Railroads Pay County \$23,807 In 1959 Taxes

Texas railroads paid \$23,807 in taxes in Wheeler county during 1959, according to the Texas Railroad Association.
That amount was the county's share of the nearly \$10,000,000 the railroads paid throughout the state.
In addition, of course, was the large total in taxes the railroads approximately 40,000 Texas employees contributed on their own property. The vast majority of railroad workers many of whom live in Wheeler county, own their own homes.
The largest railroad contribution in Wheeler county was for the support of education. The school tax for 1959 totaled \$14,088.
City and village taxes amounted to \$979, while the share of the county government's operating expenses paid for by the railroads totaled \$4,948. The road and bridge fund gained \$3,650 from the railroads in 1959. All other taxes brought the total for the county to \$23,807.
"With the future of our country and state depending to a great extent upon the education of our youth, I am glad to see that nearly half of the taxes paid by the railroads in '59, a total of \$4,565,103, went to support the schools," said Walter Caven, general counsel of the Texas Railroad Association. "Recognizing this need for education, many of our railroads also make scholarships available every year."

REPRESENTATIVE GRAINGER MCILHANY TELLS OF OFFICIAL VISIT TO PHOENIX, ARIZ.

On November 13th through the 16th I had the educational experience of attending the National Municipal Leagues 66th Annual Conference on Government in Phoenix, Ariz.
The theme of this year's meeting was "The Citizen's Dilemma in the Web of Government."
Many outstanding speakers, including former Congressman Brooks Hays (now director of the Tennessee Valley Authority), Senator Barry Goldwater of Arizona, and Congressman Stewart Udall (since named as the incoming Secretary of the Interior), pointed out governmental problems with suggested solutions. These talks carried out the purpose of the conference which was declared to be: "to create a better understanding by civic leaders and others of the

complex pattern of inter-governmental relationships which marks the American system; to come to grips with the demands made by the system upon citizens, and by citizens upon the system; to dramatize the importance of inter-governmental cooperation in today's society; to seek practical down-to-earth solutions to the critical problems of the Urban Age, particularly as they affect city, county and state governments."
I was one of four members of the Texas Legislature selected to represent the State of Texas at this meeting. We found Phoenix to be a beautiful city with an almost-perfect winter climate which has grown from 106,000 population in 1950 to 439,000 in 1960. The masses of flowers and shrubs were in full bloom in November and made a pretty picture.
Our first speaker, Mr. Hays made a strong presentation that

the federal government could do a better job in most fields of government than state and local governments could do. Later in the program Senator Goldwater took the view that the powers of the federal government should be strictly construed and that most functions of government should be carried on by the state and local governments. He pointed out that through the years the federal government has gone into many fields because state and local governments have failed to exercise their constitutional authority. His message was for state and local government to figure off the further extension of federal powers by striving always to do a better job in areas left to them. This is a states rights' approach which as a member of local government strongly appealed to me.
Karl Detzer, an editor of Reader's Digest magazine, explained

a study being made by his magazine in regard to the federal highway program. His finding were an eye-opener for me. He pointed out that a mile of federal highway in some states would cost almost twice as much as a like mile in other states. The cost variation was strictly the result of the operation of the state highway departments. He cited about a dozen states by name as doing an extremely poor job and also several that were doing excellent jobs. I am glad to report that he mentioned Texas Highway Department as doing one of the best jobs in the nation. The waste caused by some states is the probable cause for the increase of one cent in gasoline tax that was put on by the federal government in 1959. I hope that the Reader's Digest will soon publish its findings which will be important to all citizens

of the United States.
Dr. George Gallup made an interesting talk on the operation of the Gallup poll. He is strongly in favor of changing the presidential election laws so that the electors of each state are divided on the basis of the popular vote of the state. His idea is that this plan would make a stronger two-party system over the nation. I can see that such a change could give southern Democrats a stronger voice in party matters since maximum total vote would be important in each state rather than a simple majority.
I attended a number of good lectures on city charters, annexation powers of cities, and improvements in the drafting of state constitutions. Information learned in these fields will be helpful to me since these topics come before the Legislature frequently.

Mary is the granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Clark of Canadian. She was not injured. No charges were filed.

FROM YOUR STATE CAPITOL HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS

AUSTIN, Tex.—Beginning of an odd-numbered year brings a "changing of the guard" at the state-house.

Actual number of turnovers this year will be few, with Gov. Price Daniel, Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey and Atty. Gen. Will Wilson continuing in their present offices.

No change will be in the Supreme Court. Chief Justice John E. Hickman, 76, is retiring after a 50-year legal career, including 34 years of appellate court service.

Judge Hickman will be succeeded by Robert W. Calvert, now an associate justice of the Supreme Court.

Successor Calvert will be Zolfe Steadley, who has served as Secretary of State since 1957. He will be sworn in on January 3, in the Supreme Court Room of the State Courts Building in Austin. A reception and informal Open House will be held in the State Bar Building. The public is invited for both occasions.

Court of Criminal Appeals will get a new judge, also, W. T. McDonald of Bryan will succeed Judge Lloyd Davidson, defeated at the polls last summer. McDonald will be sworn in January 2 in Bryan, in the district courtroom where he has presided as judge for the past five years. His brother, Reed McDonald, a notary public, will administer the oath.

Already sworn in and ready to go when his term as land commissioner begins on January 1 is Jerry Sadler. Mrs. Dorothy Hallman, chief clerk of the House of Representatives in which Sadler served three terms, gave the oath. Sadler was sworn in nearly two weeks ahead of time in order to be "ready." He defeated the incumbent Bill Alcorn.

HOME WORK—While they're still home, members of the next Legislature can take their minds off Christmas bills by studying Governor Daniel's proposed budget for state government.

It calls for spending \$376,000,000 from the general revenue fund for the 1962-63 biennium.

This is \$54,000,000 more than was proposed for the present two-year period, but is 49 per cent less than the agencies requested. It does not include any funds for a recommendation which the governor said he will present after the legislature convenes.

Governor Daniel will propose a \$600 a year increase per teacher, adding approximately \$94,000,000 to the state's two-year costs.

This \$94,000,000 plus the \$54,000,000 increase above, plus the \$76,000,000 general revenue fund deficit, adds up to a \$224,000,000 problem which the new legislature will face.

COLORADO DAM APPROVED—State Board of Water Engineers approved plans to build a

rado River between La Grange and Columbus.

\$21,690,000 reservoir on the Colorado River and businessmen from the affected area had vigorously protested flooding of what they described as a prosperous agricultural area. They estimated it would destroy an annual agricultural income of about \$1,500,000.

Proposed reservoir would be 22 miles long, with 160,000 acre feet of initial water storage space and 75,000 acre feet of reserve. Lower Colorado River Authority estimates it will save for use some 100,000 acre feet of water that now flows into the Gulf.

U. S. Bureau of Reclamation is planning the project which is to be operated by LCRA after construction.

YOUTH PROGRAM GOALS—Texas Youth Council will urge the next Legislature to enact a six-point program to cut down on the number of Texas youngsters who "turn out bad."

Goals are: 1. Adequate funds to operate the state training schools and orphan homes; 2. A juvenile parole system to provide supervision for youngsters released from training schools; 3. A state home for dependent and neglected Negro children; 4. Local youth councils to work with delinquents and to help prevent development of delinquency; 5. Testing and guidance programs to spot problem children before they become delinquents; 6. More job opportunities for youngsters to keep them out of trouble.

NO HORSE TRADING—Highway Department agents seeking to buy land for rights of way cannot "dicker" with land owners over prices.

Commissioner DeWitt C. Greer re-stated this policy in reviewing an instance in which a landowner got in court nearly four times what the Department originally offered for the land.

Though dickering might have saved state money in this case, more than a thousand different agents authority to "barter" Highway officials feel that gives with state money would create many more inequities.

Commission policy is to have appraisal made and offer the amount indicated by the appraisal. Landowners who do not feel this price is fair can seek a better one in court.

SHORT SNORTS—Women seeking to attend Texas A&M College have struck out again. U.S. Supreme Court refused to review A&M's all-male status.

Texas Employment Commission reports a creeping up of joblessness in Texas. Latest weekly figures show 80,458 claiming unemployment benefits, an increase of 8,241 over the previous week and 23,639 more than for a year ago.

There is published herewith a front page editorial from a recent issue of the Temple Lally Telegram. The editorial was written by the "Home Tower". It follows: Dear Mr. President:

For a long time, I have strung along with you. When you were elected to office, you did a lot of things I didn't understand, but folks said they were fine and so I was satisfied.

You closed my bank a couple of days after our baby was born and we almost didn't get the kid out of hock. But I didn't mind that.

You declared a moratorium on debts but I had to go ahead and pay mine anyway.

You killed off cattle and hogs, and even if a lot of folks in some parts of the country were going hungry, I didn't.

You made my neighbors plow under their crops. It looked like a silly idea, but you were the president and I yielded to your more mature judgement in the matter.

You took my yard man away and put him on relief so that he didn't have to work for us or anybody else any more, but I took that as a part of the great social reform and stayed on your bandwagon.

You gave every state and every city and every county, every school district, every public project, pocket and pockets full of money that my kids will have to pay back, but I didn't kick.

You gave \$300, \$400, \$500 per month jobs on public money to men I wouldn't pay \$15 a week to be on my staff. But I didn't fall out with you about that either.

You took over private businesses and took away firms which would have advertised in my paper, but I bowed meekly and kept my peace.

You took over the jurisdiction of folks working for me and told them how long they might work for me and what they would get and that I couldn't fire them unless you said so. I thought that was straining a point a little, Mr. President, but we were still friends.

You made my subscribers on the farm plant things they didn't know how to grow and made them quit planting so much of the only things they did know how to grow, and I thought maybe you knew what you were doing so I let that pass, too.

You built dams on the Colorado River and forgot your promise to the Brazos, but I took the public spirited attitude on that and it's all right now.

You made your big news pronouncements over the radio instead of the newspapers, and I thought that was unfair but dismissed by criticism because I

knew the people liked to hear your golden voice.

You wanted Argentine beef for the army instead of Texas beef because it was cheaper and better, and although I didn't like the excuse, I didn't cry out against that, either.

You refused to stop the sit-down strikes, but I guess you had to be careful about what John L. Lewis and William Green would think.

You've committed many an extravagance in the name of social security and more abundant life, and I've swallowed it all like a little gentleman.

But when you changed the date of Thanksgiving Day and darn near spoiled all our football schedules... why, then, Mr. President, you went entirely too far! I've got to quit you on that.

Farmer Must File Social Security On Employees

This is the time for local farmers to prepare their social security tax return for reporting their employees for 1960. Hal Geldon, Manager of the Amarillo Social Security Office, said today.

He added: "Farm wages are reported on a yearly basis. The report covering employees who worked in 1960 must be filed with the Director of Internal Revenue during January 1961." The report must be filed for any employee who was paid \$150 or more in cash wages during the year; or any individual who worked on 20 or more days in 1960 for cash wages figured on a time basis (for instance, by the hour, day, week, etc.) regardless of the total earnings for the year.

This is important that the employee's correct social security number be shown on the report.

There was a sharp increase in the number and quality of reports filed by area farmers last year. Geldon advised that correct and complete reporting helps guarantee that the employee receives full social security credit for the work he has done.

T.B. Association Set Sights On Complete Eradication Of Dreaded TUBERCULOSIS

T.B. Associations and public health departments all over the country started 1960 with a target in their sights: complete eradication of TB as soon as possible. The first step towards achieving this goal, TB control workers agreed, is to find and give adequate treatment to all active cases of the disease. A mammoth task! There are an estimated 100,500 active cases which are at present unknown to health authorities.

Here's a sample of what's been done so far:

Kansas—People registered at the health department as having inactive TB are being reexamined to find out if they have developed active disease.

Kentucky—A mobile clinic has been established in an area covering 30 counties where TB case rates are high, and extra outpatient clinics will be opened to give more adequate treatment.

North Carolina—Outpatient clinics are being increased.

Nevada—More intensive tuberculosis testing and drug treatment are being given in the baby clinics.

Ohio—the State Health Department has recommended that all known cases of TB should be followed up for a minimum of five years.

Texas—Intensive work in certain border areas to find TB cases before they spread to others; to encourage hospitalization; to aid in rehabilitation.

To achieve this much has demanded close cooperation in organization and planning by TB control workers in TB associations, state health departments, medical societies, hospitals. There are just the first steps in tremendous all-embracing program. The big push for TB eradication is under way!

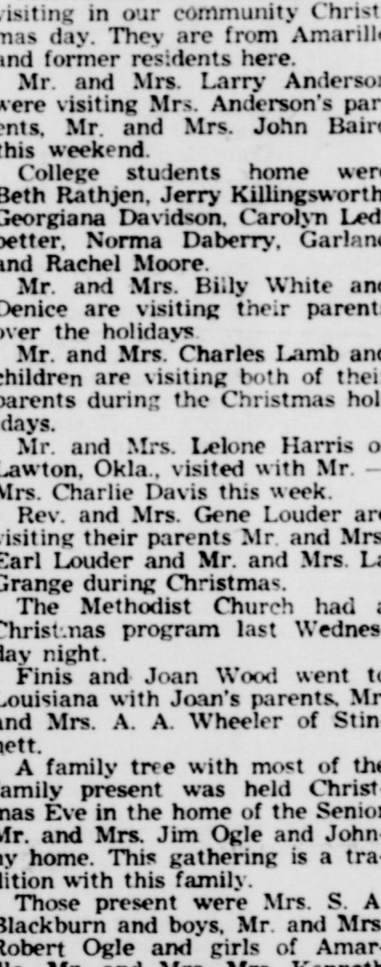

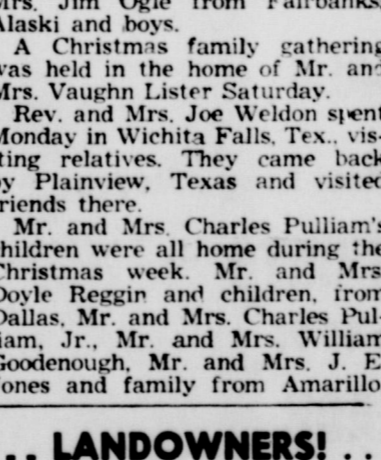
