## STORM ALERT SOUNDED

A cloud approached Wheeler Thursday evening with reports of hail in Pampa. Rain and hail began to fall shortly before 5 and an official total of 3.43 inches was received for the evening.

The national weather service issued a severe storm watch for Wheeler County and the Volunteer Fire Departments in the north half of the county were called out at 6:53. The men watched as the clouds passed

over Wednesday and then backed in for a second time. The sirens to take shelter were sounded shortly after 8:00 by the Wheeler Fire Department. The clouds passed and returned, producing heavy rain and small hail at different times.

The reported amounts ranged from nearly nothing to over 4". The amount measured is the official reading, with the gauge located at 1104 S. Canadian. The cloudy, wet weather remained in the area and produced 0.29 inches measured Sunday morning. The measurement from a Sunday night rainfall was 1.32 inches and the measurement on Tuesday morning was 0.04 inches.

The total rainfall for the month reached 5.65 inches.

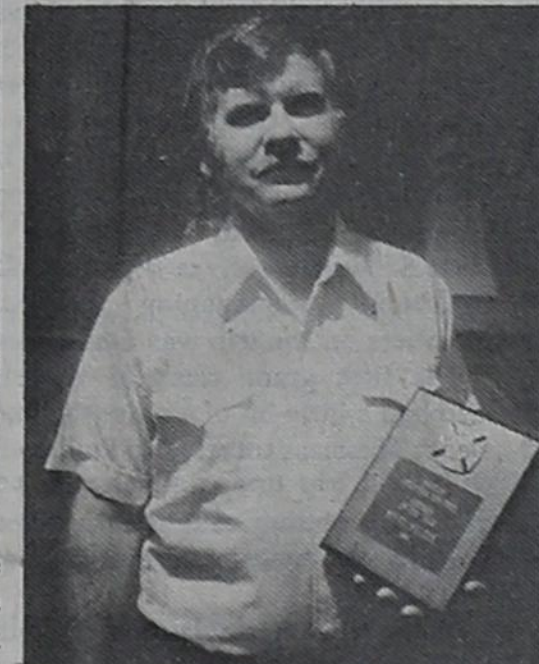
Speaking of names, it is embarrassing to go to these school functions and recognizing so few of the students and adults in attendance. When your kids graduate you do drift away from the

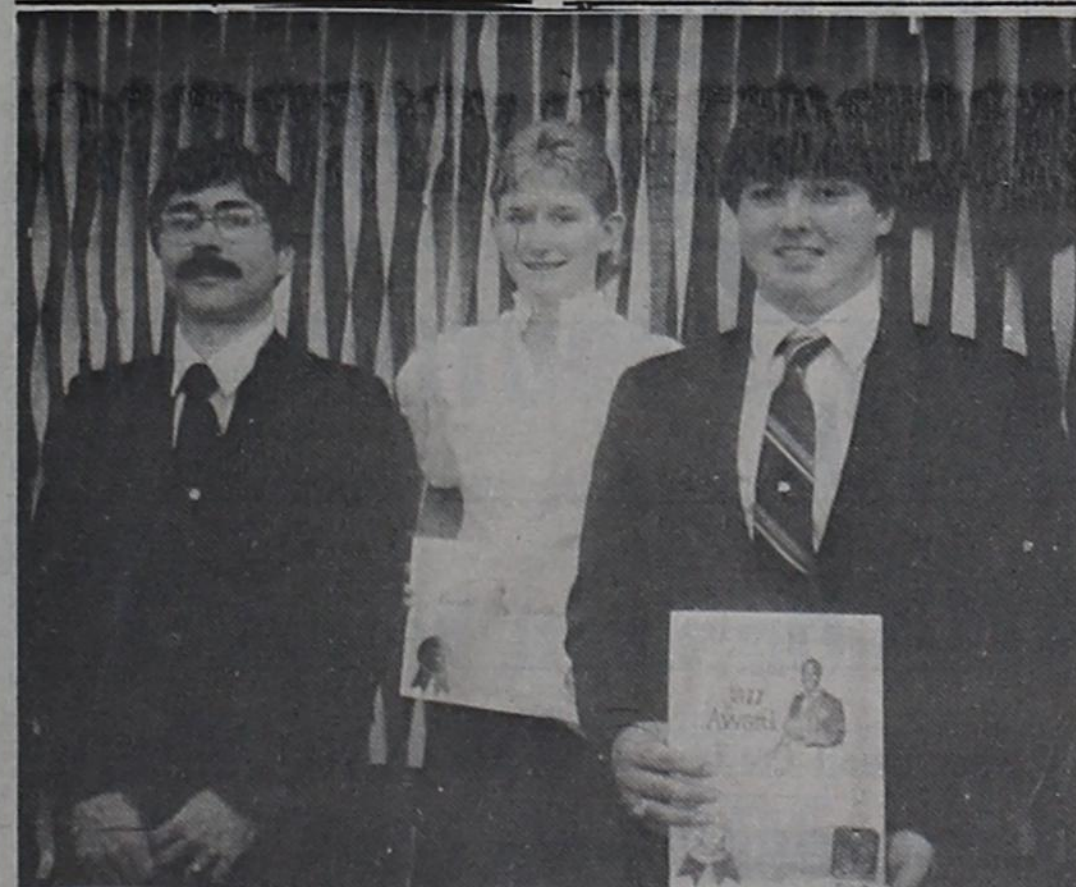



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

**PUBLIC NOTICE**

AT&T Communications of the Southwest, Inc. ("AT&T Communications"), in accordance with the Public Utility Regulatory Act and the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas ("PUC") hereby gives notice of its intent to implement a new schedule of rates for its services. The new rates will be effective May 14, 1985, unless otherwise determined by the PUC. All customers and classes of customers would be affected by the proposed rates.

AT&T Communications has filed a reprice of its tariffs designed to more closely recover access and other costs for WATS and 800 Service and all private line services including Channel Services, Foreign Exchange (FX), DATAPHONE\* Digital Service, and OCC Facilities.

Also proposed is the institution of a charge for Directory Assistance to begin to recover access costs incurred for such service and increases in rates for operator assisted AT&T Long Distance calls. The initial minute charge for all AT&T Long Distance calls and additional minute rates for AT&T Long Distance calls 51 miles or less are proposed for increases to reflect the access charges approved by the PUC for such calls.

The proposed new rates for all services would result in an increase in adjusted test period revenues of \$139 million or 12.7 percent.

A complete copy of the proposed tariffs are on file with the Texas Public Utility Commission.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible. ## Southern Peas Are Easy To Grow, Good To Eat

Southern peas, also called cow-peas or blackeye peas, are one of the easiest crops to grow in Texas. They do like it to be hot and don't like too much water. Southern peas actually are members of the "bean" family and there are three major types—blackeyes, crowder and purple hull. Crowder peas are grown just for shelling because they don't snap as well as the other varieties. No matter which type of southern pea you choose, they all are planted and cultivated in the same manner. They shouldn't be planted until seven to 10 days after the last killing frost. Then, you can continue making additional plantings at two to three week intervals until mid spring. This is one crop to which there absolutely is no advantage to planting early. Instead of maturing earlier, the seeds will rot if planted

when the ground is too cold. Place seed 1 to 1½ inches deep in rows 24 to 36 inches apart. Space plants about 4 to 6 inches apart within the row. A half pound of seeds will produce 25 pounds of shelled peas, so before planting you will need to determine how many peas you will be able to eat and preserve. Plants usually grow to about 2 feet tall and will be ready to harvest in about 90 days. Southern peas don't require a rich soil but do need good drainage. Also, it's important to neither over-fertilize or over-water your growing plants. Apply a complete and balanced fertilizer every four to six weeks. If you fertilize more than that, your plants will grow large but will set few, if any, pods. Other than watering when the soil is dry and controlling weeds, there is little else you need to do for peas. Comparatively, you get more food for less effort with southern peas than with most other garden crops.

## MOBEETIE SEEKING WATER GRANT

Mobeetie is seeking a water grant from the Texas Department of Community Affairs to pay for a water well to back up the one the city built in 1982. To qualify for the well Mobeetie would have to be in urgent need, to have a minority population or have more than 51% in moderate to low income bracket families. Mayor Leona House is taking a survey of the town to see if there are enough residents in the lower income bracket to go ahead with the project. The survey will be presented at the next city council meeting. The last time Mobeetie had a census was in 1980 and because of the oil business the census was too high.

Because the oil has moved on and there is a drop in Mobeetie's income Mobeetie should have the 51% needed. The well the city is hoping to fund will back up the city's current 350 foot deep well. This current well pumps 200 gallons a minute and was paid for in part by a loan through the Farmers Home Administration. At the last city meeting Richard Morris who is a engineer with Miriam and Barber at Pampa explained about the T.D.C.A. Grant. This grant is a full payment grant and would pay all expenses. This grant is administered through the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission.

## MOBEETIE FIGHTS RATE INCREASE

In a decision that will affect gas rates in Mobeetie, city officials in Canadian rejected a rate increase by High Plains Natural Gas and replaced it with one of their own. Canadian City Council members April 22nd offered a gas rate of 97c per thousand gallons M.C.F. plus 4.50 customer service charge. This is a increase from 92c per M.C.F. and a \$4.00 service charge. There would also be a \$6.24 per M.C.F. charge to recover \$14.00 Guernsey & Co. of Oklahoma City. High Plains provides gas to Mobeetie Higgins and rural Hemphill County. It wants to increase M.C.F. charges to \$1.45 and customer service charge to \$5.00. This would amount to a annual increase for Mobeetie,

Canadian and Higgins of \$13,000. High Plains threatened to go to the Texas Railroad Commission if they don't get the increase. The High Plains proposal would mean an increase of more than 50% while the city increase would be 12 percent. speaker for High Plains said it had been 31 months since they had an increase and they have to allow for inflation. Of course the 6c charge for the consultant did make the charge higher. City officials in Mobeetie and Higgins are waiting for the decision at Canadian before setting their rates. Mobeetie Mayor Leona House said she didn't want a gas tax increase and would like to keep the gas price as it is.
