Hospital Opening, Dedication

The North Wheeler County Hospital Board of Directors is pleased to announce the opening and dedication of the newly expanded facilities of Parkview Hospital on June 2, from 2 until 4 P.M. Dedication ceremonies will be held in the hospital cafeteria at 2 P.M.

The first phase of the expansion program provided for new construction consisting of ten private rooms with baths, four semi-private rooms with connecting baths, the area for a future respiratory therapy and physical therapy department, and elevator, and a complete new laboratory, kitchen, dietary center, and cafeteria. This new construction encompasses in excess of 12,000 square feet.

In conjunction with the new multi-level construction, the second phase of planning provided for the complete renovation of the existing facility. New wiring, plumbing and floor covering have been installed through-

out the hospital. A new chapel, nurses station, nursery, and a second x-ray and emergency room completed the renovation program.

New equipment installed includes new completely electric beds, a new telephone switchboard system, installation of a new G. E. Montrol 15 x-ray machine, and a variety of new laboratory equipment.

The public is cordially invited to attend the dedication ceremonies Sunday afternoon, June 2, in the hospital cafeteria. Tours of the facility will be followed by an informal reception hosted by the North Wheeler Hospital Board member's wives.

Jack D. Sims 61, of 200 Antonio, Canyon died May 16th.

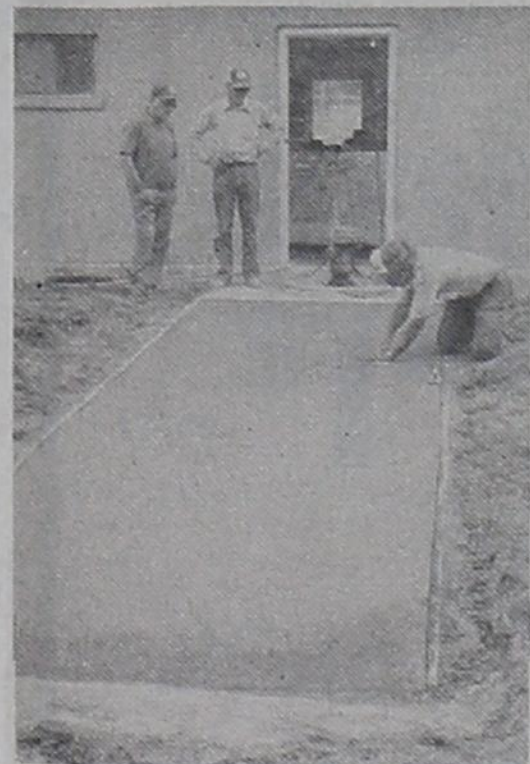

Graveside rites were held at 4:00 p.m. in the Mobeetie Cemetery by Schooler Gordon Herring Funeral Directors of Canyon.

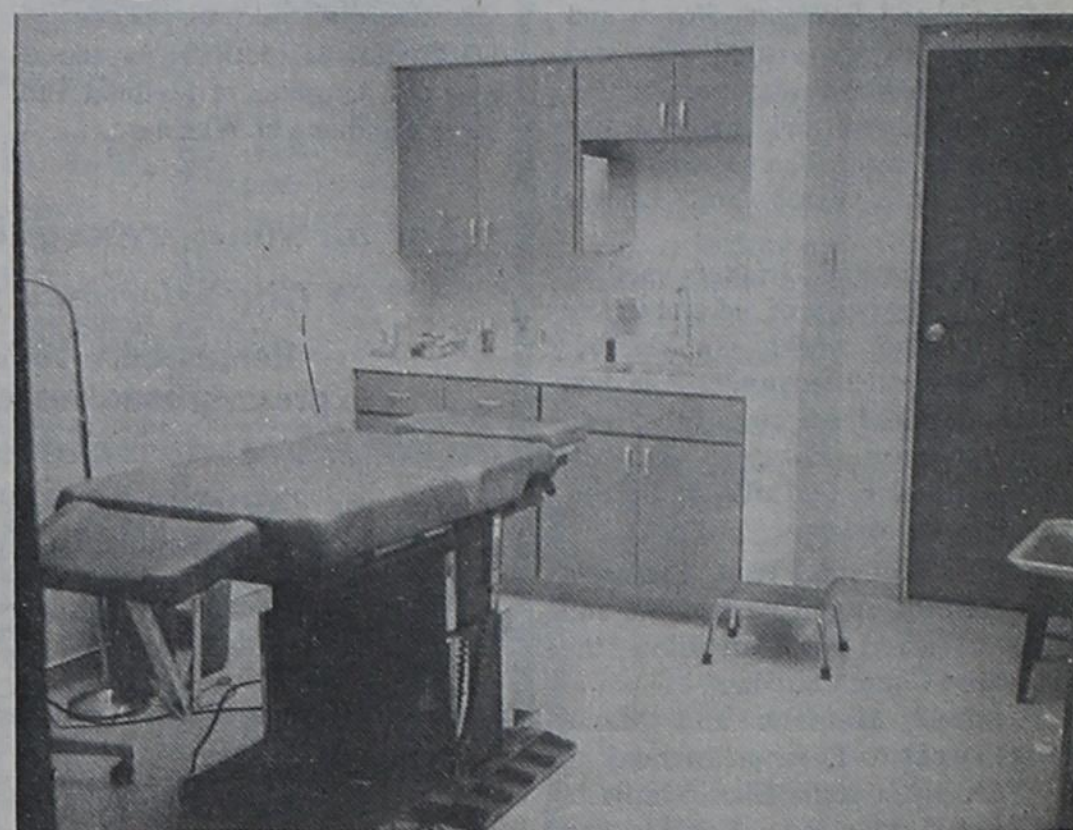

Joe Montgomery motion the meeting adjourn. David Cross second, motion carried.

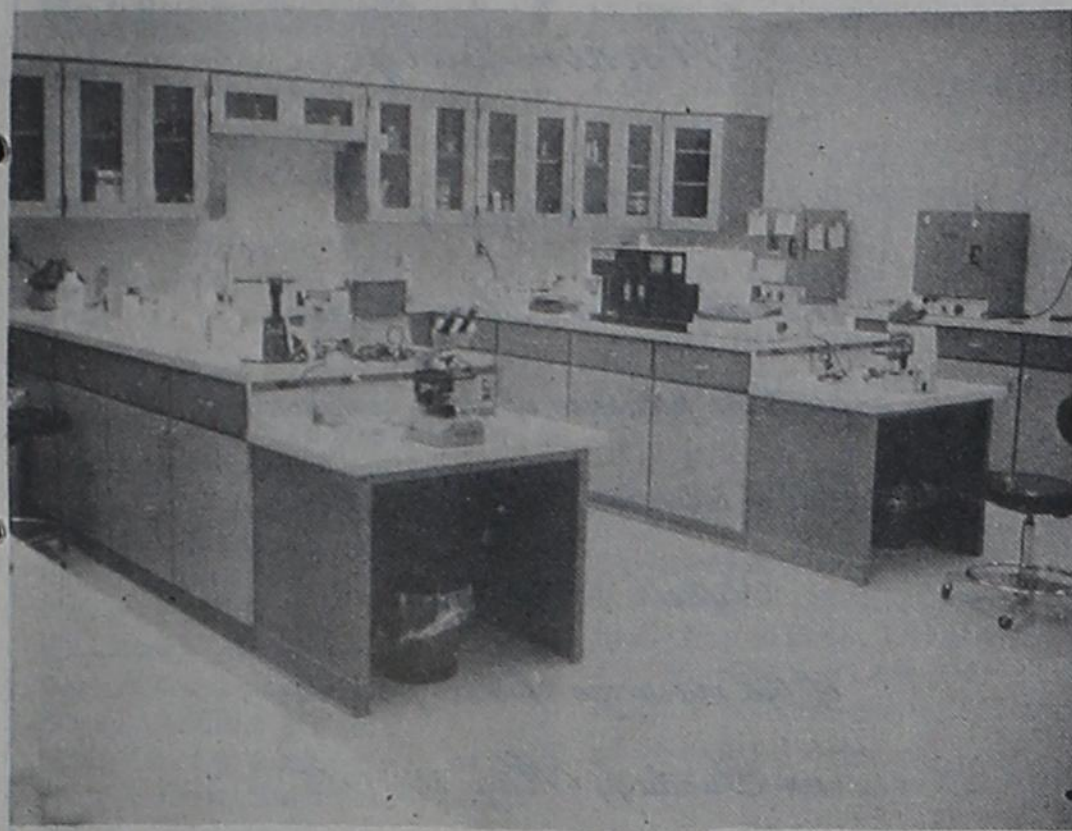

Wheat Rust Is Developing Rapidly

What promised to be an outstanding wheat crop is being threatened by infections of wheat rust in many fields.

The infection begins on the lower leaf and moves up the plant. Rust development is fastest when the leaves are wet and the temperature is between 60-80 degrees F. Our present weather conditions are ideal for the spread of rust in wheat fields. Under these conditions, a generation of rust takes about 2 weeks.

Each producer must make the decision to treat based on his own situation. The cost of spraying for rust with Bayleton is between \$15 and \$20 per acre. The treatment will not stop the development where the infection is already present, but will prevent the spread for about 21 days. you would then have another 12-14 days from the time of infection until the rust pustules appear on the leaf surface.

The presence of infection can be determined by holding a wheat leaf up to the light. The appearance of small, yellow, pinpoint spots indicates that the leaf is infected.

Dr. Bob Berry, Extension Plant Pathologist, has said that the top leaf (flag leaf) will fill about 40%, and the third leaf will fill 20%.

In at least one field in the county, damage was so severe that the grower is planning to bale wheat that earlier looked like it would produce 30-40 bushels per acre.

If you decide to treat your wheat, you should do so as soon as possible to save the top three leaves.

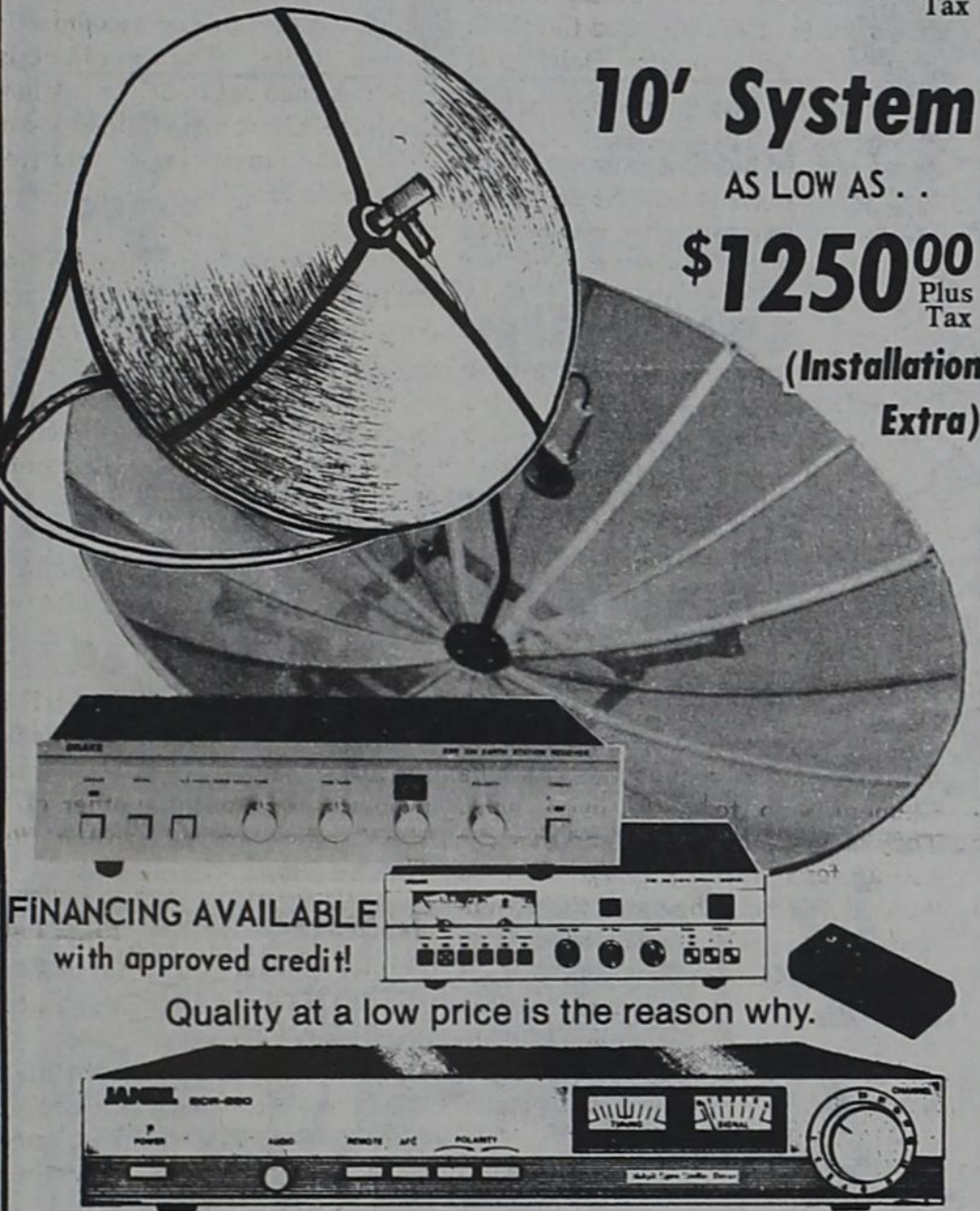

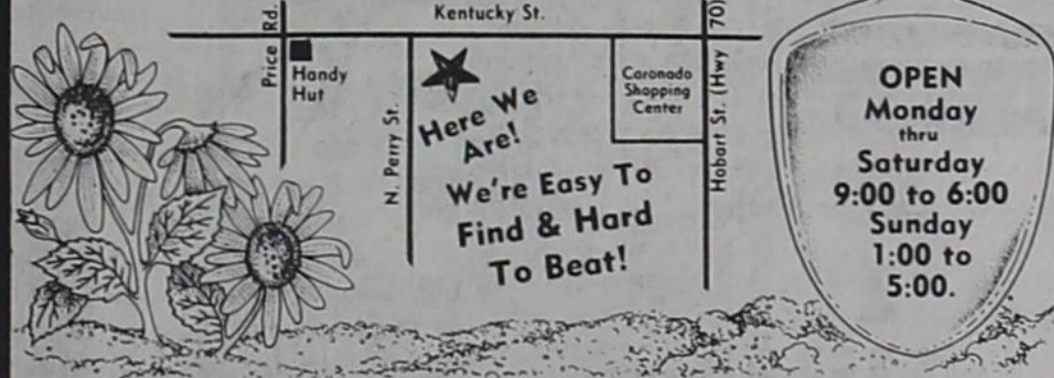
