The Wheeler County SWCD asks that everyone please be there on time to pick them up. You are reminded that the evergreens are containerized and will need no special preparations to haul them home, unless they are to be hauled in the back of a pickup, in which case they should be covered if the trip is long. However, all other trees are barerooted and you should bring some protection, a small plastic tarp will do nicely, both for your vehicle and to prevent drying of the roots while enroute.

CITY COUNCIL ELECTION
Three places on the Wheeler City Council are to be filled in the election Saturday, April 6. Bobby Vanpool and Berneice Hall are running unopposed for re-election to their places, 1 and 3, on the council. Place 5 is the only contested race on the ballot.

Two names appear on the ballot for Place 5. Walter Simmons and Mark Frankenbery are both seeking the chair being vacated by Jim Hill.

Voters will vote for or against the following: "Shall the Board of Directors of the Wheeler County Water Supply District be authorized and empowered to levy, and cause to be assessed and collected, an ad valorem tax at a rate not to exceed three CENTS (.03c) per \$100 valuation of taxable property in said District for maintenance purposes, all in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, including Chapter 46, Acts of 58th Legislature, Regular Session, 1983?"

Absentee voting will begin Monday, March 18, and continue through Tuesday, April 2. Absentee ballots may be cast at the office of the County Clerk in the Wheeler county courthouse between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m.





serves, the Alternate Presiding Judge of his polling place shall be one of the clerks.

On election day the polling places shall be open from 7:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M.

SECTION 3: Absentee voting for the election shall be conducted at the Office of the county Clerk, County Courthouse, Wheeler, Texas (Mailing Address: P.O. Box 465, Wheeler, Texas 79096) and T.J. Daughtry is hereby appointed clerk for absentee voting. For the period absentee voting is permitted by law, the hours designated for absentee voting by personal appearance shall be from 8:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. on each day except Saturdays, Sundays and official State holidays.

A Special Canvassing Board shall be used for counting absentee votes and Harold Kennedy is hereby appointed Alternate Presiding Judge of the Special Canvassing Board.

TEXAS GARDENER TIPS

Protect Your Lawn From Thatch Build-Up

Thatch, a condition created when grass clippings and other organic matter build up in your lawn, can be both desirable and destructive.

To be beneficial, a layer of thatch should not exceed one-half inch in depth. At that level, thatch forms a cushion in the lawn which will help it withstand the wear and tear of normal use. It also insulates the soil from high temperatures and reduces water evaporation.

However, if the thatch layer becomes too deep, it may seriously reduce water movement in the soil. It also will reduce soil aeration needed for root growth, increase disease and insect problems, and creates a barrier for the movement of insecticides and fertilizers.

The major cause of thatch build-up is the use of high rates of soluble nitrogen fertilizers. Nitrogen stimulates growth and can produce plant

residues faster than they can be decomposed.

A lawn with too much thatch is spongy. To estimate the depth of thatch, remove a small section of turf, making sure you cut deep enough to go through the thatch layer and into the soil. Measure the amount of thatch. If it's thicker than a half inch, take action.

The best time to remove thatch is in the spring before the lawn turns green. There are specially designed machines for this task with blades that rotate up and down, called vertical mowers, power rakes or de-thatching mowers. When using any of these machines, make sure the blades

penetrate into the soil layer. On St. Augustine lawns, the knives should be spaced 2 to 3 inches apart; on bermuda grass, 1 to 1 1/2 inches. The lawn should be mowed vertically in two or three directions, each time removing the material brought up by the mower.

Another means of thatch control is to lower the height of the lawn mower's blade for the first cutting in the spring. Mow the lawn in several directions, removing the dead material after each mowing. This method is not as effective as using a vertical mower.

The most desirable way to control thatch is through prevention, which can be accomplished by following a good lawn care program.
