest season of the year traffic wise, and we continue through the summer harvest season, the summer vacation season, the Labor Day holiday, school opening and school activity, the fall business season and the Thanksgiving and Christmas and New Year's holidays."

Some of our motorists have done a magnificent job thus far, but unless we pull out all the stops and realize that obedience to the traffic laws is necessary to stay alive, then some new death records are in store for our State."

Holiday and vacation traffic accidents take a costly toll throughout the State. The tragedy is that these accidents could have been avoided. According to the veteran officer, if everyone will check their own driving, take time to be careful and be alert for the careless driver, vacations can be accident free.

Corbett, one of the FBI's "Ten Most Wanted Fugitives," is wanted for escape from the California Institution for Men, Chino, Calif., where he was serving a 5 years' to life sentence for murdering an Air Force sergeant. A Federal warrant was issued at Los Angeles, Calif., on March 21, 1960, charging him with unlawful interstate flight to avoid confinement for murder.

A white American, born on October 25, 1928, at Seattle, Wash., Corbett is 6 feet 1 inch to 6 feet 2 inches tall and weighs 160 to 170 pounds. He has light brown hair, hazel eyes, a fair complexion, a medium build, and has worked as a clerk-typist, laborer, warehouseman, laboratory technician, and alkyd-resin cooker for a paint manufacturer. His two upper front teeth slant inward and he wears glasses, reportedly being extremely nearsighted and capable of seeing only close objects without them. He has a mole under his chin and a G-shaped scar on his right thumb.

Corbett, once a premedical student, is interested in scientific matters, avidly reads technical and travel books, and is intensely interested in firearms and target practice. He reportedly has a superior general intelligence and generally lives quietly and neatly but becomes erratic when drinking alcoholic beverages.

Anyone having information concerning him should immediately notify the nearest office of the FBI, the telephone number of which can be found on the first page of local telephone directories. **AP-1**

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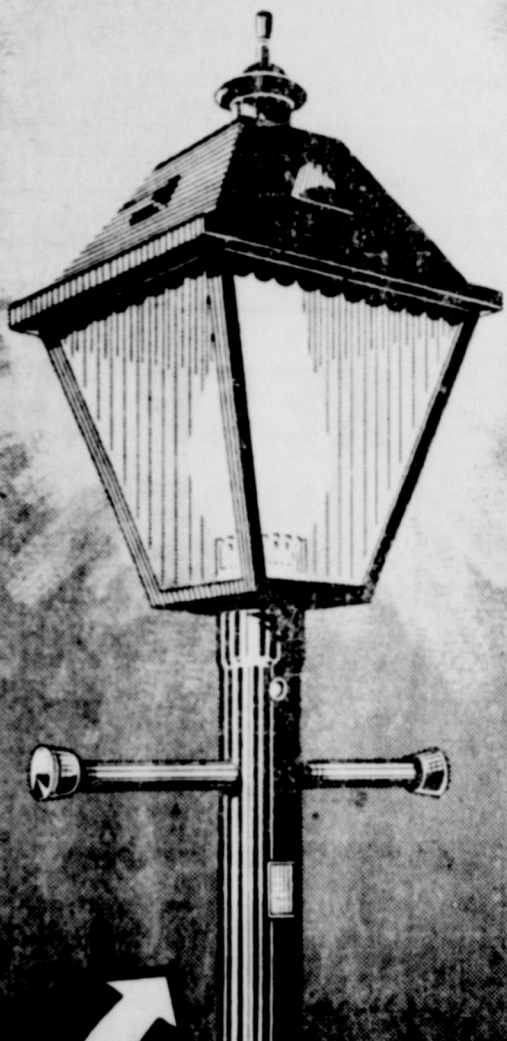

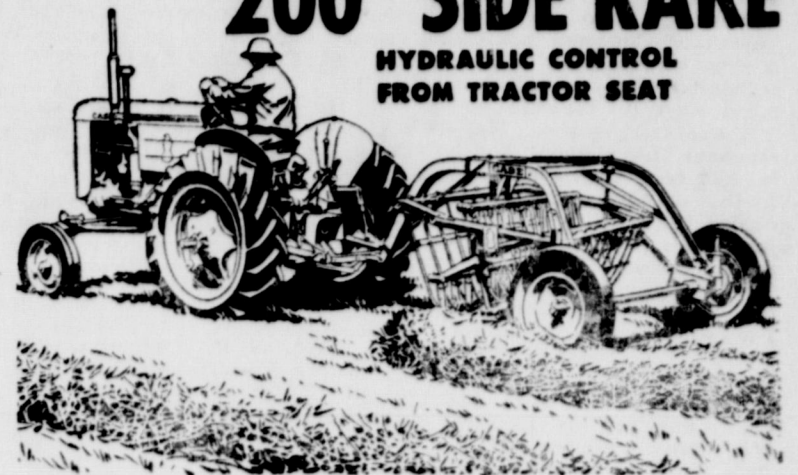

Are You Aware Of Your Rights

A relatively large number of people in the Panhandle, even now, are not completely aware of their rights under the social security law, stated Hal Geldon, Manager of the Amarillo Social Security office.
In a number of instances, retired individuals and their wives have lost months of monthly benefits, simply because they failed to inquire from their social security office about their rights under the program. Geldon called attention to the liberalization of the eligibility requirements under the past amendments which have made it easier for older persons to qualify for insurance benefits.
Two other phases of the program which should not be overlooked are the survivor insurance protection and the disability provisions under the law. Geldon emphasized that many persons are inclined to underestimate the value of their social security protection.
Persons should inquire about their rights, even though they may think they are not eligible for payments. This applies to all phases of the Federal insurance program, Geldon stated.

HIGH LIGHTS AND SIDE LIGHTS FROM YOUR STATE CAPITOL

AUSTIN, Tex. — In looking forward to the 57th Legislature, speculation now centers on (1) who will be elected Speaker of the House and (2) who will get important Legislative committee assignments.
Speaker's rate is following the pattern of two years ago. Both Rep. Wade Spilman of McAllen and Rep. James Turman of Gober claim sure victory. Each accuses the other of claiming votes from members that aren't actually pledged to him.
It takes votes of 76 of the 150 House members to win. Actual election takes place when the Legislature meets in January.
Committee assignments will be made at the start of the session by the Lieutenant Governor for the Senate and by the newly-elected Speaker of the House.
Make-up of committees or crucial importance since an unfavorable committee can, by delay or disapproval, bring almost sure death to a piece of legislation. Lawmakers themselves attach much personal significance to their committee assignments, usually regarding chairmanship of key committees as rungs up the political ladder.
But this year some members are saying, either jokingly or seriously, that they'd just as soon pass up top committee honors. They note a high casualty rate in the campaigns among last year's key committee members.
Among those last out were Sen. William Fly of Victoria, chairman of the powerful Senate Finance committee; Sen. Floyd Bradshaw, member of finance and other important committees; Rep. Max Smith, vice chairman of the House state affairs committee; Rep. Frank Seagison, vice chairman of House revenue and taxation committee.
Leadership can have a high tag, one member observed. Some of those committees, like state affairs or taxation, get nothing but hot potatoes. You make a batch of enemies with every bill.
BEACH SUIT FILED—Attorney General Will Wilson has joined Nueces County officials in getting a court order to stop barricading of beaches on Padre Island by private landowners.
Action stems from the open beach bill passed by the legislature last summer. This law, hotly debated, affirmed public ownership of beaches and guaranteed public access to them.
Padre I. Land and Development Co., which put up the barricades, claims property rights up to the water's edge as a result of a Spanish land grant.
Another suit has been filed at Galveston where a similar situation developed.
Final decision on who can go swimming where will hinge on court interpretation of the law.
TIDELANDS STUDY URGED—Jerry Sadler, Democratic nominee for land commissioner, has suggested that careful study should be made to determine what action the next Legislature should take to insure legal and orderly development of Texas tidelands.
Sadler suggested the state should chart its course carefully to avoid the possibility of any more difficulties in the management of its submerged lands. Recent U.S. Supreme Court ruling that state ownership extends 10 1/2 miles from the shoreline ended a 15 year tidelands battle.
First thing, said Sadler, will be to settle by law where the shoreline is so the tidelands boundary can be established in relation to it. Also the boundary between Texas and Louisiana coastlines will have to be definitely determined. Court decreed Louisiana owned tidelands for only three miles out.
DON'T FENCE US OUT—You can ride horseback to your heart's content in the Davis Mountains State Park, but be sure to close the gate as you come and go.
This is the gist of a State Supreme Court ruling in a case which pitted the State Parks Board against the owners of grazing rights in the Davis Park.
State has a long-term lease on land for park use with grazing rights reserved by the landowners. Owners declared public horseback riding in the 1,340 acre area interfered with grazing and padlocked the gates. Parks Board contended the riding was a legitimate park use to which the public was entitled.
Supreme Court agreed, but added that some safeguards should be set up so the grazing cattle would not be let loose. High court sent the case back to the local district court for the writing of specific directives.
EMPLOYMENT HITS PEAK—Employment in Texas hit an all-time high this spring with 3,454,000 jobholders, Texas Employment Commission announced.
High point was hit in April. Part of it was attributed to the usual good-weather pickup in farm and construction activity, part of it to industrial expansion.
A further increase in farm employment is forecast as planting, irrigation and cultivating work gets into full swing.
Non farm employment rose by 22,000 between March and April, hitting a total of 3,053,100.
YEAR TO REMEMBER—An historic Texas date, 1836, will be used on the road signs in San Jacinto State Park, the State Highway Commission announced.
Approximately 6.5 miles of roadway will be marked Road 1836. It will run from a junction with State Highway 134 and will include all state-maintained road sections within the limits of San Jacinto State Park near Houston.
SHORT SNORTS—Joe G. Moore, Jr. of Austin has been appointed

secretary and research director for the State Finance Advisory Commission. Mooty was at one time a research assistant for the Texas Legislative Council, helping in a study of state tax laws. Next appointed by the governor to study state finances and make tax recommendations, is set for Friday, June 17. Texas draft quota for July will be 290 men. State Selective Service Headquarters has announced. In addition, local boards have been asked to send up approximately 1,000 men for pre-induction exams. Gov. Price Daniel has announced the promotion of two National Guard officers. John L. Thompson, Jr., Houston business man, was named a major general and Everett Selden Simpson, Amarillo attorney, a brigadier general.
