Gary Brotherton Takes Third Place

Gary Brotherton, the seventeen year old son of Mr. and Mrs. C. B. Brotherton of Wheeler, placed third in the State University Interscholastic League Prose Interpretation Contest held May 8 and 9 at the University of Texas campus in Austin.

Gary is a senior at Wheeler High School. With the bronze medal which he received Saturday, May 9, he completes a most successful high school record in speaking events. In

the U.I.L. competition last year he received gold medals in Prose at District and Regional. He placed sixth at the State Meet in 1980. This year he won first at District and Regional and received three first place ranks in the preliminaries at Austin, then proceeded to the finals where he earned the bronze medal. In addition to the individual speaking events, Gary has been successful in the one-act play, receiving awards for the

All-Star cast.

Accompanying Gary to the State Meet were his mother, Maureen Brotherton, his speech coach, Rhonda Blanchard, LaTricia Anderson, who competed in Shorthand, and her sponsor Elaine Martin.

In the fall Gary will enter Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene, where he will continue participation in speech and drama.

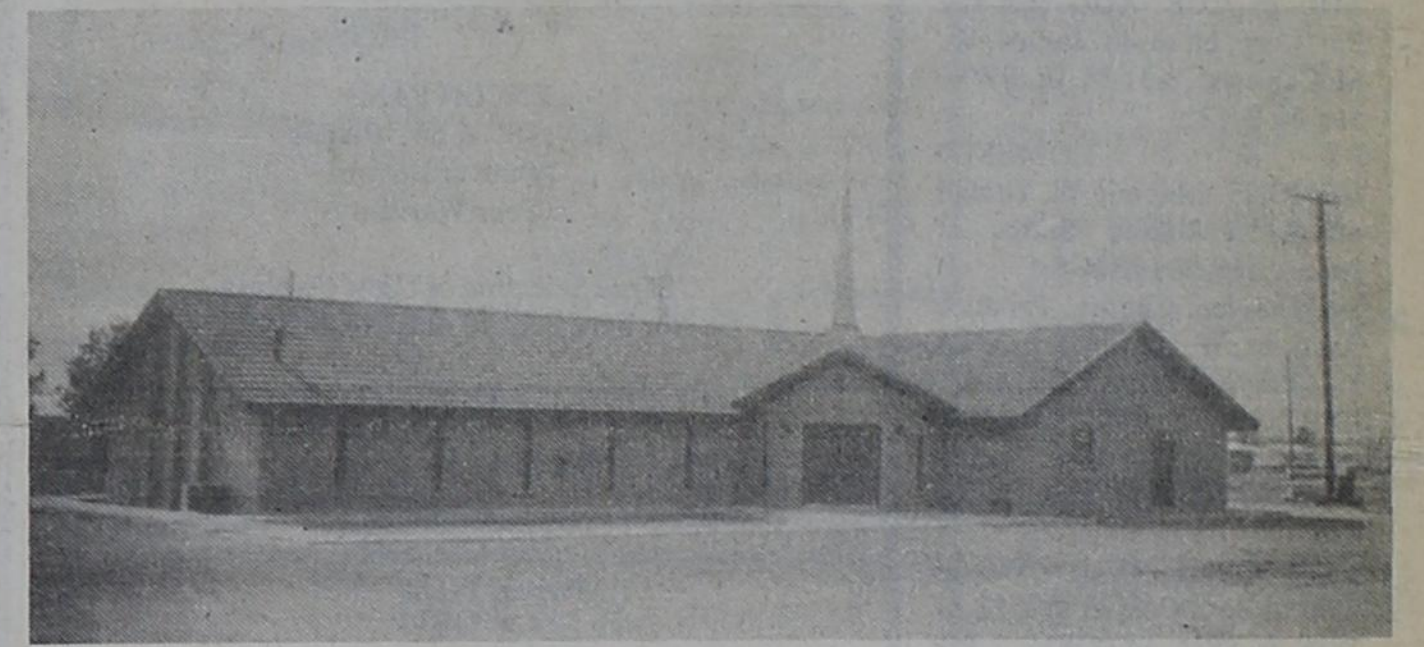
Hole-In-One

The Allison Congregation traces its roots well back before the turn of the century. In 1887, Rev. J. T. Bloodworth, a pastor at Old Mobeetie walked twice a month to the Hemphill County village of Cataline and organized the church there that year. A church built there in 1908 suffered from flooding so was moved about four miles to a hill. Some years later moved about five miles south to the Zybach community. With the coming of the railroad, the church membership divided and started two congregations, one in Briscoe and the other in Allison. These two separate congregations, begun in 1929 again became one as they merged into one in 1977.

POTS AND PANS

"Beauty" may hide a "Beast" when it comes to choosing today's pots and pans, so be careful.

Functional considerations can easily lose out to "looks" in the competitive mood of the marketplace where more than 125 companies compete for the consumer's dollars.

Fortunately some cookware is BOTH - functional and good looking.

'COOK-ABILITY'

To find cookware with function and beauty, remember your "physics" -- just the basic laws.

To do a good job of cooking, cookware must conduct heat quickly and evenly without hot spots.

Certain metals conduct heat more efficiently than others: copper is best, and aluminum is next best.

Steel and iron generally are poor conductors of heat, but stainless steel used in combination with other metals such as copper or aluminum is very satisfactory.

Porcelain-clad steel does not distribute heat very evenly. However, thick cast-iron pans can spread heat as evenly as thin copper ones, mainly because iron retains the heat so well.

DURABILITY, CLEANABILITY

Metal isn't the only consideration, either. Durability and cleanliness are major concerns, too.

Copper tarnishes easily, but is easily restored. On the other hand, if the tin lining wears away, copper can react with acidic substances to cause potentially harmful health effects.

Aluminum is vulnerable to pitting and discoloration, but aluminum poses no known health hazards.

Stainless steel is both durable and easy to clean.

Cast iron requires special seasoning and cleaning procedures to keep it in optimum shape.

COOKWARE COATINGS

Here's a word about cookware coatings:

Porcelain enamel coatings have pros and cons. These coatings are used on iron, steel and aluminum pans. They're fairly easy to keep clean, but they can be marred by metal spoons or scouring pads. Also, thin layers may chip easily and may be subject to crazing (streaking) due to thermal stress.

Non-stick coatings come in several types. The better ones resist damage, but many of these finishes probably will have a shorter life than the pots and pans they're bonded to.

SHAPES, FEATURES

Make sure any pot or pan you buy has a flat bottom -- for even, more efficient heating. Also, be sure it has a tight-fitting lid and good balance so it doesn't tip over.

A BUYING PLAN

Some types of cookware make better sense when bought "By the piece" than by the set.

When choosing cookware, be especially careful about a "set" with a "decorator look."

Consider your needs and how frequently you may use a piece of cookware.


An eclectic (variety) "mix" of cookware may be the best "recipe" for your kitchen.

For example, you might choose a cast-iron skillet for frying, an inexpensive alu-

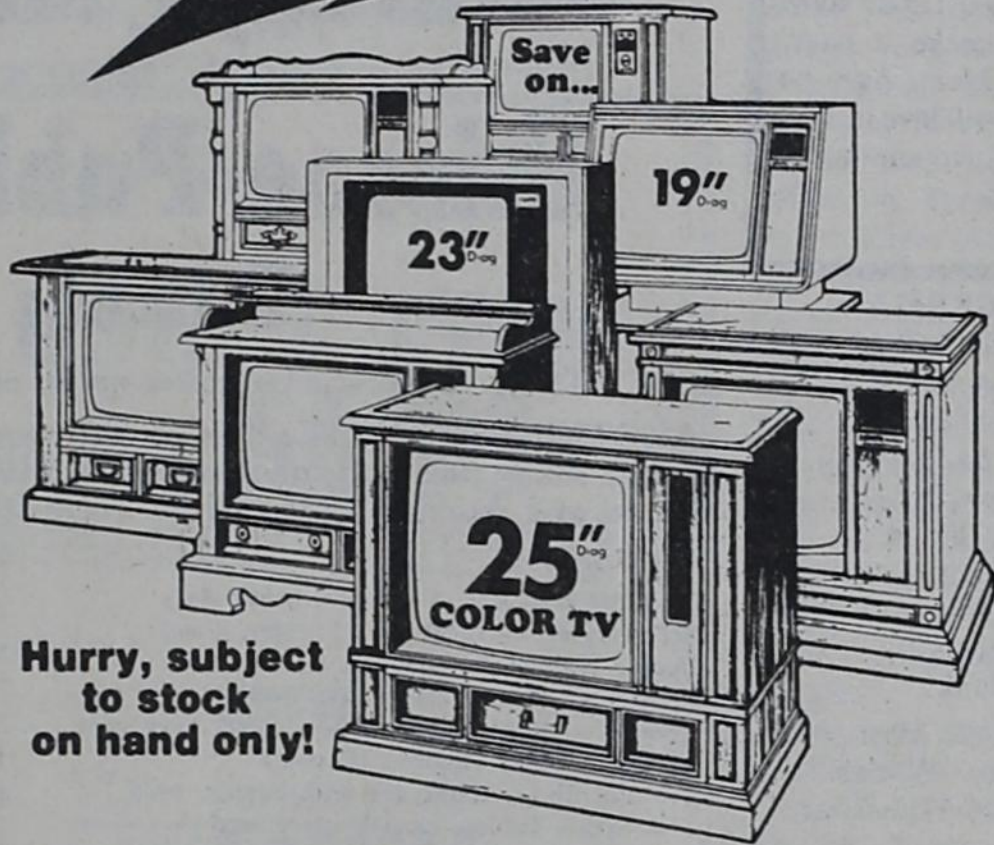

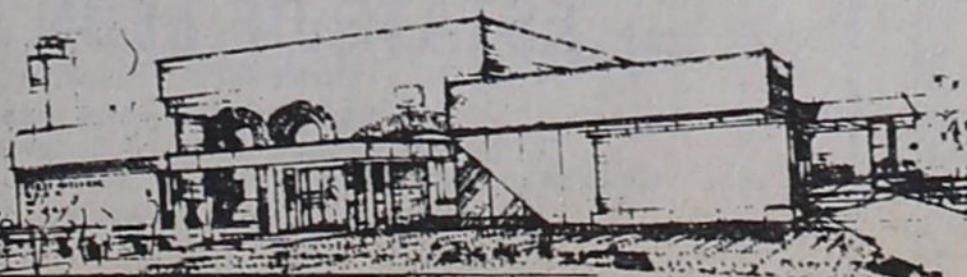

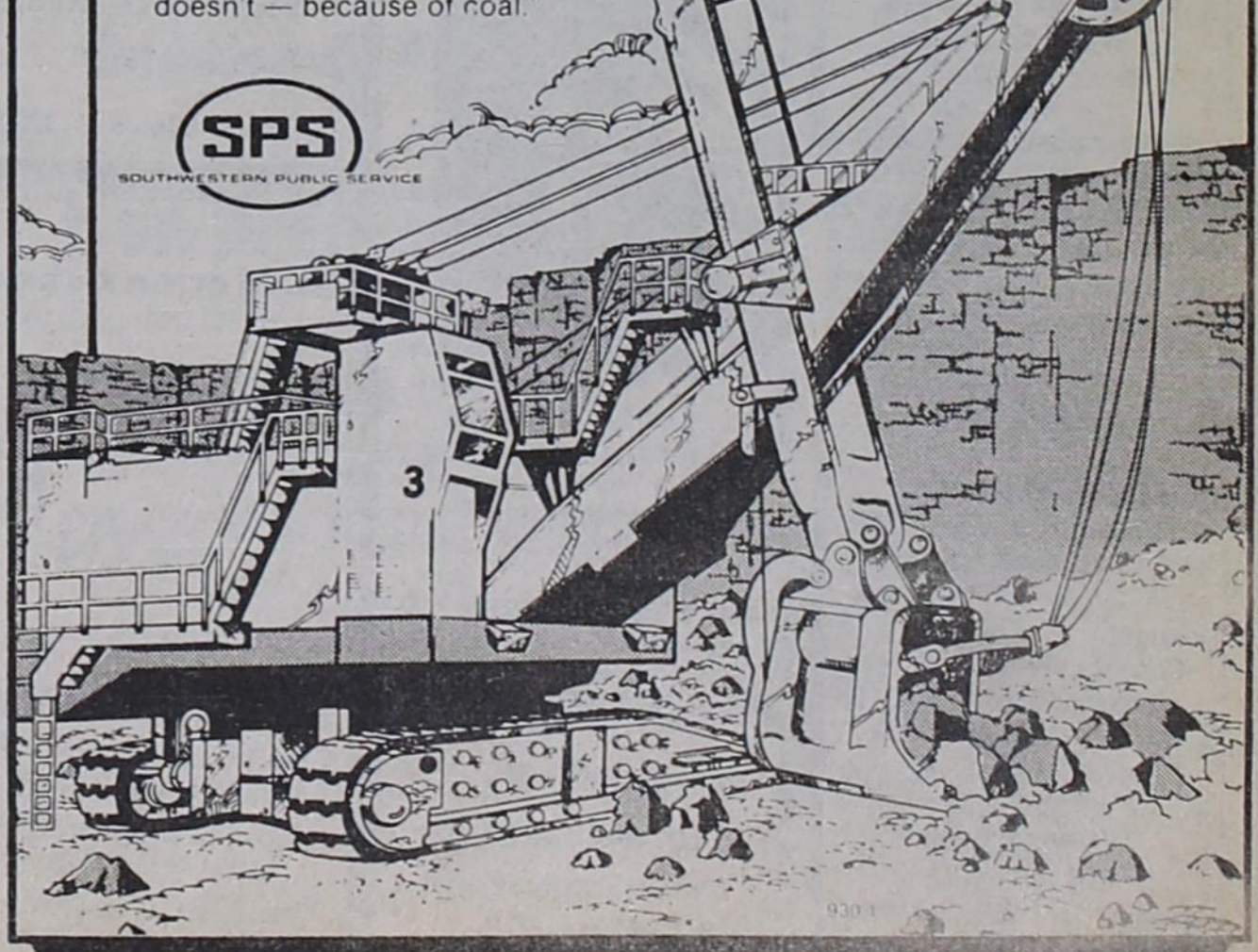

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Kelton Independent School District has determined that an election should be held to ascertain whether said governing body shall be authorized to issue bonds of said District under the provisions of Chapter 20 of the Texas Education Code, including Section 20.04 (b) (1) thereof; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved and Ordered by the Board of Trustees of The Kelton Independent School District:

SECTION 1: That an elect-

ion shall be held on the 26 day of May, 1981, in the Kelton Independent School District for the purpose of submitting to the resident qualified electors of said District the following proposition:

"Shall the Board of Trustees of the KELTON INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT of Wheeler County, Texas, be authorized an empowered, to issue the bonds of said District to the amount of \$500,000 for school building purposes, to wit: the construction and equipment of school buildings in the District and the purchase of the necessary sites therefore, and shall there be pledged and levied, assessed and collected annually ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in the District sufficient, without limit as to rate or amount, to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds as the same become due, said bonds to be issued in one or more series or issues, to mature serially or otherwise not more than forty (40) years from their date, and to bear interest at such rate or rates (not to exceed the maximum rate permitted by law at the time of issuance of the bonds) as in its discretion the Board of Trustees shall determine?"

SECTION 2: That the entire District shall constitute one election precinct for this election and the polling place shall be the School Cafeteria, Kelton, Texas. The persons hereby appointed to serve as officers of this election at said polling place are as follows:

George Davidson, Presiding Judge;

Garland Abernethy, Alternate Presiding Judge.
The Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two (2) nor more than four (4) qualified clerks to serve and assist in holding said election; provided that if the Presiding Judge herein appointed actually serves, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall be one of the clerks.

On election day the polls shall be open from 7:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M.

Dean Johnson is hereby appointed the Clerk and Kim Ray as the Deputy Clerk for absentee voting for said election, and the Superintendent's Office, Kelton, Texas (Mailing Address, Route 1, Wheeler, Texas 79096) in said District, is hereby designated as the place at which absentee voting shall be conducted for said election. For the period absentee voting is permitted by law, the hours designated for absentee voting by personal appearance shall be from 8:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M. on each day except Saturdays, Sundays and official State holidays.

SECTION 3: That paper ballots shall be used for said election, which ballots shall be prepared in accordance with the V.A.T.S. Election Code so as to permit the electors to vote "FOR" "AGAINST" the aforesaid proposition which shall be set forth in substantially the following form:

"THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

The word "FOR" and beneath it the word "AGAINST" shall be made to appear on the left of the proposition. A square shall be printed on the left of each of the words "FOR" and "AGAINST", and each elector shall place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way he wishes to vote.

Errors tend to occur as a result of carelessness even though an attorney may have drafted the original document. Make It Precise

Make your will a precise document.

To avoid law suits, make your will specific enough that it leaves no questions about anything to the probate judge- nor to your survivors.

For example, you may create problems if your will leaves "half the value of my residence" to a particular person. Judges and survivors might question whether "residence" means just the "house" or if it means "house and the land."

Protect Your Children in your will- especially minor children. Think about a "trust" rather than a guardianship.

A trust can provide a flexible and workable arrangement for a child as compared to a costly and inflexible guardianship.

Special Sections Remember special situations, too, such as the deaths of several family members in an auto crash. Include provisions for these unusual circumstances.

Update Your Will

Once the will is written, be sure to update it as holding and family standings change. Family changes-divorce, marriage, births, deaths and interstate moves-can change the settlement of an estate drastically.

For example, differences in state laws can nullify a will made in one state if you move to another state.

SOCIAL SECURITY

FRAUD

A 24 year old Brownsville, Texas woman has been sentenced in Federal Court in Brownsville for defrauding the social security administration, according to Howard L. Weatherly, manager of the Pampa, Texas Social Security office. Maricela Vargas of 55 Aubuck place had pled guilty to a charge that she had failed to report that she was no longer attending Gladys Porier High School in order to continue receiving Social Security student benefits on the record of her deceased father.

U. S. District Judge Filemon B. Vela placed Ms. Vargas on four years' supervised probation and ordered her to repay the \$1,469.00 she had illegally received.

The Social Security Administration is committed to uncovering fraud and prosecuting those who falsify records or conceal pertinent information in order to get benefits, Mr. Weatherly said.

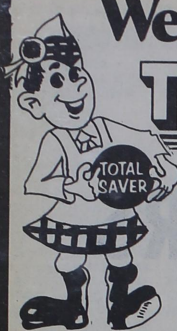
