Paula Britt Is Award Nominee

Paula Britt of Wheeler is among the 98 nominees for the Sixth Annual Texas Panhandle Distinguished Service Awards which will be presented on Saturday, April 25, at West Texas State University.

Ten recipients will be chosen in professional and career fields, civic service and education in the 32-county Texas Panhandle.

The "All For the Family" awards luncheon, which begins at 11 a.m. in the WTSU East Dining Hall, will feature Dr. Emily Taylor, director of the Office of Women in Higher Education of the American Council on Education in Washington, D.C.

Tickets are \$7 each and may be reserved or obtained from the WTSU Office of Programs for Women.

The Wednesday Study Club of Wheeler nominated Britt, who resides with her husband, David, at the Britt Ranch.

Britt has served in a variety of volunteer and civic capacities. She has served as a member of the administrative board of the United Methodist Church of Wheeler for 15 years and as director of music for 12 years. Serving a seventh consecutive year on the North Wheeler County Hospital Board, Britt was elected as women's liaison for five communities to furnish hospital rooms. In 1971, the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce named her Woman of the Year.

She is a member of the Thursday Review Club, Texas Federation of Women's Clubs for which she has served as a health chairperson on the board of directors, president of the Wednesday Study Club and a charter member of the High Plains Chapter of the Poetry Society of Texas. During a two-year period, she directed the activities of 75 area FWOC clubs and visited more than 125 clubs in the Panhandle.

Britt also is area coordinator of Rita Clements' Volunteer Services Infant Inoculation Program and the Governor's Task Force on Health Care Access for the Rural Community for which she co-authored a brochure for the Texas Medical Association. She has served as district poet laureate and is a member of the Texas Historical Foundation, Wheeler County Historical Society and is the mother of two sons.

accomplishment in these areas of interest."

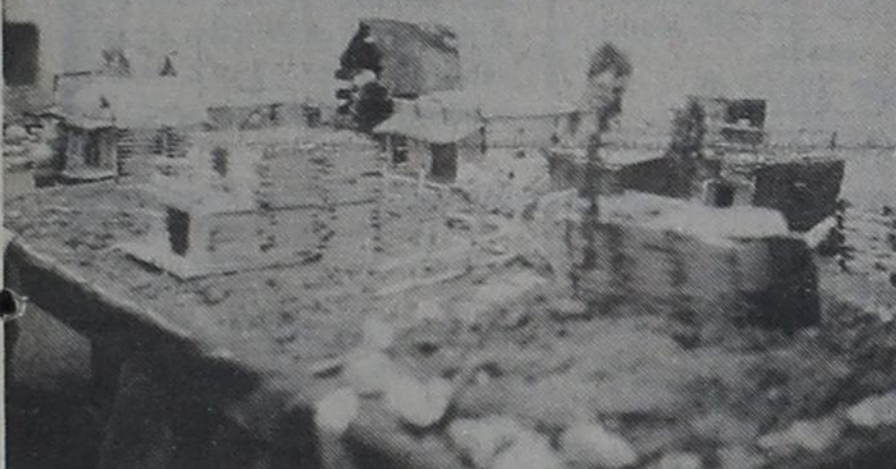

ments, or decreases due to age or deterioration.

The point is, you as a taxpayer should decide what you feel your property is worth on January 1 because, while few people know it, Texas has requires that all property owners provide the tax assessor a rendition of their property owned on January 1. A rendition is a list of property and its value.

By law you must render between January 1 and April 30. It is important that you render your property so that your opinion of the value of your property is put on record with the tax assessor. Texas law requires that the rendition be submitted in a sworn or notarized form.

Many tax offices, however, will accept an individual's rendition on a form available from the tax offices without being notarized or sworn before witnesses. But it must be noted that, should you file suit against a taxing unit over the value of your property, you probably would need a notarized rendition as a point of law.

Obtaining a notary public's seal and signature takes only a little time and trouble; most tax offices have persons there who can notarize you rendition, or they can refer you to a notary public. Often, someone where you work or bank can also help you.

What if you do not render your own property? I will discuss this next week.

As I stated last week, the law states you must render all taxable property between January 1 and April 30. Even though the law states that you must render your property, there is no legal penalty if you do not. So, why bother? Here are the reasons:

1. To take advantage of your rights and remedies. By filing a rendition you have placed into the record your opinion as to the value of your own property.
2. You create a responsibility on the part of the tax assessor and the board of equalization to notify you if they intend to increase the value of your property over the amount you have rendered.
3. If you do not render your property, the tax assessor will do it for you, as the law states he must. He does this by making his own estimate as to the value.

So write or call your tax office for a copy of a rendition. Complete the form and give it to the tax assessor before April 30. Also, a reminder for those who qualify for exemption, you must sign up every year to qualify for exemptions. Call your local tax office before April 30 to see if you qualify.

Postmaster Marvin Walker has announced that the Substitute Rural Carrier of Record examination will be opened to the public April 22, 1981, 8:00 a.m. and will close to the public April 29, 1981, 5:00 p.m., and urged that all those interested apply to take the job-related test that can lead to Postal Service employment.

Present active register is near depletion, Postmaster Walker said. "I do not want to give the impression we will be hiring great number of people in the coming months," the Postmaster said. "I anticipate approximately 1 vacancy will occur in the next two years that will be filled by hiring people from our up-dated register. We need qualified people who will be willing to accept employment, and we want to offer people who will be willing to accept employment, and we want to offer people in the local community the chance to compete for these openings by signing up for and taking the examination."

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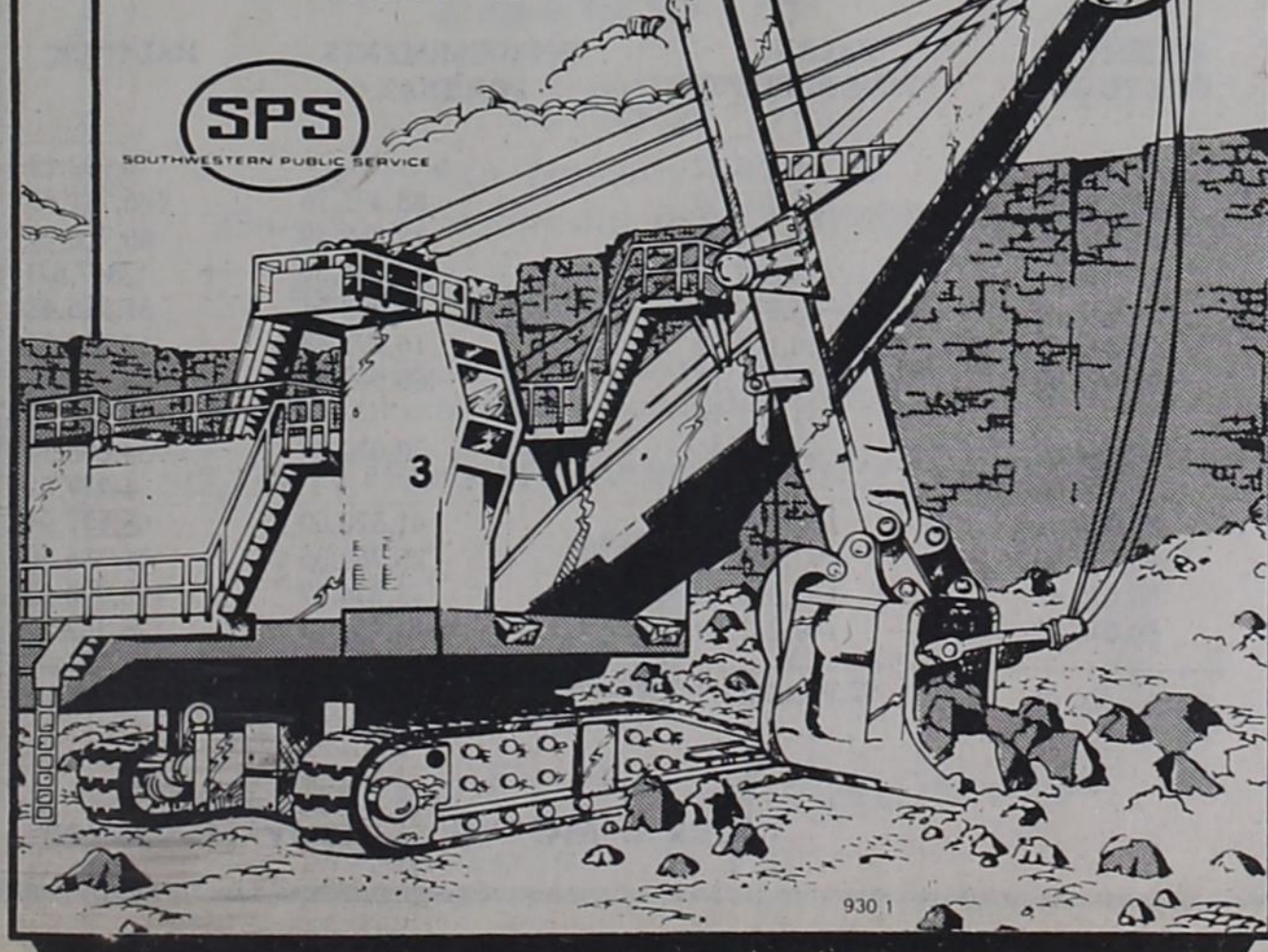
