CHAMBER WILL SPONSOR 4 DRAWINGS 56 LUCKY WHEELER SHOPPERS WILL SHARE \$2300 IN SCRIPT

FIVE FIRES DESTROY HOMES, OFFICE AREA EXPOSED REGULATORS BELIEVED TO BE CAUSE

Wheeler County Volunteer Firemen were kept busy over the weekend with 5 major fires in 32 hours. Fortunately only one house was occupied at the time of the fire and she remains in Amarillo hospital with second degree burns over 36% of her body. A total value on the loss is not available, but loss is attributed to weather. Two homes and an office were a total loss; the contents of the third home were saved, but some structural damage and heavy smoke damage were sustained by the house.

ing in Wheeler was asked to bring additional water to the scene. The whole house appeared to "just burst into flames" and the house was lost. The 2-story house was one of Wheeler's oldest; it had been moved to the country by Pete Burton when the town lot was purchased by the Baptist Church for a parking lot.



This had been the office for T. Calco, an oil related business in the Kelton community. Wheeler, Kelton, Mobeetie and Briscoe Fire Departments were called to this fire, but the doublewide trailer was a total loss. This fire was reported at 3:10—area firemen had just finished fighting a house fire near Wheeler when this call came in.

Tressie Blocker was asleep at her home in the Kelton community when she woke to find something wrong. We are not sure of the sequence of her actions but Tressie and her dog were found unconscious in the living room at the front door by neighbors. She was taken by private vehicle to Parkview Hospital where she was treated for second degree burns about the face, neck, and hands, forearms, shoulders and back. The Wheeler ambulance transferred her to St. Anthony in Amarillo later in the morning where she is reported improved with respiratory problems.

The activities of Saturday, November 27, began when the Wheeler volunteer firemen were called to the residence of H.P. Barnes, 2 1/2 miles south of Wheeler. At 1:10 A.M. Briscoe firemen sent a unit at the time the call was received. Mobeetie firemen were called to the scene at 1:46 and Shamrock's help was requested at 2:09. Henderson Truck-

FIRE SAFETY FROM WHEELER COUNTY FIRE SERVICE

All residents using butane for heating in structures must be absolutely certain the regulator on the butane tank is protected. During the 36 hour period [beginning 12:01 AM, 11-27-82, Ending 12 Noon, 11-28-82] the Wheeler County Fire Departments [Allison, Briscoe, Kelton, Mobeetie, Shamrock & Wheeler] responded to five structure fires, four of which were private residences. One person was severely injured and approximately \$200,000.00 worth of property was destroyed, leaving four families homeless.

This teacherage at Kelton was saved with structural damage Sunday morning. The contents were removed by the citizens and firemen of Kelton and the contents only sustained minor water damage. This is the home of Mrs. Katy Shutt and two children. The family was not at home at the time of the fire; they had been gone since Wednesday for Thanksgiving.

It will take place in the south end of the Old Nicholson Memorial Hospital on Canadian Street from 9:00-12:00 A.M. This clinic is sponsored by the Retired Senior Volunteer Program and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion or national origin.

Sen. Sarpalius Addresses Group

Texas State Senator, Bill Sarpalius of Hereford recently addressed a group of Wheeler citizens on November 23, at the Wheeler County Courthouse during a symposium sponsored by the Thursday Review Club. Senator Sarpalius emphasized several issues that will be considered by the Texas Legislature when it convenes in January that are of vital interest to the people of Texas and of particular importance to the residents of the Texas Panhandle.

Senate Bills 1, 2, & 3 relating to mandatory penalties and a rehabilitation program for the arrests made of driving while under the influence of drug and/or alcohol will be actively pursued by advocates which hope to tighten the laws concerning drunk drivers. Senator Sarpalius will continue to work on crop insurance legislation which will be sponsored by the federal and state governments. It is his hope that by more farmers in several states joining the programs, that the premiums will be the lowest premiums available. The Senator is also encouraging research now being done on wind energy to power irrigation wells and believes this will be a feasible reality in the near future.

Another issue of major importance to Mr. Sarpalius is to pass legislation concerning a Texas Water Trust which would encourage the development and funding of water districts and reservoir systems. This issue is important not only to the rural areas but to the major urban areas as well. West Texas is facing the importation of water through canal systems soon after the turn of the century.

Senator Sarpalius encouraged all of his constituents to write or call him concerning any of these issues as he uses these communications as a poll for the attitudes his district reflects and it is a direct means of influencing his vote.

Dr. Bob Riley Accepts Position

Dr. Bob Riley has accepted the position of Vice-President for Howard College effective the Spring semester 1983, according to Dr. Charles D. Hays, President of the Howard County Junior College District.

Dr. Riley, presently a professor and administrator at Southwestern Oklahoma State University in Weatherford, Oklahoma, was born and raised in the Panhandle of Texas, receiving his high school diploma from Wheeler High School. He earned a bachelor of science and a masters of education from West Texas State University and an Ed. D. from East Texas State University.

Dr. Riley began his career in higher education at Sul Ross State University at Del Rio as an assistant professor of education and administrator of the branch campus. From there he moved to Clarendon Junior College as Dean of Instruction and then to his present position at Southwestern Oklahoma University.

Along with his administrative duties, Dr. Riley was served as a consultant for the Office of Civil Rights in Washington, D.C., the State Department in Nacogdoches, the Professional Development Center Network in Oklahoma, and various public districts in Texas and Oklahoma. In this capacity he has dealt with a variety of topics, including Equal Opportunity in Education, Personnel Evaluation, Title IX in Texas, Classroom Management, Time Management, and Teacher Stress.

Among his publications are a handbook on Federal Court Cases dealing with Teacher and Student Rights, a research study on the Impact of Title IX in Texas, and a research study on the Status of the Four-Day College Week in Texas.

Dr. Riley is a member of Kiwanis International, Phi Delta Kappa, Kappa Delta Pi, Texas State Teachers Association, National Education Association, Oklahoma Education Association and Oklahoma Association of Teacher Education.

Along with his wife Gayle, a public school teacher, and their three children, Dr. Riley will be making his home in Big Spring next month.

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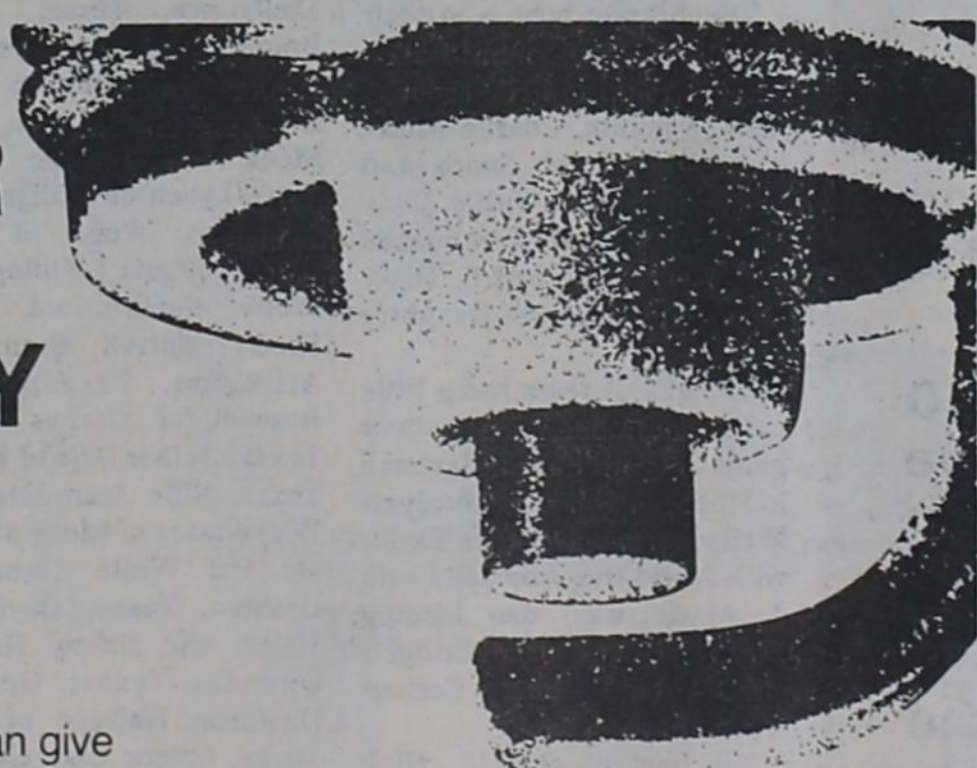
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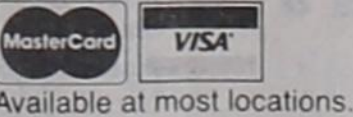
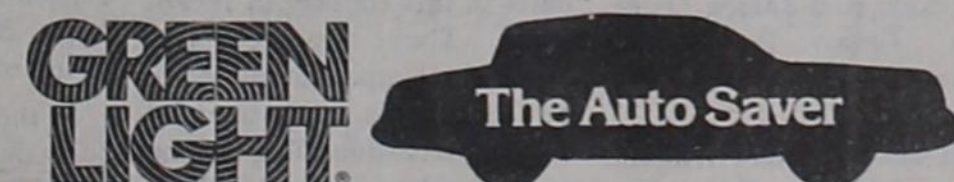
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CHAT WITH THE EDITOR

It was reported Mrs. Blocker was not breathing when she was discovered and George Harris started her breathing. The call for the Wheeler and Briscoe units was received at 4:50 A.M.

Again the weary firemen were returning to their base looking forward to warm, dry clothing when the call came to return to Kelton to the Blocker residence at 8:09. Wheeler and Briscoe departments responded to this call. The

Blocker home a contents were a total loss as well as a "bunkhouse" located about 20' from the main house.

The fire alarm was not sounded again until Sunday morning at 9:55—25 hours and 46 minutes later. Wheeler and Shamrock were called to help Kelton firemen again; this time, a house fire in Kelton. The fire, at the residence of Katy Shutt was discovered as citizens of the community were preparing to go to Sunday School. The early discovery allowed the contents of the house to be removed with only minor water damage; it appeared the entire community "turned out" to help. There is a possibility this

house, A Kelton School teacher, can be salvaged. Mrs. Shutt and her two children had been gone since Wednesday and were not home at the time of the fire.

The Wheeler Volunteer Ambulance Service reported to each of the fires, as is the policy when a structure is involved.

The cause of the fires is believed to be a closed "breather" on the butane regulator. The butane regulator has an opening which helps regulate the flow of butane; if moisture enter this opening and freezes, the flow of butane will either be cut off or allowed to flow free. It was noted that these regulators were not pro-

tected from the weather at the location of three of these fires. Ken Daughtry, Wheeler Fire

Marshall urges everyone who uses butane for heating to check to make sure their

regulator is protected. Remember: the regulator should be covered, but it must have air.
