been a resident of Wheeler County for the past six months.

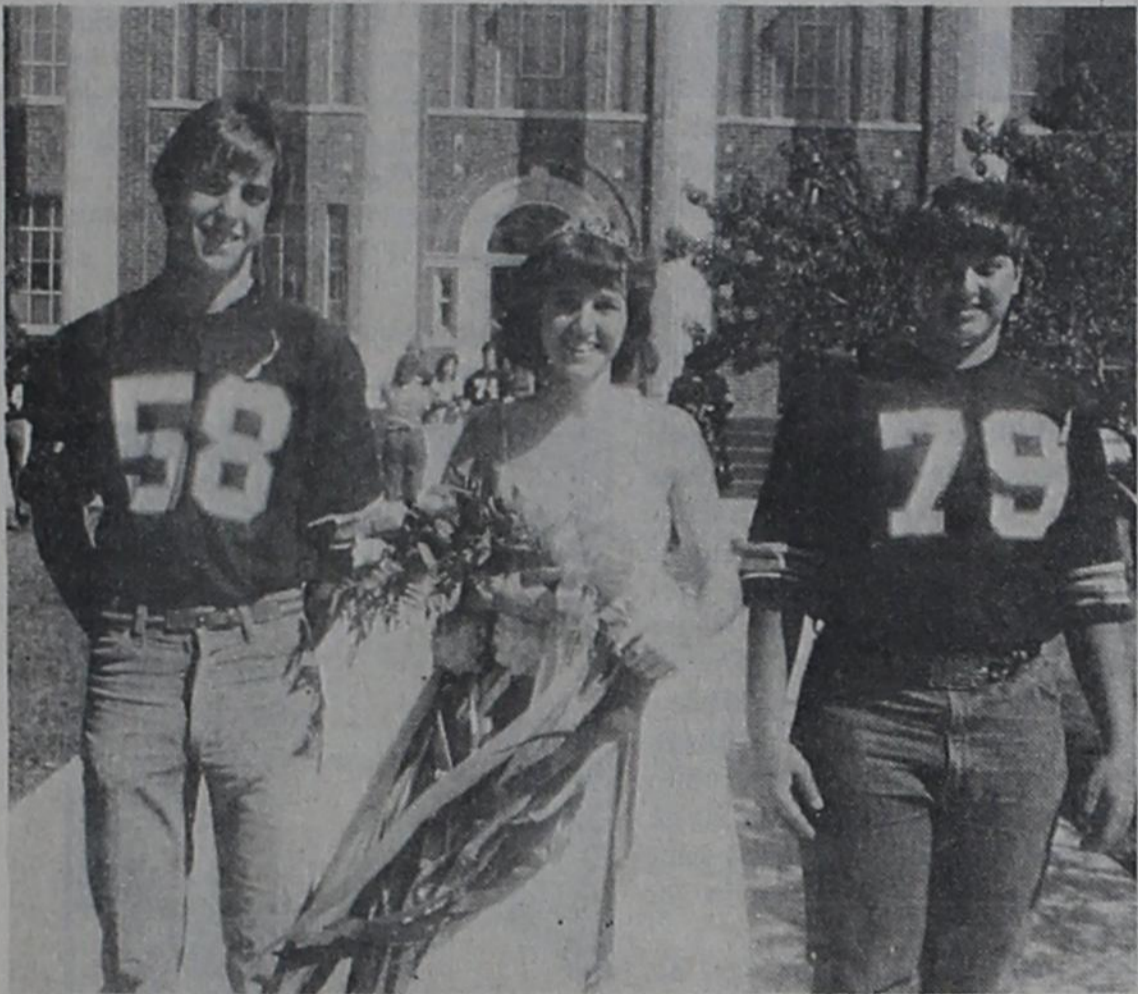

## WHEELER MUSTANGS CRUSH McLEAN TIGERS, 56-0



Wheeler's Mustangs continued on their winning ways last Friday night as they just simply crushed the hapless McLean Tigers to the tune of 56-0 before a homecoming crowd.

The Mustangs raised their record to a perfect 3-0 with the win and the young, inexperienced Tigers felt the Mustangs kick early in the game when Toby Collins went 62 yards to paydirt on the Mustangs first play from scrimmage and Larry Trevino returned an intercepted pass 38 yards for another TD just three plays after Collins' romp.

Piling up a 28-0 margin at the end of the first quarter the Mustangs substituted liberally throughout the ball game but the score still mounted as the Mustangs scored a touchdown in

each of the second and third periods and added another 14 points in the fourth quarter.

Todd Alvey broke several tackles to go 21 yards for the Mustangs final touchdown with just 1:23 to play in the game. Wade Bentley got into the scoring act after Alvey's TD as he booted the extra point as the Mustangs were perfect on their PAT attempts for the night. Six extra points were kicked true by Draton Childress.

Wheeler went ahead by 21-0 at the 3:36 mark of the first quarter when Collins capped a 44 yard march as he spun off a 19 yard scoring run off right tackle.

### Postal Notes

This week we'll try to cover a little bit about Registered Mail. All items sent at First Class or Priority rates may be registered. Registered Mail is designed for irreplaceable items, such as extremely important papers, documents, and items having a high value. Registered mail may be insured for an additional fee. Reimbursement is limited to the actual value of the item at the time of mailing. The full value must be declared whether or not postal insurance is purchased. A receipt is issued when registered mail is accepted. Be sure to keep this receipt in a safe place as the original must be presented if a claim is to be made. You may obtain a return receipt showing to whom, when and where the item was delivered. Restricted delivery is also available. All items sent registered must be securely sealed. Sealing must be done in such a way that items cannot be opened and resealed without showing signs of having been opened. Good quality envelopes with good glue. Fragile items must be properly packed and cushioned to withstand normal handling in the mail. Although postal employees will be happy to answer any questions you may have on packaging, they are not permitted to assist in the preparation or sealing of mail to be registered.

Registered mail is the most secure delivery service the U.S. Postal Service offers. It provides added protection for valuable and important mail, as its handling is closely controlled from the point of mailing to the point of delivery.

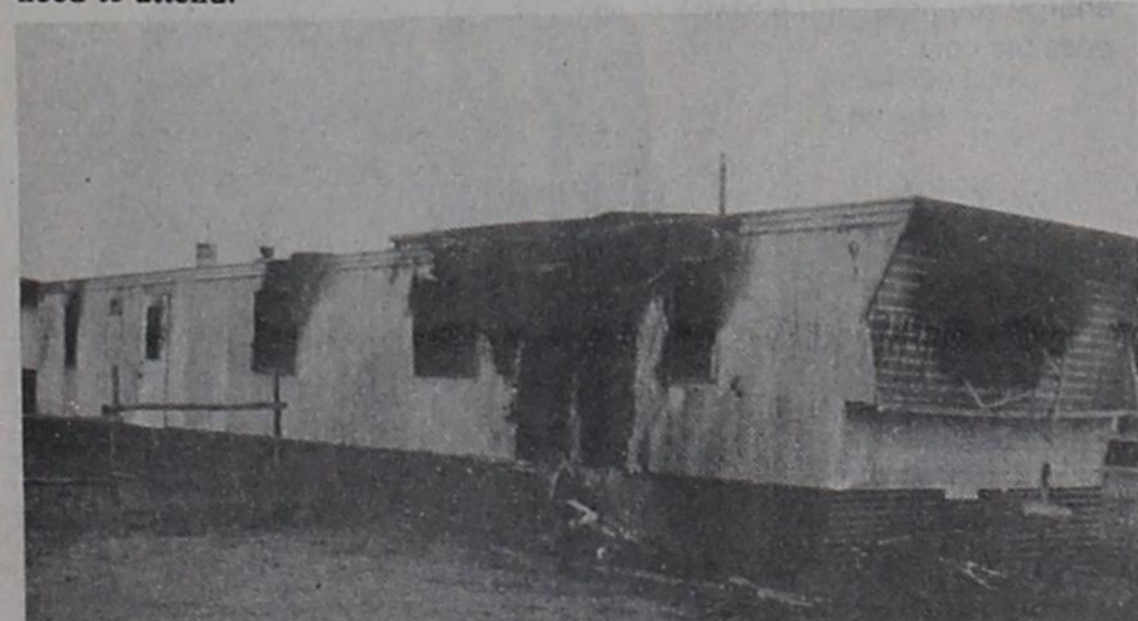

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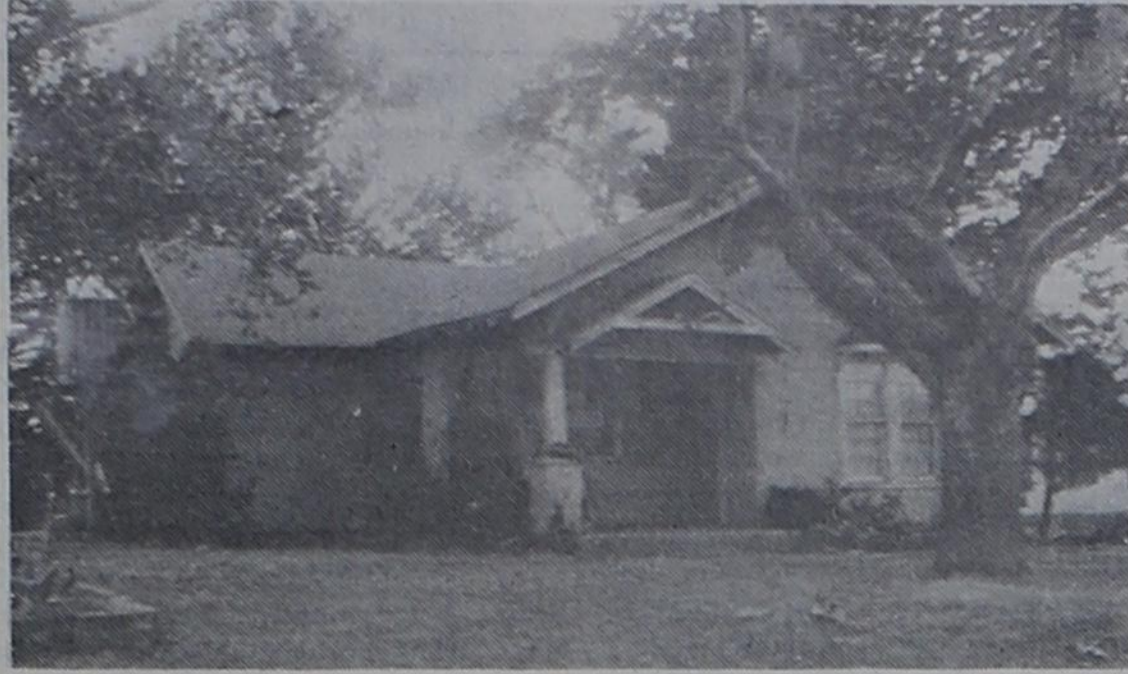

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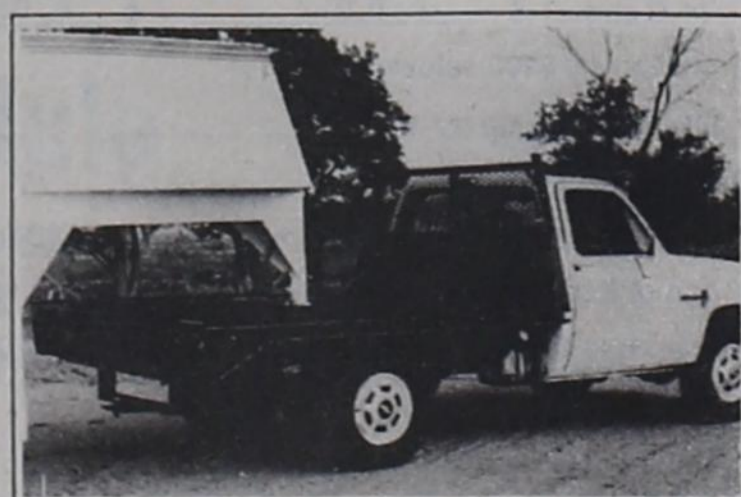

## PUBLIC NOTICE

The proposed tariff restructure will not result in any increases in the overall revenues of the Company. The proposed effective date for the tariffs is September 20, 1984. All customers and classes of customers will be affected by this filing.

The restructure in the basic long distance service (MTS) results in an overall decrease in the revenues received by the Company from such service of approximately \$100 million. The result of these proposed tariff changes and the restructure of our service offerings is to more nearly recover access costs from those services for which such access costs are incurred.

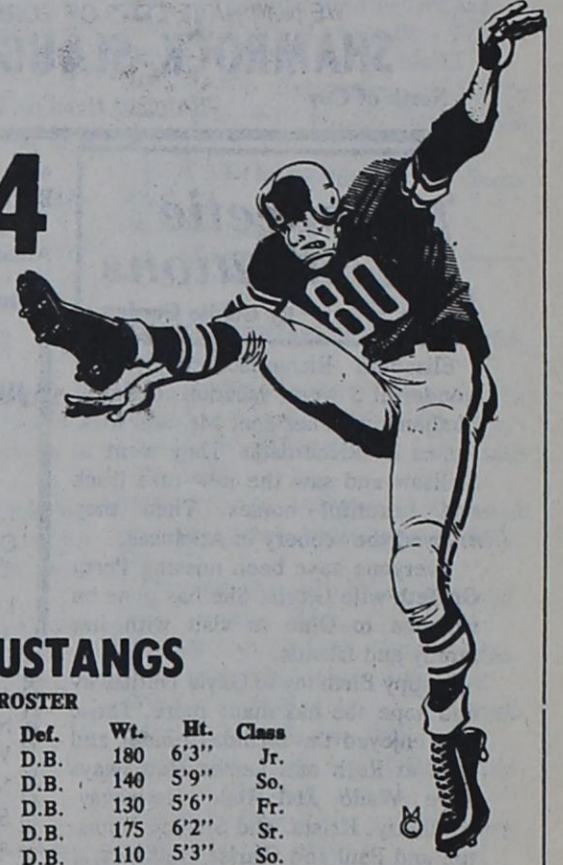
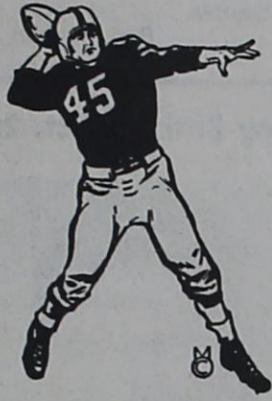

## Wallflowers Brighten Winter Landscapes

When people think of wallflowers, they usually remember their "Old Maid" aunt or the brainy girl in high school who wore braces and had no dates. But in botanical circles, the wallflower is an attractive and fragrant plant that will add a splash of colorful beauty to winter landscapes.

Wallflowers have erect spikes of showy and good-smelling flowerets with two pairs of opposite petals. Each spike may display 10 to 30 such blossoms. They come in many vibrant colors, including brown, copper, gold, yellow, apricot, red and even purple.

The wallflower is a perennial but can be treated as a hardy annual in Texas. Start your plants as soon as the weather turns cool. They cannot take hot weather and dry winds. You can either plant seed or bedding plants.

Sow the seeds outdoors in well-drained soil of average fertility. Drainage is most important because wallflowers prefer a moist but not soggy soil. The seed will germinate in five to seven days when the ground temperatures range from 55 to 65 degrees F.

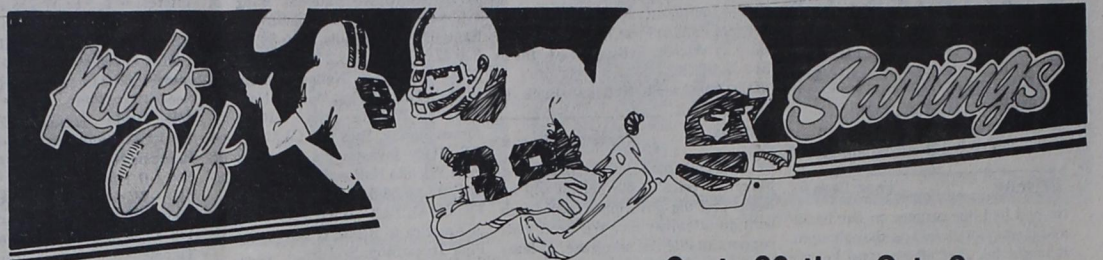
If summer lingers long into fall, it's better to plant your seed in flats where you can keep the germination temperatures at the preferred settings. When the seedlings show two leaves, plant them in 2-inch pots. As soon as the nights turn cool, set the seedlings out where you want them to grow. They need a month or more of cool weather to harden off before freezing weather arrives. Wallflowers are very cold-hardy and with adequate moisture they'll bloom in late winter through early spring.

Wallflowers, so named because they were often planted against stone walls in Ireland where they originated, need full sun but will tolerate light shade.

Even though they're well-suited to the climate, wallflowers aren't too well known in Texas, so seeds and bedding plants can be hard to find. You may want to order your seed. Suppliers that carry wallflowers include George W. Park Seed Co., Greenwood, SC 29646 and Thompson and Morgan, Box 100, Farmington, NJ 07727.

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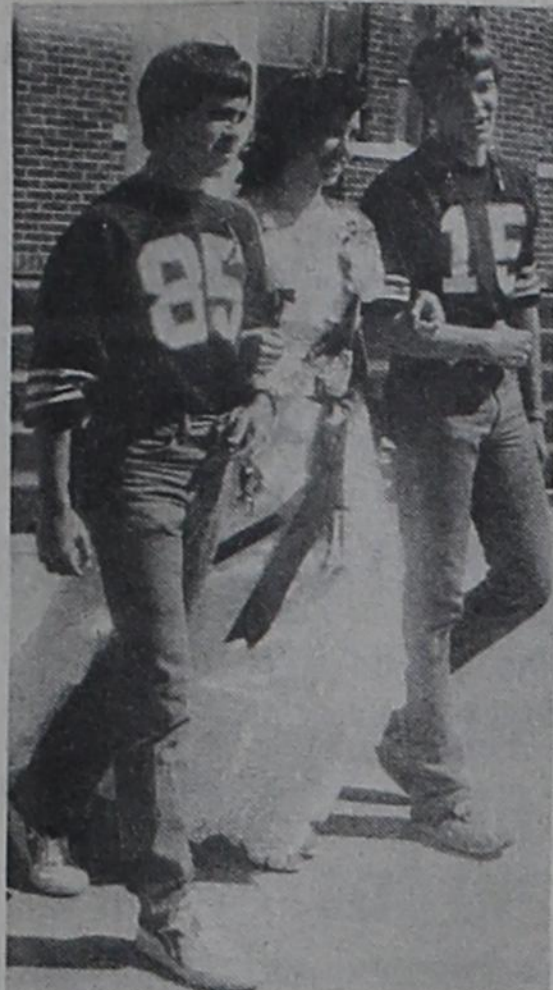

### Memory and Aging

Many people assume that aging and forgetfulness go hand-in-hand, but this is not true for all people—some continue with excellent memories, while others suffer a loss in memory. Some who lose their ability to easily remember do so quickly, and others lose their recall slowly.

People of any age can have trouble remembering. Perhaps they never learned what they want to remember very well in the first place, because it had little meaning to them at the time. Or they may be having trouble with recall.

According to Extension aging specialists, psychologists have identified a number of things that make it more difficult to remember clearly as people grow older. For example, if they can't see or hear as clearly as they used to, they may not be learning or storing the items very well in the first place. That may be one reason why some elderly people can clearly remember things that happened years ago, but have difficulty remembering things that happened yesterday.

Living longer also means that older

people have a larger pool of items they have to search through in their minds in order to remember something specific. This can take time.

If they have suffered any of the diseases that affect thinking ability, such as arteriosclerosis or Alzheimer's disease, then memory will be impaired.

In addition, there is sometimes a "psychological" factor. Some older people expect to lose their memories. They don't forgive themselves when they forget things and they see their slips of memory as a reminder of old-age.

While there is no "miraculous cure" for memory loss, here are some suggestions for improving memory:

- \* Get plenty of exercise, eat well-balanced meals and stay active enough in the daytime that you can sleep at night.

- \* Realize that you may be depressed and you may need to talk to someone about how you're feeling before you'll start feeling better.

- \* Make "memory joggers" to give you some extra signals that let you know what you need to know. For

example, write down names and phone numbers; set out medicine cups labeled with the time of day; make routine times to check for things, and have routine places for those items you use regularly.

- \* Give yourself plenty of time to learn things that you want to remember. You don't have to rush or do things at anybody else's pace. Concentrate on what you want to learn.

- \* Forgive yourself when you forget things. Anxiety over forgetting makes it even harder to remember them.

### Ideas For Remembering Names

The famous Harvard psychologist B.F. Skinner often used himself - at age 80 - as an example of someone who is trying to avoid growing old as a thinker. Remembering names is a thinking problem that he shares with many other older people. But Dr. Skinner says he has convinced himself that names are very seldom forgotten, and when he has a half hour to think about it, he can nearly always recall a name.

But most people don't have half an hour, especially when they're "on-the-spot" to make an introduction. Dr. Skinner says that's part of the problem. After we fail to produce a

name at the right moment on a few occasions, we become anxious about it. Then the next time an introduction is in order, we may fail to recall a name in part because of past failures.

Dr. Skinner suggests that older people do as he does and simply find some graceful ways of explaining the failure to remember a name. You can, for example, appeal to your age. Or you can flatter your listener by saying that you have noticed that the more important the person, the easier it is to forget the name. You can even recall an amusing story, such as forgetting your own name when you were asked for it by a clerk. If you are skillful at that sort of thing, he says, forgetting may even be a pleasure.

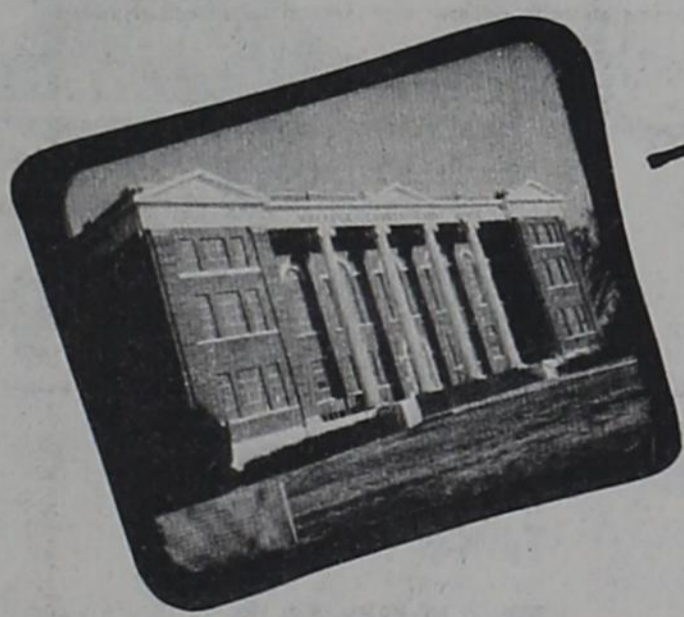
