





### **PUBLIC NOTICE**

AT&T Communications of the Southwest, Inc. ("AT&T Communications"), in accordance with the Public Utility Regulatory Act and the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas ("PUC") hereby gives notice of its intent to implement a new schedule of rates for its services. The new rates will be effective May 14, 1985, unless otherwise determined by the PUC. All customers and classes of customers would be affected by the proposed rates.


AT&T Communications has filed a reprice of its tariffs designed to more closely recover access and other costs for WATS and 800 Service and all private line services including Channel Services, Foreign Exchange (FX), DATAPHONE\* Digital Service, and OCC Facilities.

Also proposed is the institution of a charge for Directory Assistance to begin to recover access costs incurred for such service and increases in rates for operator assisted AT&T Long Distance calls. The initial minute charge for all AT&T Long Distance calls and additional minute rates for AT&T Long Distance calls 51 miles or less are proposed for increases to reflect the access charges approved by the PUC for such calls.

The proposed new rates for all services would result in an increase in adjusted test period revenues of \$139 million or 12.7 percent.

A complete copy of the proposed tariffs are on file with the Texas Public Utility Commission.

Any person interested in finding out more about the commercial vergetable growing program being offered is invited to attend. There will be representatives from all levels of the company on hand to answer questions including the plant manager, field manager, marketing manager, and business man-

The cooperative offers an alternative from the traditional crops of wheat and cotton through a network of corporations that will assist the farmer with his crop from start to finish. Members of the coop will receive advise on what to plant, when to plant, and suggested care and harvesting of crops. Vegetables are processed, packed, and marketing to insure the best profit possible for the farmer.

Pizza has an undeserved reputation as "junk food". Yet, nutritional analysis of fast-food and frozen pizza shows it can be a nutritional part of a balanced diet.

Differences in pizza recipes can, of course have a substantial impact on nutrient content. But in general, pizza contains substantial amounts of eight key nutrients. The only thing it's lacking is vitamin C.

If you're a typical adult woman who consumes about 2000 calories each day, one serving of pizza represents between 15 and 20 percent of your daily intake. For good nutrition, a food that takes up that much of your calorie allotment should also contribute a similar proportion of your daily nutrient needs.

Pizza meets this requirement. Most pizzas contribute at least 15 to 20 percent of the U.S. RDA of protein, calcium, riboflavin and several other nutrients.

The cheese provides protein and calcium. Both the cheese and the crust contain riboflavin. The pizza crust also contributes thiamin, niacin and iron. Vitamin A is in the cheese and tomato sauce. If any vitamin C is present, it comes from the tomato sauce.

When you add toppings to pizza, you add calories, but you also add substantial amounts of nutrients. For example, red or green peppers supply vitamin C that isn't present in a basic

People on low-calorie diets can enjoy pizza too. One slice of cheese pizza, at about 145 calories, makes it a good alternative to other low-calorie

Pizza's one significant nutritional limitation is the amount of sodium it contains. It isn't a good food for low-sodium diets because both mozzarella cheese and tomato sauce contain substantial amounts of sodium, and some pizzas contain added salt or other sodium-containing seasonings.


Southern peas, also called cowpeas or blackeye peas, are one of the easiest crops to grow in Texas. They do like it to be hot and don't like too much water.

Southern peas actually are members of the "bean" family and there are three major typesblackeyes, crowder and purple hull. Crowder peas are grown just for shelling because they don't snap as well as the other varieties.

No matter which type of southern pea you choose, they all are planted and cultivated in the same manner. They shouldn't be planted until seven to 10 days after the last killing frost. Then, you can continue making additional plantings at two to three week intervals until mid spring.

This is one crop to which there absolutely is no advantage to planting early. Instead of maturing earlier, the seeds will rot if planted

### **Southern Peas Are Easy** To Grow, Good To Eat



Place seed 1 to 11/2 inches deep in rows 24 to 36 inches apart. Space plants about 4 to 6 inches apart within the row. A half pound of seeds will pro-

duce 25 pounds of shelled peas, so before planting you will need to determine how many peas you will be able to eat and preserve. Plants usually grow to about 2 feet tall and will be ready to harvest in about 90 days.

Southern peas don't require a rich soil but do need good drainage. Also, it's important to neither

over-fertilize or over-water your growing plants. Apply a complete and balanced fertilizer every four to six weeks. If you fertilize more than that, your plants will grow large but will set few, if any, pods.

soil is dry and controlling weeds, there is little else you need to do for peas. Comparatively, you get more food for less effort with southern peas than with most other garden crops.




