

# WHEELER AND JAYTON IN REMATCH IN QUARTER FINAL ACTION FRIDAY

Quarterfinal action faces eight teams in Class B football action this weekend and two of those teams are returnees from last year and the two, the defending state champion Wheeler Mustangs and the Jayton Jaybirds get together in a rematch in Vernon Friday night at 7:30.

Jayton defeated Sanderson last week 14-7 to advance to the quarterfinals and the Mustangs walloped the Valley Patriots 43-7 to set the stage for Friday's clash.

Revenge will be on the Jay-

birds minds this week as they fell to the Mustangs last year by a 29-20 count and the Mustangs coaching staff has been reminding the Mustangs of this all week.

Admission for the game will be \$3.00 and \$1.00 just as last week

and fans are urged to leave early for the game. For fans unfamiliar with the location of the stadium in Vernon, you need to take the Business 287 exit and then a right turn where 287 goes to downtown Vernon.

"Jayton has the quickest back we have faced all year in Robert Segura their senior tailback and their offensive line really fires off the ball," Coach Allen said in assessing the Jaybirds. "We've got to stop Segura because they like to drive the ball on people."

The Jaybirds use the Tandem-I most of the time on offense and

have thrown for over 900 yards this season although they like to keep the pigskin on the ground.

Defensively, the Jaybirds use a Split-6 but like most of the teams that the Mustangs have faced, they will probably use a variety of defenses in hopes of stopping the Mustangs' vaunted ground attack.

The Mustangs will counter the running of Segura with a stable of good backs, who have rushed for 3724 yards through 10 games, led by Marvin Grimes who has rushed for 1294 yards on 131 carries. Benny Baker has gained

618 yards and Kent Vise 549 yards as the two stellar backs have shared duty in the fullback spot.

Wheeler came out of the Valley game injury free and will be in top shape for the Jaybird battle.

The winner of Friday night's quarterfinal action will face the

# MUSTANGS WIN BI-DISTRICT OVER VALLEY

## MONTY TAYLOR TO COMPETE IN WORLD SERIES OF PROFESSIONAL RODEO DEC. 1

Rodeo is seldom mentioned except by those who are familiar with the sport. The world series of professional rodeos will be starting Friday, December 1st in Oklahoma City, and Monty Taylor of Allison, a member of the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association, will be competing in the always dangerous bull riding event. He has just competed in the Lone Star Circuit Finals in Abilene, Texas. The circuit finals, also known as the Texas State Finals is a new concept in rodeo. This was the first year to be held. To qualify for the finals in Abilene, the cowboy must be one of the top fifteen money winners in PRCAs sanctioned rodeos in Texas. Monty went in to the state finals in second place in total money earned in bull riding. He trailed only reigning World Champion Don Gay by a

few dollars as the finals got under way November 15, 1978. There were four performances running through November 18th. Monty scored 68 points on his first bull, but failed to place. He scored a very impressive 1st place the second performance by marking his bull with an 82. He placed 3rd on Friday with a score of 76 and went in to the final performance leading his fourteen peers in points and having the highest score of the finals for a single ride. He drew a rank but potentially high scoring bull and was the last man to come out by virtue of his standings through the first three performances. He had a bad break, lost his hold and failed to score on his last bull. However, he finished the State Finals in second place winning \$1000.00 in prize and Winston bonus money.

The World Series of Professional Rodeo, better known as the National Finals, is a 10 performance rodeo held this time of every year. The cowboy scoring the most points during the finals will be crowned World Champion at it's conclusion. The top fifteen cowboys in each event (top money winners in the PRCAs during the fiscal year) will attempt to ride the top bucking animals in all of rodeo (so voted by the contestants).

Monty enters the National Finals in fourth place at the conclusion of the fiscal year 1978. This is a tremendous honor and it takes a top hand to make it. As of this date, there are only three bull riders in the world to win more money during 1978 than Monty. He has a very good chance to win the prestigious World's Champion title.

The National Finals are usually sold out months in advance and is very difficult to get a ticket to see it. There will be two performances televised in our area this year. The first performance will be taped on Friday and aired on Saturday night, December 2nd. The final performance is scheduled to be televised Saturday, December 9th.

Monty is a fine athlete, a fine young man, and a tremendous competitor. He is making quite a name for himself around the country and barring injury, should be one of the top bull riders in the world for quite some time. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Cliff Taylor of Allison and the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Taylor of Wheeler.

Wheeler's awesome and number one ranked Mustangs unleashed their powerful offense and a bone crushing defense on the Valley Patriots last Friday night in Memphis for a convincing 43-6 victory in their bi-district clash.

The victory, Wheeler's 29th without a loss, earned the Mustangs a berth in the quarterfinals this week in a repeat clash with the Jayton Jaybirds in Vernon.

Valley played the state's top ranked team nearly on even terms, though they trailed 7-0, until the first quarter was coming to an end when Valley chose to go for it on fourth and 1 from their 39.

Darrell Dowd hit the Mustangs left side and Marvin Grimes smacked the Patriots premier running back for a 2 yard loss and you can say that was the ball game.

Dowd left the ball game minutes later with an ankle injury after picking up just 26 yards on

10 attempts against the hard hitting Mustangs.

The Mustangs quickly got their second touchdown after holding the Patriots on the 37. Myron Jolly passed for 10 yards to Willie Valencia to get the drive started and Valencia capped the 6 play excursion with a 9 yard scamper to paydirt on a reverse.

Mike Evans kicked true and Wheeler led by 14-0 with 9:45 to play in the second quarter.

Valley just couldn't generate any offense against a Wheeler Defense that seems to get better

each week of play. The Patriots mustered only one first down in the first three quarters and got their only touchdown on an 84 yard drive late in the game against the Mustangs second and third teams.

Wheeler only went to the air twice in the game and their first pass was intercepted at the Valley 1 to kill a Mustang threat the first time they had the pigskin.

On the Mustangs second possession, they drove 50 yards for the game's opening score with Grimes getting 31 yards in the march that saw Jolly roll around his left end from the 4.

The Mustangs offensive line just blew the Patriots off the ball throughout the game and made running a lot easier for the Mustangs backs.

It was downhill all the way for the Black Machine after Jolly's TD and the Mustangs added two more touchdowns to their total before halftime for the 28-0 margin that the Patriots had no chance to overcome.

Jolly fair caught a Patriot punt at the Valley 48 to put the Mustangs in high gear for their

third tally. Grimes got the drive started on a 12 yard scamper on a quick pitch at right end and then Kent Vise bolted up the middle on a trap to score from the 32. Evans booted the demoralized patriots into a 21-0 deficit.

Only 1:04 remained in the first half when the Mustangs tacked on their fourth touchdown and once again it took the horses only two plays.

Valencia did a bit of nifty running to gain 14 on first down before the Mustangs called on their fullback up the middle once more and this time Benny Baker got the call and the bruising sophomore fullback shed a tackler about the 25 and rambled into the end zone from 31 yards out. Valley's fans were completely subdued by this time and could start thinking about basketball when Evans put his fourth conversion kick through the uprights.

Wheeler didn't cool off at the half and added two more touchdowns by midway of the third period and Coach Allen started substituting freely.

Taking the second half kickoff, the Mustangs headed relentlessly

ly goalward and overcame 20 yards in penalties to march 52 yards in 8 plays with Vise getting his second touchdown of the game with a 3 yard plunge over right guard.

Wheeler's golden toe, Mike Evans, split the uprights and the state's number one team in Class B was in the lead by 35-0.

Up to this point in the game, Valley still had just 1 first down and were forced to kick again on their next possession and Jolly returned Kenny Chandler's boot 21 yards to the Patriot 30.

Grimes found daylight on first down on another quick pitch good for 11 yards and four plays later scored from the 8 over left guard. Jolly passed to Vise for the two pointer and Mustangs had ended their scoring for the night.

So tough was the Mustangs hitting in the contest, four Patriots ended up on the sidelines, including their top two backs, with assorted burises from the relentless pounding they took.

"Our kids played a super defensive game against Valley and they pride themselves on outthumping people," Coach Allen said after the game.

The head mentor of the Mustangs went on to say in a joyous Wheeler dressing room that he couldn't be more proud of a group of young men. "Our kids are a super bunch and after a slow start we just dominated them on offense and defense. I can't say enough about the way we played; all the kids did terrific and Vic Bradford was a monster on defense."

## Meadows May Be Jonestown Victim

Gladys Meadows Smith, a native of Wheeler, may be one of the 912 bodies being brought back to the United States from Jonestown, Guyana. Mrs. Smith had written her father, Melvin Meadows, recently and the letter was postmarked Georgetown—the settlement closest to Jonestown.

Mr. Meadows received the first letter, postmarked Georgetown in December 1977. The letter was not informative and only indicated that her and the four children, ages 4 thru 14, were fine. The family was last in Wheeler in April, 1977.

The husband, David Smith, phoned Mr. Meadows from San Francisco in May of this year and indicated he was finishing up a few loose ends before he joined his wife and children in South America. San Francisco was the location of the headquarters for the followers of Rev. Jones.

Contact was made with Washington Tuesday to learn of the fate of the Smith family, but nothing was learned. Mr. Meadows will be notified if information becomes available.

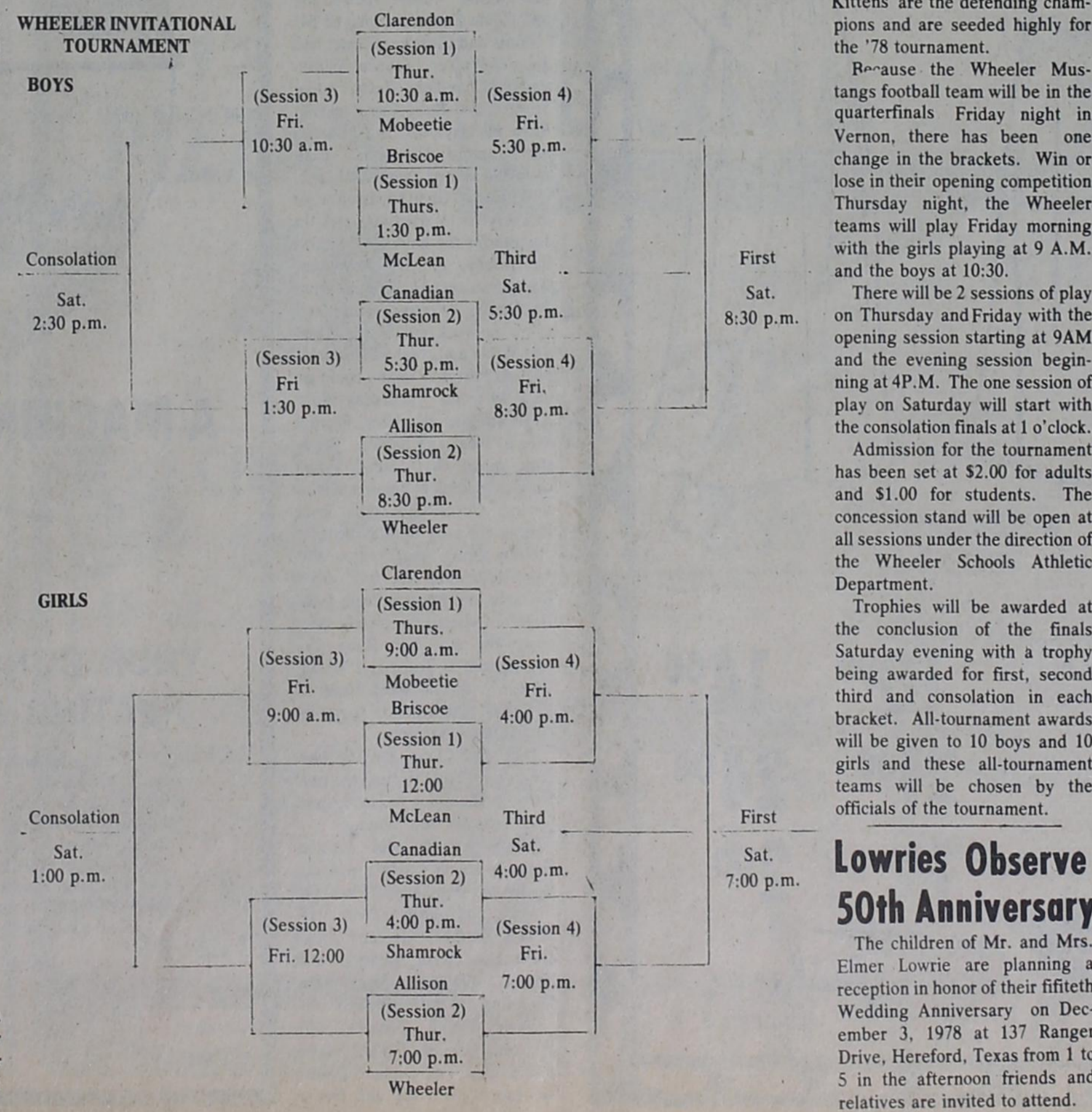

## Beef Producers Receive Invitation

Wheeler County beef cattle producer's are invited to attend a Beef Cattle Reproduction meeting Tuesday, December 5 at 7:30 P.M. in the Production Credit Assn. Meeting Room in Wheeler. The meeting is being sponsored by the Livestock Committee of the County Program Building Committee and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Programs of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are open to all people regardless of race, color, religion, sex, national origin or social-economic level.

Two specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Amarillo will present the program.

Dr. John McNeil, Area Beef Cattle specialist, will discuss the effect of cow condition, nutritional level and length of breeding season on conception rate. He will also give a review of estrus synchronization and artificial insemination management.

Dr. Gene Cope, area Veterinarian, will talk about a vaccination program for the cow herd.

Don King, County Extension Agent, said, "With the annual cost of keeping a cow at about \$190, it is important that the cow-calf producer have as high a calf crop as possible. Information presented at this meeting should help the producer increase this calf crop percentage."

### Book Review

"Emma Hamilton," by Noral Lofts, was born a poor country girl of immense charm, wit, kindness, and ambition. She becomes the wife of the connoisseur and antiquarian Sir William Hamilton, then meets and falls in love with the darling of the British public -- the small, brave, unspectacular Horatio Nelson, despite her somewhat dubious beginnings in London at the age of sixteen, she soon emerges as the most beautiful, fascinating and talked about woman of her day, painted by famous artists,

admired by distinguished men, courted by princes, she is the wife of the British Ambassador in Naples, and the confidante of Queen Maria Carolina of Naples. "Small Town," by Sloan Wilson, is a wonderful, engrossing story of love, rivalry, and some very turbulent goings-on in a deceptively placed upstate New York town. What has the tongues wagging is a simmering triangle between widower Ben Winslow, a middle-aging bear of a man; his young sister-in-law Annie; and his lean handsome son Ebon, grown to manhood and with his father's eye for the ladies. Their relationships shift and blur, complicated by old scandals, memories, warfare with the biggest and most vengeful in town and the sudden arrival of Annie's drunken, nimble-tongued Irish father, finally erupting into a confrontation that resolves the triangle.

## LEARN NOT TO BURN

### Ken Daughtry—Fire Marshall FIREPLACES AND SAFETY

Energy shortages, the high cost of gas, oil and electricity, and the growing fireplace romance have resulted in increased consumer interest in fireplaces. Modern fireplace systems are a long way from the smoked up (but picturesque) fireplaces of the pioneers. Today, fireplaces come in many sizes and shapes: fireplaces and fireplace stoves, built on-the-spot and factory built, and mounted into or against the wall — or even in a corner or freestanding.

Underwriters Laboratories Inc. (UL) and your local Fire Dept. believe that a fireplace should be more than warm and eye-catching. It should be operated safely, as well. The following are some safety tips for your "chestnut roasting" activities this year.

\* Highly combustible materials, such as loose papers, cardboard and fabrics, should be kept away from the fireplace area.

These materials could easily be ignited by stray hot ashes, glowing embers, or flying sparks. Ashes should be placed in a metal container with a tight fitting lid, pending final disposal.

\* Check to see that the chimney and flue lining are clean. Is the damper in proper working order? If the flue is obstructed carbon monoxide, other toxic gases, and smoke can escape into the living area. Soot and tar deposits can build up on the walls of the chimney and flue. These deposits are highly flammable, and if not periodically removed, can be the source of a fire.

\* Open the damper before starting a fire, and keep it open until every ember is completely out — again, carbon monoxide gas can fill the living area, even causing death.

\* A tight fitting screen or door should be placed over the front of the fireplace to prevent sparks and hot coals from popping out.

\* When building a fire, don't overdo it. Overfiring can make the firebox and flue lining red-hot, causing a flue and chimney fire. Place a moderate amount of fuel in the firebox area. Also, people who use lighter fluid on a wood or coal fire are asking for trouble — a flashback fire can result, and invisible vapor can travel throughout the room causing a fire hazard.

\* Fireplace fires consume oxygen while burning. Therefore, make certain that there is proper ventilation, both for burning efficiency and for the safety of the occupants of the house.

\* Store wood in a dry area

prior to burning. A six month storage period is desirable. The drier the wood, the more evenly the fire will burn. Using wood that is not sufficiently dry increases the possibility of soot and tar deposits, as well as flying sparks.

\* Certain types of coal can be highly volatile. Coal should be stored in a cool (75 degrees or lower) atmosphere with no foreign cluttering the area.

\* A factory built fireplace or fireplace stove should bear the UL listing Mark, indicating that it meets recognized safety standards.

\* When installing a factory built fireplace or freestanding fireplace stove, seek expert help and follow the manufacturer's instructions completely. Make certain that freestanding stoves are placed an adequate distance away from combustibel materials.

Keep safety in mind and enjoy warm and pleasant nostalgic times using your fireplace.

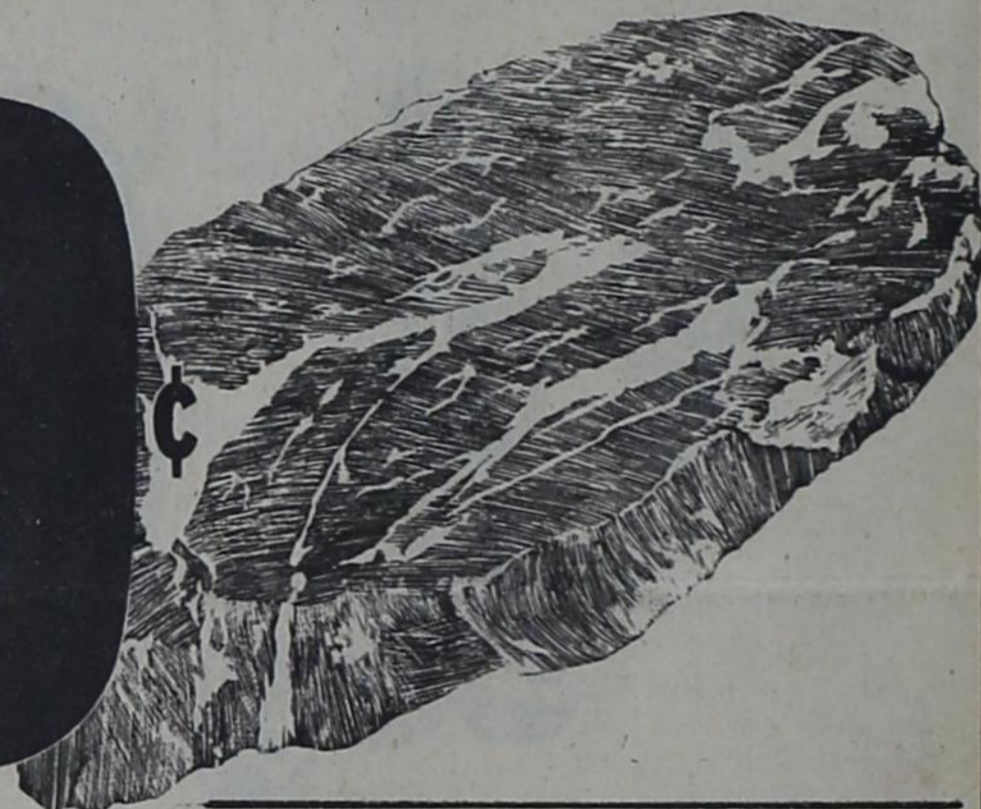

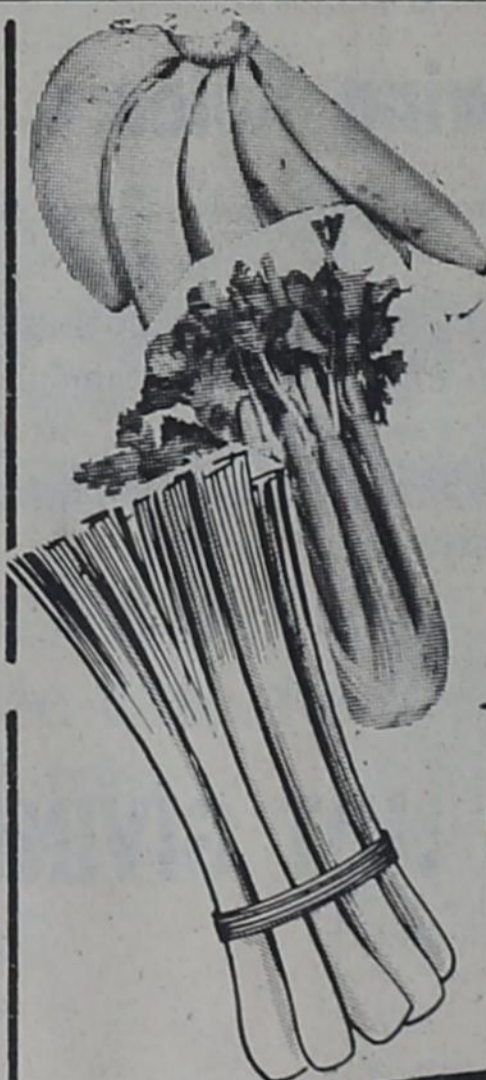

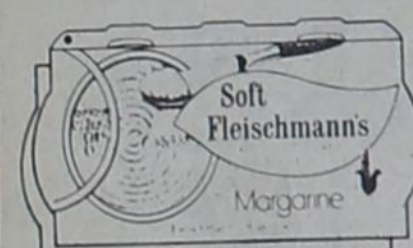
