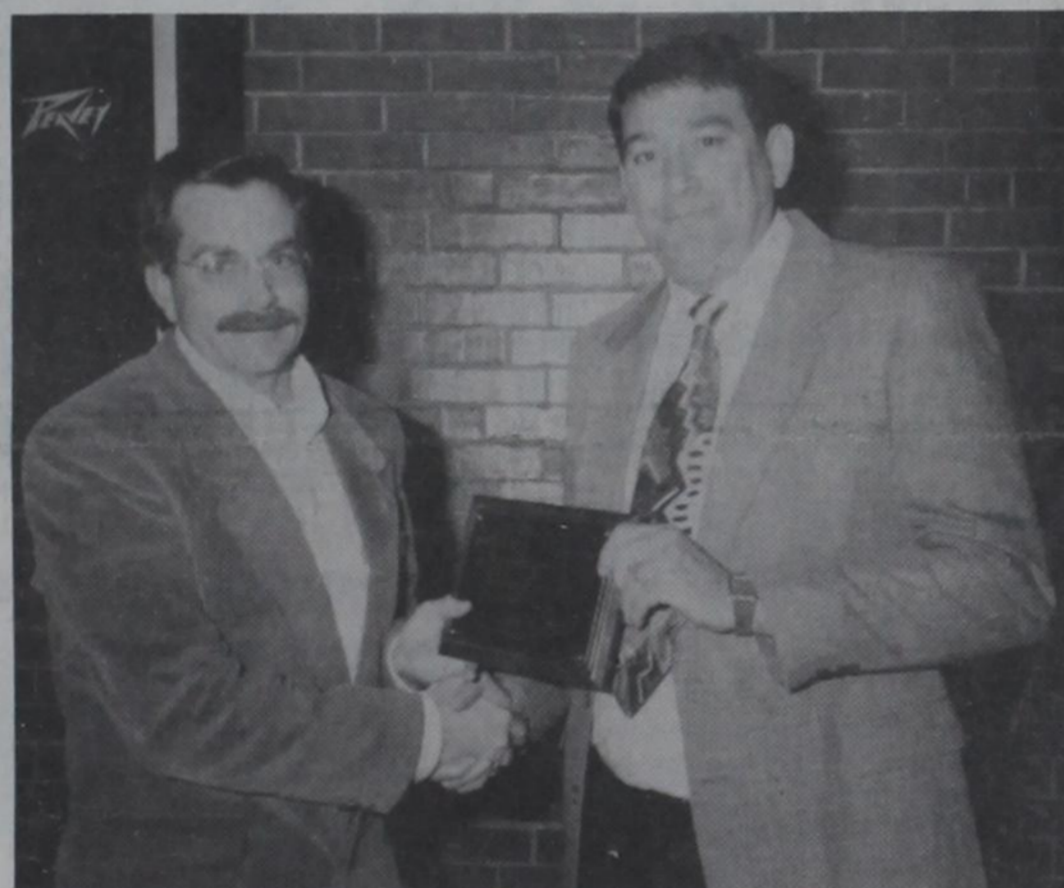

You could see it got to him very much and he sort of looked confused.

The music started and one of the acts came on stage and we were all set for one of our Idols to come out and another act or song wuz presented and then our friend Joe came on stage. He stood there and finally said he wuz happy to be with all of us and he too had family in the service and he too suffered along with all of us being away from home and he had just gotten word one of his children had given his life for his country. He told us the officer had given him word his son had been killed in action some few days past and in his travels from one post to the other he had just found about his loss as he come in the theatre. I think all of us shed tears for a father at that time. He looked at us and made some comment of an old saying in the theatre of the show must go on. He put on a beautiful show an when it was over you never saw the affection we gave him.

Over the years I have had the privilege of bein around many show people, some minor and some stars, but have found most of them to be just like you and me, just people makin a livin at a trade they have chosen. For some reason I never did ask for their autographed photos but on a couple of occasions I have worked with these folks makin a movie and they would write in a little note pad a little note to me such as thanks or sumthing. As I said some of these folks were new in the business and some oldtimers, but each of them have left their imprint on me.

One time out in the mountains I was working with a movie set and the producer asked me if I knew a good doctor there in town and I answered yes we had close friendship with all of them. Mr. Lyons said Tippie Hedron had a cold and needed to see one at once as she was one of the leading actresses in the movie. This one doc I had in mind had just recovered from a heart attack and was working part time. I called Mrs. London, the Doc's wife, and asked if Doc could see Tippie now. I took her up to the Doc and he examined her and gave her a shot and when we left he told me not to bring too many of them beautiful women there as he didn't want a relapse.

I get to see Florence Henderson an that feller that played Gomer Pyle every year at the tract and James Garner comes here and he even gave Mama, my little fat wife, a kiss on the cheek one time, but I sort of watch him after that. Ha.

Have one acquaintance, Ben Johnson, that I sort of feel close to as he lost his bride not long ago and she was a dandy. They had raised a family and had been around rodeo and ropin activities many many years and she was a very nice lady to know.

I've had folks say man wouldn't that be fun to be a movie star and I wonder how many of us would put up with what those folks have to endure gettin up at odd hours, working in remote areas and being away from their families for weeks and weeks at a time. I bet the bigger percent of us would just rather be on the 40 hour a week job. I know Mama wouldn't put up with me kissin Clara or Gini Lodabridga day after day. I know what that gal would do, she would have my duds sittin by the door. See you next week.

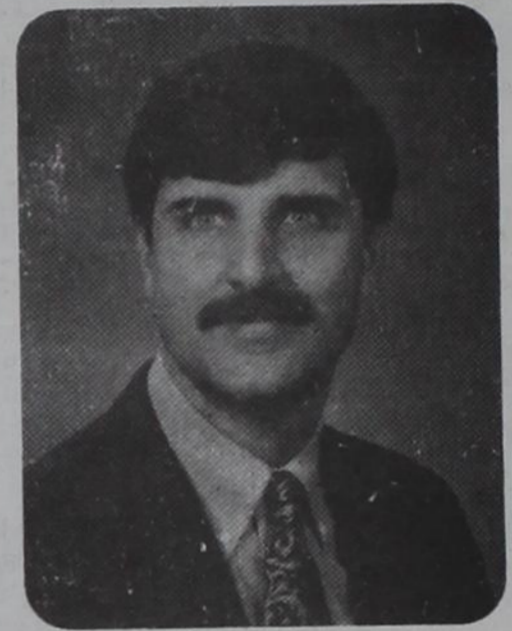

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If your land has never received productivity appraisal, you must apply to the appraisal district no later than April 30th to get the tax benefit for 1995. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but with a penalty.

If your land already receives agricultural appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to do so. If you receive a notice to reapply respond as soon as possible. **FAILURE TO RESPOND COULD LEAD TO YOUR EXEMPTION BEING DENIED.**

Farm Loans Require Crop Insurance Coverage

Any producer who anticipates applying for a farm loan from USDA must obtain at least Catastrophic (CAT) crop insurance coverage on all crops of economic significance. This coverage must be obtained before the sales closing date for the producer's particular crops. The requirement applies to both direct and guaranteed farm ownership, operating, or emergency loans administered by the former Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) offices, now using the working name Rural Economic and Community Development (RECD).

This change is required by the Federal Crop Insurance Reform and Department of Agriculture Reorganization Act of 1994. The Act also authorized the reorganization of USDA, which combined the programs of the former ASCS and FCIC with the farm loan programs of FmHA, under the newly created Consolidated Farm Services Agency (CFSA).

The sales closing dates are approaching quickly. It is crucial for applicants to contact their local CFSA office, because once the deadline has passed and the loan applicant has crops without CAT coverage, they will likely have to wait until the following crop year to be eligible for loan assistance.

Further information about the coverage can be obtained from any local crop insurance agent or the CFSA (formerly ASCS) office. Questions regarding the loan requirement can be answered by the local RECD (formerly FmHA) office.

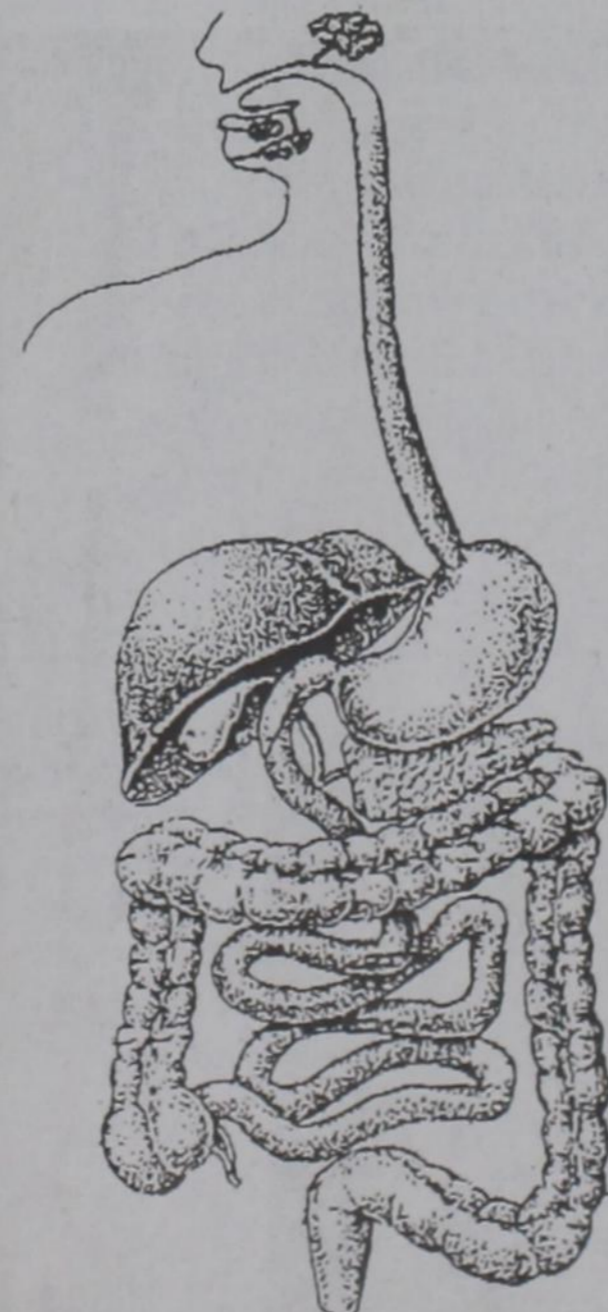
